An Ordinance to Amend the Abuse of Opiates Prevention Ordinance

8th July, 1929

Date of
commencement

ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of Kenya, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows —

1 This Ordinance may be cited as “the Abuse of Opiates Prevention (Amendment) Ordinance, 1929,” and shall be read as one with the Abuse of Opiates Prevention Ordinance (Chapter 121 of the Revised Edition), hereinafter referred to as “the Principal Ordinance”

2 In this Ordinance, unless the context otherwise requires —

“The Convention” means the Convention signed at the Second Opium Conference at Geneva on the 19th February, 1925,

“Export authorisation” means an authority in writing issued by the Government of any country signatory to the Convention authorising the export therefrom of any opiate specified therein,

“Import certificate” means a certificate issued by the Government of any country signatory to the Convention authorising the import into such country of any opiate specified therein,

“Diversion certificate” means a certificate issued under this Ordinance or by the Government of any country signatory to the Convention through which any opiate may have passed in transit to the Colony authorising the diversion of any opiate to any country other than that specified as the importing country in the export authorisation,

“Ship” includes every description of vessel used in navigation or for the carriage or storage of goods,

“Government” includes any ministry or department of Government charged with the administration of the law relating to any opiates to which the Principal Ordinance refers

3 Any opiate coming into the Colony in the course of transit to another country, whether or not it is removed from the ship or other conveyance in which it is being conveyed, may be seized by any officer of customs, administrative officer, police officer or other person authorised by the Governor in that behalf unless—

(a) the opiate is imported from a place from which such opiate may by the law of that place legally be

exported under a through bill of lading for any place into which such opiate may by the law of that place legally be imported, and

- (b) the opiate is accompanied by the export authorisation under which such opiate was exported or by a diversion certificate and by an import certificate

4 The presence of any opiate on board any ship shall be declared in writing to the Commissioner of Customs, or such other officer as may be appointed by the Governor in that behalf, by the master of the ship within four hours after the arrival of the ship in the territorial waters of the Colony. Provided that if the office of such Commissioner of Customs or such other officer is not open for the four hours after the arrival of the ship the declaration required by this section may be made to the officer in charge of the nearest police station

5 No opiate coming into the Colony shall be—

- (a) removed from the ship on which it was conveyed, or
(b) in any way moved in the Colony after removal from such ship, or
(c) exported, whether or not such opiate has been removed from such ship,

except under, and in accordance with, a removal or export permit (as the case may be) issued by the Commissioner of Customs, in the form shown in the Schedule hereto

6 No export permit shall be issued under section 5 until there shall have been produced to the Commissioner of Customs—

- (a) an import certificate, and
(b) an export authorisation or a diversion certificate containing the particulars set out in sub-section (2) of section 7

**Diversion of
consignments**

7 (1) No consignment of any opiate coming into the Colony shall be diverted to any destination other than that named in the copy of the export certificate which accompanies it except by virtue of a diversion certificate issued by the Governor or such person as the Governor may authorise in that behalf

(2) A diversion certificate shall only be issued after receipt of an import certificate from the Government of the country to which it is proposed to divert such consignment, and shall contain the following particulars —

- (a) The quantity of any opiate in such consignment,
(b) The name and address of the exporter and the name and address of the importer of such consignment,
(c) The period within which the consignment shall be despatched to its destination,
(d) The number and date of the import certificate and the authority by whom it has been issued,
(e) The name of the country from which the consignment was originally exported

(3) Upon the issue of a diversion certificate the copy of the export authorisation accompanying any consignment on

the arrival of such consignment in the Colony shall be detained by the Governor and returned to the Government or other authority issuing such authorisation together with a notification of the name of the country to which such consignment has been diverted

8 Notwithstanding anything contained in this Ordinance when any opiate is unaccompanied by the documents specified in section 3 (b) by reason of the fact that the country to which such opiate is consigned is not a signatory to the Convention the Commissioner of Customs may at his discretion issue an export permit in respect of such opiate

