An Ordinance to amend the Law Relating to Banking.

[March 19th, 1917]

Date of Assent and Commence-

Colonial Bank

to be a British

BE it enacted by the Governor of the East Africa ment Protectorate with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof —

1 This Ordinance may be cited as "The Bank Amendment Short title Ordinance, 1917," and shall be read together with the Bank

- Ordinance, 1910, hereafter referred to as the Principal Ordinance 2 Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in the Principal Power to Ordinance contained the Governor may in his absolute discretion declare a by Proclamation declare any Bank duly constituted in any British Dominion or Colony in accordance with the laws for the time being in force therein relating to the formation of Companies,
- and engaged in the business of banking within the Protectorate to be a British Bank for the purposes of the Principal Ordinance Provided that such declaration shall not be made unless and until such bank has shewn to the Governor's satisfaction that the law under which such bank is constituted provides adequate safeguards for control over its operations

3 Part III of the Principal Ordinance shall not apply to any Part III of Bank declared under this Ordinance to be a British Bank

Principal Ordinance not to apply Lists and

- 4 (1) Every Bank declared under this Ordinance to be a British Bank shall within 60 days after the 31st December in summaries each year forward or cause to be forwarded to the Governor in to be made duplicate a list of all persons who on such 31st December are members of the company and all persons who have ceased to be members since the date of the last return made hereunder
- (2) The list shall state the names, last known addresses and occupations of all the past and present members therein mentioned and the number of shares held by each of the existing members at the date of the return specifying shares transferred since the date of the last return by persons who are still members and have ceased to be members respectively and the dates of the registration of the transfers and shall contain a summary distinguishing between shares issued for cash and shares issued as fully or partly paid up otherwise than in cash and specifying the following particulais —
 - (a) The amount of the share capital of the company and the number of the shares into which it is divided
 - (b) The number of shares taken from the commencement of the company up to the date of the return
 - (c) The amount called up on each share
 - (d) The total amount of calls received
 - (e) The total amount of calls unpaid
 - (f) The total amount of the sums (if any) paid by way of commission in respect of any shares or debentures of allowed by way of discount in respect of any debentures since the date of the last return
 - (g) The total number of shares forfeited
 - (h) The total amount of shares or stock for which share warrants are outstanding at the date of the return
 - (1) The total amount of share warrants issued and suirendered respectively since the date of the last return
 - (h) The number of shares or amount of stock compused in each share warrant
 - (1) The names and addresses of the persons who at the date of the return are the directors of the company of occupy the position of directors by whatever name called and
 - (m) The total amount of debt due from the company in respect of all mortgages and charges

- (3) The summary shall also include a statement made up to such date as may be specified in the statement in the form of a balance sheet audited by the company's auditors and containing a summary of its share capital its liabilities and its assets giving such particulars as will disclose the general nature of those liabilities and assets and how the values of the fixed assets have been arrived at but the balance sheet need not include a statement of profit and loss
- (4) The above list and summary shall be signed by the manager or by the Secretary of the company
- (5) If a Bank declared under this Ordinance to be a British Bank makes default in complying with the requirements of this section it shall be liable to a fine not exceeding Rs 75/- for every day during which the default continues

Statements to be made

- 5 (1) Every Bank declared under this Ordinance to be a British Bank shall within 60 days after the 31st December in each year forward or cause to be forwarded to the Governor two copies of a statement in the form set out in the Schedule to the Principal Ordinance Every such statement shall be signed by a director
- (2) If default is made in compliance with this section the Bank shall be liable to a fine not exceeding Rs 75/- for every day during which the default continues

Statements, lists and summaries to be filed with Registrar of Companies 6 One copy of every statement, list and summary received by the Governor under the provisions of this Ordinance shall be filed at the office of the Registrar of Companies and may there be inspected and copies thereof may be obtained in the manner and on payment of the fees prescribed for the inspection and copies of similar documents relating to the companies registered in the Protectorate

AN ORDINANCE

No 2 of 1917

An Ordinance to provide for the Discipline of the Crews of Vessels Chartered or Requisitioned by the Admiralty.

