AT THE COURT AT BUCKINGHAM PALACE,

The 2nd day of November 1907.

PRESENT,

THE KING'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS the territories of Africa known as the East Africa Protectorate are under the protection of His Majesty the King:

And whereas by treaty, grant, usage, sufferance and other lawful means, His Majesty has power and jurisdiction within the Protectorate:

And whereas by an Order of His Majesty in Council bearing date the eleventh day of August, 1902, and entitled "The East Africa Order in Council, 1902," provision was made for the administration of the government of the said Protectorate by a Commissioner:

And whereas by a further Order of His Majesty in Council bearing date the twenty-second day of October, 1906, it was provided that a Governor should be appointed for the said Protectorate in place of a Commissioner:

And whereas by the Fifteenth and Sixteenth Articles of the last recited Order provision was made for the administration of the Government of the said Protectorate in the absence of the Governor, and it is desirable to make other provision in lieu thereof:

NOW, THEREFORE, His Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers on that behalf by the Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890, or otherwise, in His Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered as follows:—

I. This Order may be cited as "The East Africa Order in Council, 1907."

II. Articles XV. and XVI. of the above recited Order in Council of the twenty-second day of October, 1906, are as from the coming into operation of this Order hereby revoked without prejudice to anything lawfully done thereunder, and in place thereof the following articles shall be substituted and take effect:—

"XV. Whenever the office of Governor is vacant, or if the Governor become incapable or be absent from the Protectorate, or is from any cause prevented from acting in the duties of his office, the person appointed by His Majesty to be Lieutenant-Governor of the Protectorate, or if there be no such Officer therein, or such Officer be unable to act, then such person or persons as His Majesty may appoint under His Sign Manual and Signet, and in default of any such appointment the Senior Member of the Executive Council shall, during His Majesty's pleasure, administer the Government of the Protectorate, first taking the oaths hereinbefore directed to be taken by the Governor and in the manner herein prescribed, which being done, the Lieutenant-Governor or any other such Administrator as aforesaid is hereby authorized, empowered, and commanded to do and execute, during His Majesty's pleasure, all things that belong to the office of Governor according to the tenour of his Order, and according to His Majesty's Instructions as aforesaid, and the laws of the Protectorate. Provided that the Governor during his passage by sea to or from any part of the Protectorate, or when, in the exercise or discharge of any powers or duties by this Order in Council or otherwise conferred or imposed upon him, he is in any territories adjacent to or near to the Protectorate, shall not be considered to be absent from the Protectorate."

"XVI. In the event of the Governor having occasion at any time to be temporarily absent for a short period from the seat of Government, or, in the exercise or discharge of any powers or duties by this Order in Council or otherwise conferred or imposed upon him by His Majesty, to visit any territories adjacent to or near to the Protectorate, he may by an instrument under the Public Seal of the Protectorate appoint the Lieutenant-Governor, or, if there be no such Officer, or such Officer is absent or unable to act, then any other person to be his Deputy within any part of the Protectorate, and in that capacity to exercise, during his pleasure, such of the powers hereby vested in the Governor, except the powers of suspension and pardon, as shall in and by such instrument be specified and limited, but no others. The appointment of such Deputy shall not affect the exercise by the Governor himself of any of his powers or authorities. Such Deputy shall, in the discharge of his office, conform to and observe all such instructions as the Governor shall address to him for his guidance."

III. His Majesty, His heirs and successors, in Council may at any time revoke, alter, or amend this Order.

IV. This Order shall be read and proclaimed within the Protectorate, and shall thereupon commence and come into operation.

And the Right Honourable the Earl of Elgin, K. G., one of His Majestys Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein.

EAST AFRICA PROTECTORATE.

AN ORDINANCE

No. 15 of 1907.

To make better provision for regulating the manufacture and sale of Native Intoxicating Liquors. Title.

[December 18th, 1907.]

Date.

BE it enacted by the Governor of the East Africa Protectorate with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof:—

1. In this Ordinance “Native Intoxicating Liquor” means palm wine (Tembo tamu and tembo kali), pombe, fermented asali and all other native intoxicating liquors. Definition.

2. (1) Save as hereinafter provided no person shall sell any native intoxicating liquor except he has first taken out a licence from the District Commissioner the charge for which shall be thirty Rupees per annum. The sale of native liquor prohibited except as authorized by this Ordinance.

