A Bill to Amend the Stock Traders Licence Ordinance

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of Kenya, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows —

1 This Ordinance may be cited as “ the Stock Traders Licence (Amendment) Ordinance, 1929,” and shall be read as one with the Stock Traders Licence Ordinance (Chapter 59 of the Revised Edition), hereinafter referred to as “ the Principal Ordinance ”

Short title

2 Section 5 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby repealed, and in lieu thereof shall be read the following —

Issue of licences and fees payable therefor

“ 5 (1) Licences under this Ordinance may be obtained at the office of a resident commissioner or district commissioner and shall be in such form as the Governor may prescribe

(2) A licence may be issued for one year or for half a year. Every yearly licence shall continue in force from the date of the issue thereof until the next following thirty-first day of December, and every half-yearly licence shall continue in force from the date of the issue thereof until the next following thirtieth day of June or thirty-first day of December, whichever shall first ensue

(3) There shall be payable for a yearly licence the sum of five pounds and for a half-yearly licence the sum of two pounds ten shillings ”

OBJECTS AND REASONS

This Bill amends the Stock Traders Licence Ordinance by providing for a half-yearly as well as a yearly stock traders' licence. It is understood that many stock traders carry on business as such only during certain periods of the year and it is felt that it is a hardship in such cases to require a yearly licence to be taken out. It is not anticipated that the proposed concession will result in a loss of revenue from this source.

OBJECTS AND REASONS

The Local Government (Rating) Ordinance, 1928, requires that the Valuation Roll shall be prepared so as to show both the unimproved value of land and the value of improvements

The Valuation Roll to which the Mombasa Municipal Board has invited objections contains a valuation of the unimproved value of land only

In view of the fact that the imposition of a site value rate for 1929 before the valuation of improvements is completed might be legally questioned, it is considered advisable to validate the Valuation Roll as approved by the Valuation Court

The Bill therefore provides that the Valuation Roll as signed and certified by the President of the Valuation Court shall be deemed to be the Valuation Roll of rateable property in force within the Municipality of Mombasa and that the Municipal Board shall, as soon as may be, cause a valuation of improvements to be made and added to the Roll

In order to meet the objection that the imposition of rates on site values only unfairly penalises the landowner and that, had a valuation of improvements existed, the Board might have imposed a rate on improvements, it is provided that no additional rate on site values exceeding one-eighth of one per cent shall be imposed until a valuation of improvements has been added to the Roll



Commencing at a beacon on the summit of the hill known as Governor's Camp Spui,

thence bounded by a straight line north-easterly for about one mile and a quarter to a beacon on the summit of Rageh Hill,

thence easterly by a straight line for about one mile and three-quarters to a beacon on the summit of Moyale Road Hill,

thence southerly for about two miles and a half by a straight line through a big tree (marked by a wall of stones round its base) to a watercourse,

thence north-westerly by that watercourse up-stream for about two miles and three-quarters to a cañon,

thence north-westerly by a straight line to the point of commencement



THE PUBLIC HEALTH ORDINANCE

RULES

IN EXERCISE of the powers conferred upon him by section 126 of the Public Health Ordinance (Chapter 124 of the Revised Edition), His Excellency the Governor in Council on the advice of the Central Board of Health, has been pleased to make the following Rules —

1 These Rules may be cited as “ the Public Health (Kisumu) (Storage of Hides and Skins) Rules, 1929,” and shall apply to the Township of Kisumu

2 In these Rules the following terms shall have the following meanings —

“ Hides and Skins ” shall mean and include the hide or skin of any animal whatsoever ,

“ Hides and Skins Go-down ” shall mean and include any building or part of a building used, or adapted, or designed to be used, for the storage, examination or packing of dry hides and skins ,

“ Hides and Skins Go-down Area ” shall mean and include that area in Kisumu Township north west of the Indian Bazaar, Section LXVIII, Plots No 1 to No 18 on Land Office Plan No 24699, also Section LV/I B E A Corporation Gin-nery site and Section LV/II, both on Plan No 24699

3 No person shall erect any building intended, adapted or designed to be used as a hides and skins go-down in any part of the Township of Kisumu, except in the hides and skins go-down area, and no person shall adapt any existing building or part of a building in the Township of Kisumu as a hides and skins go-down unless such building or part of a building is situated in the hides and skins go-down area

