HIS EXCELLENCY the Governor has approved of the following Bill being introduced into Legislative Council :—

A Bill to Amend the Shop Hours Ordinance, 1925.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of Kenya, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :—

1. This Ordinance may be cited as “ the Shop Hours Short title.
(Amendment) Ordinance, 1928,” and shall be read as one with the Shop Hours Ordinance, 1925, hereinafter referred to as “ the Principal Ordinance.”

5 2. The Principal Ordinance is hereby amended by the addition thereto of the following sections :—

10 “ 19. Nothing in this Ordinance shall apply to any premises where intoxicating liquor is sold for consumption on such premises, nor to the trade or business of a restaurant, cafe, or eating house, nor to the trade or business of a wood fuel seller, a motor fuel seller, or a motor oil seller, nor to the trade or business of a seller of motor, cycle, or aircraft supplies and accessories.

15 20. (1) The Governor in Council may from time to time, at the request of any local authority, by proclamation declare any trade or business to be exempt from all or any of the provisions of this Ordinance and thereupon such trade or business shall be exempt from all or any of such provisions.

20 (2) Any proclamation issued under this section may be of general application or may be applied to any particular municipality, township or other area.”

3. The third item in the Second Schedule to the Principal Ordinance is hereby deleted.

OBJECTS AND REASONS.

The object of this Bill is to provide for the exemption of certain trades and businesses from the operation of the Shop Hours Ordinance, 1925.

The Bill has been prepared after consultation with the Nairobi Municipal Council and it is proposed, in the interests of public convenience, to exempt from the operation of the Ordinance all premises where intoxicating liquor is sold for consumption on the premises and also the trades and businesses of a restaurant, cafe, eating house, wood fuel seller, motor fuel seller, motor oil seller, and of sellers of motor, cycle and aircraft supplies and accessories.

Provision is also inserted in the Bill to empower the Governor in Council from time to time, at the request of a local authority, to declare any other trade or business to be exempt from the operation of the Ordinance.

THE NATIVE FOODSTUFFS ORDINANCE.

(Cap. 135 of the Revised Edition of the Laws of Kenya.)

By His Excellency Sir Edward William Macleay Grigg, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Knight Commander of the Royal Victorian Order, Companion of the Distinguished Service Order, upon whom His Majesty has conferred the decoration of the Military Cross, Lieutenant-Colonel in His Majesty's Army (retired), Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony and Protectorate of Kenya, in Executive Council.

WHEREAS by Section 3 of the Native Foodstuffs Ordinance (Chapter 135 of the Revised Edition), it is provided that where it has been made to appear to the Governor in Council that any district or area is suffering from, or threatened with a shortage of native foodstuffs, he may issue a proclamation (a) prohibiting the purchase or barter of such foodstuffs generally or of any class or classes of the same, for the purpose of resale in or export from the district or area in such proclamation specified, unless the written permission of the Resident Commissioner or District Commissioner, as the case may be, be first obtained; (b) prohibiting the export of such foodstuffs generally or of any class or classes of the same from any district or area; (c) prohibiting the use of such foodstuffs or of any class or classes of the same for the manufacture of liquor in any district or area; (d) prohibiting the concealment or destruction of such foodstuffs or any class or classes of the same in any district or area;

AND WHEREAS it has been made to appear to me that the Dagoretti Sub-District of the Kiambu District is threatened with a shortage of native foodstuffs;

NOW, THEREFORE, by virtue of the powers vested in me as aforesaid, and having taken the advice of my Executive Council I do hereby prohibit:

- (a) the purchase or barter of maize, beans, wimbe, sweet potatoes and mtama for the purposes of resale in or export from the Dagoretti Sub-District of the Kiambu District unless the written permission of the District Officer of the said Sub-District be first obtained;

- (b) the export of any such native foodstuffs from the said area;
- (c) the use of any such native foodstuffs for the manufacture of liquor in the said area; or
- (d) the concealment or destruction of any such native foodstuffs in the said area.

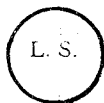

GOVERNMENT NOTICE No. 39.**THE INDIAN TELEGRAPH ACT, 1885.****RULES.**

IN EXERCISE of the powers conferred upon him by the Indian Telegraph Act, 1885, as applied to the Colony and Protectorate of Kenya, His Excellency the Governor in Council has been pleased to make the following Rules:—

1. These Rules may be cited as “the Telegraph Rules 1928,” and shall come into force from the 1st day of December, 1927.

2. The charges for press telegrams tendered in the Colony and Protectorate of Kenya for transmission to the undermentioned countries, *via* the Eastern and South African Telegraph Company's cables, shall be:—

3. A telegram to be accepted at Press Rates shall fulfil the following conditions:—

- (a) It shall be tendered by a recognised press correspondent authorised by the Postmaster General;
- (b) It shall bear at the beginning of the address the paid service indication “PRESS” inserted by the sender;
- (c) It shall be addressed to newspapers, periodical publications, or news agencies, and solely to the name of the newspaper, publication, or agency, and not to the name of a person connected in any capacity whatever with the management of the newspaper, publication or agency. The use of abbreviated and registered code addresses is permitted;

- (d) It shall contain only intelligence relative to politics, commerce, etc., clearly intended for publication in newspapers and other periodical publications :

• Provided that instructions relative to such publication may be inserted when such instructions are written in parenthesis either at the beginning or the end of the text. The parenthesis shall not amount to more than 5 per cent. of the number of words of the text and shall not in any case exceed ten words in all.

The parenthesis shall be chargeable at the same rate as the text ;

- (e) Subject to the proviso in (d) it must not contain any passage, advertisement or communication having the character of private correspondence, nor any advertisement or communication for the insertion of which a charge is made. Stock Exchange and market quotations, with or without explanatory texts, are admitted, but the sender shall, if required, furnish proof that groups of figures appearing in a press telegram really represent exchange or market quotations ;
- (f) It shall be written in English or French or in one of the languages of the country of origin or of destination authorised for international telegraphic correspondence in plain language, or in the language in which the receiving newspaper is printed, provided that this language is admitted for international telegraphic correspondence. The languages mentioned may also be used in quotations conjointly with that in which the press telegram is expressed. The usual spelling of the language used must be employed.

4. Telegrams at Press Rates may be accepted with multiple addresses. Subject to this exception no prepaid replies, collation, notice of delivery or other facility or special service of a like nature shall be allowed.

5. Telegrams which do not fulfil the conditions of the foregoing Rules shall be chargeable at full ordinary rates.

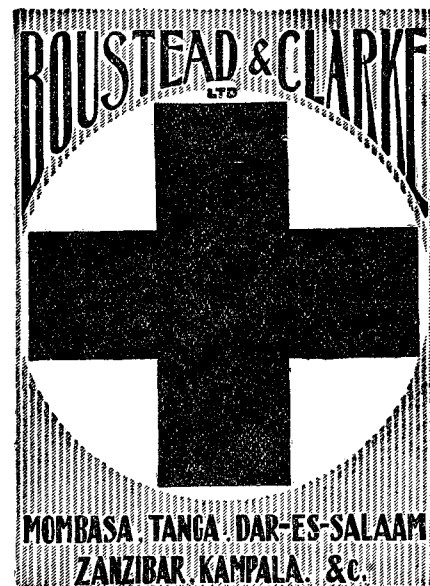
