WHEREAS by Section 4 of the Diseases of Animals Ordinance (Chapter 157, Revised Edition) it is provided that the Governor may at any time by proclamation declare any area to be an infected area; extend, diminish or otherwise alter the limits of an area declared to be an infected area; declare an area to be free from any disease; and/or for the purpose of preventing disease prohibit the removal of animals from one district, place or area to any other district, place or area.

And whereas by Government Notice No. 231, dated the 3rd day of July, 1919, and in exercise of the powers conferred upon him by Section 13 of the Interpretation and General Clauses Ordinance (Chapter 1, Revised Edition) His Excellency the Governor has been pleased to depute the person for the time being holding the office of Chief Veterinary Officer to exercise on his behalf the powers conferred upon the Governor by the said Section 4 of the Diseases of Animals Ordinance.

Now therefore in exercise of the powers so conferred upon me and all other powers thereunto enabling me, I hereby declare the following farms to be infected areas for the purposes of the said Diseases of Animals Ordinance:—

GOVERNMENT NOTICE NO. 341.

WIRELESS TELEGRAPHY ORDINANCE, 1913.

Rules.

IN EXERCISE of the powers conferred upon him by the Wireless Telegraphy Ordinance, 1913, His Excellency the Governor in Council has been pleased to make the following Rules:—

- 1. These Rules may be cited as "the Wireless Telegraphy Rules, 1926."
- 2. In these Rules unless the contrary intention appears:—
- "Experimental licence" means a licence issued solely for the purpose of instruction, or demonstration in, or investigation into wireless telegraphy.
- "Licensee" means any person to whom a licence has been granted under these Rules.
- "Ordinance" means the Wireless Telegraphy Ordinance, 1913.
- "Postmaster General" means the person for the time being holding the office of Postmaster General and includes any officer acting for or on behalf of the Postmaster General.
- "Wireless telegraphy" includes all systems of transmitting and receiving telegraphic or telephonic messages by means of electricity without a continuous metallic circuit between the transmitter and the receiver.
- 3. The following classes of licences may be issued by the Postmaster General:—
 - (a) Broadcasting licences.
 - (b) Receiving licences.
 - (c) Experimental licences.

(a) Broadcasting Licences.

- 4. Any person may appeal to the Postmaster General for a licence to establish a service of broadcasting wireless telephony. Application shall be made in such form and manner as the Postmaster General may from time to time prescribe.
- 5. The Postmaster General may, with the approval of the Governor in Council, issue a broadcasting licence subject to these Rules and such special terms and conditions as he may decide.
- 6. The licensee shall establish at his own expense, within such time as shall be set out in the licence, a broadcasting station of the latest approved type powerful enough to give efficient transmission over a distance to be specified in the licence. No other broadcasting licence shall be issued within such distance during the currency of the licence. The station shall operate at the power and wave-length shown in the licence subject to such alterations as the Postmaster General may from time to time direct or permit.
- 7. A broadcasting licence shall continue in force for a period of five years from the date of issue and may be renewed on such terms and conditions as the Postmaster General, with the approval of the Governor in Council, may decide.

- 8. The fee payable for a broadcasting station licence shall be two hundred shillings per annum payable in advance.
- 9. The broadcasting licensee shall carry out a regular service lasting in the total for a period prescribed in the licence, consisting of music, lectures, educational matters, speeches, weather reports, theatrical entertainments and any other matter from time to time approved by the Postmaster General.
- 10. The licensee shall at the request of the Postmaster General broadcast matter for public purposes in addition to the ordinary programme free of charge for a total period not exceeding three hours in any one week.
- 11. The licensee shall have the right to make contracts with advertisers to disseminate advertising matter and make charges therefor provided that advertisements shall not be broadcasted for more than 10 per cent. of the total daily broadcasting time or more than once in any one hour.
- 12. The licensee shall not broadcast any news but purely local news or information in the nature of local news, except such as is referred to in Rule 10 unless obtained from or authorised under agreement with the publisher of a newspaper or news agency.
- 13. The right is reserved to the Postmaster General to curtail the hours of broadcasting at any time if found advisable in the public interest. All matter broadcasted shall be subject to such censorship as the Postmaster General with the approval of the Governor in Council may determine.
- 14. Broadcasting stations shall be operated by competent operators and all persons employed in the working thereof shall be British subjects.
- 15. The licensee shall comply with such conditions as the Postmaster General may from time to time communicate to him.
- 16. The Postmaster General, with the approval of the Governor in Council, may withdraw the licence relating to any broadcasting station—
 - (a) if the licensee fails, within a period to be determined by the Postmaster General, to commence a broadcasting service which in the opinion of the Postmaster General is adequate; or
 - (b) if, in the opinion of the Postmaster General, an inadequate service is being given at any time; or
 - (c) if the licensee ceases to give such service for a period of one week; or
 - (d) if the licensee continues to broadcast any matter or information of any class which the Postmaster General considers objectionable and has requested him not to broadcast; or
 - (e) if, in the opinion of the Postmaster General, the service is being conducted in an improper or inefficient manner; or
 - (f) if the licensee contravenes any provisions of these Rules or any condition imposed thereunder or any term or condition of his licence; or

(g) in the event of war or other grave national emergency, and in such an event the Postmaster General may take over and work the station for Government purposes.