4 After the expiry of a period of twelve months from the sale or the offering for sale of any or all of the plots in the hides and skins go-down area, no person shall use any building or part of a building as a hides and skins go-down unless such building or part thereof is situated in the hides and skins go-down area

5 Any person who shall contravene any of the provisions of these Rules shall be guilty of an offence and shall be liable on conviction to a penalty not exceeding five hundred shillings and if a continuing offence, to a daily penalty not exceeding forty shillings for each day during which the offence shall continue

1 These By-laws may be cited as ‘ the Nairobi Municipality (Amendment No 3) By-laws, 1929,’ and shall be read as one with the Nairobi Municipality (Application) By-laws, 1929, hereinafter called ‘ the Principal By-laws ’

2 The Principal By-laws are hereby amended by the addition of the following words at the end of By-law 109 —

“ and the word ‘ meat ’ means the flesh of cattle, sheep, goats, swine or antelope, but does not include bacon or ham or cooked or canned or potted meat or sausages ’

3 The Principal By-laws are hereby further amended by the deletion of By-law No 113 and the substitution of the following By-law therefor —

“ 113 No person shall sell or expose for sale or deposit for the purpose of sale or for the preparation for sale in or upon any premises within the Municipality including a street or other place of public resort, any meat, whether derived from an animal slaughtered at the Slaughter House or otherwise, unless and until such meat shall have been inspected by the Meat Inspector and passed by him as fit for human consumption”

ORDINANCE, 1928

BY-LAWS

IN EXERCISE of the powers conferred upon them by section 66 of the Local Government (District Councils) Ordinance, 1928, the Uasin Gishu District Council have made the following By-laws —

1 These By-laws may be cited as “ the District Council (Standing Orders) By-laws, 1929 ”

2 No business shall be transacted at a meeting of the District Council other than that specified in the agenda relating thereto except any matters which the Chairman considers urgent, or which the Council resolves by a majority of the whole Council or three-fourths of the members present to deal with as urgent

Meetings of
the Council

3 When a meeting of the Council is adjourned, notice of the adjourned meeting shall be sent to each member of the Council, specifying the business to be transacted

4 If, at the expiration of twenty minutes after the hour at which any meeting of the Council is appointed to be held, a quorum shall not have assembled, no meeting shall take place, unless it is decided, with the unanimous consent of the members present, to allow further time, not exceeding an additional ten minutes, in order to enable a quorum to assemble

5 If during any sitting of the Council the attention of the Chairman of the Council shall be called to the number of members present he shall count them, and if it be found that there is not a quorum present, and if after an interval of five minutes a quorum is still not present, the Council shall stand adjourned

6 Every member of the Council attending a meeting of the Council shall sign his name in the attendance book kept for that purpose

7 Minutes of the proceedings of every meeting of the Council shall be drawn up and printed or typewritten, and shall, if confirmed, be signed at the next ensuing ordinary meeting by the Chairman

8 The minutes of the last meeting shall be taken as read with a view to confirmation, provided that a copy of the minutes shall have been sent to each member of the Council twenty-four hours previously

9 No motion or discussion shall be allowed upon the minutes except as to their accuracy

10 Members of the Council shall stand when speaking, and shall address the chair

Conduct of
debate

11 A member who speaks shall direct his speech strictly to the motion under discussion, or to an explanation or a question of order,

12 Whenever the Chairman of the Council rises during a debate, any member then speaking, or offering to speak, is to sit down, and the Council is to be silent, so that the Chairman of the Council may be heard without interruption

13 No speech shall exceed ten minutes in length without the consent of the Council

14 The Chairman of the Council shall call the attention of the Council to continued irrelevance, tedious repetition, unbecoming language, or any breach of order on the part of a member, and shall direct such member, if speaking, to discontinue his speech, or in the event of persistent disregard of the authority of the chair, to retire for the remainder of the sitting

15 No member shall address the Council more than once on any motion or amendment, the mover of the original motion may, however, reply but he shall strictly confine himself to answering previous speakers and shall not introduce any new matter into the debate. The right of reply shall not extend to the mover of an amendment which, having been carried, has become the substantive motion