Date of Assent and Commence ment

[March 19th, 1917]

BE it enacted by the Governor of the East Africa Protectorate with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof—

Short title

1 This Ordinance may be cited as 'The Merchant Seamen Discipline Ordinance, 1917''

Offences

- 2 (1) If whilst within the jurisdiction a seaman lawfully engaged in accordance with the Merchant Shipping Acts, 1894 to 1914, to serve on board any British ship belonging to or chartered or requisitioned by the Admiralty
 - (a) Neglects or refuses without leasonable cause to join his ship or to proceed to sea in his ship, or is absent without leave from his ship or from his duty at any time, or
 - (b) Joins his ship or is whilst on board his ship in a state of drunkenness so that the performance of his duties or the navigation of his ship is thereby impeded,

he shall be guilty of an offence, and the Master Mate or Owner of the ship or his Agent or any Commissioned Naval Officer may with or without the assistance of any Police Officer convey on board his ship any seaman whom he has reason to believe to be guilty of an offence under this section, and may also arrest him without first procuring a warrant, and Police Officers are hereby directed to give assistance if required Provided always that no Commissioned Naval Officer acting in pursuance of t aforesaid shall be liable to any penalty or to any action for damages for false imprisonment

(2) If such seaman is brought before a Magistrate holding a Penalties Subordinate Court of the First Class on a charge of having committed an offence under this section, he shall, if the offence comes within the provisions of paragraph (a) of sub-section (1) of this section be liable to the penalties prescribed for such offences in section 221 of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, and if the offence comes within the provisions of paragraph (b) of sub-section (1) of this section he shall be liable to a fine not exceeding Rs 75/

No 3 of 1917

An Ordinance to amend the Criminal Law.

[March 19th, 1917]

Date of Assent and Commencement

BE it enacted by the Governor of the East Africa Protectorate with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof —

- This Ordinance may be cited as "The Criminal Short title Law Amendment (Advertisements) Ordinance, 1917 "
- Whoever shall publicly advertise a reward for the return Criminal of any property whatsoever of which he or any other person shall advertise have been deprived by any offence punishable under the Indian Penal Code as applied to the Protectorate of which has been lost and shall in such advertisement use any words purporting that no questions will be asked, or shall make use of any words in any public advertisement purporting that a reward will be given or paid for any property of which any person shall have been deprived by any offence punishable under the Indian Penal Code as applied to the Protectorate or which shall have been lost without seizing of making any inquiry after the person producing such property or shall promise or offer in any such public advertisement to ieturn to any pawnbioker or other person who may have bought or advanced money by way of loan upon any property of which any person shall have been deprived by any offence punishable under the Indian Penal Code as applied to the Protectorate or which shall have been lost the money so paid or advanced or any other sum of money or reward for the return of such property or shall print or publish any such advertisement shall be hable to a fine not exceeding Rs 750/- or to a term of implisonment of either description not exceeding six months or to both

No 4 of 1917

An Ordinance to make further provision with Regard to the Disposal of Enemy Property.

Date of Assent and Commence ment

| March 19th, 1917]

BE it enacted by the Governor of the East Africa Protectorate with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof —

Short title

1 This Ordinance may be cited as 'The Enemy Property (Disposal) Ordinance, 1917' and shall be construed with the Trading with the Enemy Ordinances, 1915 and 1916

