THE TOWN PLANNING ORDINANCE, 1919.

NOTICE is hereby given that His Excellency the Governorin-Council has provisionally approved of a Town Planning Scheme for the Island of Mombasa, subject to certain modifications and conditions, of which a descriptive Memorandum is hereinbelow published in compliance with the Town Planning Ordinance, 1919, Section 4.

The relative plans, drawings and exhibits may be inspected by persons interested at the Land Office, Mombasa, between the hours of 8 a.m. and 12 noon and 2 p.m. and 4 p.m. on any day other than Saturdays or Sundays, and between 12 noon and 2 p.m. on Saturdays.

Any objections to the said scheme must be made it writing within 60 days from the date of the publication of this notice and addressed to the Colonial Secretary.

MEMORANDUM.

UNDER Government Notice No. 239 of 1920, His Excellency the Governor-in-Council on July 17th, 1920, in exercise of the powers conferred by Section 3 (1) of the Town Planning Ordinance, 1919, appointed various persons to be the Authority for the purposes of that Ordinance and ordered them to prepare a Town Planning Scheme in respect of any land situated within the Island of Mombasa. On April 14th, 1921, the personnel of the Authority was revised in Government Notice No. 129 and subsequent appointments of members have from time to time been made.

- 2. The various provisions contained in the Town Planning Procedure Regulations, 1922, Clauses 3-11 inclusive have now been duly observed by this Authority and their scheme is now ready for submission for the final approval of the Governor-in-Council.
- 3. The area to which the scheme applies is the Island of Mombasa excluding the area edged black and hatched in black lines on the maps drawn on scale of 1 in 5000. The area thus excluded is roughly the Old Town of Mombasa. Of the remainder of the Island, the land commonly known as "Railway" land and certain outlying portions on the western side of the Island are not as yet planned in detail.
- 4. The object of the scheme is to provide for the orderly development of the Island in accordance with the modern principles of sanitation and town planning, so that access by good roads may be obtained to every plot and that lines of public travel at conveniently near intervals may be established and that features of special architectural and arboreal beauty may be introduced.
- 5. It has been necessary, in order to effect this object, to alter the shape of existing plots and to reduce their size proportionately so as to permit of frequent lines of public travel and to give to each plot a frontage on a road of access, but care has been taken to provide for each plot-holder a new plot of reasonable shape suitable for sub-division and as far as possible on the same site on which his original plot was situated.
- 6. The plan could not be devised without entailing the demolition of a certain number of buildings not only for the accommodation of new streets, but also to permit of the widening of existing streets. Claims for compensation for loss so incurred will be paid when material damage is actually inflicted. But in assessing such compensation regard shall be had to any enhancement in the value of the property caused by the scheme and if such enhancement equals or exceeds in value the amount of the loss no compensation will be paid.

7. The actual area of new plots is not the same as that of the existing plots, but no compensation will be paid in the case of plots which do not at present front on any public road unless the plot be reduced by an area exceeding 20% of its original area, and in such case compensation will only be payable in respect of the excess taken over 20%, for it is considered that the value of a plot to which access is provided will be correspondingly increased.

8. The construction of new streets and the widening of existing streets will be a charge on the general revenues of the township.

9. It is estimated that the proper fulfilment of the scheme will entail an expenditure of approximately £100,000. This sum it is proposed to obtain by a loan. The annual charges on this loan will be met out of the proceeds of a rate on unimproved site values of plots on the Island, and an assessment of site values will be commenced as soon as the survey of new plots on the ground has been completed.

10. The scheme presented by the Authority comprises a variety of requirements and restrictions which will be embodied as rules under the Town Planning Ordinance, 1919, when the approval of the Governor-in-Council is finally given to the scheme. The scheme has been duly published by the Authority.