16 Any member, whether he has spoken on the matter under discussion or not, may rise to a point of order, or in explanation, but such explanation shall be confined to some material part of his former speech which may have been misunderstood. A member so rising shall be entitled to be heard forthwith

17 A motion or amendment may be withdrawn by the mover, with the consent of the Council, which may be signified without debate, and it shall not be competent for any member to speak upon it after the mover has asked permission for its withdrawal, unless such permission shall have been refused

18 The ruling of the Chairman of the Council on a point of order or on the admissibility of a personal explanation shall be final and shall not be open to discussion

19 The Council may resolve itself into a Committee of the whole Council

20 The quorum of the Committee of the whole Council shall be not less than one-half of the members of the whole Council

Voting

21 Every motion proposed and seconded shall be submitted to the Council by the Chairman of the Council, who shall call upon the members in favour of the motion to say "Aye," and those against to say "No", and he shall thereupon declare what he collects to be the sense of the Council. Provided it shall always be in the power of any member to challenge the declaration of the Chairman of the Council, and to demand a division, whereupon the Chairman of the Council shall take the vote of each member separately, which shall be recorded in the minutes, and the motion shall be declared carried or lost according to the numbers voting for or against it

22 Previously to the Chairman taking the division, the question before the Council shall be put again by the Chairman of the Council, and every member then present, save any member prohibited from exercising a vote under any provisions of the Local Government (District Councils) Ordinance (with the exception of the member occupying the chair, with whom it shall be optional whether he votes or not), shall record his vote either for or against the question

23 No member shall vote in a division unless he shall have been present when the question was put the second time

24 When the Clerk shall have recorded all the votes cast, the Chairman of the Council shall announce the result of the division

Financial

25 All receipts shall be deposited daily to the credit of the Council's banking account without abatement

26 Written receipts on printed and numbered forms bearing the name of the District, of which duplicate copies shall be kept, shall be issued for all moneys received by or on behalf of the Council

27 All work not carried out departmentally, the cost of which exceeds seventy-five pounds must, except in cases of emergency, be put up for public tender, and all work not carried out departmentally, the amount of which does not exceed seventy-five pounds, shall where possible, be put up for public tender

28 Tenders shall be received only in closed envelopes, and placed in a box appointed for the purpose

29 The tenders shall be opened by two members of the Council, or of a Committee duly authorised to deal with such tenders, in conjunction with the Clerk, who shall sit in public for that purpose fifteen minutes before the time fixed for the sitting of the Council, or Committee, as the case may be, and one of the members of the Council or Committee so present shall date and sign each tender received. All tenders received shall be recorded in the minutes of the Council or Committee, as the case may be

30 If a Committee shall accept or recommend the acceptance of a tender other than the lowest they shall state their reasons in a report thereon to the Council

31 All orders for works and goods shall be given on official order forms, and copies of such orders shall be attached to all accounts before payment is made

32 All payments shall be made by cheque

33 No cheques shall be drawn for any amount the account for which is not signed by the Chairman of the Committee directing the expenditure, the Clerk and the Engineer

STANDING ORDERS BY-LAWS

IN EXERCISE of the powers conferred upon them by the Local Government (District Councils) Ordinance, 1928, the Nairobi District Council have made the following By-laws —

1 These By-laws may be cited as “ the Nairobi District (Standing Orders) By-laws, 1929,” and shall take effect as from the date of publication in the Gazette

2 The business of the Nairobi District Council shall be conducted in accordance with the Standing Orders set forth in the Schedule hereto —

S C H E D U L E

STANDING ORDERS

MEETINGS OF THE COUNCIL

1 At least ten days' notice before any meeting of the Council and an agenda, specifying the business to be transacted thereat, shall be posted to every member at his usual place of residence or at his business address. Provided that accidental omission to supply such agenda shall not affect the validity of the proceedings

2 No business shall be transacted at a meeting other than that specified in the agenda relating thereto, except any matters which the Chairman considers urgent, or which the Council resolves by a majority of the whole Council or three-fourths of the members present to deal with as urgent

3 The Council may adjourn a meeting to any day or hour, but no business shall be transacted at an adjourned meeting except such as was set out in the agenda for the meeting of which it is an adjournment, other than matters which are brought forward in accordance with Order No 2 above