(b) Receiving Licences.

- 17. No person shall construct, maintain, instal or work a wireless receiving apparatus until he has obtained a receiving licence authorising him to do so.
- 18. The receiving licence shall be available for twelve months from date of issue, and may be renewed by the Postmaster General on payment of the fees prescribed for the licence.
- 19. The licensee shall not allow the licensed apparatus to be used for any purpose other than the reception of messages in the premises occupied by the licensee.
- 20. The licensed apparatus shall not be used in such a manner as to cause interference with the working of other licensed apparatus. In particular reaction must not be used to such an extent as to energise any neighbouring aerial.
- 21. The fees for a receiving licence to establish a wireless receiving station, inclusive of the fees payable to the licensee of the broadcasting station within the area of which the receiving station is established, shall be payable annually in advance at the following rates:—

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For other premises or in special circumstances such fee as the Postmaster General may prescribe.

- 22. The fee set out in the preceding rule shall apply only in areas in respect of which a broadcasting licence has been issued and a broadcasting service is in operation. Of such fees five shillings will accrue to the Post Office Department as public revenue in respect of each licence issued.
- 23. The licensee shall within fourteen days of the expiration of the period specified in his receiving licence either renew the licence or immediately dismantle his apparatus and give notice in writing thereof to the Postmaster General.
- 24. Receiving licences may be withdrawn by the Postmaster General in time of war or other grave national emergency.

(c) Experimental Licences.

25. No person shall be entitled to experiment in wireless communications without complying with the Rules in this part.

- 26. An experimenter desiring to make use of any apparatus for the receiving of wireless communications shall make application to the Postmaster General for an experimental receiving licence, and the Postmaster General may, if satisfied that the applicant is a bona fide student and experimenter in the science of wireless communication, issue such licence for a period of one year free of charge.
- 27. The apparatus for receiving placed in use by an experimenter must not be used in such a way as to cause waves to be emitted by resonance or otherwise which may interfere in any way with the receiving apparatus of any other licensee and valves must not be connected or coupled in such a way as to cause the aerial of the licensee's apparatus to oscillate.
- 28. An experimenter shall not be entitled to transmit wireless messages or waves of any kind whatsoever unless he obtains a transmitting licence under Rule 29.
- 29. An experimenter may, on complying with conditions prescribed by the Postmaster General, obtain free of charge an experimental transmitting licence for one year subject to the following conditions:—
 - (a) Such licences shall be limited to such a number in any area as the Postmaster General may decide.
 - (b) The periods during which the experimenter shall be allowed to transmit shall not be more than two per week to be specified in the licence.
 - (c) The power and wave-lengths of the transmission and any other technical conditions shall be laid down in the licence.
 - (d) No charge may be made by the experimenter for the dissemination of matter of any kind whatsoever.
- 30. An experimenter may apply for a renewal of his licence before the expiration of the current period, and such renewal for a further period of twelve months may be granted by the Postmaster General. If the experimenter fails to apply for renewal of his licence he shall immediately dismantle his wireless apparatus.
- 231. Experimental licences may be withdrawn by the Postmaster General in time of war or other grave national emergency.

General.

- 32. A licence granted under these Rules shall be in such form and subject to such special terms and conditions as the Postmaster General may from time to time prescribe.
- 33. The Postmaster General may, in his discretion, refuse to issue a licence to any applicant: Provided however that the applicant so affected may appeal to the Governor in Council whose decision shall be final.
- 34. Every licence shall be subject to the provisions of any Rules from time to time made under the Ordinance so far as they are applicable to the licence and these provisions shall be deemed to be incorporated in the licence.
- 35. The Postmaster General may, with the approval of the Governor in Council, withdraw any receiving licence or experimental transmitting licence if in his opinion it is in the public interest to do so, in which case the licensee shall immediately dismantle his apparatus. A licensee whose licence has been so withdrawn shall have no claim for a refund of any fee paid in respect of such licence.

