GOVERNMENT NOTICE NO. 104.

S. 399/7.

The following Bill is published for information and criticism:—

A Bill**Intituled****An Ordinance to Provide for the Exploitation of Certain Lands for Oil.**

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Oil Production Ordinance, 1924," and shall come into operation on such date as the Governor by notice in the "Gazette" shall determine.

Short title and commencement.

2. In this Ordinance unless there be something repugnant in the subject or context:—

Definitions.

"Commissioner of Mines" shall include any person appointed to act for the Commissioner of Mines.

"Land-owner" includes also a mortgagee, grantee and a lessee, and any person occupying land under a licence from the Crown.

"Minerals" and "all minerals" includes metals and precious stones, but does not include coal, oil, or common minerals.

"Prospecting" includes all modes of prospecting or searching.

"Mineral Oil" includes bitumen, asphalt, and other bituminous substances with the exception of coal.

"Native Reserves" shall include all land which is considered by the Government to be required by and reserved for natives whether gazetted or not.

"Oil" includes all descriptions of mineral oil and natural gas.

"Private Land" includes lands privately owned and land the subject of a grant, lease or licence from the Crown.

"Salt Licks" means those deposits of salt or other mineral which have been or are being used as salt licks for cattle whether privately owned or not.

3. The provisions of this Ordinance shall extend to all land situate within the Colony and Protectorate of Kenya.

Application of Ordinance.

Providing, however, that nothing herein contained shall be deemed to authorise any person to prospect or mine on or under:—

(a) lands dedicated or set apart for any public purpose.

(b) lands held under any title which gives the holder the rights of working oil, provided that those rights are recognised by the Governor.

(c) land situate within any township or municipal area except with the consent of the owner and also of the Governor or municipal authority concerned.

(d) land over which prospecting or mining rights have been granted by the Governor or by or on behalf of His Majesty under the Mining Ordinance, 1923, or any repealed Mining Ordinance or amending Ordinance, and during such time as such rights shall be subsisting except by or on behalf of the persons to whom such rights shall have been granted.

(e) land reserved for the purpose of any railway or within 100 yards of any railway, except with the consent of the Railway Administration.

(f) land the site of or within 300 yards of any building, or the site of or within 500 yards of any artificial dam or reservoir, the property of the Crown or of the Government, except with the sanction of the Governor.

(g) private land, where the mineral rights are vested in the Crown, except with the consent of the owner of the land; provided that such exemption shall cease upon payment of compensation to the landowner for the loss resulting from the

cesser of such exemption, such compensation, if not otherwise agreed upon, to be determined by arbitration. The person desiring the cesser of such exemption, and the land-owner shall be deemed parties of such arbitration.

(h) lands declared by the Governor by notice in the Gazette to be exempt from the operations of this Ordinance.

(i) a street, road, highway, or road reserve, without the consent of the Governor or public body having the control thereof.

(j) closed districts, except with a licence from the proper authority.

(k) salt licks, except with special permission of the Commissioner of Mines.

Native
Reserves.

4. Native Reserves, for the purposes of this Ordinance shall be deemed to be private land, and the administrative authority of each reserve for the time being shall be deemed to be the owner.

Unauthorised
prospecting.

5. Any person who prospects or mines for oil without being authorised to do so by virtue of this Ordinance or of some enactment heretofore in force or without the licence or authority of the Governor, shall be guilty of an offence, and shall on conviction, be liable to pay for each offence a penalty not exceeding one hundred shillings for every day on which he shall so prospect or mine.

Officers and
powers.

6. The officers for the time being appointed under the Mining Ordinance, 1923, or under any Ordinance amending or in substitution therefor, shall be deemed to be the officers appointed for the administration of this Ordinance and the powers vested in them by virtue of the Mining Ordinance, 1923, shall be taken as full and sufficient authority for the administration of this Ordinance. These powers shall include the holding of the Commissioner of Mines Court, vesting of authority in Wardens, Inspectors, Registrars and other officers, surveys, inspections, recovery of rent, fees, penalties and monies payable under this Ordinance, and all powers necessary for the full administration of this Ordinance, so far as those powers are consistent with the provisions of this Ordinance.

Regulations.