4 If at the expiration of twenty minutes after the hour at which any meeting of the Council is appointed to be held a quorum shall not have been assembled, no meeting shall take place, unless it is decided with the unanimous consent of the members present to allow further time, not exceeding an additional ten minutes, in order to enable a quorum to assemble

5 If during any sitting of the Council the attention of the Chairman of the Council shall be called to the number of members present, he shall count them, and if it be found that there is not a quorum present, and if after an interval of five minutes a quorum is still not present, the Council shall stand adjourned

6 Every member of the Council attending a meeting of the Council shall sign his name in the attendance book kept for that purpose

MINUTES

7 Minutes of the proceedings of every meeting of the Council shall be drawn up and printed or typewritten, and shall, if confirmed, be signed at the next ensuing ordinary meeting by the Chairman

8 The minutes of the last meeting shall be taken as read, with a view to confirmation, provided that a copy of the minutes shall have been sent to each member of the Council not less than twenty-four hours previously

9 No motion or discussion shall be allowed upon the minutes, except as to their accuracy

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES

10 Except as to any report which a Committee may bring up as a matter of urgency (of which urgency the Chairman of the Council shall be the judge), the reports and recommendations of Committees shall be printed or typewritten, and posted to each member of the Council at least ten days before the meeting of the Council at which they are to be considered

11 The member bringing up a report shall move "That the report be received"

Upon the motion that the report be received, if among the other paragraphs there be one not containing a recommendation, it shall be competent for a member to move "That the report be received with the exception of paragraph No "

The Council having agreed to receive the report as a whole, the Clerk shall thereupon put the recommendations therein contained *senatim* (unless for good cause the Chairman of the Council shall see fit to vary their order)

12 No recommendations of Committees shall require to be proposed or seconded, but each recommendation shall, upon being put by the Clerk, become a motion under debate

13 The Chairman of the Committee or other member bringing up a report may withdraw or amend any paragraph with the consent of the Council

14 It shall not be in order to move an abstract resolution on any paragraph of a report of any standing committee

PETITIONS AND DEPUTATIONS

15 Petitions may be presented by the members of the Council, but the presentation of a petition shall not be accompanied by any speech or comment

16 Deputations wishing to be received by the Council shall be requested in the first instance to send in a memorial in writing, and the Clerk shall bring the memorial before the Committee concerned, which shall be authorised, if it see fit, to receive the deputation and to report to the Council

If the Committee is of opinion that the memorial is one which should be brought before the Council, the Committee shall so report, and, if the Council shall so order, the deputation shall be invited to attend

17 A deputation shall not exceed five in number, and only one member thereof shall be at liberty to address the Council, except in reply to questions from members of the Council, and the matter shall not be further considered by the Council until the deputation shall have withdrawn

NOTICES OF MOTION

18 Every notice of motion shall be in writing, signed by the member giving the notice. It shall be given to the Clerk and shall be entered in a book to be kept in his office, which book shall be open to inspection by every member. A notice of motion which shall not have been received at least fourteen days before any meeting of the Council shall not be specified in the agenda for such meeting, and every notice of motion shall be relevant to some question affecting the administration or condition of the Nairobi District.

19 All notices of motion shall be dated and numbered as received, and shall be entered by the Clerk upon the agenda paper in the order in which they are received, save and except that notice of an amendment shall be entered immediately after such notice, irrespective of the time at which notice of the motion shall have been received.

20 No member shall have more than two notices of motion on the agenda paper at the same time.

21 In dealing with notices of motion the Chairman of the Council shall first of all read out the number of each and the name of the mover, so as to ascertain which motions are unopposed, and these last shall be passed forthwith. The Chairman of the Council shall then call on the movers of the opposed motions in their order on the paper.

22 When a written notice of opposition to a motion on the agenda paper has been lodged with the Clerk at the table before or within one hour after the commencement of the meeting, such motion shall be considered as opposed business not to be passed without discussion.

23 At any meeting of the Council questions relevant to the general work or procedure of the Council may be put, subject to the following conditions —

- (1) Unless notice of question has been given in writing to the Clerk not later than noon on the day preceding such meeting, it shall be competent for the Chairman to rule that such notice must be given before the question can be put.
- (2) Questions germane to the work of any Committee shall be put to the Chairman of such Committee, or to the member acting on his behalf, immediately after the report of such Committee has been taken.
- (3) If, after a reply to a question, a member considers that his question requires further elucidation, he may ask for a further reply.

