Sir,

I have the honour to transmit for your information a copy of the instrument of appointment of the Imperial Shipping Committee appointed by the Prime Minister in accordance with a Resolution passed by the Imperial War Conference on 26th July, 1918

2 I am causing to be prepared for the information of the Committee a memorandum dealing with any complaints or suggestions for improvement which have come to the notice of the Colonial Office, in matters relating to Inter-Imperial maritime communication. The Crown Agents for the Colonies have suggested that the Committee should be asked to consider—

(a) the question of the grant of preferential treatment to government stores both as to rates of freight and the allocation of tonnage, and

(b) the possibility of doing away with the rebate system,

and they have been placed in direct communication with Sir A Steel-Maitland, with a view to these matters, or any others which they may consider it desirable to submit in the interests of the Colonies, being brought before the Committee as suitable opportunities occur

INSTRUMENT OF APPOINTMENT OF THE
IMPERIAL SHIPPING COMMITTEE

WHEREAS the Imperial War Conference, 1918, passed on the 26th July, 1918, the following resolution —

(1) That in order to maintain satisfactorily the connections, and at the same time encourage commercial and industrial relations, between the different countries of the British Empire, this Conference is of opinion that shipping on the principal routes, especially between the heart of the Empire and the Overseas Dominions, including India, should be brought under review by an Inter-Imperial Board on which the United Kingdom and the British Dominions and Dependencies should be represented

(2) That for this purpose an Imperial Investigation Board, representing the various parts of the Empire, be appointed, with power to inquire into

and report on all matters connected with ocean freights and facilities, and on all matters connected with the development and improvement of the sea communications between the different parts of the Empire, with special reference to the size and type of ships, and the capacities of harbours the Board to include, in addition to representatives of the Governments concerned, persons with expert knowledge of the problems involved, including representatives of the shipping and trading interests,

AND whereas it has been represented to me, The Right Honourable David Lloyd George, Prime Minister and First Lord of the Treasury, by the Secretary of State for the Colonies after consultation with the Governments of the Dominion of Canada, of the Commonwealth of Australia, of the Dominion of New Zealand, of the Union of South Africa and of Newfoundland by the Secretary of State for India and by the President of the Board of Trade that it is now desirable that a Committee should be appointed under the title of the Imperial Shipping Committee with the following functions, viz —

(i) To enquire into complaints from persons and bodies interested with regard to ocean freights, facilities and conditions in the Inter Imperial trade or questions of a similar nature referred to them by any of the nominating authorities and to report their conclusions to the Governments concerned

(ii) To survey the facilities for maritime transport on such routes as appear to them to be necessary for trade within the Empire and to make recommendations to the proper authority for the co ordination and improvement of such facilities with regard to the type, size and speed of ships, depth of water in docks and channels, construction of harbour works and similar matters

Now I, therefore, do hereby appoint the following persons to form the Imperial Shipping Committee and to exercise the functions hereinbefore set forth—

SIR A H D RAMSAY STEEL-MAITLAND, Bart, M P nominated by the Secretary of State for the Colonies

SIR W S MEYER G C I E, K C S I, nominated by the Secretary of State for India in Council

HON SIR GEORGE H PERLEY, K C M G, nominated by the Government of the Dominion of Canada

MR H B G LARKIN, nominated by the Government of the Commonwealth of Australia

THE HIGH COMMISSIONER FOR NEW ZEALAND, nominated by the Government of the Dominion of New Zealand

CAPT G BOWDEN, M C, nominated by the Government of the Union of South Africa

HON SIR EDGAR R BOWRING, nominated by the Government of Newfoundland

SIR KENNETH ANDERSON, Bart, K C M G SIR ALFRED BOOTH Bart MP W LIONEL HICHENS MP KENNETH LEF, MR J W MURRAY, being persons experienced in shipping and commerce

THE following despatch which has been addressed to His Excellency the Governor by the Secretary of State for the Colonies on the subject of Native Labour is published for general information

