SCHEDULE.

DESCRIPTION OF BOUNDARIES OF KITALE TOWNSHIP (EXTENSION).

Commencing at a beacon on the south-easterly boundary of Kitale Township 2,233 feet (approx.) from its most southerly corner;

thence by that boundary north-easterly bearing $59^{\circ} 09' 52''$ for a distance of approximately 6,475 feet to a beacon;

thence south-easterly bearing $149^{\circ} 09' 54''$ for approximately 3,151 feet to a beacon;

thence south-westerly bearing $239^{\circ} 09' 54''$ for approximately 3,201 feet to a beacon;

thence south-easterly bearing $149^{\circ} 09' 54''$ for approximately 1,800 feet to a beacon;

thence south-westerly bearing $254^{\circ} 39' 52''$ for approximately 935 feet to a beacon;

thence north-westerly bearing $329^{\circ} 09' 54''$ for approximately 1,550 feet to a beacon;

thence south-westerly bearing $239^{\circ} 09' 54''$ for approximately 4,332 feet to a beacon;

thence generally northerly bearing $343^{\circ} 37' 14''$ for approximately 648 feet to a beacon;

thence still northerly bearing $4^{\circ} 37' 27''$ for approximately 3,099 feet to the point of commencement.

The foregoing boundaries are more particularly delineated, edged red, on Land Survey Boundary Plan No. 29, deposited at the Land Surveys Office, Nairobi, a copy of which is on record at the Resident Commissioner's Office, Kitale.

FUGITIVE CRIMINAL.

THE ESTONIA (EXTRADITION) ORDER IN COUNCIL, 1926.

AT THE COURT AT BUCKINGHAM PALACE,

The 28th day of June, 1926.

WHEREAS by the Extradition Acts, 1870(a) to 1906(b), it was amongst other things enacted that, where an arrangement has been made with any foreign State with respect to the surrender to such State of any fugitive criminals, His Majesty may, by Order in Council, direct that the said Acts shall apply in the case of such foreign State; and that His Majesty may, by the same or any subsequent Order, limit the operation of the Order, and restrict the same to fugitive criminals who are in or suspected of being in the part of His Majesty's dominions specified in the Order, and render the operation thereof subject to such conditions, exceptions and qualifications as may be deemed expedient :

AND WHEREAS a Convention was concluded on the 18th day of November, 1925, between His Majesty and the Estonian Republic for the mutual extradition of fugitive criminals, which Convention is in the terms following :—

His Majesty the King of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, Emperor of India and the Esthonian Republic; having determined, by common consent, to conclude a convention for the extradition of criminals, have accordingly named as their plenipotentiaries :

His Majesty the King of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, Emperor of India :—

The Right Honourable Joseph Austen Chamberlain, M.P.,
His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign
Affairs; and

The Esthonian Republic :—

Dr. Oskar Kallas, Envoy Extraordinary and Minister
Plenipotentiary of the Esthonian Republic at London ;

Who, after having exhibited to each other their respective
full powers, found in good and due form, have agreed upon
the following articles :—

ARTICLE 1.

The High Contracting Parties engage to deliver up to each
other, under certain circumstances and conditions stated in the
present convention, those persons who, being accused or con-
victed of any of the crimes or offences enumerated in Article 2,
committed within the jurisdiction of the one Party, shall be
found within the territory of the other Party.

ARTICLE 2.

