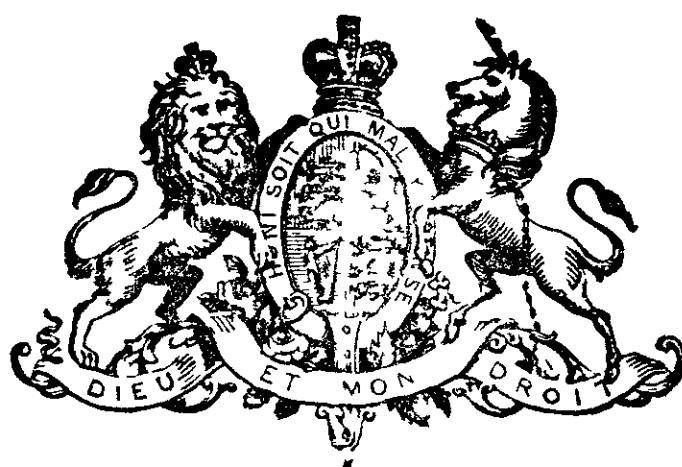

EAST AFRICA PROTECTORATE.

AN ORDINANCE

No 3 of 1920

An Ordinance to Amend the Law Relating to the Powers and Duties of Native Chiefs Councils and Headmen Recognised by the Government and to Provide for the Enforcement of Native Authority

[February 11th, 1920] Date of Assent and
Commencement

BE it enacted by the Acting Governor of the East Africa Protectorate with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof —

1 This Ordinance may be cited as “The Native Authority Amendment Ordinance, 1920” and shall be read and construed as one with the Native Authority Ordinance, 1912, hereinafter referred to as “The Principal Ordinance” Short title

2 Section 7 of the Principal Ordinance shall be and is hereby amended as follows — Amendment to Section 7
of Principal Ordinance

I By the addition of the following clause —

(m) the provision of paid porters for Government servants on tour and for the Government Transport Department and of paid labour for work on the construction or maintenance of railways and roads wherever situated in the Protectorate and for other work of a public nature whether of a like kind to the foregoing or not Provided always that no person shall be required to work under the provisions of this clause —

(a) for a longer period than 60 days in any one year,

(b) if he be fully employed in any other occupation or has been so employed during the preceding 12 months for a period of 3 months,

(c) if he be otherwise exempted under the provisions of any direction issued by the Governor, and

II The word “and” at the end of clause (l) is hereby deleted

III Clause (m) shall become clause (n)

AN ORDINANCE

No 4 OF 1920

An Ordinance to amend the Statistics Ordinance, 1918Date of Assent and
Commencement

[February 11th, 1920]

BE it enacted by the Acting Governor of the East Africa Protectorate with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof —

Short title

1 This Ordinance may be cited as "The Statistics Amendment Ordinance, 1920", and shall be read as one with the Statistics Ordinance, 1918, hereafter referred to as "the Principal Ordinance" and all Ordinances amending the same

Duty of person to answer

2 In Section 5 line 5 of the Principal Ordinance the words "the furnishing of which is prescribed" shall be substituted for the word "required"

Penalty for communicating
information collected to
any other person than a
prescribed person

3 In Section 13 of the Principal Ordinance —

(a) the word "information" shall be substituted for the word "Statistics" wherever it occurs

(b) the words "it relates" shall be substituted for the words "they relate"

AN ORDINANCE

No 5 OF 1920

An Ordinance for the Better Prevention of Corruption.Date of Assent and
Commencement

[February 11th, 1920]

BE it enacted by the Acting Governor of the East Africa Protectorate with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof —

Short title

1 This Ordinance may be cited as "The Prevention of Corruption Ordinance, 1920"

Punishment of corrupt
transactions with agents

2 (1) If any agent corruptly accepts or obtains, or agrees to accept or attempts to obtain, from any person, for himself or for any other person, any gift or consideration as an inducement or reward for doing or forbearing to do, or for having after the passing of this Ordinance done or forborne to do, any act in relation to his principal's affairs or business, or for showing or forbearing to show favour or disfavour to any person in relation to his principal's affairs or business, or

