The following Bill is published for general information and criticism —

A Bill

Instituted

An Ordinance for the Reciprocal Enforcement of Judgments in the Colony, and other parts of His Majesty's Dominions and Territories under His Majesty's Protection

1 This Ordinance may be cited as "The Reciprocal Short title Enforcement of Judgments Ordinance, 1922"

2 (1) In this Ordinance unless the context otherwise Interpretation requires the expression "Colony" shall mean the Colony and 5 Protectorate of Kenya

The expression "Judgment" means any judgment or order given or made by a Court in any civil proceedings, whether before or after the passing of this Ordinance, whereby any sum of money is made payable, and includes an award in proceedings on an 10 arbitration if the award has, in pursuance of the law in force in the place where it was made, become enforceable in the same manner as a judgment given by a Court in that place

The expression "original Court" in relation to any judgment means the Court by which the judgment was given

15 The expression "registering Court" in relation to any judgment means the court by which the judgment was registered

The expression "judgment creditor" means the person by whom the judgment was obtained, and includes the successors and assigns of that person

20 The expression "judgment debtor" means the person against whom the judgment was given, and includes any person against whom the judgment is enforceable in the place where it was given

(2) Subject to Rules of Court, any of the powers conferred 25 by this Ordinance may be exercised by a Judge of the Court

3 (1) Where a judgment has been obtained in a superior Court in the United Kingdom, the judgment creditor may apply to the High Court, at any time within twelve months after the date of the judgment, or such longer period as may be allowed by 30 the Court to have the judgment registered in the Court, and on any such application the Court may, if in all the circumstances of the case they think it is just and convenient that the judgment should be enforced in the Colony, and subject to the provisions of this section, order the judgment to be registered accordingly

35 (2) No judgment shall be ordered to be registered under the section if —

(a) the original court acted without jurisdiction, or
 (b) the judgment debtor, being a person who was neither carrying on business nor ordinarily resident within the jurisdiction of the original Court, did not voluntarily appear or otherwise submit or agree to submit to the jurisdiction of that Court, or

(c) the judgment debtor being the defendant in the proceedings, was not duly served with the process of the original Court and did not appear notwithstanding that he

Enforcement in the Colony of judgments obtained in superior courts in the United Kingdom

was ordinarily resident or was carrying on business within the jurisdiction of that Court or agreed to submit to the jurisdiction of that Court, or

(d) the judgment was obtained by fraud or

(e) the judgment debtor satisfies the registering Court either that an appeal is pending or that he is entitled and intends to appeal, against the judgment or

(f) the judgment was in respect of a cause of action which for reasons of public policy or for some other similar reason could not have been entertained by the registering Court

(3) Where a judgment is registered under this section —

(a) the judgment shall as from the date of registration, be of the same force and effect, and proceedings may be taken thereon, as if it had been a judgment originally obtained or entered up on the date of registration in the registering court

(b) the registering Court shall have the same control and the jurisdiction over the judgment as it has over similar judgments given by itself but in so far only as relates to execution under this section

(c) the reasonable costs of and incidental to the registration of the judgment (including the costs of obtaining a certified copy thereof from the original Court and of the application for registration) shall be recoverable in like manner as if they were sums payable under the judgment

(4) Rules of Court shall provide —

(a) for service on the judgment debtor of notice of the registration of a judgment under this section and

(b) for enabling the registering Court on an application by the judgment debtor to set aside the registration of judgment under this section on such terms as the Court thinks fit and

(c) for suspending the execution of a judgment registered under this section until the expiration of the period during which the judgment debtor may apply to have the registration set aside

(5) In any action brought in any Court in the Colony on any judgment which might be ordered to be registered under this section the plaintiff shall not be entitled to recover any costs of the action unless an application to register the judgment under this section has previously been refused or unless the Court otherwise orders

4 Where a judgment has been obtained in the Supreme Court against any person, the court shall on an application made by the judgment creditor and on proof that the judgment debtor is resident in the United Kingdom, issue to the judgment creditor a certified copy of the judgment

Power to make rules

5 The Chief Justice shall have power to make Rules of Court for regulating the practice and procedure (including scales of fees and evidence), in respect of proceedings of any kind under this Ordinance

Extension of
Ordinance to
Dominions

6 (1) Where the Governor is satisfied that reciprocal provisions have been made by the legislature of any part of His Majesty's Dominions outside the United Kingdom for the enforcement within that part of His Majesty's Dominions of judgments obtained in the Supreme Court of the Colony, the Governor in Council may by Proclamation in the Gazette declare that this Ordinance shall extend to judgments obtained in a superior Court in that part of His Majesty's Dominions in like manner as it extends to judgments obtained in a superior Court in the United Kingdom and on such such Proclamation being made this Ordinance shall extend accordingly

(2) For the purposes of this Section the expression 'part of His Majesty's Dominions outside the United Kingdom' shall be deemed to include any territory which is under His Majesty's protection or in respect of which a mandate is being exercised by the Government of any part of His Majesty's Dominion,