Interpreta tion

- 2 Firm' means any person, company or association or body of persons corporate or unincorporate the business of whom or which has been or shall on or after the commencement of this Ordinance be the subject of the appointment of a liquidator under any of the provisions of the Trading with the Enemy Ordinances, 1915 and 1916 relating to the appointment of a liquidator
- "Immoveable property" includes any right whether legal or equitable in or arising out of immoveable property
- "Liquidator" means any liquidator appointed under the Trading with the Enemy Ordinances, 1915 and 1916
 - "Corporation under Enemy Control" includes —
 - (a) A corporation of which any of the Directors or persons occupying the position of Director by whatever name called is an enemy or enemy subject
 - (b) A corporation shareholders in which holding ten per cent of more of the issued capital or voting rights of the corporation are enemies or enemy subjects or persons who hold such issued capital or voting rights directly or indirectly for or at the disposal of enemies or enemy subjects
 - (c) A corporation which is by any other means whether of a like or different character in fact under the control directly or indirectly of enemies or enemy subjects or corporation under enemy control
 - (d) A corporation the executive whereof is a corporation within (a) (b) or (c)
 - "Court" means the High Court
- "Enemy" means any person who is or is treated as an enemy under any Act of Parliament Order in or of Council or Royal Proclamation for the time being in force or under any Proclamation issued by the Governor in pursuance of the law relating to Trading with the Enemy for the time being in force
- 'Enemy subject' means a subject of a State for the time being at war with His Majesty

Power to vest immoveable property of firms in Liquidation.

3 (1) The Governor may by order published in the Gazette vest in the Liquidator of any firm of which the liquidation has been ordered by the Governor under any of the provisions of the Trading with the Enemy Ordinances 1915 and 1916, any immoveable property belonging to or vested in any such firm subject to any subsisting rights of way or apparent easements affecting the same but otherwise free from encumbrances

- 3 (2) I very right title or interest of any person other than the Crown of the public and other than subsisting rights of way or apparent exsements to and in any immoveable property vested in the liquidator as hereinbefore provided which is derogatory or counter to the estate and interest vested in the liquidator and the benefit of any covenant agreement or reservation in support of any right title or interest shall be absolutely extinguished and no action of other proceeding other than a claim for compensation as hereafter mentioned shall be capable of being taken or proceeded with to enforce the same
- 4 The Liquidator shall as soon as conveniently may be after Liquidator to the publication in the Gazette of an order of the Governor under sell immovethe last preceding section offer for sale by public auction or private treaty all immoveable property vested in him by any such order, and the receipt of the Liquidator for the purchase money in respect of any such sale shall be a good discharge to the purchaser of the said property

Subject to the leave of the Governor an enemy may be permitted to send in any such claim and be represented before the Court under the provisions of the next sub-section

- (2) After the expiration of the six months from the date of such notice or within such extended time as aforesaid the Court shall if any claim has been sent in under the preceding sub-section issue a summons to the Liquidator and to the claimant or his agent (but in the case of an enemy claimant only with the leave of the Governor) calling upon them to appear at a time and place named when the claim will be heard and determined No appeal shall lie from the decision of the Court upon any claim Liquidator shall be entitled to be paid his costs charges and expenses of and in connexion with the said notice and claim (if any) and summons (if any) but the costs of any claimant in connexion with any claim and summons shall be in the discretion of the Court and the Court if it thinks fit may order the claimant to pay all the costs of the summons
- (3) (a) After the expiration of the said six months or such extended time as aforesaid or after the determination by the Court of the claim (if any) of which notice has been sent in as aforesaid the proceeds of sale paid into Court or the balance (if any) thereof after deducting the costs charges and expenses of the Liquidator and any sums directed by the Court to be paid or retained thereout in respect of claims (if any) allowed thereon and any claimant's costs allowed by the Court shall be paid to the Liquidator and may be dealt with by him in like manner as the other assets of the firm and no person who has not given notice of a claim within the said six months or such extended time as aforesaid shall thereafter without the leave of the Governor be entitled to make or enforce any claim upon the said proceeds of sale or the other assets of the firm in respect of any right title interest or benefit declared to be extinguished as aforesaid