If any person corruptly gives or agrees to give or offers any gift or consideration to any agent as an inducement or reward for doing or forbearing to do, or for having after the passing of this Ordinance done or forborne to do, any act in relation to his principal's affairs or business, or for showing or forbearing to show favour or disfavour to any person in relation to his principal's affairs or business, or

If any person knowingly gives to any agent, or if any agent knowingly uses with intent to deceive his principal any receipt, account, or other document in respect of which the principal is interested, and which contains any statement which is false or erroneous or defective in any material particular, and which to his knowledge is intended to mislead the principal,

he shall be guilty of an offence, and shall be liable on conviction to imprisonment of either description for a term not exceeding two years or to a fine not exceeding Rs 3,000/- or to both such imprisonment and such fine, or on conviction by a Magistrate holding a Subordinate Court of the first class to imprisonment of either description for a term not exceeding 6 months, or to a fine not exceeding Rs 1,500/- or to both such imprisonment and such fine

(2) For the purpose of this Ordinance the expression "consideration" includes valuable consideration of any kind, the expression "agent" includes any person employed by or acting for another, and the expression "principal" includes an employer

(3) A person serving under the Crown or under any municipal corporation is an agent within the meaning of this Ordinance

3 A prosecution for an offence under this Ordinance shall not be instituted without the consent of the Attorney General or Solicitor General

Prosecution of offences

AN ORDINANCE

No 6 OF 1920

An Ordinance to Amend the Law Relating to Master and Servants.

[February 11th, 1920] Date of Assent and Commencement

BE it enacted by the Acting Governor of the East Africa Protectorate with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof —

1 This Ordinance may be cited as "The Master and Servants Amendment Ordinance, 1920" and shall be read and construed as one with the Master and Servants Ordinance, 1910, hereafter referred to as the Principal Ordinance and all amendments thereof

Short title

2 Section 15 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby repealed and the following section is hereby substituted therefor —

Repeal
Penalty for decoying servants

15 Whoever decoys away or unlawfully induces any servant to quit the service of his employer or who attempts to decoy away or attempts unlawfully to induce any servant to quit the service of his employer or who knowingly harbours any servant who may improperly quit the service of his employer shall be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding Rs 1,500/- or to imprisonment of either description not exceeding 6 months or to both such fine and imprisonment

AN ORDINANCE

No 7 OF 1920

An Ordinance to Prohibit the Melting Down or use of Gold and Silver Coins otherwise than as Currency.

[February 11th, 1920] Date of Assent and Commencement

BE it enacted by the Acting Governor of the East Africa Protectorate with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof —

1 This Ordinance may be cited as "The Gold and Silver Currency Protection Ordinance, 1920"

Short title

2 No person shall melt down, break up or use otherwise than as currency any gold or silver coin which is for the time being current in the Protectorate or in the United Kingdom or in any British Possession or Protectorate or in any foreign country

Prohibition on melting down or using except as currency gold and silver coins

Penalty

3 Any person who contravenes any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall on conviction be liable to a fine not exceeding Rs 3,000/- or to imprisonment of either description for a term not exceeding 6 months or to both such fine and imprisonment

AN ORDINANCE

No 8 OF 1920

An Ordinance to make Provision for the Regulation of Aerial Navigation.

Date of Assent and
commencement

[February 11th, 1920]

BE it enacted by the Acting Governor of the East Africa Protectorate with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof —

Short title.

