An Ordinance to Amend the Fish Protection Ordinance, 1908.

ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of Kenya with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof:—

- 1. This Ordinance may be cited as "The Fish Protection short title. (Amendment) Ordinance, 1923," and shall be read as one with the Fish Protection Ordinance, 1908, hereinafter referred to as "the Principal Ordinance."
- 2. It shall be lawful for the Treasurer on the direction of the Governor to pay ninety per centum of the fees, collected for the period commencing on the 12th day of June and ending on the 31st December, 1923 and thereafter during each financial year in respect of licences issued pursuant to Rules under the Principal Ordinance for the taking or killing of any species of fish, to the Kenya Angling Association quarterly for the more effectual protection and improvement of fish and the due administration of Rules made under the Principal Ordinance.
- 3. The Kenya Angling Association shall if and when Accounts required by the Governor so to do submit to the Governor a statement shewing accurately and in detail an account of all expenditure of the money paid under this Ordinance and the balance on hand.