Extradition shall be reciprocally granted for the following
crimes or offences, provided that they are punishable under the
law of both States by imprisonment with or without hard labour
or some greater punishment :—

1. Murder (including assassination, parricide, infanticide,
poisoning), or attempt or conspiracy to murder.
2. Manslaughter.
3. Administering drugs or using instruments with intent
to procure the miscarriage of women.
4. Rape.
5. Carnal knowledge, or any attempt to have carnal
knowledge, of a girl under 14 years of age.
6. Indecent assault.
7. Kidnapping and false imprisonment.
8. Child stealing, including abandoning, exposing or
unlawfully detaining.
9. Abduction.
10. Procuration.
11. Bigamy.
12. Maliciously wounding or inflicting grievous bodily
harm.
13. Assault occasioning actual bodily harm.
14. Threats, by letter or otherwise, with intent to extort
money or other things of value.
15. Perjury, or subornation of perjury.
16. Arson.
17. Burglary or housebreaking, robbery with violence,
larceny or embezzlement.
18. Fraud by a bailee, banker, agent, factor, trustee,
director, member, or public officer of any company or fraudu-
lent conversion.
19. Obtaining money, valuable security, or goods by false
pretences; receiving any money, valuable security, or other
property, knowing the same to have been stolen or feloniously
obtained.
20. (a) Counterfeiting or altering money, or bringing into
circulation counterfeited or altered money.

(b) Knowingly making without lawful authority any instrument, tool, or engine adapted and intended for the counterfeiting of the coin of the realm.

21. Forgery, or uttering what is forged.

22. Crimes against bankruptcy law.

23. Any malicious act done with intent to endanger the safety of any persons travelling or being upon a railway.

24. Malicious injury to property, if such offence be indictable.

25. Piracy and other crimes or offences committed at sea against persons or things which, according to the laws of the High Contracting Parties, are extradition crimes or offences.

26. Dealing in slaves in such manner as to constitute a crime or offence against the laws of both States.

The extradition is also to be granted for participation in any of the aforesaid crimes or offences, provided such participation be punishable by the laws of both High Contracting Parties.

Extradition may also be granted at the discretion of the State applied to in respect of any other crime or offence for which, according to the law of both the High Contracting Parties for the time being in force, the grant can be made.

ARTICLE 3.

Each Party reserves the right to refuse or grant the surrender of its own subjects or citizens to the other Party.

ARTICLE 4.

The extradition shall not take place if the person claimed has already been tried and discharged or punished, or is still under trial in the State applied to, for the crime or offence for which his extradition is demanded.

If the person claimed should be under examination or under punishment in the State applied to for any other crime or offence, his extradition shall be deferred until the conclusion of the trial and the full execution of any punishment awarded to him.

ARTICLE 5.

The extradition shall not take place if, subsequently to the commission of the crime or offence or the institution of the penal prosecution or the conviction thereon, exemption from prosecution or punishment has been acquired by lapse of time, according to the laws of the State applying or applied to.

ARTICLE 6.

A fugitive criminal shall not be surrendered if the crime or offence in respect of which his surrender is demanded is one of a political character, or if he proves that the requisition for his surrender has, in fact, been made with a view to try or punish him for a crime or offence of a political character.

ARTICLE 7.

A person surrendered can in no case be kept in custody or be brought to trial in the State to which the surrender has been made for any other crime or offence, or on account of any other matters, than those for which the extradition shall have taken place, until he has been restored, or has had an opportunity of returning, to the State by which he has been surrendered.

This stipulation does not apply to crimes or offences committed after the extradition.

ARTICLE 8.

The requisition for extradition shall be made through the diplomatic agents of the High Contracting Parties respectively.

The requisition for the extradition of an accused person must be accompanied by a warrant of arrest issued by the competent authority of the State requiring the extradition, and by such evidence as, according to the laws of the place where the accused is found, would justify his arrest if the crime or offence had been committed there.

If the requisition relates to a person already convicted, it must be accompanied by the sentence of condemnation passed against the convicted person by the competent court of the State that makes the requisition for extradition.

A sentence passed in *contumaciam* is not to be deemed a conviction, but a person so sentenced may be dealt with as an accused person.

ARTICLE 9.

If the requisition for extradition be in accordance with the foregoing stipulations, the competent authorities of the State applied to shall proceed to the arrest of the fugitive.

ARTICLE 10.