9 (1) The provisions of this Ordinance shall apply to any opiate transported by air. Provided that if the aircraft carrying such opiate passes over the Colony without landing the provisions of this Ordinance shall not apply to such aircraft

(2) Any person in charge of any aircraft landing in the Colony, whether through stress of weather or otherwise, shall within four hours declare in writing to the nearest officer of customs the presence in such aircraft of any opiate. Provided that if the office of such officer of customs is not open for the four hours immediately after the landing of such aircraft the declaration required by this section may be made to the officer in charge of the nearest police station

(3) Any person in charge of any aircraft forced to land in the Colony through stress of weather in such a place that he is unable to comply with the last preceding sub-section shall at once report to the nearest administrative officer, thereafter forwarding to the nearest customs officer a report in writing specifying the amount of opiate carried in such aircraft

10 (1) Any person—

- (a) who acts in contravention of, or fails to comply with, any provision of this Ordinance, or
- (b) who acts in contravention of, or fails to comply with, the conditions of any certificate or permit granted under or in pursuance to this Ordinance, or
- (c) who for the purpose of obtaining, whether for himself or for any other person, the issue of any such certificate or permit as aforesaid, makes any declaration or statement which he knows to be false in any particular, or knowingly alters, produces or makes use of any such declaration, statement or any document containing the same, or
- (d) who in the Colony aids, abets, counsels or procures the commission in any place outside the Colony of any offence punishable under the provisions of any corresponding law in force in that place, or does any act preparatory to, or in furtherance of, any act which if committed in the Colony would constitute an offence against this Ordinance,

shall be guilty of an offence against this Ordinance

(2) Every person guilty of an offence against this Ordinance shall, in respect of each offence, be liable to a fine not exceeding one thousand pounds, or to imprisonment of either description for a period not exceeding ten years, or to both such fine and imprisonment, and shall, in every case on conviction for the offence, forfeit to His Majesty all articles in respect of which the offence was committed, and the court

before which the offender was convicted may order any forfeited articles to be destroyed or otherwise disposed of as the court thinks fit

(3) Any offence against this Ordinance shall be triable before a magistrate holding a court of the first or second class

Power to make Rules

11 The Governor in Council may from time to time make Rules for any of the purposes following —

- (a) Providing for the forms of any declarations, certificates or permits made or issued for the purposes of this Ordinance and the conditions (if any) to be contained therein
- (b) Prescribing the hours within which and the manner in which any declaration of any opiate shall be made by the master or person in charge of any ship or other conveyance
- (c) Regulating the arrival and berthing of ships carrying any opiate
- (d) Providing for the rendering of periodical returns by any person being in possession of or producing or manufacturing any opiate within the Colony, and for the rendering by any person of an estimate of the amount of any opiate to be imported by him during a period to be prescribed by the Rules, to such officer as the Governor in Council shall appoint in that behalf
- (e) Generally for the better carrying out of the objects and purposes of this Ordinance

Amendment of section 12 (1) of Principal Ordinance

12 Sub-section (1) of section 12 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby amended by the insertion at the commencement thereof of the words “ Subject to the provisions of this Ordinance ”

1 This Ordinance may be cited as “ the Specific Loan (Amendment) Ordinance, 1929,” and shall be read as one with the Specific Loan Ordinance, 1927, hereinafter referred to as “ the Principal Ordinance ”

Short title

1 This Ordinance may be cited as “ the Non-Native Poll Tax (Amendment) Ordinance, 1929,” and shall be read as one with the Non-Native Poll Tax Ordinance (Chapter 52 of the Revised Edition), hereinafter referred to as “ the Principal Ordinance ”.

