AN ORDINANCE

No. 11 of 1907.

Title.

To make provision for the proper Notification of Amendments to Indian Acts applicable to the Protectorate.

Date.

[27th November 1907.]

Be it enacted by the Governor of the East Africa Protectorate with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council theroof:

Short title.

Amendment to Indian Acts applied to the Protectorate not to become operative in the Protectorate until applied by Ordinance.

This Ordinance may be cited as "The Applied Acts Ordinance 1907".

An Act of any Legislature of India amending or substituted for any Act of such Legislature which has been made applicable to and brought into operation in the Protectorate shall, if such Act has been passed before the publication of this Ordinance, apply to the Protectorate as from the date when such act shall have come into force in India; but no such act passed after the publication of this Ordinance shall apply to the Protectorate until it shall be applied by Ordinance.

Proclamation.

WHEREAS THE DOMINIONS OF HIS HIGHNESS THE SULTAN OF WITU are under the protection of His Majesty the King of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Emperor of India, and form part of the territories known as the British East Africa Protectorate AND WHEREAS His Majesty has jurisdiction by Treaty, Grant, Usage, Sufferance and other lawful means within the said Protectorate AND WHEREAS in exercise of the said jurisdiction laws have been made and are from time to time made for the said Protectorate by or with the approval and in accordance with the Orders of His Majesty. AND WHEREAS doubts have been expressed as to whether the laws so made do apply to that part of the said Protectorate as is within the Dominions of His Highness the Sultan of Witu. NOW THEREFORE KNOW ALL MENTHATI, OMAR BIN MAHOMED SULTAN OF WITU do hereby proclaim and declare that ALL LAWS already made or which may hereafter be made for the British East Africa Protectorate by or with the authority of His Majesty the King of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Emperor of India, are and shall be in force within my Dominions save in so far as any such law shall provide to the contrary, and shall be enforced by my Officers and by such Officers as His Majesty may be pleased to appoint to assist me in administering the said laws and the Government of my Dominions.

Rules.

Rules issued by His Excellency the Governor under the provisions of "The East Africa Townships Ordinance 1903-06."

These rules shall apply to the township of Nakuru.

The Provincial Commissioner of the Province of Naivasha shall nominate annually a Committee consisting of two Protectorate Officials, one of whom shall be the District Commissioner of the district, one Railway Official subject to the concurrence of the Manager of the Uganda Railway, and two European non-official residents in the Township.

(3) The Committee shall from time to time frame and submit to the Governor for his approval

rules for the health, order and good government of the Township of Nakuru.

Meetings of the Nakurn Municipal Committee shall be held at regular intervals provided that special meetings may be convened when required by the District Commissioner or at the written request of two members on giving one week's notice of such special meeting to every member. Three

members shall form a quorum for the transaction of business.

All resolutions of the aforesaid Committee shall be passed by a majority of the members present and in the event of there being an equal number of votes for and against any motion the Chairman shall have

NOTICE is hereby given that the officers of the Administration and Native Affairs will do their best to supply labour for settlers, planters, contractors and others on the following terms:-

1. The employer shall erect suitable huts for the employed or see that they are properly housed. 2. The employer shall provide each of the employed with one good blanket free of charge on his

- arrival at the place of work for the use of the employed whilst in his employ.

 3. The employer shall endeavour to give to the employed such food as they are accustomed to in their own country. He shall supply to each of the employed 2 lbs. of rice, maize or other suitable and wholesome grain or 2 lbs. of flour or beans every day. He shall further supply 2 lbs. of sweet potatoes or suitable alternative to be approved by the District Commissioner or Assistant to the Secretary for Native Affairs to each of the employed twice a week. An allowance in lieu of food to be paid daily may, with the sanction of the recruiting officer, be given to the employed.

4. The employer shall provide and keep supplied one large sufuria and senia for every ten men.

5. The employer shall detail one man out of every gang of fifty men to cook the food for the rest of the gang, such man to be allowed to return to camp at least 3 hours before the other men.

6. The employer shall report by telegram or by the most direct route to the nearest District

Commissioner or to the nearest Assistant to the Secretary for Native Affairs (Labour Officer) any trouble or friction with his men, any desertions and any outbreak of sickness or deaths amongst his men.

7. The employer shall keep an adequate supply of suitable medicines and bandages at each of his

8. In the event of any of the employed being seriously sick the employer shall arrange for his or their transport by train or by the most direct route to the nearest hospital.

9. In the event of the water supply at a camp being polluted or unfit for drinking purposes the

employer shall arrange for the water to be boiled before it is given to the men to drink. 10. The employer shall deposit the requisite sum with the recruiting officer to enable that officer to

purchase a sufficient supply of food for the men's consumption on the way to and from their homes and place of work. 11. The employer shall deposit with the recruiting officer the wages of the employed or shall give a

suitable security or guarantee to ensure that such wages as are due to the employed will be paid monthly. 12. The employer of men working on or near the Uganda Railway shall take the necessary steps to

rail time expired men from the nearest station to his camp to the station of departure to their homes. 13. The rates of wages obtaining in various districts will be notified from time to time in the

"Official Gazette" by the Secretary for Native Affairs. 14. The fees for the attestation of contracts of service shall be as set forth in the Proclamation under Section No. 6 of the Master and Servants Ordinance 1906.

- 2. Tenders accompanied by samples of the article to be supplied should reach the Deputy Superintendent of Mombasa Gaol not later than the 10th December 1907 and will be opened on 12th
- 3. The contract to be granted may extend over a period of one year, and the Contractor will be required to supply the articles, as specified in a Schedule to be attached to the contract, at the prices agreed to according to the samples supplied and accepted and in such quantities as shall from time to time be ordered, provided that the quantities set out in the notice of the various articles to be supplied shall be taken only as an indication of the probable amount of the articles which may be required and shall be in no way binding on the Superintendent of the Gaol.