A criminal fugitive may be apprehended under a warrant issued by any police magistrate, justice of the peace, or other competent authority in either State, on such information or complaint and such evidence, or after such proceedings, as would, in the opinion of the authority issuing the warrant, justify the issue of a warrant if the crime or offence had been committed or the person convicted in that part of the dominions of the two High Contracting Parties in which the magistrate, justice of the peace, or other competent authority, exercises jurisdiction. He shall, in accordance with this article, be discharged if within the term of thirty days a requisition for extradition shall not have been made by the diplomatic agent of the State claiming his extradition in accordance with the stipulations of this treaty. The same rule shall apply to the cases of persons accused or convicted of any of the crimes or offences specified in this treaty, and committed on the high seas on board any vessel of either State which may come into a port of the other.

ARTICLE 11.

The extradition shall take place only if the evidence be found sufficient, according to the laws of the State applied to, either to justify the committal of the prisoner for trial, in case the crime or offence had been committed in the territory of the same State, or to prove that the prisoner is the identical person convicted by the courts of the State which makes the requisition, and that the crime or offence of which he has been convicted is one in respect of which extradition could, at the time of such conviction, have been granted by the State applied to; and no criminal shall be surrendered until after the expiration of fifteen days from the date of his committal to prison to await the warrant for his surrender.

ARTICLE 12.

In the examinations which they have to make in accordance with the foregoing stipulations, the authorities of the State applied to shall admit as valid evidence the sworn depositions or the affirmations of witnesses taken in the other

State, or copies thereof, and likewise the warrants and sentences issued therein, or copies thereof, and certificates of, or judicial documents stating the fact of a conviction, provided the same are authenticated as follows :—

1. A warrant, or copy thereof, must purport to be signed by a judge, magistrate, or officer of the other State, or purport to be certified under the hand of a judge, magistrate, or officer of the other State to be a true copy thereof, as the case may require.

2. Depositions or affirmations, or the copies thereof, must purport to be certified under the hand of a judge, magistrate, or officer of the other State, to be the original depositions or affirmations, or to be true copies thereof, as the case may require.

3. A certificate of, or judicial document stating the fact of a conviction must purport to be certified by a judge, magistrate, or officer of the other State.

In every case such warrant, deposition, affirmation, copy, certificate, or judicial document must be authenticated, either by the oath of some witness, or by being sealed with the official seal of the Minister of Justice, or some other minister of the other State, or by any other mode of authentication for the time being permitted by the law of the State to which the application for extradition is made.

ARTICLE 13.

If the individual claimed by one of the High Contracting Parties in pursuance of the present convention should be also claimed by one or several other Powers on account of other crimes or offences committed within their respective jurisdictions, his extradition shall be granted to the State whose claim is earliest in date, unless such claim is waived.

ARTICLE 14.

If sufficient evidence for the extradition be not produced within two months from the date of the apprehension of the fugitive, or within such further time as the State applied to, or the proper tribunal thereof, shall direct, the fugitive shall be set at liberty.

ARTICLE 15.

All articles seized which were in the possession of the person to be surrendered at the time of his apprehension, and any articles that may serve as a proof of the crime or offence shall be given up when the extradition takes place, in so far as this may be permitted by the law of the State granting the extradition.

ARTICLE 16.

Each of the High Contracting Parties shall defray the expenses occasioned by the arrest within its territories, the detention, and the conveyance to its frontier, of the persons whom it may have consented to surrender in pursuance of the present convention.

ARTICLE 17.

The stipulations of the present convention shall be applicable, so far as the laws permit, to all His Britannic Majesty's Dominions, except to the self-governing Dominions hereinafter named—that is to say, the Dominion of Canada, the Commonwealth of Australia (including for this purpose Papua

and Norfolk Island), the Dominion of New Zealand, the Union of South Africa, the Irish Free State, and Newfoundland—and India, provided always that the said stipulations shall be applicable to any of the above-named Dominions or India in respect of which notice to that effect shall have been given on behalf of the Government of such Dominion or India by His Britannic Majesty's Representative at Tallin (Reval), and provided also that it shall be competent for either of the High Contracting Parties to terminate separately the application of this convention to any of the above-named Dominions or India by a notice to that effect not exceeding one year and not less than six months.