1 This Ordinance may be cited as "The Aerial Navigation Ordinance, 1920"

Power to prohibit
navigation by aircraft
over prescribed areas

2 (1) The Governor-in-Council may —

(a) for the purpose of protecting the public from danger, and

(b) for the purpose of the defence or safety of the Protectorate

from time to time by order prohibit the navigation of aircraft over such areas as may be prescribed in the order

(2) Any such order may apply either generally to all aircraft or to aircraft of such classes and descriptions only as may be specified in the order and may prohibit the navigation of aircraft over any such prescribed area either at all times or at such times or on such occasions only as may be specified in the order and either absolutely or subject to such exceptions or conditions as may be so specified

(3) Any area prescribed in pursuance of sub-section (1) (b) of this section may include the whole or any part of the coast line of the Protectorate and the territorial waters adjacent thereto or the whole or any part of the waters of Lake Victoria being within the Protectorate

(4) If any person navigates any aircraft over an area prescribed under the provisions of this section he shall be guilty of an offence under this Ordinance unless he proves that he was compelled to do so by reason of stress of weather or other circumstance over which he had no control

Power to prescribe
landing places or other
conditions in the case
of aircraft entering
the Protectorate

3 (1) The Governor-in-Council may from time to time by order prescribe the areas within which aircraft coming from any place outside the Protectorate are to land and the other conditions to be complied with by such aircraft

(2) If any person contravenes any of the provisions of any such order he shall be guilty of an offence under this Ordinance unless he shall prove that he was compelled to do so by reason of stress of weather or other circumstance over which he had no control

4 (1) The Governor-in-Council may from time to time by order regulate air navigation over the Protectorate and the territorial waters adjacent thereto and in particular but without departing from the generality of the above provision may by any such order provide for —

Power to regulate
air navigation

(a) the grant, suspension and revocation of licences to pilots and other persons engaged in the navigation of aircraft especially those used for carrying passengers, goods or mails,

(b) the registration, identification, inspection and certification of aircraft especially those used for carrying passengers, goods or mails,

(c) the licensing, inspection and regulation of aerodromes,

(d) the conditions under which aircraft may be used for carrying passengers, goods or mails,

(e) the conditions under which goods and mails may be conveyed in aircraft into, from or within the Protectorate

(2) If any person contravenes or fails to comply with the provisions contained in any such order he shall be guilty of an offence under this Ordinance. Provided that if proceedings are taken by the Chief of Customs for contravention of or failure to comply with any regulation made under paragraph (e) of sub-section (1) of this section the proceedings shall be deemed to be proceedings for the recovery of a penalty under the law relating to Customs

5 If an aircraft flies or attempts to fly over any area prescribed under this Ordinance for the purposes of defence or safety of the Protectorate or in the case of an aircraft coming from any place outside the Protectorate fails to comply with any of the conditions as to landing prescribed by an order under Section 3 of this Ordinance it shall be lawful for an officer designated for the purpose by regulations made by the Governor-in-Council to cause such signal as may be prescribed by those regulations to be given and if after such signal has been given the aircraft fails to respond to the signal by complying with such regulations as may be made by the Governor-in-Council prescribing the action to be taken on such a signal being given it shall be lawful for the officer to fire at or into such aircraft and to use any or every means necessary to compel compliance and every and any such officer and every other person acting in his aid and by his direction shall be and is hereby indemnified and discharged from any prosecution, charge, penalty, action or other proceeding whatsoever whether criminal or civil for so doing

Power to compel
compliance when
aircraft disobeys
signals

6 If any person is guilty of an offence under this Ordinance he shall on conviction be liable to imprisonment of either description for a term not exceeding six months or to a fine not exceeding Rs 3,000/- or to both such imprisonment and fine

Penalties.