CONDUCT OF DEBATE

24 Members of the Council shall stand when speaking, and shall address the chair.

25 A member who speaks shall direct his speech strictly to the motion under discussion, or to an explanation or a question of order.

26 Whenever the Chairman of the Council rises during a debate, any member then speaking, or offering to speak, shall resume his seat, and the Council shall be silent, so that the Chairman of the Council may be heard without interruption.

27 No speech shall exceed ten minutes in length without the consent of the Council.

28 The Chairman of the Council shall call the attention of the Council to continued irrelevance, tedious repetition, unbecoming language or any breach of order on the part of a member, and shall direct such member, if speaking, to discontinue his speech, or in the event of persistent disregard of the authority of the chair, to retire for the remainder of the sitting

29 The Council may suspend and exclude any member or members who may disregard the authority of the chair, or who may wilfully obstruct the business of the Council, provided that no such suspension and exclusion shall be for a period of more than six weeks

30 No member shall address the Council more than once on any motion or amendment, the mover of the original motion may, however, reply, but he shall strictly confine himself to answering previous speakers and shall not introduce any new matter into the debate The right of reply shall not extend to the mover of an amendment which, having been carried, has become the substantive motion

31 Any member, whether he has spoken on the matter under discussion or not, may rise to a point of order, or in explanation, but such explanation shall be confined to some material part of his former speech which may have been misunderstood A member so rising shall be entitled to be heard forthwith

32 A motion or amendment may be withdrawn by the mover, with the consent of the Council, which shall be signified without debate, and it shall not be competent for any member to speak upon it after the mover has asked permission for its withdrawal, unless such permission shall have been refused

33 The ruling of the Chairman of the Council on a point of order or on the admissibility of a personal explanation shall be final and shall not be open to discussion

34 When a motion is under debate at any meeting of the Council no further motion shall be received except the following —

To amend the motion

That the consideration of the question be postponed

That the Council do now adjourn

That the debate be adjourned

That the question be now put

That the Council do proceed to the next business

TO AMEND THE MOTION

35 Every amendment shall be relevant to the motion on which it is moved

36 Every amendment shall be reduced to writing, signed by the mover, and handed to the Chairman of the Council, or to the Clerk

37 Every amendment shall be read before being moved

38 No amendment shall be discussed or put to the Council until it shall have been seconded

39 A member shall not address the Council more than once on an amendment The right of reply shall not extend to the mover of an amendment which, having been carried,

has become a substantive motion. A member who has seconded an amendment in a formal manner shall be permitted afterwards to speak upon it.

40 Whenever an amendment upon an original motion has been moved and seconded, no second or subsequent amendment shall be moved until the first amendment shall have been disposed of. If an amendment shall be carried, the motion as amended shall take the place of the original motion, and shall become the question upon which any further amendment may be moved.

41 No member shall be at liberty to move more than one amendment upon any motion without withdrawing any previous amendment moved by him.

42 Any amendment may be withdrawn by the mover, with the consent of the Council, which shall be signified without debate, and it shall not be competent for any member to speak upon it after the mover has asked permission for its withdrawal, unless such permission shall have been refused.

43 Any motion affecting the drafting or amending of by-laws or legislation (except in the case of verbal amendments accepted by the Chairman of the Committee concerned) shall, before the Council finally vote thereon, be referred to the Committee within whose reference the matter lies, or to a Committee of the whole Council, and such Committee shall report to the Council the general effect of such motion, if passed, upon existing by-laws or legislation. The motion shall then be considered by the Council together with any recommendations the Committee may see fit to make.

THAT THE CONSIDERATION OF THE QUESTION BE
POSTPONED

44 Any member of the Council may, at the conclusion of any speech, move that the consideration of the question be postponed for any stated period, or *sine die*. Such motion must be seconded, but it need not be reduced to writing. The mover may speak for not more than five minutes, but the seconder shall not be permitted to speak beyond formally seconding it. Upon such a motion being made, the mover of the question under debate may (without prejudice to his ultimate right of reply if the motion that the question be postponed be not carried) be heard in reply for five minutes, after which the question shall be put without further debate.