ARTICLE 18.

The requisition for the surrender of a fugitive criminal, who has taken refuge in any of His Britannic Majesty's self-governing Dominions, Colonies, or Possessions to which this convention applies shall be made to the Governor-General, Governor, or chief authority, of such self-governing Dominion, Colony, or Possession by the appropriate consular officer of the Estonian Republic.

Such requisition may be dealt with, subject always, as nearly as may be, and so far as the law of such self-governing Dominion, Colony, or Possession will allow, to the provisions of this convention by the competent authorities of such self-governing Dominion, Colony or Possession, provided nevertheless that, if an order for the committal of the fugitive criminal to prison to await surrender shall be made, the said Governor-General, Governor, or Chief Authority, may, instead of issuing a warrant for the surrender of such fugitive criminal, refer the matter to His Britannic Majesty's Government.

Requisitions for the surrender of a fugitive criminal emanating from any self-governing Dominion, Colony, or Possession of His Britannic Majesty shall be governed, as far as possible, by the rules laid down in the preceding articles of the present convention.

ARTICLE 19.

It is understood that the stipulations of the two preceding articles apply in the same manner as if they were Possessions of His Britannic Majesty, to the following British Protectorates, that is to say, the Bechuanaland Protectorate, Gambia Protectorate, Kenya Protectorate, Nigeria Protectorate, Northern Rhodesia, Northern Territories of the Gold Coast, Nyasaland, Sierra Leone Protectorate, Solomon Islands Protectorate, Somaliland Protectorate, Swaziland, Uganda Protectorate, and Zanzibar.

It is also understood that if, after the signature of the present convention, it is considered advisable to extend its provisions to any British protectorates other than those mentioned above, or to any British-protected State, or to any territory in respect of which a mandate on behalf of the League of Nations has been accepted by His Britannic Majesty, including the territories in respect of which mandates are being exercised on behalf of His Britannic Majesty by the Government of the Commonwealth of Australia, the Government of the Dominion of New Zealand, and the Government of the Union of South Africa, the stipulations of the two preceding articles shall be deemed to apply to such protectorates or States or mandated territories from the date prescribed in the notes to be exchanged for the purpose of effecting such extension.

It is further understood that the provisions of the present convention which apply to British subjects shall be deemed also to apply to natives of any British protectorate or protected State or mandated territory, to which the stipulations of the two preceding articles apply or shall hereafter apply.

ARTICLE 20.

The present convention shall come into force ten days after its publication, in conformity with the forms prescribed by the laws of the High Contracting Parties. It may be terminated by either of the High Contracting Parties by a notice not exceeding one year and not less than six months.

It shall be ratified and the ratifications shall be exchanged at London, as soon as possible.

In witness whereof the respective plenipotentiaries have signed the convention and have affixed thereto their respective seals.

Done at London, the 18th day of November, in the year 1925.

AND WHEREAS the ratifications of the said Convention were exchanged at London on the 11th day of May, 1926 :

NOW, THEREFORE, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, and in virtue of the authority committed to him by the said recited Acts, doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the 12th day of July, 1926, the said Acts shall apply in the case of the Estonian Republic under and in accordance with the said Convention of the 18th November, 1925.

Provided always that the operation of the said Acts shall be and remain suspended within the Dominion of Canada so long as an Act of the Parliament of Canada, being Part I of Chapter 155 of the Revised Statutes of Canada, 1906, and entitled "An Act respecting the Extradition of Fugitive Criminals," shall continue in force there, and no longer.

Provided further that the operation of the said Acts shall be and remain suspended within the self-governing Dominions hereinafter named, that is to say, the Commonwealth of Australia (including for this purpose Papua and Norfolk Island), the Dominion of New Zealand, the Union of South Africa, the Irish Free State and Newfoundland, and India, until notification shall have been made in the "London Gazette" that the Convention has been made applicable thereto, and that on such notification being made in respect of any such Dominion or India the said Acts shall apply in such Dominion or India in the case of the Estonian Republic under and in accordance with the said Convention as from the date of the said notification.