AN ORDINANCE

No 9 of 1920

An Ordinance to Amend the Law Relating to Vagrants

Date of Assent and Commencement

[February 11th 1920]

BE it enacted by the Acting Governor of the East Africa Protectorate with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof —

Short title and operation

1 This Ordinance may be cited as "The Vagrancy Ordinance, 1920" The Governor-in-Council may by order published in the Gazette apply this Ordinance to any area in the Protectorate

Interpretation

2 In this Ordinance unless the subject or context otherwise requires the expression —

"Magistrate" means a Magistrate holding a Subordinate Court of the 1st or 2nd class

"Native" means any person who is a native of Africa not of European or Asiatic origin or descent and includes any Somali or Swahili

"Vagrant" means —

(a) Any person asking for alms

(b) Any person wandering about or without leave of the owner thereof lodging in any verandah, outhouse, shed or unoccupied building or in any cart, vehicle or other receptacle and not having any visible means of subsistence,

(c) Any person wandering about who cannot satisfy the Police that he possesses adequate means of subsistence from a legitimate source

Powers of arrest

3 Any police officer may arrest without warrant any person who is apparently a vagrant and shall at the earliest opportunity take him before the nearest Magistrate

Power to establish houses of detention for vagrants

4 (1) It shall be lawful for the Governor to provide houses of detention at such places within the Protectorate as he shall think fit for the reception of vagrants

(2) The Governor may from time to time appoint such superintendents and medical and other officers for the management of such houses of detention as he may think fit

(3) Every such superintendent, medical and other officer shall be deemed to be a public servant within the meaning of the Indian Penal Code as applied to the Protectorate

Regulations for management of houses of detention

5 It shall be lawful for the Governor-in-Council from time to time to make Regulations for the management of houses of detention Such Regulations shall include among other things Regulations for —

(a) The search of the person and clothing of any person admitted to the house of detention

(b) The custody or destruction of the clothing and effects of the inmates

(c) The diet dress and accommodation of the inmates

(d) Personal cleanliness hours, meals, labour, and general conduct

(e) Medical examination of any person admitted to the house of detention

(f) Recording particulars for the future identification of the inmates

(g) Discharge

and may prescribe punishments for disobedience to such Regulations to be inflicted by the superintendent not exceeding one week's confinement or one week's reduced diet or both such punishments. The nature of such confinement and diet shall be prescribed by Regulations.

6 (1) The superintendent of any house of detention shall use his best endeavours to obtain suitable employment outside such house for the vagrants admitted therein.

Obtaining employment

(2) When any such employment is obtained any vagrant who refuses or neglects to avail himself thereof shall be liable on conviction to imprisonment of either description for a term not exceeding six months.

7 The Governor may at any time order the discharge of any person detained in a house of detention.

Discharge by Governor

8 Every person detained in a house of detention shall be put to any labour of which the Medical Officer shall certify him to be capable. Any such person who refuses to perform such labour or who performs such labour in a negligent or unsatisfactory manner shall be guilty of an offence and shall on conviction be liable to imprisonment of either description for a term not exceeding one month.

Work

9 The Governor may by order direct that suitable provision shall be made in any prison in the Protectorate for the use thereof as a house of detention under this Ordinance and the provisions of this Ordinance and any Regulations thereunder shall apply to any such house of detention situated in a prison.

Provisional houses of detention in prisons

10 (1) If within a reasonable time not exceeding three months from the date on which a vagrant was committed to a house of detention no suitable employment is obtainable for him if such vagrant is not a British subject born in the Protectorate or a native of the Protectorate the Governor-in-Council may order him to be repatriated and he shall be repatriated accordingly and any person who returns to the Protectorate after having been repatriated under this Ordinance without the licence of the Governor in writing first had and obtained shall be guilty of an offence and shall on conviction be liable to imprisonment of either description for a term not exceeding six months.

Repatriation of vagrants

(2) For the purpose of repatriating a vagrant under subsection (1) of this section it shall be lawful for such officer as the Governor may direct to place the vagrant on board ship and such vagrant shall be detained on board and shall be deemed to be in lawful custody while the ship is within the jurisdiction of the Protectorate.

