THE NATIVE LIQUOR ORDINANCE, 1921.

PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS by Section 3 of the Native Liquor Ordinance, 1921, it is provided that the Governor-in-Council may by Proclamation apply the aforesaid Ordinance to any area in the Colony and Protectorate where there is no local authority, at the request of the Administrative Officer-in-charge of such area.

And whereas the Resident Commissioner, Kisumu has requested that the aforesaid Ordinance shall be applied to the areas the boundaries of which are as set out in the schedule annexed hereto.

Now therefore, I, Edward Northey, Major-General of His Majesty's Forces, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Companion of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Governor of the Colony and Protectorate of Kenya, having taken the advice of my Executive Council, do order and proclaim that the aforesaid Ordinance shall apply to and have effect in the aforesaid areas on and after the 28th day of February, 1922.

No. 1368/3; thence by the South-western boundary of that portion to the Trigonometrical Beacon Gungit (Gingit) at its most Southerly corner; thence Easterly by a straight line to the Trigonometrical Beacon Kavisserat; thence North-easterly by a straight line to the Trigonometrical Beacon Kablaigut at the South-west corner of L.O. No. 1473; thence by the Western boundary of that portion to the Trigonometrical Beacon Matema at its North-west corner; thence by the Southern boundary of L.O. “(h) An owner of a public rickshaw shall not employ or hire out his rickshaw to any native not being a registered rickshaw boy and the possessor of a certificate under Section (b) of this Bye-law.

“When a public rickshaw is found plying for hire and being hauled or pushed by any native not being a registered boy and the possessor of a certificate under Section (b) of this Bye-law, the owner of such rickshaw shall be guilty of an offence and the Town Clerk may cancel his licence in respect of such rickshaw.”

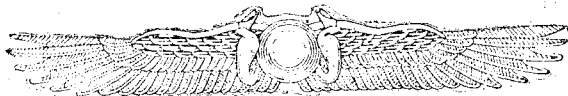
