Section 2 of the Principal Ordinance proposed to be amended :—

Interpretation. **2.** In this Ordinance, unless the context otherwise requires :—

“ Birth ” means the issuing forth of any child from its mother after the expiration of the twenty-eighth week of pregnancy, whether alive or dead ;

“ Police officer ” means a police officer in charge of a police station ;

“ Prescribed particulars ” means—

(i) as to any birth, the name, sex, date and place of birth, and the names, residence, occupations and nationality of the parents ;

(ii) as to any death, the name, age, sex, residence, occupation and nationality of the deceased, and the date, place and cause of death ;

(iii) such other particulars as may be prescribed by the Rules ;

“ Registrar General ” means the Registrar General of Births and Deaths for the Colony ;

“ Registrar ” means a registrar appointed to register births and deaths in any area ;

“ The Rules ” means Rules made under section 27 of this Ordinance ;

“ The Statistician ” means the Statistician appointed by the Governor for the purposes of this Ordinance.

Section 4 of the Principal Ordinance proposed to be amended :—

**4.** The Governor may from time to time, by notice in the Gazette, appoint any area in the Colony to be a “ registration area ” for the purposes of this Ordinance, and may appoint fit and proper persons to be the Registrars for each registration area.

### **A Bill to Amend the Births and Deaths Registration Ordinance, 1928.**

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of Kenya, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :—

1. This Ordinance may be cited as “ the Births and Deaths Registration (Amendment) Ordinance, 1928,” and shall be read as one with the Births and Deaths Registration Ordinance, 1928, hereinafter referred to as “ the Principal Ordinance.”

2. Section 2 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby amended as follows :—

(a) by the addition at the end of the definition of “ Registrar ” of the words “ and includes the Principal Registrar ”; and

(b) by the addition of the following definition :—  
“ ‘ Medical Officer of Health ’ means a Medical Officer of Health appointed under the provisions of the Public Health Ordinance, or any other Ordinance, to carry out the duties of Medical Officer of Health in any area.”

3. Section 4 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby amended by the insertion of the words “ the Principal Registrar for the Colony and ” before the words “ the Registrars ” in the fourth line thereof.

**17.** (1) A Registrar shall, upon production to him at the time of registering the death of a medical certificate on such form as may from time to time be prescribed by the Rules as to the cause of death, issue a written permit for the interment or other disposal of the body of the deceased.

**22.** It shall be the duty of every Registrar, at the close of each week, to forward to the medical officer in charge of every district included within his registration area, and to the Statistician, a statement of the births and deaths registered by him during such week.

4. Sub-section (1) of section 17 is hereby amended by the insertion, following the word " death " in the fourth line thereof, of the following words :—

5. Section 22 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby repealed and the following section substituted therefor :—

10 " 22. It shall be the duty of every Registrar, at the close of each week, to forward to the Medical Officer of Health in whose area his registration area is situate, and to the Statistician, a statement of the births and deaths registered by him during such week."

15 6. (1) In the case of the death of any person who has been attended during his last illness by a registered medical practitioner, that practitioner shall sign a certificate stating to the best of his knowledge and belief the cause of death.

20 (2) Every such certificate of cause of death shall be forwarded forthwith by the medical practitioner by whom it is signed to the Registrar, and the medical practitioner, on signing a certificate as aforesaid shall give in the form prescribed by the Rules to some person required by the Principal Ordinance to give information concerning the death,  
25 notice in writing of the signing of the certificate.

(3) Where an inquest is held on the body of any deceased person a medical certificate of the cause of death need not be forwarded to the Registrar, but the magistrate holding the inquest shall send to the Registrar a copy of his finding, which  
30 shall be sufficient.

#### OBJECTS AND REASONS.

The Bill provides for the appointment of an additional official to be called the Principal Registrar, who will perform administrative functions on behalf of the Registrar General in addition to being Registrar for the Nairobi area. No financial provision in regard to this additional official will be required in 1929, but such provision will probably be necessary in future years.

Clauses 2 (b) and 5 make the Medical Officer of Health the person to whom weekly statements of births and deaths shall be sent by Registrars.

Clauses 4 and 6 make provision, in accordance with the recently adopted practice in England, for the actual certificate of cause of death, which may contain confidential matter, to be forwarded to the Registrar direct, the person who is under an obligation to register the death receiving a notice, for production to the Registrar, that such a certificate has been signed.