2 Section 2 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby amended by the insertion of the following definition —

“ ‘ Collector ’ includes a district commissioner, an assistant district commissioner, a hwalı, a mudır and any person appointed by the Governor to assist in the collection of taxes leviable under this Ordinance ”

3 (1) Sections 5, 6 8 and 13 of the Principal Ordinance are hereby amended by the substitution of the word “ collector ” for the words “ district commissioner ” wherever the latter occur

1 This Ordinance may be cited as “ the Crown Lands (Amendment) Ordinance, 1929, ’ and shall be read as one with the Crown Lands Ordinance (Chapter 140 of the Revised Edition), hereinafter referred to as “ the Principal Ordinance ”

Short title

2 In this Ordinance, unless the context otherwise requires —

Interpretation

“ Communal Reserve ” means any area reserved for the joint benefit of the Arab inhabitants and a Native tribe or Native tribes of the Colony

3 The Governor in Council may by notice in the Gazette declare that any area of Crown land, either by general or particular description and whether the same has been surveyed or not, shall be a Communal Reserve

4 The provisions of Part VI of the Principal Ordinance (relating to the reservation of land for the use of Native tribes) as amended by the Crown Lands (Amendment) Ordinance, 1926, shall apply, *mutatis mutandis*, to any area declared under the last preceding section to be a Communal Reserve.

1 This Ordinance may be cited as “the Births and Deaths Registration (Amendment) Ordinance, 1929,” and shall be read as one with the Births and Deaths Registration Ordinance, 1928, hereinafter referred to as “the Principal Ordinance”

2 Section 2 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby amended by the addition of the following definition —

“ ‘ Medical Officer of Health ’ means a Medical Officer of Health appointed under the provisions of the Public Health Ordinance, or any other Ordinance, to carry out the duties of Medical Officer of Health in any area ”

3 The following section shall be inserted as section 3A of the Principal Ordinance —

“ 3A The Governor shall appoint a Principal Registrar of Births and Deaths for the Colony who in addition to performing the duties of a Registrar, and carrying out such instructions as may be issued by the Registrar General, shall have such duties and powers as may be prescribed ”

4 The following section shall be inserted as section 16A of the Principal Ordinance —

“ 16A (1) In the case of the death of any person who has been attended during his last illness by a registered or licensed medical practitioner, that practitioner shall sign a certificate stating to the best of his knowledge and belief the cause of death.

(2) Every such certificate of cause of death shall be forwarded forthwith by the medical practitioner by whom it is signed to the Registrar, and the medical practitioner, on signing a certificate as aforesaid shall give in the form prescribed by the Rules to some person required by this Ordinance to give information concerning the death, notice in writing of the signing of the certificate

(3) Where an inquest is held on the body of any deceased person a medical certificate of the cause of death need not be forwarded to the Registrar, but the magistrate

holding the inquest shall send to the Registrar a copy of his finding, which shall be sufficient

(4) Every medical practitioner who refuses or fails without reasonable excuse to comply with any of the provisions of this section shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds "

5 Sub-section (1) of section 17 is hereby amended by the insertion, following the word " death " in the fourth line thereof, of the following words —

1 This Ordinance may be cited as the " Legal Practitioners (Amendment) Ordinance, 1929 ", and shall be read as one with the Legal Practitioners Ordinance (Chapter 10 of the Revised Edition), hereinafter referred to as " the Principal Ordinance "

2 The Principal Ordinance is hereby amended by the addition thereto of the following section —

“ 5 (1) Any person who wilfully and falsely pretends to be or takes or uses any name, title, addition or description implying that he is duly qualified to act as an advocate or that he is recognised by law as so qualified, shall be guilty of an offence under this Ordinance, and be liable to a penalty not exceeding the sum of seventy-five pounds for each such offence

(2) No costs, fee, reward or disbursement on account of or in relation to any act or proceeding done or taken by any person who acts as an advocate, without being duly qualified so to act, shall be recoverable in any action, suit or matter by any person or persons whomsoever