(3) If within a reasonable time not exceeding three months from the date on which a vagrant was committed to a house of detention no suitable employment is obtainable for him if such vagrant is a native of the Protectorate the Governor-in-Council may order him to be returned to the area if any reserved for the use of his tribe or sub-tribe and he shall be returned accordingly and any native who after having been returned to the area reserved for the use of his tribe or sub-tribe leaves such reserve without the licence in writing of the Provincial Commissioner of the Province in which such

reserve is situated first had and obtained shall be guilty of an offence and shall on conviction be liable to imprisonment of either description for a term not exceeding six months

Powers of Magistrates

11 (1) When any person is brought before a Magistrate as being apparently a vagrant if after due inquiry the Magistrate find as a fact such person is a vagrant he may —

(i) Order him to find work within such time as he may prescribe and direct on what date and time such vagrant shall report to the Magistrate,

(ii) Order him to be detained in a house of detention, or

(iii) Order him if he be a native of the Protectorate to be returned to the area, if any, reserved for the use of his tribe

(2) If any native who under this section is ordered to find work fails to find such work or fails to report to the Magistrate as directed the Magistrate may order him to be returned to the area, if any, reserved for the use of his tribe

(3) Any native who after being returned under this section to the area reserved for the use of his tribe or sub-tribe leaves such area without the licence in writing of the Provincial Commissioner of the Province in which such reserve is situated shall be guilty of an offence and shall on conviction be liable to imprisonment of either description not exceeding six months

(4) A Magistrate may order the detention of a vagrant who is a native in a house of detention or in prison pending his return to the area reserved for the use of his tribe or sub-tribe

Warrants

12 A Magistrate may issue such warrants as may be necessary to carry into effect any order issued by him under the preceding section and a vagrant when held under such a warrant shall be deemed to be in lawful custody

Offences

13 Any person who has once been found by a Magistrate to be a vagrant or who has been committed to prison as a vagrant under the Vagrancy Regulations, 1900, shall on any subsequent conviction of vagrancy be liable to a term of imprisonment of either description not exceeding six months in addition to any other order which a Magistrate may make under this Ordinance

Juveniles under the apparent age of 16 years

14 Any person under the apparent age of 16 years not being regularly employed and who is not residing with his or her parents or other lawful guardian shall on being found wandering about be taken before a Magistrate who may issue an order for the return of such person to the custody of the parent or guardian as the case may be and thereupon shall by the most expeditious means possible be handed over to the custody of such parent or guardian. Should any juvenile subsequent to an order having been made as aforesaid again be found wandering about without employment and who has left the custody of the parents or guardian a Magistrate may after due enquiry order such juvenile to receive six strokes with a light cane and shall thereafter cause him to be again returned to the custody of the parents or guardian

Repeal

15 The Vagrancy Regulations, 1900, are hereby repealed, provided that such repeal shall not affect any conviction and sentence under such Regulations or any order made thereunder.

AN ORDINANCE

No 10 OF 1920

An Ordinance to Extend Temporarily Certain Ordinances Relating to Trading with the Enemy to the Carrying on of Banking Business after the Termination of the War.[February 11th, 1920] Date of Assent and
Commencement

BE it enacted by the Acting Governor of the East Africa Protectorate with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof —

1 This Ordinance may be cited as “The Trading with the Enemy (Restriction of Banking) Ordinance, 1920,” and shall be construed and read as one with the Trading with the Enemy Ordinances 1915 and 1916 Short title

2 In this Ordinance —

The expression “enemy controlled corporation” means any corporation — Interpretations

(a) Where the majority of the directors or the persons occupying the position of directors by whatever name called are subjects of an enemy state, or

(b) Where it appears to the Court that the majority of the voting power or shares is in the hands of persons who are subjects of an enemy state or who exercise their voting powers or hold the shares directly or indirectly on behalf of persons who are subjects of an enemy state, or

(c) Where the control is by any means whatever in the hands of persons who are subjects of an enemy state, or

(d) Where the executive is an enemy controlled corporation or where the majority of the executive are appointed by an enemy controlled corporation