This Order may be cited as the "Estonia (Extradition) Order in Council, 1926."

THE MUNICIPAL CORPORATIONS ORDINANCE.

By-Laws.

IN EXERCISE of the powers vested in the Nairobi Corporation by the Municipal Corporations Ordinance (Chapter 84 of the Revised Edition), the Nairobi Corporation, with the approval of His Excellency the Governor in Council, have made the following By-laws:—

1. These By-laws may be cited as "the Nairobi Township (Amendment) (No. 3) By-laws, 1926," and shall be read as one with the Nairobi Township By-laws, 1926 (hereinafter called "the Principal By-laws").

2. In these By-laws unless the context otherwise requires—

the expression "night" means the interval between nine o'clock in the evening and six o'clock in the morning of the next succeeding day;

the expression "native" shall include a native of the Comoro Island, and a native of Madagascar.

3. By-law 557 of the Principal By-laws is hereby amended by the addition thereto of the following subsections, the first part thereof being numbered accordingly :—

“(2) Every native who—

(a) not being a servant housed therein by his or her employer or the husband, wife, or child of such servant, shall be found or remain, by day or by night, in or upon any house, tent, warehouse, coach-house, garage, stable, outhouse, yard, garden, or other premises without the written consent of the owner or occupier of such house, tent, warehouse, coach-house, garage, stable, outhouse, yard, garden or other premises or without other lawful excuse (the proof whereof shall be on such native);

(b) without valid excuse, the proof whereof shall be on such native, shall be found lying, wandering or loitering in any highway, yard or other place during the night or, shall be found wandering abroad and/or lodging in any barn or outhouse or in any deserted or unoccupied building or in the open air or under a tent or in any cart or wagon;

(c) shall be found by night having in his possession without lawful excuse (the proof whereof shall be on such native) any dangerous or offensive weapon, firearm, or instrument or any key, picklock, crowbar, jemmy, jack, bit or other implement of house-breaking or having his or her face disguised;

(d) shall remain within the Municipal Area of Nairobi for a longer period than seven days without employment (the proof whereof shall be on such native): Provided that the provisions of this subsection shall not apply to any native who is in possession of a valid permit to reside in the Municipal Area, issued by the District Commissioner, Nairobi, and provided that the said District Commissioner, Nairobi, may issue to any native showing good and sufficient cause a permit in the form of the Schedule hereto, and such permit shall constitute the authority of such native to reside within the Municipal Area for the period stated on such permit;

and every person wilfully aiding or wilfully assisting such native aforesaid shall be guilty of an offence and on conviction for such offence shall be liable to a fine not exceeding five hundred shillings or to imprisonment of either description for a term not exceeding six months or to both such fine and imprisonment. In addition to such punishment aforesaid the Court may order such native to return to his reserve or proper place of residence and if such native disobeys such order he shall be liable to a further term of imprisonment of either kind not exceeding three months.

(3) Any police officer may take into custody without warrant any person found or reasonably suspected of committing or attempting to commit or wilfully aiding or wilfully assisting any native to commit any offence against these By-laws.

(4) When there is reasonable cause for so doing any European police officer of or above the rank of assistant inspector or any police officer authorised in writing by him may enter any house, tent, warehouse, coach-house, garage, stable, outhouse, yard, garden or other premises at any time to ensure that the provisions of these By-laws are being complied with."

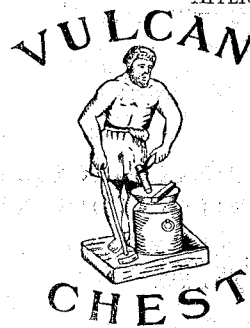

IN ORDER to meet the demand for plots for Asiatic residence it has been decided that grants in respect of the plots specified in the Schedule hereto will be offered for sale by auction in the Railway Club, Nairobi, on Monday the 15th November, 1926, commencing at 10 a.m.