- (b) If an enemy establishes a claim to compensation out of the purchase money or any part thereof neither the amount of his claim nor any part thereof shall be paid out to him but shall be retained and remain in Court and shall be dealt with after the termination of the present War in such manner as the Governor may by order under his hand direct
- (c) If an enemy subject, (not being an enemy) or a corporation under enemy control establishes a claim to compensation out of the purchase money or any part thereof neither the amount of such claim nor any part thereof shall without the consent of the Governor be paid to him and if the Governor does not so consent or to the extent to which he does not so consent the amount shall be retained and remain in Court and shall be dealt with after the termination of the present War in such manner as the Governor may by order under his hand direct
- (d) The Liquidator appointed or to be appointed of the business of any firm which being entitled or permitted to make a claim hereunder has established a claim to compensation out of any purchase money in Court may with the leave of the Governor apply to have the same paid out to him as assets of the firm
- (e) If the Court in considering the claim of any person for compensation out of any purchase money as aforesaid under section 6 (1) hereof is of opinion that such person should be allowed to rank as an ordinary creditor on the other assets of the firm for any amount or balance of any amount allowed him by way of compensation which the purchase money in Court is not sufficient to provide the Court may with the approval of the Governor order that such person shall rank as an ordinary creditor on such other assets of the firm as were not distributed by the Liquidator at the time when he received notice of such claim for such amount or balance but the amount payable to any such claimant by the Liquidator shall if the amount (if any) allowed him by way of compensation out of the purchase money would have been retained in Court be paid into Court by the Liquidator in manner aforesaid and be dealt with under the provisions of paragraphs (b) and (c) of this sub-section and shall also be subject to the rights of the Liquidator of any such claimant as is provided in paragraph (d) of this sub section
- (f) Any costs charges and expenses of any abortive sale by the Liquidator of immoveable property may be paid by or retained by the Liquidator out of any other assets of the firm that may come to his hands as a first charge thereon

Liquidator may assign leases without consent of the lessor 7 (1) Except where the Crown is the lessor the Liquidator may sell or assign any immoveable property being leasehold property without the consent of the lessor any covenant or condition in the lease to the contrary notwithstanding and such sale or assignment shall not constitute a breach of any covenant or condition

Liquidator may assign notwithstand ing breaches of covenant or condition (2) In the case of any lease specified in an order made by the Governor under section 3 hereof the lessor or other person in whom the reversion expectant on the termination thereof shall for the time being be vested shall not be entitled to exercise or enforce any power of re-entry under or right of forfeiture of such lease by reason of any breach of any covenant or condition prior to the date of completion of the sale thereof by the Liquidator nor till the expiration of six months from such date by reason of any breach of a covenant or condition imposing on the lessee an obligation to trade upon the premises therein comprised

Prohibition of proceedings without leave of Governor where a Liquidator has been appointed under the Trading with the Enemy Ordinance, 1915-1916

8 When an Order has been made under the Trading with the Enemy Ordinances, 1915 and 1916, for the appointment of a Liquidator of the business of a firm no insolvency petition or petition for winding up such firm shall be presented or resolution for the winding up of such firm passed or steps for the enforcement of the rights of any claimants upon or against the firm (except such as are provided for in section 6 (1) hereof) taken without the consent of the Governor

9 The Liquidator shall not sell any immoveable property to Liquidator an enemy or enemy subject or a corporation under enemy control or to any person acting for an enemy or enemy subject or enemy corporation under enemy control and further shall not complete subject or a any sale of immoveable property unless and until the purchaser being an individual or corporation shall have made a statutory control declaration in the appropriate form set out in the schedule Such declaration in the case of a corporation being a purchaser shall be made by some official of the corporation duly authorized thereto by the corporation