The expression “enemy state” means a state with which His Majesty is now or was recently at war

The expression “Court” means the High Court

3 (1) During the period of five years immediately after the termination of the present war and thereafter until this Ordinance shall be repealed no banking business shall be carried on within the Protectorate— Restriction of banking
business for the
benefit of or under
the control of enemies

(a) By a company which is an enemy-controlled corporation within the meaning of this Ordinance, or

(b) By a firm or individual if the business carried on is one with respect to which, if a state of war still continued, an order for the liquidation thereof could have been made under Section 3 of the Trading with the Enemy Amendment Ordinance, 1916

and if any person is concerned in carrying on any such business in contravention of this provision he shall be guilty of an offence punishable in like manner and subject to the like provisions as in the case of an offence under Section 1 (1) of the Trading with the Enemy Ordinance, 1915

(2) Where it appears to the Court on the application of the Attorney General that any banking business is carried on in contravention of this section the Court shall order the business to be wound up, and for that purpose the provisions of Section 3 of the Trading with the Enemy Ordinance, 1916, shall with the necessary adaptations apply

(3) The powers of a Magistrate and of the Governor to appoint inspectors under Section 2 of the Trading with the Enemy Ordinance, 1915, shall include the power to appoint inspectors for the purpose of ascertaining, during the period aforesaid, whether any banking business is carried on by a company which is an enemy-controlled corporation or is carried on for the benefit of, or under the control of subjects of an enemy state, and the provisions of that section shall apply accordingly

(4) The Governor-in-Council may make rules defining what business is for the purpose of this Ordinance, to be deemed banking business

AN ORDINANCE

No 11 of 1920

An Ordinance to Amend the Law Relating to Weights and MeasuresDate of Assent and
Commencement

[February 11th, 1920]

BE it enacted by the Acting Governor of the East Africa Protectorate with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof —

Short title

1 This Ordinance may be cited as "The Weights and Measures Amendment Ordinance, 1920," and shall be read and construed as one with the Weights and Measures Ordinance, 1912, hereafter referred to as "the Principal Ordinance" and the Weights and Measures Amendment Ordinance, 1918

Amendments.

2 (1) The Schedule to this Ordinance shall be substituted for Schedule C, of the Principal Ordinance

(2) Under the heading "Measures of Capacity in Schedule F, to the Principal Ordinance the words 'a pishi, a kibaba, half a kibaba, one-fourth of a kibaba' shall be deleted

AN ORDINANCE

No 12 of 1920

An Ordinance to Provide for the Arrest and Surrender of Fugitive Offenders from the Territory known as German East Africa.Date of Assent and
Commencement.

[February 11th, 1920]

BE it enacted by the Acting Governor of the East Africa Protectorate with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof —

Short title

1 This Ordinance may be cited as "The Fugitive Offenders (German East Africa) Surrender Ordinance, 1920"

Power to arrest
fugitive offenders from
German East Africa.

2 Where in that part of the territory now known as German East Africa in British military occupation a warrant has been issued for the apprehension of any person accused of an offence punishable by law in the aforesaid territory and such person is or is suspected of being in or on his way to the Protectorate any Magistrate holding a Subordinate Court of the First or Second Class if satisfied that the warrant was issued by a person having lawful authority to issue the same may endorse such warrant and the warrant so endorsed shall be a sufficient authority to apprehend the person named in the warrant and return him in like manner as if the aforesaid territory were a British Possession of a group in which the Protectorate was included within the meaning of Part II of the Fugitive Offenders Act, 1881, and the provisions of that Act shall apply accordingly

Duration of
Ordinance

3 This Ordinance shall remain in force during the British military occupation of the territory now known as German East Africa

AN ORDINANCE

No 13 of 1920

An Ordinance to amend 'The Discharged Soldiers Settlement Ordinance, 1919.'[February 11th, 1920] Date of Assent and Commencement