Plans of the sites may be seen at the Public Map Office, attached to the Land Department, Nairobi, or may be had on application to that office on payment of Shs. 3, post free.

The right to withdraw any plots from the auction is reserved to the Commissioner of Lands.

CONDITIONS.

1. Each plot will be auctioned separately.
2. The highest bidder will be the purchaser, and, if any dispute arise as to any bidding, the plot will be put up again at the last undisputed bidding.
3. The amount of the advance of each bidding will be regulated by the auctioneer and no bidding shall be retracted.
4. Each purchaser shall pay to the auctioneer immediately on the fall of the hammer a deposit of 25 per cent. of his purchase money. In default of such payment the plot may be immediately re-offered for sale and any subsequent bid by the person who has made default may be ignored or refused.
5. Each purchaser shall on paying the deposit inform the auctioneer of the name or names of the person or persons on whose behalf the plot is purchased; the grant will be issued in accordance with this information.
6. The balance of the purchase money together with the rent due to the 31st day of December, 1926, the survey fees and the fees payable for the preparation and registration of the grant and the stamp duty payable in respect of the grant shall be paid to the Commissioner of Lands at the Land Office, Nairobi, within seven days from the date of the sale, and upon such payments being duly made the purchaser shall, subject to the provisions of the Crown Lands Ordinance, 1915, and if the conditions of sale have been complied with be entitled to a grant of the plot, which grant shall be presented to him duly executed as soon as conveniently may be.

Provided that the balance of the purchase money shall not be payable within the time stated or thereafter unless and until the Commissioner of Lands can present to the purchaser the grant of the plot duly executed.

7. The grants will be subject to the conditions of the Crown Lands Ordinance, 1915, and the Registration of Titles Ordinance, 1919, and will be for a term of 99 years from the 1st day of December, 1926, and the rent shall be payable from that date.

8. Subject to the proviso contained therein if the balance of the purchase money together with the rent, fees and duty mentioned in Condition 6 be not paid to the Commissioner of Lands, at the Land Office, Nairobi, within seven days from the date of the sale, the Commissioner of Lands may order the deposit made by the purchaser to be forfeited and the purchaser will have no further claim to a grant of the plot.

9. Each purchaser shall erect on his plot within two years of the commencement of his grant a dwelling house of approved design in accordance with Township Regulations for the town of Nairobi.

10. No building shall be erected on any plot unless plans, drawings, elevations and specifications thereof shall have been previously submitted to and approved by the Commissioner of Lands or such other person as he may appoint.

11. The grantee shall further submit a block plan of the plot with the position of the building clearly defined and showing a system of drainage, which shall satisfy the Town Clerk for the Township of Nairobi for properly dealing with the surface water on the plot and before any building may be occupied the grantee shall satisfy the said Town Clerk that such system of drainage has been properly constructed.

12. Each grantee shall suitably connect his premises with any town drainage system when, in the opinion of the said Town Clerk such drainage scheme is so far completed as to enable the grantee reasonably so to connect.

13. No building shall at any time during the term of the grant be used for any other purpose than a private dwelling house or used as a place of residence for natives who are not domestic servants in the employ of the grantee.

14. The grantee shall not at any time during the term of the grant assign any portion of a plot without the previous consent of the Governor in writing.

15. The grantee shall not at any time during the term of the grant erect any building or buildings so as to cover more than one-half of the area of the plot.

16. The Governor or such person as may be appointed for the purpose shall have the right to enter upon any plot and lay and have access to water mains and service pipes, telegraph or telephone wires, whether overhead or underground, and the grantees shall not erect any building in such a way as to cover or interfere with any existing routes, main or service pipes or the telegraph or telephone wires aforementioned.

17. Every purchaser shall bear the cost of deeds, Shs. 90, stamp duty, registration and survey fees and all other expenses, if any, connected with the purchase of the plot.