(2) Such licence shall authorize the holder to sell native intoxicating liquor on such premises only as the District Commissioner shall approve and shall specify on the licence.

3. (1) The owner of any tree tapped for palm wine shall pay a tax of one Rupee per annum for every tree tapped. Tax on trees tapped for tembo.

(2) The making of fermented asali for sale is prohibited except the persons making the same shall be licensed by the District Commissioner. There shall be paid for every such licence the sum of twenty-five Rupees per annum. Licences required by persons making fermented asali.

4. A person who has paid a tax under Section 3 (1) or has obtained a licence under Section 3 (2) may without a licence sell palm wine or asali respectively to a person licensed under Section 2. Persons authorized to sell to licensed dealer.

5. No premises licensed for the sale of native intoxicating liquors shall be used as a dwelling house. No sale in a dwelling house.

6. The District Commissioner may refuse to grant a licence in respect of any premises or to any person. The discretion of licensing Officer unlimited.

7. Any Magistrate or Police Officer of or above the rank of an Inspector and any other Police Officer having special written authority from a Magistrate or Police Officer of or above the rank of an Inspector may at any hour enter any unlicensed premises in which he suspects an illicit sale of native intoxicating liquors and may take into custody all persons found therein, and may take possession of all liquor found therein, and all persons taken into custody shall be brought before a Magistrate as soon as possible or may be admitted to bail, and upon conviction all such liquors found therein shall be forfeited. Power to search unlicensed premises.

8. Any Officer of Police may enter any licensed premises at any time when he has reasonable grounds for believing that liquor is being sold on such premises contrary to the provisions of this Ordinance. Power to enter licensed premises.

9. No native intoxicating liquor shall be sold on any licensed premises except between the hours of 6-30 a.m. and 9 p.m. Hours for sale of liquor.

10. No person other than a person of African extraction shall hold a licence under this Ordinance. Only natives of Africa may be licensed to sell native liquors.

11. No licensed person shall supply any native intoxicating liquor to an intoxicated person or allow drunkenness upon his licensed premises. Prohibition of sale to intoxicated person.

Licences to expire on 31st December.	12. Every licence granted under this Ordinance shall expire on the 31st day of December of the year in which it was issued.
Licence not to be transferred without sanction.	13. A licence to sell native intoxicating liquor shall not be transferred from one person to another person or from one premises to other premises except with the consent of the District Commissioner and on payment to the Government of a fee of five Rupees.
Penalty.	14. Save as provided by Section 4 of this Ordinance any unlicensed person who shall sell native intoxicating liquor and any licensed person who shall sell native intoxicating liquor on premises other than those authorized by his licence shall upon conviction be liable to imprisonment of either description for a term which may extend to twelve months or to a fine up to one thousand Rupees or to both and to forfeiture of any licence under this Ordinance.
Penalties.	15. Any person who shall contravene any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall, where other provision is not made by this Ordinance, be liable to a term of imprisonment of either description which may extend to six months or to a fine not exceeding five hundred Rupees or to both and to forfeiture of any licence under this Ordinance.
Sale to include barter.	16. In this Ordinance the words "sale" and "sell" shall include "barter".
Officers authorised to enter upon private land for purposes of this Ordinance.	17. Any Officer of the Government duly appointed on that behalf may enter upon any land for the purpose of counting and examining the trees thereon for the purposes of this Ordinance.
Licences in native locations.	18. In any Township or Municipality in which an area has been set apart as a native location a licence under Section 2 of this Ordinance shall not be issued in respect of any premises not situate in such native location.
Special licences.	19. A District Commissioner may issue a special licence authorizing the person named therein to sell native intoxicating liquor on premises mentioned in such licence during the hours specified therein but not exceeding in all 24 hours. There shall be paid in respect of every such licence a fee of two Rupees.
Repeal.	20. The Native Liquors Regulations of 1900 and the Native Liquor (Licences) Ordinance 1905 are hereby repealed.
Short title.	21. This Ordinance may be cited as "The East Africa Native Liquor Ordinance 1907" and shall come into force on 31st day of December 1907. Provided however that the Governor may by a Proclamation postpone the operation of the provisions of this Ordinance in so far as they relate to the imposition of a tax on trees tapped for tembo for a period not exceeding twelve months from the 31st day of December 1907.

PROCLAMATION.

Under the Native Intoxicating Liquors Ordinance, 1907.

