THE PRISONS ORDINANCE, 1914.

Rules.

IN EXERCISE of the powers conferred upon him by Section 116 of the Prisons Ordinance, 1914, His Excellency the Governor in Council has been pleased to make the following Rules:-

CIVIL DEBTORS IN PRISONS.

1. A civil debtor prisoner, when not at exercise, will Cellular remain in his cell, but will be eligible for employment outside confinement. his cell provided that he is not thereby brought into close contact with convicted criminal prisoners.

- 2. A civil debtor prisoner will not be compelled to have Hair cutting his hair cut or to be shaved unless the Medical Officer of the and shaving. Prison certifies that this is necessary.
- 3. It shall be the duty of every civil debtor prisoner to Cleaning of make his own bed and to sweep out his cell every morning, cell. and to keep the furniture and utensils clean.
- 4. Civil debtor prisoners may exercise daily during such Exercise. periods as the circumstances of the prison may allow, and during those periods may associate together in an orderly manner.

5. A civil debtor prisoner shall be required to work, Employment. either at his own trade or profession, provided his employment does not interfere with the regulations of the prison, or at work of an industrial nature, and he shall be allowed to receive the whole of his earnings subject to deductions for the cost of his maintenance, if provided by the prison, and for the use of implements furnished by the prison.

6. A civil debtor prisoner shall be permitted to receive a Letters and visit of a quarter of an hour's duration, and also to write and receive one letter, in each week. Any extension of these privileges shall be at the discretion of the Superintendent of Prison, who should afford all reasonable facilities for enabling the debtor to provide such payments as will procure his release from prison.

7. Civil debtor prisoners will be subject to any general rules for the government of prisons unless inconsistent with these rules or any other rules relating to civil debtors in prison.

CONDITIONS OF SALE.

- 1. The highest bidder will be the purchaser and if any dispute arises as to any bidding the plot shall be put up again at the last undisputed bid. The amount of the advance shall be regulated by the auctioneer and no bid shall be retracted.
- 2. The purchaser must pay to the auctioneer immediately on the fall of the hammer 25% of the purchase price of the plot. In default of payment of such deposit the grant of the plot may be reoffered for sale immediately and any subsequent bid made by the person who has made default may be ignored or refused.
- 3. The balance of the purchase money together with the rent due to the 31st December, 1925, the prescribed survey fees and the fees payable for the preparation and registration of the grant and the stamp duty payable in respect of the grant shall be paid to the Commissioner of Lands at the Land Office within seven days from the date of sale, and upon such payments being duly made the purchaser shall subject to the provisions of the Crown Lands Ordinance, 1915, and if the conditions of the sale have been complied with, be entitled to a grant of the plot, which grant shall be presented to him duly executed as soon as conveniently may be.

Provided that the balance of the purchase money shall not be payable within the time stated or thereafter unless and until the Commissioner of Lands can present to the purchaser the grant of the plot duly executed.

- 4. The grant will commence on the 1st day of December, 1925, and rent will be payable from that date.
- 5. Subject to the proviso contained therein if the balance of the purchase money together with the rent, fees and duty mentioned in Condition 3 is not paid to the Commissioner of Lands within seven days from the date of the sale, the Commissioner of Lands may order that the deposit made by the purchaser be forfeited to the Government and that the purchaser shall have no further claim to a grant of the plot.
- 6. The plot shall be used for the purposes of a Bank or for the joint purposes of a Bank and residence of officials employed therein, provided that should the plot be used for the said joint purposes not more than half of the area may be built upon. Should the plot be used solely for banking purposes then not more than two-thirds of the area may be built upon. The plot shall not be used for any purposes other than the aforementioned without the previous written consent of the Governor in Council.
- 7. The purchaser shall erect a building of stone, brick or concrete upon the plot within two years from the date of the grant, such building to be erected according to plans and specifications which must be approved in writing by the Commissioner of Lands or such other official as he may appoint for the purpose.
- 8. The grantee shall further submit a block plan of the plot with the position of the building clearly defined and showing a system of drainage, which shall satisfy the Principal Medical Officer, for properly dealing with the surface water on the plot and before any building may be occupied the grantee shall satisfy the Principal Medical Officer that such system of drainage has been properly constructed.
- 9. The grantee shall suitably connect the premises with any town drainage system when, in the opinion of the Principal Medical Officer, such drainage scheme is so far completed as to enable the grantee reasonably so to connect.
- 10. The Government or such person as may be appointed for the purpose shall have the right to enter upon the plot and lay and have access to water mains and service pipes, telegraph or telephone wires, and electric mains of all descriptions whether overhead or underground, and the grantee shall not erect any building in such a way as to cover or interfere with any existing routes, main or service pipes or the telegraph or telephone wires and electric mains aforementioned.