BE it enacted by the Acting Governor of the East Africa Protectorate with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof —

1 This Ordinance may be cited as "The Discharged Soldiers Settlement Amendment Ordinance, 1920," and shall be construed as one with 'The Discharged Soldiers Settlement Ordinance, 1919,' (hereinafter referred to as the Principal Ordinance) Short title

2 Section 8 sub-section 7 of the Principal Ordinance shall be and is hereby amended as follows — Amendment of Section 8 sub section 7 of the Principal Ordinance

The words " eighteen months" in the said sub-section shall be deleted and the words "two years" substituted therefor

An Ordinance to make Notes of the Governor and Company of the Bank of England and Treasury Currency Notes Legal Tender in the East Africa Protectorate[February 11th, 1920] Date of Assent and Commencement

BE it enacted by the Acting Governor of the East Africa Protectorate with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof --

1 This Ordinance may be cited as "The Bank of England and Treasury Currency Notes Ordinance, 1920 " Short title

2 From and after the commencement of this Ordinance Bank of England and Notes of the Governor and Company of the Bank of England Treasury Currency Notes issued pursuant to any Act of legal tender and Treasury Currency Notes shall be legal tender in payment or on account of any amount at the rate of eight rupees and fifty cents to one pound sterling

PROCLAMATION

IN EXERCISE of the powers conferred on me by the Municipal Corporations Ordinance, 1909 I hereby declare that the boundaries of the Township of Nairobi, being a Municipality constituted under the above mentioned Ordinance by Proclamation dated the 5th day of July, 1919, shall be altered as from the 1st day of April, 1920, to the effect that the said Township from the said last mentioned date shall consist of the area enclosed within a line running as follows, viz —

Commencing at the North-eastern corner of L O No 1870 (Upper Parklands Estate), thence bounded by the Mathari River down-stream to the North-western corner of L O No 36 (Egerton Estate) where it joins the Western boundary of that estate thence by the Western boundary of that estate to Nairobi River, thence onward to a point where a line produced along the South-eastern boundary of the proposed Native Location (now cancelled as shewn on Nairobi Township Map) would intersect, thence by that line South-western to where it intersects the Ngong River, thence by that River up-stream to the North eastern corner of L O No 37, thence by the Northern boundary of that L O number to its North-western corner, thence by a line to the most Southern corner of the King's African Rifles Lines, thence by the generally Western boundary of King's African Rifles Lines to Ngong Road, thence by the Southern boundary of that Road to a point where a line produced Southernly of the Eastern boundary of L O No 1 (Upper Hill Estate) would intersect thence by the Eastern boundary of that Estate to its North-eastern corner on Kuchaw Kubwa or Gara River, thence by that River down stream to its junction with Kuchaw Dogo or Gara River, thence in a Northernly direction by the Eastern boundaries of L O No 207/1 and L O No 208/1 to Nairobi River thence by that River up-stream to the South-western corner of L O No 209/345 thence by the Western boundary of that L O number to its most Northernly corner and continued where it meets Salisbury Road, thence South-eastern by that Road to the most Western corner of L O No 209/76 thence in a generally Northernly direction by the generally Eastern boundary of L O No 1870 (Upper Parklands Estate) to the point of commencement including that area L O No 1870 originally L O No 209/79

IN EXERCISE of the powers conferred upon the Governor by the Diseases of Animals Ordinance, 1906, His Excellency the Acting Governor has been pleased to make the following Rules —

1 These Rules may be cited as 'The Diseases of Animals (Importation of Dogs) Amendment Rules (No 1) 1920,' and shall be read as one with the Diseases of Animals Rules, 1918, and all amendments thereof

2 Rule 12 of the Diseases of Animals Rules, 1918, the Diseases of Animals (Importation of Dogs) Amendment Rules, 1919, and the Diseases of Animals (Importation of Dogs) Amendment Rules (No 2) 1919, shall be deleted and the Rules following substituted therefor —

