ADDITIONAL INSTRUCTIONS passed under the Royal Sign Manual and Signet to the Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Kenya, in regard to the Legislative Council thereof.

Dated 15th July, 1925.

ADDITIONAL INSTRUCTIONS to our Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Our Colony of Kenya, or other Officer for the time being administering the Government of Our said Colony.

WHEREAS by Letters Patent under the Great Seal of Recites Letters Patent of 11th Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland bearing date September 1920. the Eleventh day of September, 1920, We did constitute, order, and declare that there should be a Governor and Commanderin-Chief (therein and hereinafter called the Governor) in and over Our Colony of Kenya (therein and hereinafter called the

And whereas We did thereby authorise, empower and command the Governor to do and execute all things that belong to his said office, according to the tenour of Our said Letters Patent and of any Orders in Council relating to the territories formerly known as the East Africa Protectorate, save in so far as any provision of any such Order in Council might be repugnant to any of the provisions of Our said Letters Patent, and of such Commission as might be issued to him under the Royal Sign Manual and Signet, and according to such instructions as might from time to time be given to him under the Royal Sign Manual and Signet, or by Order in Council or by Us through one of Our Principal Secretaries of State, and to such laws as were then or should thereafter be in force in the Colony:

And whereas certain Instructions bearing date the Recites Eleventh day of September, 1920, were issued under the Royal Instructions of 11th September Sign Manual and Signet for the guidance of the Governor or 1920. other Officer administering the Government of the Colony, and providing amongst other things for the constitution of the Legislative Council of the Colony:

September

And whereas by certain Additional Instructions bearing date the Twenty-fifth day of October, 1923, We did further amend the Fifteenth, Nineteenth and Twentieth Clauses of the said Instructions of the Eleventh day of September, 1920, as amended by Our Additional Instructions of the Eleventh day of February, 1922:

And whereas We are minded to make other provision in regard to the constitution of the said Legislative Council:

Substitutes fresh Clause for Fifteenth Clause of Instructions of 11th September 1920. Now, therefore, We do, by these Our Additional Instructions under Our Sign Manual and Signet, revoke, as from the date of the receipt thereof by the Governor in the Colony, the clause which by the said Additional Instructions of the Twenty-fifth day of October, 1923, was substituted for the Fifteenth Clause of Our Instructions of the Eleventh day of September, 1920, as amended by Our Additional Instructions of the Eleventh day of February, 1922, but without prejudice to anything lawfully done thereunder, and instead thereof We do direct and enjoin and declare Our Will and pleasure that as from the date of such receipt, the aforesaid Instructions of the Eleventh day of September, 1920, shall be read and construed as if in place of the Fifteenth Clause thereof amended as aforesaid the following Clause had been inserted therein:

Constitution of the Legislative Council.

- "XV. The Legislative Council of the Colony shall consist of the Governor as President, ten ex officio Members, Nominated Official Members not exceeding ten in number, eleven European Elected Members, five Indian Elected Members, one Arab Elected Member, and one Nominated Unofficial Member to represent the interests of the African community:
- "Provided that until such Indian Elected Members have been elected there shall be five Nominated Indian Unofficial Members:
- "Provided further that the appointment of a Nominated Unofficial Member to represent the interests of the African Community shall be discontinued in pursuance of instructions from Us through one of Our Principal Secretaries of State when it shall appear to Us that such appointment is unnecessary:
- "Provided further that if one of the Nominated Official Members is not specially appointed to represent the interests of the Arab Community there shall be a Nominated Unofficial Member to represent such interests."

THE PATENTS AND DESIGNS (AMENDMENT)
BILL, 1925.

STATEMENT OF OBJECTS AND REASONS.

The object of this Bill is to amend the Principal Ordinance in accordance with the suggestion of the Secretary of State, to carry out the recommendations of the British Empire Patent Conference as to the simplification of procedure and the reduction of the cost of obtaining a patent operative throughout the Empire.

The present Bill is based on the lines of a draft model Ordinance which has been prepared by the Board of Trade.

The effect of the amendments is to substitute for the grant of letters patent in the Colony the registration of a United Kingdom patent, as the grant of patents by the Central Patent Office now gives protection in all colonies and protectorates.

When the Bill has been passed the Rules under the Principal Ordinance will be amended to allow for the reduction of fees

Sections 7 to 11 have hitherto been rules in the Schedule to the Principal Ordinance.

A Bill

Intituled

An Ordinance to Amend the Patents and Designs Ordinance, 1913.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as "the Patents and Short title. Designs (Amendment) Ordinance, 1925," and shall be read as one with "the Patents and Designs Ordinance, 1913," hereinafter referred to as "the Principal Ordinance."