7. The Governor may make regulations to provide for the granting of licences or leases to prospect and mine for oil and for the effective control of any rights granted, and for the better carrying out of the provisions of this Ordinance, and for the following particular purposes:—

(a) fees, rents and royalties payable.

(b) for regulating safety in mining operations, protection of employees, mode of inspection and powers and duties of inspectors, water and timber rights, drainage, pollution of land and water, repair to land on abandonment.

(c) working conditions to be observed under exploration licences, prospecting licences or leases.

(d) The laying of pipe-lines for the conveyance of oil and the conditions upon which such pipe-lines shall be operated.

Rights of
His Majesty's
Government.

8. All licences and leases shall be granted only on the implied agreement by the licensee and lessee with the following:—

(a) that His Majesty's Government shall have the right of pre-emption at current commercial prices of all crude oil won from the area concerned and of all products of the refining or treatment of such oil.

(b) that in the event of war, whether His Majesty's Government is involved or not, the Governor on behalf of His Majesty shall have power to take control of the works and plant in the area granted, or to take control of any refinery or stores of oil.

(c) that the Governor shall have the power to regulate the site of any refinery or place of storage of oil in the Colony and Protectorate of Kenya.

(d) that the licensee or lessee will forward to the Commissioner of Mines a copy of every geological map of the area concerned within one month from the making of such report or map.

Bond.

9. The Commissioner of Mines may before the granting of any rights hereunder require any applicant for such rights to enter into a bond with two sureties of reasonable amounts for the due observance and performance of any covenants and conditions to be inserted in any licence, protection area or lease or otherwise prescribed by law.

THE PORT ORDINANCE, 1922.

RULES.

IN EXERCISE of the powers conferred upon him by the Port Ordinance, 1922, His Excellency the Governor-in-Council has been pleased to make the following Rules:—

1. These Rules may be cited as "The Port (Amendment) Rules, 1924," and shall be read as one with "The Port Rules, 1923," (hereinafter referred to as "the Principal Rules").

2. Rule 15 of the Principal Rules is hereby cancelled and the following Rules substituted therefor:—

"15. No master of a steamship or sailing ship shall take such ship alongside any other steamship or sailing ship in a port unless he has first obtained permission so to do from the Port Captain or Port Officer, as the case may be."

3. Rule 24 of the Principal Rules is hereby amended by the deletion therefrom of the word "ten" and by the substitution therefor of the word "three."

4. Rule 51 of the Principal Rules is hereby amended by the insertion therein of the word "carrying" between the words "craft" and "receiving."

5. Sub-rule 57 (1) of the Principal Rules is hereby cancelled and the following sub-rule substituted therefor:—

"57. (1) All ships or native vessels anchored, moored or berthed in a port shall receive on board, make fast or cast off lines or warps from any other ship or native vessel warping in or out of such port when required so to do by the Port Captain or Port Officer, as the case may be, or by the Pilot, Master or other person in charge of such other aforesaid ship or native vessel."

6. Rule 77 of the Principal Rules is hereby amended by the addition thereto of the words "except as provided in Rule 71 hereof."

7. Sub-rule 79 (2) of the Principal Rules is hereby amended by the addition thereto of the words "if he has knowingly permitted its infringement."

8. Schedule I of the Principal Rules is hereby amended by the addition thereof of a Schedule I (a) as hereto annexed.

9. Item 3 of Schedule III, Part 3 of the Principal Rules is hereby cancelled and the item 3 hereto annexed is substituted therefor.

SCHEDULE I (A).

"LAID-UP" SHIPS.

A ship in a port shall not be treated as "laid-up" unless she has no cargo on board and the Articles of Agreement with the crew thereof have been closed.

Due notice of intention to "lay-up" a ship shall be given by the Owners or Agents thereof to the Port Captain or Port Officer, who shall thereupon declare the date on which such ship shall be treated as a "laid-up" ship.

As and from such date Port Dues shall be charged for such ship at the rate prescribed in Schedule I (a) hereof.

No further charges shall be made for a period of twelve months from the date on which such ship shall have been declared "laid-up" as aforesaid.

Such charges shall be payable in respect of every period of twelve months or part thereof during which such ship is "laid-up" in the same port.