3 All dogs imported from the Union of South Africa, Swaziland, Bechuanaland or Basutoland shall be accompanied by a certificate of health from a Veterinary Surgeon

4 All dogs imported without the certificate required by the last preceding Rule from any country (except Australia) other than the above-mentioned shall be subjected on arrival to four months quarantine at the risk and expense of the importer provided that the Chief Veterinary Officer may reduce the period of quarantine if he is satisfied, by a certificate from a Veterinary Surgeon, that the animals have been quarantined immediately prior to embarkation and, by a certificate from the Captain of the Ship on which the dogs arrived, that they have been strictly isolated from all other dogs during the voyage

6 Rule 65 of the Principal Rules shall be deleted and the following is substituted therefor —

Discretion of Judge as to costs

63 The Judge may for special reasons to be certified by him allow costs in addition to the costs provided by the scale, or may refuse to allow an Advocate's costs, or may allow costs at a lower rate than that provided by the scale

7 Rule 66 (a) and (b) of the Principal Rules shall be deleted and the following is substituted therefor —

Summary Proceedings

64 (a) Summary Proceedings relate to suits under Chapter XXXIX of the Code of Civil Procedure or any law substituted therefor, and all actions in which the Plaintiff has proceeded under a specially endorsed summons

(b) The sum allowed in the scale shall be in addition to the sum disbursed for Court costs in accordance with the scale of Court Fees for the time being in force prescribing the fees leviable in Civil suits

The scale of allowance to witnesses in the first schedule shall apply to witnesses in Subordinate Courts and shall also apply to a party who is a material and necessary witness

INSTRUCTIONS FOR WEARING BADGES ROUND THE
NECK BY THE POSSESSORS OF THE INSIGNIA
OF MORE THAN ONE ORDER WHICH IS SO
WORN

ONLY one Ribbon and Badge, *i.e.*, the *senior one*, is worn round the neck inside and under the Collar of the Uniform Coat, so that the Badge hangs about an inch outside and below the front of the Collar. All other Badges are worn, one below the other, commencing about an inch below the senior badge, each suspended on about three inches of ribbon emerging from between the buttons of the Uniform Coat. A small eye is stitched inside the coat to which the ribbon is fastened by a hook.

In Evening Dress, one Badge only is worn round the neck, and as a rule the *senior badge* is thus worn unless a junior one should appear to be more appropriate to the occasion. The ribbon, from which this badge is suspended, is worn under the white tie, the badge hanging about an inch below. All badges are worn also, *in Miniature*, on the lapel of the coat.

These instructions will not affect the existing regulations with regard to the wearing of Insignia, *in Miniature*, by Naval and Military Officers.

The method of wearing the *ribbons* of Orders, Decorations and Medals, which will be the same in all cases, both for men and woman, is as follows —

A piece of the ribbon one and a half inches wide, or the width of the medal ribbon, and half an inch in depth, mounted on a bar of metal in the form of a brooch to be worn on the left breast of the coat, or in a corresponding place on the dress as the case may be

do so, wear then Insignia, Decorations and Medals with morning dress on Official Occasions and at Public Functions

The Ribbons of the Orders, Decorations and Medals may be worn on all occasions *at the discretion of the holder*

The method of wearing the Insignia of Orders, also Decorations and Medals, on Official Occasions and at Public Functions with morning dress is as follows —

Should wear the *Star only* on the left breast of the Coat or in a corresponding place on the dress, as the case may be

Should wear the ribbon to which the Badge is suspended under the tie, *which should be a bow*, the badge hanging about three-quarters of an inch below the bow

Should wear the Badges, Decorations and Medals on the left breast of the coat, or in a corresponding place on the dress as the case may be

NOTE —The above intimation only refers to Morning Dress and does not alter the regulations with regard to wearing Orders, Decorations and Medals with Uniform, or with Evening Dress