- 36. The Postmaster General or any person authorised in writing by the Postmaster General may at all reasonable times enter upon any station or premises on which wireless telegraphy appliances are installed or are in course of being installed in pursuance of a licence; and may examine or test the appliances and the working and user thereof.
- 37. The licensed apparatus shall, without the consent in writing of the Postmaster General, not be altered or modified in respect of any of the particulars furnished with the application for the licence, nor shall a new apparatus be substituted for the original licensed apparatus without such consent.
- 38. The licensee shall be held responsible at all times for the operation of the licensed apparatus which moreover shall not, without the previous consent in writing of the Postmaster General, be used by any person on the licensee's behalf or by permission of the licensee for the despatch or receipt of messages other than messages authorised by the licence.
- 39. The licensee shall not divulge to any person (other than properly authorised officers of the Government or a competent legal tribunal) or make any use whatever of any message coming to the knowledge of the licensee and not intended for receipt by means of the licensed apparatus.
- 40. The licensee shall so work the licensed apparatus as not to interfere with the working of any wireless telegraph station established in the Colony or Protectorate or the territorial waters thereof, and the licensee shall comply with all directions which shall be given to the licensee by the Postmaster General in this behalf.
- 41. All apparatus used by the licensee shall be so placed and used as not to interfere with the efficient or convenient maintenance, working or use of any telegraph line of the Postmaster General which may from time to time exist.
- 42. Except with the consent in writing of the Postmaster General no licence may be assigned, underlet or otherwise disposed of, or the location of a licensed station changed.
- 43. The Postmaster General, with the approval of the Governor in Council, may appoint any number of persons to form a Board to assist the Postmaster General in the control and censorship of all matter for broadcasting.
- 44. A licensee shall at all times indemnify the Government and the Postmaster General against all actions, claims and demands which may be brought or made by any corporation, company or person in respect of any injury arising from any act of the licensee or his agents permitted by the licence.
- 45. Nothing in these Rules shall be construed as rendering the Postmaster General liable or responsible for any infringement by a licensee in the exercise of his licence of copyright in any work or of any patent for an invention or for any breach of the law arising out of the exercise of the licence and nothing in these Rules shall affect the liability of the licensee in respect of any such act done by him.

THE MASTER AND SERVANTS ORDINANCE, 1910.

RULES.

IN EXERCISE of the powers conferred upon him by the Master and Servants Ordinance, 1910-1919, and all other powers thereunto enabling him, His Excellency the Governor in Council has been pleased to make the following Rules:—

- 1. These Rules may be cited as "the Native Labourers (Medical Treatment) Rules, 1926."
- 2. An employer shall provide, free of charge, in all cases of illness of, or injury to, any servant in his employ, whether such illness or injury was contracted as a result of the work on which the servant was employed, or not, medicines, dressings and medical treatment. The term "medical treatment" shall include treatment at a Government hospital if available.
- 3. In all camps, farms, hutments or other labour centres employing more than fifty labourers, there shall be kept an adequate stock of medicines and equipment, which shall include the following:—
 - Medicines.—Cough mixture, castor oil, Epsom salts, quinine, calomel, turpentine liniments, picric acid solution, potassium permanganate, sulphur ointment and boracic powder.
 - Equipment.—Medicine measure, measure jug, dressing bowl, surgical needles and sutures, bandages, cyanide gauze, cotton wool, oiled paper or jaconet, boric lint, clinical thermometer, scissors and dressing forceps.
- 4. An employer shall be liable for charges for maintenance of any servant admitted as an in-patient in a Government hospital for a period until the termination of the servant's contract or for a maximum of thirty days, whichever is the less, provided that such servant be not a casual labourer engaged for not more than twenty-four hours.

The employer shall notify the Medical Officer-in-Charge of the date of expiration of contract.

- 5. An employer shall not be liable for hospital fees in connection with a native servant who shall have departed, without lawful cause, from his employer's service, with intent not to return thereto, and whose desertion has been duly reported to the Administrative Officer in charge of the district in accordance with the procedure laid down in Rule 11 (i) of Government Notice No. 128 of April 6th, 1922; or, who shall have absented himself without lawful cause from his place of employment and shall have contracted his illness during such unlawful absence, unless such desertion or such absence can be proved to be the result of the illness or injury for which the native was admitted to hospital.
- 6. An employer shall not be liable for hospital fees in respect of a native resident on his estate and duly registered under the Resident Native Labourers Ordinance, No. 5 of 1925.
- 7. A native suffering from any disease which under section 18. Public Health Ordinance, 1921, has been proclaimed a notifiable infectious disease, shall be treated free in Government hospitals.

8. Any person contravening Rule 2 or Rule 3 hereof shall be guilty of an offence and shall, on conviction, be liable to imprisonment of either description for a term not exceeding one month, or to a fine not exceeding two hundred shillings or to both such imprisonment and fine.

NOTICE.