(3) For the purposes of this section a person shall be deemed to be duly qualified to act as an advocate if he shall have in force at the time at which he acts as such advocate a duly signed and sealed certificate authorising him so to do, in accordance with the provisions of the laws for the time being relating to advocates, or if he shall be a person entitled to practise in any Court of the Colony and Protectorate of Kenya under any Ordinance, Rules or other law for the time being in force ”

Short title

1 This Ordinance may be cited as “ the Stage Plays and Cinematograph Exhibitions (Amendment) Ordinance, 1929,” and shall be read as one with the Stage Plays and Cinematograph Exhibitions Ordinance (Chapter 73 of the Revised Edition), hereinafter called “ the Principal Ordinance ”

Interpretation

2 Section 2 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby amended as follows —

(a) by the substitution of the following for the definition of ‘ Cinematograph exhibition ’ —

“ ‘ Cinematograph exhibition means any exhibition of pictures or other optical effects presented by means of a cinematograph or other similar apparatus whether the characters concerned in such pictures or other optical effects talk or not ’, and

(b) by the addition of the following definition —

“ ‘ Cinematograph picture ’ means any picture made by means of a cinematograph or other similar apparatus and intended for public exhibition ”

3 The following section shall be inserted between sections 2 and 3 of the Principal Ordinance —

Insertion of section 2A in the Principal Ordinance

“ 2A No person shall direct, or take part in, or assist in, the making within the Colony of any cinematograph picture, unless the licence of the licensing officer in respect of the making of such cinematograph picture shall previously have been obtained as hereinafter provided ”

4 Section 6 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby amended and shall be read as if the words “ or in respect of the making of any cinematograph picture ” were inserted between the word “ exhibition ” and the word “ or ” in line three thereof

1. This Ordinance may be cited as “ the Appropriation Ordinance, 1929 ”

Short title

2 The Public Revenue for the year 1929, and other funds of the Colony and Protectorate of Kenya, are hereby charged towards the Service of the year ending the thirty-first day of December, one thousand nine hundred and twenty-nine, with a sum of three million one hundred and eighty-eight thousand one hundred and sixty-five pounds

3 The money granted by this Ordinance shall be applied for the purposes and services expressed in the Schedule annexed hereto

Application of money granted

4 The Treasurer of the Colony and Protectorate of Kenya is hereby authorised and required from time to time upon the warrant or order of the Governor to pay out of the revenue and other funds of the Colony and Protectorate of Kenya, for the several services specified in the Schedule, the said sum of three million one hundred and eighty-eight

ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of Kenya,
with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council
thereof, as follows —

1 This Ordinance may be cited as “ the Tribal Police Ordinance, 1929 ” **Short title**

2 The district commissioner of any district or area within which the Governor may, by notice in the Gazette, approve of the appointment of tribal police may from time to time appoint fit and proper persons within such district or area to be tribal police officers **Appointment of tribal police**

3 The superintendence of the tribal police throughout the Colony shall vest in such person as the Governor in Council may, by notice in the Gazette, appoint **Superintendence of tribal police throughout Colony**

4 The administration of the tribal police in any province shall vest in the senior commissioner of the province **Administration of tribal police in provinces**

5 It shall be the duty of every tribal police officer— **Duties of tribal police**

(a) when called upon by any headman appointed under the provisions of the Native Authority Ordinance to assist him in the exercise of the duties imposed upon him by that Ordinance, **Cap 129**

(b) to detect and bring offenders to justice and to preserve the public peace and prevent the commission of offences,

(c) to obey and execute promptly all orders and warrants lawfully issued to him by any competent authority and to apprehend all persons whom he is legally authorised to apprehend, or for whose apprehension sufficient ground exists,

(d) to take charge of all persons who may be committed to his custody by any court or native tribunal,

(e) to perform such duties and undergo such training as may be ordered by a district commissioner, and

(f) to act as a messenger in any matter connected with tribal administration or the public service and to obey all lawful orders issued to him by any senior commissioner, district commissioner, assistant district commissioner, liwali, mudir or headman