If such ship proceeds to another port in the Colony for the purpose of being "laid-up" Port Dues shall be charged afresh as hereinbefore described from the date of entry of such ship into such other port.

When so required by the Owners or Agents of a ship which has been "laid-up" as aforesaid, the Port Captain or Port Officer shall declare the date on which such ship shall be treated as having ceased to be "laid-up."

All charges under this Schedule shall be paid in addition to any charges payable in respect of such ship under Schedule-I hereof.

THE MUNICIPAL CORPORATIONS ORDINANCE, 1922.

BYE-LAWS.

IN EXERCISE of the powers conferred upon them by the Municipal Corporations Ordinance, 1922, the Municipal Council of Nairobi, with the approval of His Excellency the Governor-in-Council, have made the following Bye-laws:—

1. These Bye-laws may be cited as "Nairobi (Density of Buildings) Bye-laws, 1923," and shall be read as one with Nairobi Township Rules of 1917.

2. Bye-laws 4, 5 and 6 of these Bye-laws shall apply to the Commercial Area only.

3. For the purpose of these Bye-laws "dwelling" means a building or any part or portion of a building used, or constructed, adapted or designed to be used for human habitation, as a separate tenancy, or by one family only, whether detached, semi-detached, or separated by party walls or by floors from adjoining buildings; together with such outbuildings as are reasonably required to be used or enjoyed therewith.

4. No person shall so erect, add to or alter a building that on the plot or sub-plot on which such building stands such plot or sub-plot being not greater than one thirty-fifth of an acre, there shall be more than one dwelling, or so that there shall be any dwelling on such plot or sub-plot which is of less extent than one thirty-fifth of an acre or so that the number of dwellings over the whole area of such plot or sub-plot shall exceed the number yielded by a ratio of thirty-five dwellings to one acre.

In coming to a determination as to the number of dwellings which shall be permitted upon any plot or sub-plot in accordance with the foregoing provisions, no regard shall be had to any open spaces, streets or passages reserved or agreed to be reserved and abutting upon or in the vicinity of such plot or sub-plot.

5. No person shall erect a building intended, adapted or designed to be used wholly or partially for human habitation on any plot or sub-plot the area of which is less than 1250 square feet in extent, or on any plot or sub-plot which has not a frontage of at least 14 feet 6 inches upon a street such street not being a sanitary lane or passage as defined in Bye-law 99 of Nairobi Township Rules, 1917.

6. No person shall so erect, add to or alter a building intended, adapted or designed to be used wholly or partially for human habitation that any portion thereof which constitutes a dwelling shall be without separate and independent access to a street such street not being a sanitary lane or passages as defined in Bye-law 99 of Nairobi Township Rules, 1917.

7. Bye-law 44 of Nairobi Township Rules, 1917, is hereby amended by substituting the words "one-half" for the words "two-thirds" wherever they occur, and by adding the following clause:—"And provided further that this Bye-law shall not apply to buildings appearing in the opinion of the Municipal Council to be constructed or adapted to be used entirely as offices, counting houses, hotels or residential clubs."

8. No person shall so erect, add to, alter or use any building that on the plot or sub-plot on which such building stands, such plot or sub-plot being not greater than one twenty-fifth of an acre, there shall be more than one dwelling, or so that there shall be any dwelling on such plot or sub-plot which is of less extent than one twenty-fifth of an acre, or so that the number of dwellings over the whole area of such plot or sub-plot shall exceed the number yielded by a ratio of twenty-five dwellings to one acre.

In coming to a determination as to the number of dwellings which shall be permitted upon any plot or sub-plot in accordance with the foregoing provisions, no regard shall be had to any open spaces, streets or passages reserved or agreed to be reserved and abutting upon or in the vicinity of such plot or sub-plot.

The provisions of this Bye-law shall not apply to the Commercial Area or to any area which is or shall be gazetted as a Native Location.

9. Nothing contained in Bye-laws 4 and 8 hereof shall be deemed to apply to any building which, in the opinion of the Municipal Council, is constructed, adapted or designed to be used as an hotel or residential club and which in their opinion is unlikely, on account of the manner in which it may be used, to become a menace either to the health of the inhabitants thereof or of the community.