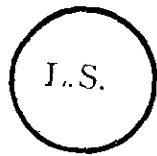

thence south-easterly by the northern boundaries of the latter sub-division and that of sub-division 82 to the westernmost corner of sub-division 211/2;

thence north-easterly by the north-western boundary of the last sub-division to its north-east corner;

## GENERAL NOTICE No. 3.

AGRICULTURAL DEPARTMENT.  
LOCUST REPORT.

27-12-28.

*Suk-Turkana.*—In Aberitt, the area between the rivers Turkwell, Wei-wei, and Chepropo, is now clean. Over 500 acres of hoppers were destroyed in patches. Egg laying is reported near Poi.

*Chepropo.*—Small swarms of hoppers destroyed and others suffering destruction.

*Kateruk.*—Over 100 acres hoppers destroyed, and destruction proceeding. Egg laying has taken place on both sides of the Suk-Turkana boundary on an extensive scale. Roads are being cut to enable supplies to be got up quickly.

*Kamasia, etc.*—The Acting Provincial Commissioner has just completed a tour of his district, during which as many natives as possible (many are nomadic) were informed concerning locusts—breeding, laying and hoppers. He has visited the Suk and Turkana areas. Natives had commenced destruction in several places on their own initiative by grass burning and beating. Hoppers are being destroyed in numbers to the south and east of Lake Baringo. A road is being cut towards the mountain Pakka in which area hoppers are expected. Over half the administrative staff is in the field dealing with locusts. The area of the district is over 30,000 square miles, the greater portion is waterless. There are very few roads; the population is sparse and generally nomadic. Food is scarce in many parts.

*Northern Frontier Province.*—Locust officers are operating in the Sankuri and Garba Tula Districts. The laying has been very scattered in Samburu with the result that hoppers are difficult to discover. Very good work has been done by Mr. Bader, District Commissioner, Barsaloi. The administration has placed every available man in the field. Local natives have been called upon to assist in the following manner—

- (1) Supply animal transport.
- (2) Furnish information in regard to locusts' laying grounds and hoppers.
- (3) Supply guides. Assist in rationing workers.
- (4) Collect live stock, and trample hoppers, to organise all available stock to trample them as they emerge, and in addition to beat hoppers.

Large areas have been dealt with by the Locust Officers under the direction of Mr. Bader, and heavy work has been done.

Owing to the nature of communications up to the present we are unable to report on action taken by the Administration in Marsabit, Wajir, Moyale and Bura Districts, but there is no doubt that the situation is being tackled with all the resources available in the Province.

*Kitui.*—The situation in this area is reported as satisfactory, and work is progressing on organised lines.

*Voi.*—Small laying swarms are still moving about the district. Hoppers on the Railway have delayed traffic at Maktai. Destruction is taking place in several areas.

*Coast.*—Considerable energy and foresight has been exhibited by the administration at the Coast.

In the Malindi area, hatching is reported from 7 locations, in 2 locations hopper destruction has been completed. Fairly satisfactory progress is being made in all the other locations. Digging up of eggs is taking place daily at Kilifi, as also disc harrowing. The area is estimated at 4,000 acres.

The Sabaki River is now falling, and it is hoped to move the tank-truck over to the north bank shortly as practically all swarms on the south side have now been destroyed.

Flying swarms arrived in Fundi Isa from the north and from the south. They have flown out to sea. Another swarm flew out seawards over Watamu.

*In Digo.*—No hatching is as yet reported, but the marking and working over laid areas is proceeding.

*Masai.*—No hoppers as yet. There is a large swarm near Magadi.

*Tanganyika* again reports large swarms.

Reports are now in from settled areas, that ripe yellow locusts, generally very much scattered, are present in practically all districts. A tour has been arranged to visit Gilgil, Nakuru, Ravine, Eldoret and Kitale during the first two weeks of January, to establish the contact necessary for coping with any possible hopper swarms.

Arrangements have been made with the Kenya and Uganda Railway to instal a fire engine over a water tank truck to enable rapid spraying on both sides of the line wherever possible.

The public must be warned, in view of the large area of the Colony which we know to-day has been visited by laying swarms, that it is more than likely pink flying locusts will again be seen in the Colony in February. The nature of some of the country which has been visited by laying swarms is such that many small swarms of hoppers will never be seen in time, and therefore will escape destruction. However, enormous numbers of hoppers are being destroyed daily and these efforts reinforced by natural losses will have the effect of considerably reducing the infestation.