Power to enter premises without warrant

6 It shall be lawful for any tribal police officer for any of the purposes mentioned in the last foregoing section, without a warrant to enter and inspect any hut, or any place of resort of loose or disorderly characters

Power to lay information

7 It shall be lawful for any tribal police officer to lay any information before a magistrate, and to apply for a summons, warrant, search warrant, or such other legal process as may by law issue against any person committing an offence

Power of tribal police officers to inspect licences permits and passes

8 (1) A tribal police officer may stop and detain any person whom he sees or suspects of doing any act or thing, or of being in possession of anything, for which a licence, permit, or pass is required by the provisions of any Ordinance or other law or regulation and may require such person to produce such licence, permit, or pass

(2) Any person who shall fail to produce such licence, permit, or pass when called upon by a tribal police officer may be arrested without a warrant unless he shall give his name and address and shall otherwise satisfy the tribal police officer that he will duly answer any summons or other proceedings which may be taken against him

Protection of tribal police
Cap 36

9 Every tribal police officer, appointed in pursuance of this Ordinance, shall have the protection conferred upon a police officer by section 62 of the Police Ordinance

Apprehension and detention by tribal police

10 Sections 224, 225 and 225B of the Indian Penal Code shall apply to the lawful apprehension of any person by a tribal police officer and the lawful detention in custody of any person by a tribal police officer

Assault in execution of duty

11 Whoever assaults or uses criminal force to any tribal police officer in the execution of his duty, or with intent to prevent or deter that tribal police officer discharging his duty, or in consequence of anything done or attempted to be done by such tribal police officer in the lawful discharge of his duty shall be liable to imprisonment of either description for a period not exceeding six months or to a fine not exceeding one hundred and fifty shillings or to both such fine and imprisonment

Tribal police ordinarily to act within their own district

12 A tribal police officer shall execute the duties imposed upon him by this Ordinance within the district or area to which he is appointed, but shall, if so ordered by a senior commissioner, district commissioner, assistant district commissioner, liwali or mudri, execute such duties in any other area or place, and may without any such order enter any adjoining district or area for the purpose of apprehending suspected persons or protecting life or property

Penalties

13 (1) Every tribal police officer who wilfully disobeys any lawful order or warrant, or is guilty of any act or conduct to the prejudice of good order or discipline, shall be liable to punishment by a district commissioner or, save as hereinafter provided, by an assistant district commissioner by—

(a) confinement to his quarters for a period not exceeding fifteen days, or

(b) extra duty or guards, or

(c) fine not exceeding one-third of a month's pay to be levied by stoppages from such pay as may have been prescribed or

(d) dismissal from the tribal police

Provided that no tribal police officer shall be dismissed by an assistant district commissioner and any sentence of dismissal passed by a district commissioner shall be subject to confirmation by the senior commissioner of the province

(2) In addition to any other punishment to which he may be liable under this section a tribal police officer may be punished with corporal punishment not exceeding fifteen lashes. Every sentence of corporal punishment shall be reported by the district commissioner to the senior commissioner of the province

(3) No sentence of corporal punishment shall be carried out until a period of twenty-four hours has elapsed from the time of such sentence nor unless under the superintendence of a medical officer, or, in case no medical officer is available of a magistrate nor until such medical officer or magistrate shall certify as to the physical fitness of the offender to undergo such punishment, and in relation thereto such medical officer or magistrate may give such orders for preventing injury to health as he may deem necessary, and if such medical officer or magistrate shall order the punishment to be discontinued it shall be discontinued forthwith

(4) Any punishment awarded by an assistant district commissioner under this section shall be subject to confirmation by the district commissioner who may vary or revoke such punishment provided that such punishment shall not be increased

14 The Governor may make Rules with regard to the pay, terms of service, discipline and equipment of tribal police officers and generally for carrying into effect the purposes of this Ordinance

An Ordinance to Provide for the Registration of Domestic Servants

ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of Kenya, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows —

1 This Ordinance may be cited as "the Registration Short title of Domestic Servants Ordinance, 1928"

Application of
Ordinance

2 This Ordinance shall apply to such townships, districts or areas, and from such date or dates, as the Governor may from time to time by proclamation in the Gazette appoint

Interpretation

3 In this Ordinance, unless the context otherwise requires —

“ Employer ” includes every person having servants in his employment,

“ Servant ” includes every person employed either wholly or partly in any of the following capacities, that is to say, cook, house servant (including bedroom and kitchen servants), waiter, butler, nurse, valet, bar boy, footman, or chauffeur or washerman, if in the employment of a single employer, or in any capacity involving the duties usually performed by any of the above-mentioned servants by whatever style the person acting in such capacity may be called,

“ Employment ” and “ engagement ” include any employment or engagement of a servant to render any services for a remuneration or any engagement whereby services are rendered by a servant

“ Registered servant ” means a servant who has been registered in accordance with the provisions of this Ordinance,

“ Registrar ” means a Registrar of Domestic Servants appointed under section 4 of this Ordinance and includes a Deputy Registrar,

“ Registration district ” means any township, district or area to which this Ordinance has been applied

Appointment
of Registrars.

4 It shall be lawful for the Governor from time to time to appoint for each registration district a Registrar of Domestic Servants and such Deputy Registrars or other officers as he may consider necessary for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of this Ordinance

5 It shall be the duty of every employer of servants in any registration district, within one month after the application of this Ordinance to such district, to cause each such servant to be registered, and for this purpose he shall furnish to the Registrar in writing a return showing the name, capacity in which employed, and date of engagement of each such servant, together with the registration number of the certificate (if any) issued to each such servant under the provisions of the Native Registration Ordinance

6 It shall be the duty of every servant employed in any registration district, within two months after the application of this Ordinance to such district, to attend personally before the Registrar and to furnish such information regarding his country, race or tribe, previous service or antecedents, and such other particulars of identity, as the Registrar may require for the purpose of record in the general register

Provided that the Registrar shall not make any entry in the general register as to previous service or antecedents unless he has satisfied himself of the credibility of the information furnished to him in relation thereto

7 The Registrar shall, on such servant so attending hand to him a pocket register, in which shall be entered the particulars recorded in the general register The servant shall

hand the pocket register to his employer, who shall retain the same during the continuance of the servant's employment

8 If any servant whose name appears on any return furnished by an employer to the Registrar, as provided in section 5, shall leave the service of such employer within two months after the application of this Ordinance and before obtaining a pocket register, such employer shall transmit to the Registrar a memorandum of the date and cause of such servant leaving his employment

INTENDING SERVANTS

9 (1) It shall be the duty of every Registrar to receive applications for registration from persons who are desirous of entering employment as servants within his district

(2) Before registering any applicant under this section the Registrar shall satisfy himself that there are reasonable grounds for believing that such applicant is a fit and proper person to enter domestic service, and if he is so satisfied he shall register such applicant in the general register, recording therein such particulars as he has been able to learn respecting the applicant and his antecedents, and the names of any persons who certify to his respectability. The Registrar shall thereupon issue to the applicant a pocket register in which shall be entered the particulars recorded in the general register

10 The Registrar shall not grant registration under the last preceding section to any convicted thief or associate of thieves, or to any person known to the police to be leading a disorderly or disreputable life, or who shall have been convicted of any infamous crime

Provided that the Registrar may, at the request of any householder who may be willing to give such applicant a trial, grant registration to any applicant if he is satisfied as to the respectability of such householder and that the intention to employ the applicant as a servant is a *bonâ fide* one

Provided, however, that such registration shall only be valid for employment with the householder who is willing to give such applicant a trial

GENERAL

11 Upon registering any servant or intending servant under this Ordinance the Registrar shall—

(a) take the finger prints of such servant or intending servant in such manner as may be prescribed and record such finger prints in the general register and also in the pocket register issued to such servant or intending servant. Provided that photographs may be accepted and affixed in the general register and also in the pocket register in lieu of finger prints if the Registrar is satisfied that such photographs provide sufficient means of identification,