- 13 (1) The Governor may at any time require any person claiming to be the owner lessee or mortgagee of any immoveable owner, etc, of property sold by the Liquidator or of any part thereof or of any right title or interest therein to furnish him in writing with such particulars as appear to the Governor to be necessary to enable him to ascertain whether or not the person is or holds the property on any part thereof or any right title or interest therein for or on behalf of or in trust for or for the benefit of or in any way so as to come under the control of an enemy, enemy subject or corporation under enemy control or of a person who but for the conclusion of any peace in connexion with the present War would be an enemy, enemy subject or corporation under enemy control and in the case of a corporation may also require any Director of the corporation or person occupying the position of Director by whatever name called or the Secretary or any other officer of the corporation performing the duties of Secretary or any person acting as manager or agent for the corporation in connexion with the property to furnish the required particulars
 - (11) If any person fails when required to furnish such particulars as it is in his power to give or ascertain or furnishes particulars which are false in any material particular he shall be liable to a penalty of fifteen hundred rupees or to six months' implisonment of to both
 - (111) Where any particulars have been furnished in accordance with this section such particulars may be used in evidence against the person or corporation by whom they are furnished in any proceedings under section 10 or section 11 hereof and the fact that any person who has been required to furnish particulais in accordance with this section refuses or neglects to furnish such particulars as it is in his power to give or ascertain or furnishes particulars which are false in any material particular shall be piima facie evidence in the case of proceedings under section 10 or section 11 hereof that the person regarding whom the particulars were required is an enemy, enemy subject or corporation under enemy control or a person who but for the conclusion of any peace in connexion with the present War would be an enemy, enemy subject or corporation under enemy control

Registration of Ordinance

14 This Ordinance and every Order hereunder shall be registered in the Crown Lands Registration Office and with the Principal Registral appointed under the Land Titles Amendment Ordinance, 1910, and shall be deemed to be a valid and effectual registration for the purposes of the Crown Lands Ordinance, 1915, and the Land Titles Amendment Ordinance, 1910, as the case may be, with respect to all estates and interests vested in the Liquidator by virtue of this Ordinance

Indemnity to Liquidator

15 The Liquidator shall not be personally liable in respect of any immoveable property vested in him as aforesaid and this Ordinance shall be a complete indemnity to the Liquidator for any acts done pursuant thereto

WHEREAS it is desirable that the conditions of active service shall cease to apply to those officers and men of the East Africa Police who are employed on civil duties NOW THERE-FORE I, Henry Conway Belfield, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the East Africa Protectorate, hereby declare that the Proclamation of the 5th day of August, 1914, (Proclamation No 17) shall cease to apply to that part of the East Africa Police Force which is employed on civil duties

Note (4) —In order to minimise as far as possible any inconvenience which may be caused to British traders by the dislocation of export trade owing to the inclusion in the Statutory List of a former connection, the Foreign Trade Department is collecting and classifying the names of non-enemy firms who may be able to act as substitutes for firms mentioned in the Statutory List A considerable amount of information is already available at the Foreign Irade Department, and it is in many cases possible to suggest the names of satisfactory substitutes without the necessity of referring the matter abroad. The Department is, however, prepared on application to enquire of His Majesty's Representatives abroad for the names of suitable substitutes. When the applicant wishes this done by telegraph he is required to undertake to pay the cost of telegraphic correspondence. It would greatly facilitate the work of the Foreign Trade Department if applicants in making enquiries would specify the particular trade or trades for which substitutes are required.

Note (5)—The Statutory List for each country is telegraphed, on the day of issue, to His Majesty's Representative in that country who is instructed to notify accordingly British Consular Officers, to whom persons abroad should apply for information as to names on the List—Persons and firms in the United Kingdom with agencies or branches abroad would, however, be well advised to turnish such agencies or branches with issues of the List as they appear. GENERAL NOTICE No. 224

THE REGISTRATION AND CARE OF GRAVES.