In pursuance of the powers conferred upon me by Section 21 of "The East Africa Native Liquor Ordinance, 1907"

I hereby order that the provisions of the said Ordinance in so far as they relate to the imposition of a tax on trees tapped for tembo shall not come into operation until the 31st day of December, 1908.

PROCLAMATION.

Diseases of Animals Ordinance 1906.

In pursuance of the powers conferred upon me by Section 4 of the Diseases of Animals Ordinance 1906 I hereby declare all that area in the Ukamba Province set forth and described in the Schedule hereto to be an infected area and I hereby prohibit the movement of cattle from one farm in such area to another farm in such area or on to or along any public road, track, or way in such area accept with the permission of a Veterinary Officer, Inspector or other Officer in charge of such area.

The area bounded by a line from the Athi River Station along the Athi River to Donyo-Sabuk, thence along the Eastern Boundaries of the settled farms to Fort Hall, thence to the Kamiti River, thence along the Northern borders of the settled farms to mile post 353 on the Railway, thence along the Railway to mile post 348, thence along the Eastern boundary of the Forest Reserve to the Southernmost point of the Scottish Mission settlement, thence to Messrs. Peak and Bull's farm, thence along the Southern boundaries of the settled farms to the Mbagathi River, thence along this river to its junction with the Athi River, thence along the Athi River to Athi River Station.

RULES.

Rules issued by the Governor of the East Africa Protectorate under the provisions of the Diseases of Animals Ordinance 1907.

Dated this 16th day of December, 1907.

1. Any person who within any area proclaimed to be an infected area within the meaning of the Diseases of Animals Ordinance 1906 shall open and leave open or finding open shall on passing through neglect to shut and fasten any gate in any fence shall be liable to a fine not exceeding Rs. 1,500/- or imprisonment not exceeding 6 months of either kind or both.

2. The owner or person in charge of any stock or cattle which shall without the authority and sanction of the Veterinary Officer or other Officer in charge of an infected area be on any public road, track or way in such area within which the movement of stock or cattle as the case may be is prohibited shall be liable to the like punishment as in the preceding rule provided.

3. Whenever by any Proclamation the movement of stock or cattle from one farm to another farm is prohibited, the owner or person in charge of any stock or cattle as the case may be which shall be moved in contravention of such Proclamation shall be liable to the like punishment as in the first of these Rules provided.

NOTICE.

Notice is hereby given that farmers and settlers will be granted a free issue of timber from Government Forests for the purpose of erecting fences, buildings and outhouses on their lands. This privilege will last for a period of one year in the case of farms already occupied, and for two years from the date of occupation of all farms granted hereafter. The privilege is subject to the following conditions :—

(1.) Timber, obtained as above without payment from Government, cannot be sold.

(2.) No trees may be felled until a permit to do so has been obtained from the Chief Conservator of Forests.

(3.) Trees felled under these rules must have been previously selected and marked as exploitable by the Forest Department.

(4.) Only nature of timber will be granted under these rules ; young trees will not be allowed to be felled for poles. For fencing, timber split from the heartwood of durable species of timber should be employed as far as possible.

(5.) **Firewood :** *Bonâ fide* dead wood can be removed from the forests without a special permit for a period of two years from the date of occupation of farms granted hereafter. This privilege will be rescinded should timber otherwise than dead wood be removed at any time.

(6.) No farmer having forest available on his own land may obtain free timber or firewood under these rules.

(7.) A certificate certifying that the timber is essential to the applicant and that he is deserving of a free grant of timber must be obtained from the Honourable the Commissioner for Lands and be presented to the Chief Conservator of Forests.

(8.) It is understood that farmers in receipt of a free grant of timber or fuel will in return assist the Forest Department in preserving the forest in their neighbourhood, and at once report forest fires and all unlawful acts committed in the forest to the nearest Police or Forest Officer.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as “The Uganda Arms Amendment Ordinance, 1907.”
2. The yearly gun tax imposed by the Uganda Arms Ordinance, 1906, Section 30, is hereby reduced from three rupees to two rupees in respect of each fire-arm possessed, used or carried by a native of the Protectorate solely within any Province District or Sub-division of the Protectorate to which this Ordinance is applied as hereinafter mentioned.
3. The Governor may, subject to the approval of the Secretary of State, apply this Ordinance by Proclamation to any Province District or Sub-division of the Protectorate.