(b) if such servant be a person to whom the provisions of the Native Registration Ordinance, or any Ordinance amending or replacing the same, apply, record in both the general register and in the pocket register the index letters and number of such servant's registration certificate and shall make an endorsement in such registration certificate to the effect that such person has been registered as a

domestic servant and it shall be incumbent upon such servant to produce his registration certificate for the purpose

Unregistered servants not to be employed in registration districts

12 After the application of this Ordinance to any registration district, no person ordinarily resident in such district shall within one month of the application of this Ordinance engage or employ a servant to work in such district unless such servant shall produce his pocket register as evidence of his being a registered servant and unless such pocket register shall record the termination of his last previous employment, if any as a registered servant

Particulars of employment to be entered in pocket register

13 Every employer, whether resident in a registration district or not, shall, on engaging a registered servant, forthwith enter in the pocket register the date on which and the capacity in which such servant is engaged and shall thereupon forward the pocket register to the Registrar for the district in which such servant is registered. On receipt of the pocket register the Registrar shall insert the particulars recorded therein in the general register. The Registrar shall then return the pocket register to the employer who shall retain the same during the continuance of the servant's employment

Particulars of cessation of employment to be entered in pocket register

14 Every employer, whether resident in a registration district or not, shall, on the cessation of the engagement of a registered servant, enter in the pocket register the date and cause of the cessation of the engagement, the character of such servant, and, if the servant was dismissed, the cause of such dismissal. The employer shall also furnish to the Registrar for the district in which such servant is registered a copy of the particulars so entered, and such particulars shall be inserted by the Registrar in the general register unless he intends to take action under section 18 of this Ordinance

Provided that if the employer is unable to enter the particulars aforesaid owing to the loss or destruction of the pocket register, he shall report the fact to the Registrar and shall furnish him with the particulars hereinbefore required to be entered in the pocket register. The Registrar shall thereupon, at the expense of the employer, issue to the servant a duplicate pocket register in which shall be entered the particulars aforesaid

Power to cancel registration of servants

15 If any registered servant is convicted of theft or of any infamous crime or is known to the police to be leading a disorderly or disreputable life the Registrar may, with the approval of the Commissioner of Police, cancel the registration of such servant in which case he shall also cancel the endorsement made under section 11 (b) of this Ordinance. Upon the cancellation of the registration of any servant under the provisions of this section the pocket register issued to such servant shall be returned to the Registrar by the person in whose custody it is at the date of such cancellation

Production of pocket registers to police when required

16 (1) Every employer shall, when called upon to do so, produce the pocket registers of such registered servants as are in his employment to any police officer not below the rank of sub-inspector

(2) Every unemployed registered servant shall, when called upon to do so, produce his pocket register to any police officer not below the rank of sub-inspector

17 It shall be lawful for the Registrar for any district, on payment of the prescribed fee, to issue a duplicate pocket register to replace a pocket register originally issued in such district and which may have become worn out or which may have been lost or destroyed

18 (1) Any employer who contravenes any of the provisions or who fails to comply with any of the requirements of this Ordinance or any Rules made hereunder, or who without reasonable cause gives a registered servant an adverse character, or who enters in the pocket register of a registered servant any grave accusation against such servant which he cannot substantiate, shall be liable to a fine not exceeding one hundred shillings

(2) When any person has been convicted of the offence of giving a registered servant an adverse character without reasonable cause, or of entering in the pocket register of a registered servant any grave accusation against such servant which he cannot substantiate, the court by which he has been convicted may order that the entry in respect of which the accused has been so convicted or any part thereof shall be deleted from the servants' pocket register and from the general register

(3) Any proceedings under this section may be instituted by or at the instance of the Registrar