2. Section 4 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby repealed the following section substituted therefor:—

Amendment to Section 4 of the Principal and the following section substituted therefor:

Crdinance.

- "4. Any person being the grantee of a Patent in the United Kingdom or any person deriving his right from such grantee by assignment, transmission or other operation of law may apply within three years from the date of the issue of the patent to have such Patent registered in the Colony. Where any partial assignment or transmission has been made, all proper parties shall be joined in the application on registration.'
- Section 6 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby repealed Section 6 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby repealed Section 6 of the Principal 15 and the following section substituted therefor:

Ordinance

- "6. Every application for the registration of a Patent or Design under this Ordinance shall be made to the Registrar and shall be accompanied
 - (a) In the case of a Patent, by:—
 - (1) Two certified copies of the specification or specifications (including drawings, if any) of the United Kingdom Patent, and
 - (2) A certificate of the Comptroller General of the United Kingdom Patent Office giving full particulars of the issue of the Patent on such specification or specifications.
 - (b) In the case of a Design, by:—
 - (1) Two copies of any drawing in relation to the Design,
 - (2) Two exact representations or specimens of the Design, and
 - (3) Two certified copies of the United Kingdom certificates of registration."

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Amendment to Section 8 of the Principal Ordinance

- 4. Section 8 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby renumbered 8 (1), and the following subsection added thereto:-
 - "(2) Privileges and rights so granted shall have effect from the date of the United Kingdom Patent or certificate of registration of Design, as the case may be."

Disclaimers.

5. Whenever the specification or drawings of an United Kingdom Patent registered in the Colony has been amended by way of disclaimer, correction, or explanation, according to the law of the United Kingdom, a request, accompanied by a 10 copy of the specification and drawings (if any) as amended, duly certified by the Comptroller General of the United Kingdom Patent Office, may be made to the Registrar to substitute a copy of the specification and drawings as amended, for the specification and drawings originally filed.

Assignments,

6. Where a person becomes entitled by assignment, transmission, or other operation of law to the privileges and rights conferred by a certificate of registration under this Ordinance or to any interest therein, he may make application to the Registrar for the entry on the register of such assign- 20 ment, transmission or other instrument affecting the title or giving an interest therein.

The Registrar shall on sufficient evidence thereof and on payment of the prescribed fee enter the same in the proper register in the prescribed manner and shall endorse the same 25 on the certificate of registration.

Extension and revocations, etc.

7. All extensions, and revocations of any patent or design registered under the Ordinance shall be notified to the Registrar, who shall, on sufficient evidence thereof and on payment of the prescribed fee, enter the same in the proper 30 register in the prescribed manner, and shall endorse the same on the certificate of entry referring to such patent or design. The Registrar shall, on payment of the prescribed fee, cause a copy of such entry to be inserted in the Gazette.

Inspection of registered designs.

8. During the existence of copyright in a design, the 35 design shall not be open to inspection except by the proprietor, or a person authorised in writing by the proprietor, or a person authorised by the Registrar or by the Court, and furnishing such information as may enable the Registrar to identify the design, nor except in the presence of the Registrar or of an 40 officer acting under him, nor except on payment of the prescribed fee; and the person making the inspection shall not be entitled to take any copy of the design or of any part thereof.

Design of which copyright ceased.

9. When the copyright in a design has ceased, the design 45 shall be open to inspection, and copies thereof may be taken by any person on payment of the prescribed fee.

Inspection of and extracts from register.

10. Every register kept under the Ordinance and the specification of every registered patent shall be open to the inspection of the public on payment of the prescribed fee, 50 subject to the provisions of the Ordinance and to the rules made thereunder. Certified copies sealed with the seal of the Registrar of any entry in such register or of any such specification, shall be given to any person requiring the same on payment of the prescribed fee: Provided that whenever any 55 specification or extract includes any tracing, drawing, or diagram, an additional fee for any copy thereof shall be paid equal to the cost of preparing such tracing, drawing, or diagram.

11. The Registrar may, on request in writing accompanied by the prescribed fee:-

Registrar to correct clerical errors.

- (a) Correct any clerical error in or in connection with an application for a patent, or for registration of a design;
- (b) Correct any clerical error in the name, style, or address of the registered proprietor of a patent, or design.

THE NOTARIES PUBLIC (AMENDMENT) BILL, 1925.

STATEMENT OF OBJECTS AND REASONS.

The object of this amending Ordinance is to allow any practising advocate in the Colony to be recommended and licensed as a Notary Public.