Sir,

You will be aware that considerable interest has recently been aroused by the publication in the East Africa Protectorate of a circular by the Chief Native Commissioner in accordance with your directions on the subject of Native Labour and having regard to the anxiety which the policy and phrasing of the circular have created in many quarters, I think it desirable to confirm the views which I have expressed when discussing the matter with you during your visit to England in order that there may be no room for doubt as to the general policy of His Majesty's Government or as to the intentions of your Government in the matter

2 I recognise that the problem of Native Labour Supply in the East Africa Protectorate is one of the most difficult with which you were confronted, when you assumed the Governorship of the Protectorate early last year, it is a problem which has engaged and will I know, continue to engage the most careful attention of your Government and yourself, and I am glad to have this opportunity of expressing my entire confidence in your determination to pursue a policy which is strictly in accord with the wishes of His Majesty's Government and which aims at the advancement and well-being of the native races in the Protectorate no less than the meeting of the settlers requirements

3 The criticisms of your action which have come to my notice are mainly due to the fear that 'forced labour' or 'compulsory labour' is being adopted by the Protectorate Government for supplying the needs of private employers I have on a recent occasion referred in Parliament to the Native Authority Amendment Ordinance, 1919, in accordance with which natives may be required to perform certain paid labour for the Government, *e g*, for the Government Transport Department and for work on the construction or maintenance of railways, roads and other work of a public nature, subject to the express provisions that no native shall be required to perform such work for more than sixty days in any one year and that any native who is fully employed in any other occupation or has been so employed during the preceding twelve months for a period of three months shall be exempted from such labour To this extent I have agreed to compulsory labour for Government purposes, as I am satisfied that the position justified the measure It will be observed that the provisions of this Ordinance do in fact meet the conditions laid down in the memorandum sent to you by the Bishop of Mombasa on the 1st of November last when forwarding the views of himself and the Bishop of Uganda and other leading Missionaries in East Africa But I desire to make it clear that I should not be prepared to go further in regard to compulsory labour for Government nor indeed do I think that you would wish to extend the principle It has been suggested that the native should have the right to commute for payment of additional taxation the labour otherwise required of him under the Ordinance I have not had the advantage of discussing

this point with you personally, but, as at present advised I should not be disposed to accept the suggestion. In other parts of Tropical Africa a system of rebates on taxation for labour performed has been in force from time to time, but, apart from the somewhat complicated machinery which is needed for the working of the system, I understand that the natives are themselves opposed to it, on the ground that they prefer to know precisely what their obligations are in respect of annual taxes, without any qualifications as to rebates in certain circumstances. If the option of payment of cash in lieu of the labour required by Government were granted, it would introduce exactly such an element of uncertainty in the native mind as to his total obligations for the year.

4 As regards compulsory labour for private employment, there could of course be no question of entertaining any proposals which involve this principle, and I know there has never been any intention on your part either to suggest or to countenance it. Needless to say, such a policy would be absolutely opposed to the traditional policy of His Majesty's Government, and I should not have thought it necessary even to mention it, had it not been that the policy embodied in the circular of the 23rd of October, 1919, has been misinterpreted as implying this principle. I have no doubt, however, that the further explanatory circular which you have now issued, will have dispelled any misgivings on this point which is one of fundamental importance, and I trust that it will now be clear to all that there is no question of force or compulsion but only of encouragement and advice through the Native Chiefs and Headmen. With such a policy I find myself in entire agreement, provided that the safeguards against abuse are—as I am satisfied that they are—adequate. On the other hand from the point of view of the natives, I do not hesitate to accept your opinion, which my own experience corroborates, that in their own interests they should seek outside employment, when not engaged on work in their own Reserves, and that as stated in the second circular it is desirable that the young able bodied men should become wage-earners and should not remain idle in the Reserves for a large part of the year. On this point I observe that the Bishop's memorandum expresses full concurrence in the necessity for preventing idleness. On the other hand, from the point of view of the settler, it is necessary that there should be an adequate supply of labour, if he is to develop his holdings, and in my opinion the Protectorate Government would be failing in its duty if it did not use all lawful and reasonable means to encourage the supply of labour for the settlers who have embarked on enterprises calculated to assist not only the Protectorate itself but also the country and other parts of the Empire by the production of raw materials which are in urgent demand.