19 (1) Any servant who contravenes any of the provisions or who fails to comply with any of the requirements of this Ordinance or any Rules made hereunder shall be liable to a fine not exceeding fifty shillings or to imprisonment of either description for a period not exceeding three months or to both such fine and imprisonment

(2) Any servant who gives false information on any matter in regard to which he is required by this Ordinance to give information to the Registrar or to any other person shall be liable to a fine not exceeding one hundred shillings or to imprisonment for a period not exceeding six months or to both such fine and imprisonment

20 Any person who commits any of the following acts, namely, who—

shall be liable to a fine not exceeding two hundred shillings or to imprisonment for a period not exceeding one year or to both such fine and imprisonment

21 (1) It shall be lawful for any police officer to take, for the purposes of identification, the finger prints of any registered servant who may be accused of any offence under this Ordinance

LOCUST REPORT TO 17TH JULY, 1929

FLYING SWARMS

In Baringo a mature flying swarm with gravid females has been seen moving about for about one week. A new laying is anticipated in the district.

New pink swarms have been observed arriving from the south, one at Taveta and over Lake Jipe, flying south east, one moving northwards over Narok towards the Mau. Several have flown into Koru and Lumbwa Districts, and continued in a north-westerly direction.

A new swarm on an 8 mile front entered Suk country from Karamoja, and a swarm has again been reported from the Cherangani. Very small pink swarms have been moving in the Kedong Valley.

A mixed swarm of old and young fliers has been observed in the Konza area, flying north. Up to date, the damage done by flying locusts is practically negligible.

HOPPER AREAS

Voi District—Staff now being transferred to other areas. An excellent clean up is reported, although a small proportion has reached the flying stage. Fliers have been entering the district from the south.

Masai Reserve—Staff has been moved out of the Kedong Valley which is practically clear, and work is concentrated between Magadi, Kajiado and the Escarpment. Efforts made against hoppers in this area are highly successful, and will cease at the end of the month.

Gulgil-Narvasha—District now clear, staff moved to Baringo area.

Nakuru District—Four locust officers with two tank trucks are assisting in overcoming the new hatchings which have been reported from farms in this area. Destruction should be completed within ten days.

KERIO PROVINCE

Baringo—Areas are reported clear, but new hatchings which take place frequently demand further work. Officers have penetrated to the northern district, and destruction is proceeding rapidly. Enormous numbers of dead hoppers have been found in several places, and numbers are sick in areas where no baiting or spraying has as yet been done.

Elgeyo-Maraquet—Re-infestation of areas by invasion of hopper bands from across the Baringo boundary is reported. In one area, baiting is reported to be ineffective.

Suk—Of the sixteen areas in this district, two are definitely clean, five almost clean, and no difficulty is anticipated with the balance.

Northern Turkana—The reports from this district are more encouraging. Here it is found effective to burn hopper bands when roosting. On account of the extreme heat in the day time, much more work is done at night. Several large districts are now reported clear, viz. Lorogunm, Kalakwal, Loreng.

Southern Turkana—Hatching was delayed in this district, but work is now proceeding on bands which are found in practically every area.

Northern Frontier—The report of lightness of infestation is again confirmed. Very large hopper areas are reported as being in Abyssinian territory, one heavily infested area is reported as being situated 20—30 miles north of Moyale.

Laikipia Plateau—Two locust officers are dealing with scattered hopper bands along the Uaso Nyiro River.

It should be observed that no one method of destruction is used exclusively. In certain conditions, contact spraying is cheap and effective, under other circumstances dung or bran baiting is used, where grass and bush admit of it, ordinary fire methods are equally effective, and where natives will beat or burn, they are encouraged to work in their own way.

Flying swarms may be expected to cross the settled areas, moving from the south to the north, and there is the possibility of swarms flying over the Coast.

Crops almost everywhere in Kenya are good, and weather conditions are excellent. Farmers should make preparations to protect crops by smoke, and from now on a careful lookout should be kept for flying swarms.