DURING the present war a branch of the Adjudant-General's Department has been created to care for and preserve the identity of the graves of British officers and men Units were established for this purpose in France and Belgium shortly after the battle of the Marne, in Egypt and Salonika recently, and an Officer has now been despatched to Mesopotamia

The Director of Graves Registration and Enquiries is the Officer directly responsible The duty of the Graves Registration Units is to register the position of graves and to see that they are marked with durable wooden crosses bearing a metal

inscription giving the name, number, rank, regiment and date of death

While these Units have been successful in registering and marking a large number of graves at the front and many in advanced positions, where they might otherwise have been lost, it is not possible, and never will be possible, to obtain a record of all graves If, as is to be feared, the enemy have in many instances not marked the graves of British officers and men buried within their lines a number of graves will be irretrievably lost In some cases, even within our own lines, though graves have been marked the position is too exposed for a correct plan and survey to be made, in others every trace of a burial ground having been obliterated by the enemy's shell fire there is no hope of reconstructing the cemetery so that individual graves may be recognised. Again, during heavy fighting burials are often carried out under circumstances which make it impossible to take, or at

any rate to transmit, an accurate record of the positions of graves

Early in 1915 it became necessary to make definite arrangements with regard to the provision of land in France for the burial of British officers and men. Up till then, and particularly during the retreat and the subsequent advance to the Aisne, burials had often taken place in isolated graves which were, wherever practicable, cared for with reverence and respect by the French peasants and owners of land, and in a few cases, permanent concessions of land were offered. By this time however French civil cemeteries were being more regularly used and it was also possible to arrange for special burial grounds The Director of Graves Registration and Enquires approached the French Government, through the French Military Authorities, on the matter The French Government immediately expressed the desire to provide land for permanent resting places for British officers and men at the cost of the French nation, and a law was passed which gave effect to this generous impulse, on December 29th, 1915. Since then, in co-operation with the French Army, the Directorate has established authorised burial grounds immediately behind the British front and near the Field Ambulances, the Casualty Clearing Stations and the Hospitals further back. Soldiers are employed, under the Office's of the Graves Registration Units, to look after these burial grounds. In the case however of a battle or severe fighting, isolated burials necessarily still take place

The French Government further offered to maintain these Cemeteries Government has, however, in agreement with the French Government, undertaken to provide for their maintenance in perpetuity and has appointed a National Committee to care for the graves of our officers and men after the war. With the King's consent the

Prince of Wales has accepted the Presidency of this Committee

Relatives are requested to facilitate the work of this branch of the Army (a) by addressing as few enquiries as possible to the Directorate and (b) by realising that pressure of work, and not want of sympathy, will often necessitate a brief reply on a printed form On the other hand the work will be assisted if relatives send to the Director any information they possess as to the place of burial. It is not intended, unless circumstances should show that it is desirable, to make airangements for dealing with enquires made in person Relatives are therefore requested to confine themselves to written communications, which should be addressed to —

> Director of Graves Registration and Enquiries, Wai Office, Winchester House, St James's Square, London, S W

Much unnecessary correspondence will be saved if relatives will carefully note the following facts —

- Some time may elapse after build before the grave has been properly registered and marked and the position accurately recorded. As soon as this is done a notification will be sent to the next-of-kin. This notification may be taken as final verification or correction of information received from other sources
- It is not possible to arrange for the distribution of flowers or wreaths for individual graves, but the cemeteries, as a whole, are grass-sown and planted with flowers and shrubs, where military conditions allow, under the advice of the Director of the Royal Botanic Gardens, Kew Their maintenance is under the supervision of Officers of the Graves Registration Units
- 3 Photographs of such graves in France and Belgium as are accessible to the photographers employed for the purpose are furnished to relatives on application, free of cost, out of funds placed at the disposal of the Directorate, for this object as well as for the planting of burial grounds, by the Joint Wai Committee of the British Red Cross Society and St John Ambulance Association All applications are carefully noted and

photographs are sent as soon as possible, but it will be understood that in many cases weeks or months may pass before photographs can be taken