5 It has been objected that the principle of working through the Native Chiefs and Headmen is unsound, and that this system is liable to most serious abuse. It cannot be denied that a Native Chief may attempt to abuse his authority, and experience will show whether in fact this does often occur, but I believe that with the exercise of due watchfulness by the Government officials, this tendency, if it does manifest itself, can be promptly checked. The principle, however, is in my opinion right, inasmuch as it has long been the policy of the Government to work in native affairs as far as possible, through the Native Chiefs and Headmen, and to maintain the tribal organisation, and I feel sure that you would share my reluctance to take action which would tend to weaken rather than to strengthen the position of the tribal Chiefs and Headmen. Again, strong exception has been taken to the directions in paragraph 4 (3) of the circular of the 23rd of October, 1919, as to the keeping of records of the way in which Native Chiefs and Headmen

carry out the general instructions of the Government. I have no doubt that this criticism is based on a misconception, otherwise, it is difficult to see how it could be supposed that there is anything unreasonable in the Government requiring the co-operation of its subordinate officials. The case in point is the Government policy as to native labour, but it is obvious that in all their activities the Native Chiefs and Headmen must be closely watched by the European officers responsible for the administration of the Protectorate, and that failure on the part of any Chief or Headman to assist the Government or unwillingness to act on the instructions conveyed through the responsible Government officers would naturally be taken note of and recorded.

6 While I am conscious of the fact that the anxiety which is evinced in certain quarters lest encouragement should degenerate into compulsion is quite genuine, I know that I may rely upon your Government to spare no pains to prevent abuses, and that every effort will be made to ensure that the instruction, which you have issued are carried out in accordance with the unmistakable intention of the Government. The re-organisation of the Administrative Service, which has recently been sanctioned should materially facilitate the task of the Government in this respect. I shall receive with interest your report on the working of the new system, but I anticipate most satisfactory results from the formation of a special branch of the Administrative Service (including the Labour Inspectors for special duty in connection with Native Labour) directly under the Chief Native Commissioner working in the native areas and dealing solely with the administration of those areas and the care of the natives as distinct from other parts of the community, and I believe that this arrangement will in itself provide a safeguard of the greatest value against any attempt (if such were made) to exploit the natives or to recruit native labour by unlawful or improper means.

7 It has been overlooked, I think, in certain of the criticisms directed against the policy embodied in the circular that the Government does not contemplate obtaining native labour for a particular employer, and that the native is free to choose, assuming that he is willing to leave his Reserve and work, where and for whom he will work. This is important, inasmuch as the results must be that a good master who acquires a reputation for treating his labourers with justice and consideration should have little or no difficulty in obtaining an adequate supply of labour, and that there should be no fear of native employed outside their Reserves being treated or ill cared for quite apart from the strict legal safeguards contained in the Master and Servants Ordinances. Provided therefore that the Government by judicious advice through the Native Chiefs and Headmen can start the flow of labour, it may be hoped that in the natural course of events a greater number of natives will realise the advantages of working for the wages which employment brings, and that as their knowledge and their wants increase, they will appreciate the need for more employment and more wages to satisfy those wants, so that the supply of labour should become continuous, while the condition of the native himself will inevitably improve at the same time.