Under the provisions of the Principal Ordinance this privilege is restricted to advocates who have qualified as barristers or solicitors in the United Kingdom or Ireland.

This amending Ordinance extends the privilege to all advocates without distinction as to the place of qualification.

The essential qualification is now altered to five years' practice in the Colony in place of five years' qualification as a barrister or solicitor.

The fees are increased from £10 and £3 to £20 and £5 respectively in order to approximate more closely to the fees ruling in England.

An Ordinance to Amend the Notaries Public Ordinance, 1906.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as "the Notaries Public Short title. (Amendment) Ordinance, 1925," and shall be read as one with "the Notaries Public Ordinance, 1906," hereinafter referred to as "the Principal Ordinance."

Sections 1 and 2 of the Principal Ordinance are hereby repealed and replaced as follows:-

Amendment of Sections 1 and. 2 of the Principal Ordinance.

- 1. The Governor shall have power to direct the Registrar of the Supreme Court to grant a licence to any practising advocate who may be recommended by the Chief Justice to exercise within the Colony the functions and duties commonly performed by Notaries Public of the United Kingdom and to levy fees in accordance with the second schedule hereto.
- No advocate shall be licensed under this Ordinance Amendment of unless he shall have practised in the Colony for at least 15 five years.

3. Schedule I of the Principal Ordinance is repealed and replaced as follows:-

Fee payable on appointment as a Notary Public and for a licence to practice until 31st December next after such appointment ' ...

THE WIRELESS TELEGRAPHY AMENDMENT BILL, 1925.

STATEMENT OF OBJECTS AND REASONS.

This amending Ordinance is to extend the rule making power under the Principal Ordinance.

At present rules regulating the use of wireless telegraphy can only be made in regard to merchant ships.

The Secretary of State desires rules to be made, similar to those existing in England regulating the use of wireless telegraphy on board foreign warships and service aircraft accompanying them in harbours of the Colony.

This amending Bill gives powers similar to those given by the Wireless Telegraphy Act, 1904, and extends those powers to aircraft.

Short title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as "the Wireless Telegraphy (Amendment) Ordinance, 1925," and shall be read as one with "the Wireless Telegraphy Ordinance, 1913," hereinafter referred to as "the Principal Ordinance."

Amendment of Section 6 (1) of the Principal Ordinance.

- 2. Section 6 subsection (1) of the Principal Ordinance is amended by the deletion therein of the word "merchant" whenever occurring and by the addition of the following clause:—
 - "(vi) Regulations similar to those made under paragraphs (iii), (iv) and (v) of this subsection may also 10 be made in regard to aircraft."

BY His Excellency Edward Brandis Denham, Esquire, Companion of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Acting Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony and Protectorate of Kenya.

WHEREAS by Section 3 of the Native Foodstuffs Ordinance, 1922, it is provided that when it has been made to appear to the Governor in Council that any district or area is suffering from or threatened with a shortage of Native Foodstuffs he may by Proclamation prohibit the purchase or barter

of such foodstuffs from natives for the purpose of resale in or export from the district or area in such Proclamation specified unless the written permission of the Resident Commissioner or District Commissioner concerned, as the case may be, be first obtained.

And whereas it is further provided by the said Section that such Proclamation may either prohibit the purchase or barter for purposes of resale in or export as aforesaid of such foodstuffs generally or may be confined to any class or classes of foodstuffs.

And whereas it has been made to appear to me that the District of Digo is suffering from or threatened with a shortage of Native foodstuffs.

Now therefore by virtue of the powers in me as Governor in Council vested as aforesaid I do hereby declare that from the date of publication hereof the purchase or barter of the following native foodstuffs, namely, yams, sweet potatoes, beans, mtama, mwimi, maize, and all other grain commonly used as food by natives in the said district shall be and is hereby prohibited unless the written permission of the District Commissioner concerned be first had and obtained.

STATEMENT OF OBJECTS AND REASONS.

Section 70 of the Principal Ordinance enables a licensee to enter into agreements with consumers as to the price to be charged for electrical energy, but the licensee must not, under Section 72, in making such agreements show any undue preference. In case of difference the Governor in Council is the arbiter.

Such agreements under Section 137 must be approved by the Governor in Council and if at a later date it is discovered that an agreement does in fact give preference the Governor in Council has to review the terms of the agreement already approved.

To remove this anomaly Section 137 is repealed.

The amendments of Sections 2, 17, and 32, are consequential.

The proviso added to Section 42 of the Principal Ordinance by the Electric Power (Amendment) Ordinance, 1923, is amended at the request of the Secretary of State as at present it might be construed that the proviso referred only to licences mentioned in Section 42 (2) instead of to all licences.