Sale of Grants in Respect of Residential Plots, Nairobi.

IN ORDER to meet the demand for plots for Asiatic residence it has been decided that grants in respect of the plots specified in the Schedule hereto will be offered for sale by auction in the Railway Club, Nairobi, on Monday the 13th September, 1926, commencing at 10 a.m.

Plans of the sites may be seen at the Public Map Office, attached to the Land Department, Nairobi, or may be had on application to that office on payment of Shs. 3, post free.

The right to withdraw any plots from the auction is reserved to the Commissioner of Lands.

CONDITIONS.

- 1. Each plot will be auctioned separately.
- 2. The highest bidder will be the purchaser, and, if any dispute arise as to any bidding, the plot will be put up again at the last undisputed bidding;
- 3. The amount of the advance of each bidding will be regulated by the auctioneer and no bidding shall be retracted.
- 4. Each purchaser shall pay to the auctioneer immediately on the fall of the hammer a deposit of 25 per cent of his purchase money. In default of such payment the plot may be immediately reoffered for sale and any subsequent bid by the person who has made default may be ignored or refused.
- 5. Each purchaser shall on paying the deposit inform the auctioneer of the name or names of the person or persons on whose behalf the plot is purchased; the grant will be issued in accordance with this information.
- 6. The balance of the purchase money together with the rent due to the 31st day of December, 1926, the survey fees and the fees payable for the preparation and registration of the grant and the stamp duty payable in respect of the grant shall be paid to the Commissioner of Lands at the Land Office, Nairobi, within seven days from the date of the sale, and upon such payments being duly made the purchaser shall, subject to the provisions of the Crown Lands Ordinance, 1915, and if the conditions of sale have been complied with be entitled to a grant of the plot, which grant shall be presented to him duly executed as soon as conveniently may be.

Provided that the balance of the purchase money shall not be payable within the time stated or thereafter unless and until the Commissioner of Lands can present to the purchaser the grant of the plot duly executed.

- 7. The grants will be for 99 years and will commence from the 1st day of October, 1926, and the rent shall be payable from that date.
- 8. Subject to the proviso contained therein if the balance of the purchase money together with the rent, fees and duty mentioned in Condition 5 be not paid to the Commissioner of Lands, at the Land Office, Nairobi, within seven days from the date of the sale, the Commissioner of Lands may order the deposit made by the purchaser to be forfeited and the purchaser will have no further claim to a grant of the plot.

- 9. Each purchaser shall within two years of the commencement of his grant completely enclose his plot with a fence of suitable design and in conformity with the Township Regulations.
- 10. Each purchaser shall erect on his plot within two years of the commencement of his grant a dwelling house of approved design to be constructed of stone, brick or concrete.
- 11. At no time during the term of the grant shall more than one dwelling house, with the necessary offices and outbuildings, be erected on any plot.
- 12. No building shall be erected on any plot unless plans, drawings, elevations and specifications thereof shall have been previously submitted to and approved by the Commissioner of Lands or such other person as he may appoint.
- 13. The grantee shall further submit a block plan of the plot with the position of the building clearly defined and showing a system of drainage, which shall satisfy the Medical Officer for the Township of Nairobi for properly dealing with the surface water on the plot and before any building may be occupied the grantee shall satisfy the said Medical Officer that such system of drainage has been properly constructed.
- 14. Each grantee shall suitably connect his premises with any town drainage system when, in the opinion of the said Medical Officer such drainage scheme is so far completed as to enable the grantee reasonably so to connect.
- 15. All outbuildings, offices, etc., shall be properly screened from view to the satisfaction of the Commissioner of Lands or such other person as he may appoint and shall be kept so screened during the term of the grant.
- 16. No building shall at any time during the term of the grant be used for any other purpose than a private dwelling house or used as a place of residence for natives who are not domestic servants in the employ of the grantee.
- 17. The grantee shall not at any time during the term of the grant assign or sub-let any portion of a plot.
- 18. The grantee shall not at any time during the term of the grant erect any building or buildings so as to cover more than one-third of the area of the plot.
- 19. The grantee shall not at any time during the term of the grant erect any building nearer than ten feet from the boundary of the plot.
 - 20. At no time shall the plot be sub-divided.
- 21. The Governor or such person as may be appointed for the purpose shall have the right to enter upon any plot and lay and have access to water mains and service pipes, telegraph or telephone wires, and electric mains of all descriptions whether overhead or underground, and the grantees shall not erect any building in such a way as to cover or interfere with any existing routes, main or service pipes or the telegraph or telephone wires and electric mains aforementioned.
- 22. Every purchaser shall bear the cost of deeds, Shs. 90, stamp duty, registration and survey fees and all other expenses, if any, connected with the purchase of the plot.