8 I need not detail the provisions of the Master and Servants Ordinance, 1910, and the recent amending Ordinances, but I may say that it would be difficult to find a more comprehensive set of regulations to secure the well-being of natives employed outside their Reserves. I am satisfied that if these Ordinances are made more widely known, they will have the effect of removing much of the anxiety felt by those who are interested in the Native Labour question. I am therefore arranging that they should be published with the papers which I propose to lay before Parliament very shortly.

9 The encouragement of native women and children to take up employment has been strongly criticised, but in this respect the methods of employment and the intention of the circular of the 23rd of October, 1919, have clearly been misunderstood. The explanatory statement in the second circular will make it clear that women and children must return to their homes at night, and that only when the husband is employed and living on the plantation should his family be permitted to remain there at night. It is possible that it has not been realised that the labour performed by women and children is, in almost every case, coffee picking which is paid as piece work by results, and that it is a form of labour which is popular among the women and children, as they can earn good wages by this light work in half a day, and are then free to return to their homes.

10 Finally, objection has been taken to the fifth paragraph of the circular of the 23rd of October, 1919, relative to your desire to obtain a supply of labour from the adjacent Tanganyika Territory. Although no mandate has yet been received for the Tanganyika Territory, there is, in my opinion, nothing inconsistent with the spirit of the mandatory system in the recruitment of voluntary labour in the Tanganyika Territory for paid employment in the East Africa Protectorate. Before the war, when the Tanganyika Territory was a German possession, Wanyamwezi labour flowed into the British Protectorate, and provided that there is now in the Tanganyika Territory a surplus of labour over and above that required in the Territory itself I see no reason to interfere with the recruitment of natives who desire to cross the border and earn wages. You will however, note the important proviso that, if the Territory can absorb all its available native labour, no recruitment should be allowed for the East Africa Protectorate. I understand from the Administrator that at present there is a surplus, but that it is probably temporary. Under these circumstances, I have informed you that I approve of the recruitment of voluntary labour from that Territory subject to the limitation of the period of employment to six months in the first instance and subject of course to your making satisfactory arrangements to ensure proper feeding, clothing transport accommodation and medical attention and on the understanding that the natives who are recruited may be accompanied by their women if they so desire. It has been arranged that the labour from the Tanganyika Territory is to be employed by the Government only, thus reducing the requirements of the Government in the East Africa Protectorate by an equivalent number of natives of the Protectorate of whom it may be assumed that a proportion at least will be willing to offer themselves for work with private employers.

*Lord Chamberlain's Office,**Buckingham Palace, S W*

7th May, 1920

The King has approved of the recommendations made, with a view to economy, by a Committee appointed for the purpose of considering alterations in the regulations with regard to Civil Uniform.

The alterations, which the King has approved, are as follows —

(1) *First and Second Class Uniform* — The wearing of the Full Dress Coat to be optional. The Levee Coat to be substituted for it, at the option of the wearer, on all occasions when Full Dress is prescribed.

(2) *Third, Fourth and Fifth Class Uniform* — In future to be of one pattern for all three classes, but with distinctive embroidery on the collar to mark the three classes. (Patterns may be seen at St James's Palace)

(3) The White Undress Tropical Uniform, as approved for use by Colonial Officials in tropical countries, may be worn at Court in this country and on all ceremonial occasions overseas, at the option of those entitled to it.

(4) All persons in possession of Civil Uniforms made in accordance with the existing Regulations may continue to wear them as heretofore.

(5) Civil Uniforms as approved for use by officers of the Government in India may be worn as heretofore.

(6) In lieu of either Civil Uniform or Court Dress, the following alternative Dress may be worn by gentlemen (other than Members of Their Majesties' Households and of the Diplomatic and Consular

Services) on all occasions when Uniform or Court Dress is prescribed —

- An ordinary black evening dress coat
- Black or white evening dress waistcoat
- Breeches — Plain black evening dress material or stockinet, with three small black cloth or silk buttons and small jet or black buckles at the knee
- Hose — Black silk
- Shoe, — Plain Court, with bows, no buckles
- Tie — White evening dress bow necktie