- 4 Chaumstances not infrequently arise which make it undesirable in the interests of the military situation to disclose the position of a grave although it has been duly registered and recorded
- 5 Many considerations, among which is the desire felt at the front to avoid inequality of treatment, have made it necessary to forbid the erection of any permanent memorials during the progress of hostilities, the sending of crosses to France is also prohibited as all transport is required for material of war
- 6 The exhumation of bodies during the war is strictly forbidden by both the French and British Military Authorities
- 7 Owing to the great difficulties that exist in Mesopotamia due to local and climatic conditions, the proper registration and marking of graves will necessarily be a lengthy and difficult problem

The following particulars furnished by the Curator of Military Graves, East Africa, are published for general information —

Under the instructions of Brigadier-General, R M Ewart, CIE, CMG, DA & QMG I was appointed Curator of Military Graves in British and German East Africa, with orders to make periodical visits to the various Cemeteries, make such improvements as were necessary and to provide a proper means of identifying these Graves

Since my appointment in July, 1916, my time has been occupied in making tours of inspection in the various fields where operations have taken place and submitting reports on the condition of the Military Cemeteries that have come into being during the operations in this part of the globe. I would like to state with feelings of gratification how much my duties in this connection have been simplified by the kind consideration and care bestowed by the various Units in providing some mark of respect or memento to their connectes who have fallen either in action or from illness in prosecuting this War

I whould like to place on record the generosity and kind benevolence shown by the Ladies League of Mercy, Nairobi, who from private donations have supplied many Memorial Stones for fallen Soldiers and would have continued doing so but the work in this direction became more than they could undertake together with the other branches of charity and kindness they have on hand

As regards what has been done up to the present, I would like to state that some seventy Cemeteries have been inspected and some 700 photographs of the various Graves have been taken and to warded through the A G's Office at the Base to the registered next-ot-kin. Some one hundred and fifty-five permanent stone Monuments have been erected over the Graves of Soldiers, in other instances temporary metal crosses have been provided, which are both painted with particulars and then perforated, so that should the paint wear out through rain and other conditions the perforation will remain. These metal crosses are made from empty petrol tins, etc., and are supported by an arched hoop of galvanised from wire. As funds permit and more donations are received these will in time be replaced by permanent stone or concrete memorials. With the exception of one or two isolated graves, the whole of the area north of the Central Railway has been inspected and most of these Cemeteries have been securely fenced in with barbed wire and wire netting, and have distinctive marks on them

His Excellency the Governor has kindly sanctioned the free issues of ornamental plants and shrubs, to be provided by the Agricultural Department, and these have been planted out in places where they could be attended to

Two registers are kept in this Office, one headed Cemeteries, showing all particulars of the graves in each Cemetery, the other, with the names of those who have died air ranged in alphabetical order tor quick reference

Plans have been made of the various Cemeteries inspected and the positions of these are indicated on the maps in this Office by flags

Several letters of thanks and appreciation have been received from the relatives of those who have lost their lives here for photographs of the graves, and also a kind letter of thanks from the Right Honourable General Louis Botha, Minister of Defence, South Africa, on behalf of the relatives of the Members of the South African Union Forces I think I might say that with the exception of a few isolated cases,—where a surprise has taken place, or in an action where the enemy have been in overwhelming numbers, a few cases of dead lett on the field, or buried by the enemy, the positions of which are at present unascertainable—all other graves have had either wood, metal, or stone crosses provided

No Military funds have been set aside for this purpose, and expenses in connection with providing memorials, etc., are paid for from private donations. The Ladies League of Mercy have generously devoted just over £100, and through the Commissioner of the Red Cross and St John Ambulance Society (Col Montgomery) a sum of £100 has been received, in addition to these two items small donations have been received from other private sources. In conclusion I would mention that some 155 stone monuments have been erected, about 500 crosses made of tin and other metal, and the remainder of the graves have wood crosses of some sort or other, which are being replaced as circumstances permit by those of a more permanent nature
