EAST AFRICA TOWNSHIPS ORDINANCE, 1903.

RULES.

IN EXERCISE of the powers conferred upon him by the East Africa Townships Ordinance, 1903, His Excellency the Governor has been pleased to make the following Rules:—

- 1. These Rules shall apply to the Township of Mombasa and may be cited as the Mombasa Township Drainage Rules, 1923.
- 2. No person shall erect or construct in or upon any premises any septic tank, cesspit, soakage pit, water closet, urinal sink or similar contrivance except with the written permission of the Medical Officer of Health and upon such conditions as he may prescribe.
- 3. No person shall newly construct any drain in connection with a building or make any addition or alteration to any existing drain in connection with a building unless and until he shall have obtained the written permission of the Medical Officer of Health.
- 4. Every person who shall execute any work in any way connected with the drainage of any premises shall execute such work according to a design and of materials and in a manner approved by the Medical Officer of Health.
- 5. Every person who shall contravene or fail to comply with any of the provisions of these Rules shall be guilty of an offence and shall be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding Shs. 400/- and in default of payment to imprisonment of either kind for a period not exceeding two months.