45 If the postponement for a stated period be carried, the motion shall be placed first on the list of motions for the day to which it has been postponed.

46 The motion may be withdrawn by the mover with the consent of the Council signified without debate.

THAT THE COUNCIL DO NOW ADJOURN

47 Any member of the Council may, at the conclusion of any speech, move that the Council do now adjourn. Such a motion must be seconded, but it need not be reduced to writing. The mover may speak for not more than five minutes, but the seconder shall not be permitted to speak beyond formally seconding it. Upon such a motion being made, the mover of the question under debate may (without prejudice to his ultimate right of reply if the motion to adjourn be not carried) be heard in reply for five minutes, after which the question shall be put without further debate. If the motion be carried, the question under debate shall become a dropped motion.

48 A second motion that the Council do now adjourn shall not be made within ten minutes, unless in the opinion of the Chairman of the Council the circumstances of the question are materially altered

49 No member shall move or second more than one motion for the adjournment of the Council at one sitting

50 On a motion for the adjournment of the Council it shall be competent for the Chairman of the Council, before putting that motion, to take the pleasure of the Council as to whether it will proceed to the transaction of unopposed business before adjourning. The motion to adjourn may be withdrawn by the mover with the consent of the Council signified without debate

THAT THE DEBATE BE ADJOURNED

51 Any member of the Council may, at the conclusion of any speech, move that the debate be adjourned. Such a motion must be seconded, but it need not be reduced to writing. The mover may speak for not more than five minutes but the seconder shall not be permitted to speak beyond formally seconding it. Upon such a motion being made, the mover of the question under debate may (without prejudice to his ultimate right of reply if the motion that the debate be adjourned be not carried) be heard in reply for five minutes, after which the question shall be put without any further debate

52 If the motion that the debate be adjourned be carried the discussion shall be resumed at the next meeting of the Council, and the Council shall proceed to the next business on the paper

53 On resuming an adjourned debate, the member who moved the adjournment shall be entitled to speak first

54 A second motion that the debate be adjourned shall not be made within ten minutes

55 No member shall move or second more than one motion for adjournment of the same debate

56 The motion may be withdrawn by the mover with the consent of the Council signified without debate

THAT THE QUESTION BE NOW PUT

57 It shall be competent for any member at the close of any speech to move, without debate, that the question be now put, and the motion, if seconded, shall be put forthwith. Should the motion be carried, the motion or amendment under debate shall be put at once

58 A second motion that the question be now put shall not be made within ten minutes

THAT THE COUNCIL DO PROCEED TO THE NEXT BUSINESS

59 It shall be competent for any member at the close of any speech to move, without debate, that the Council do proceed to the next business, and, if the motion be seconded, it shall be put forthwith

60 When a motion is carried that the Council do proceed to the next business, the question under discussion shall be considered as dropped

61 A second motion that the Council do proceed to the next business shall not be made within ten minutes

62 The motion may be withdrawn by the mover with the consent of the Council signified without debate

VOTING

63 Every motion duly proposed and seconded shall be submitted to the Council by the Chairman of the Council, who shall call upon the members in favour of the motion to say "Aye," and those against to say "No", and he shall thereupon declare what he collects to be the sense of the Council. Provided it shall always be in the power of any member to challenge the declaration of the Chairman of the Council and to demand a division

64 Previously to the Chairman taking the division, the question before the Council shall be put again by the Chairman of the Council, and every member then present (with the exception of the member occupying the chair, with whom it shall be optional whether he votes or not) shall record his vote either for or against the question. The Chairman of the Council shall take the vote of each member separately, and such votes shall be recorded in the minutes, and the motion shall be declared carried or lost according to the numbers voting for or against it

65 No member shall vote in a division unless he shall have been present when the question was put the second time

66 When the Clerk shall have recorded all the votes cast, the Chairman of the Council shall announce the result of the division

67 Applications for an appointment to an office the value of which exceeds £300 per year shall be called for by advertisement, except in cases where the Committee concerned may recommend the promotion of a member of the permanent staff. When applications are called by advertisement, the Committee making the preliminary selection shall (unless otherwise ordered) submit to the Council the names of not more than three candidates, indicating at the same time, if it thinks fit, the candidate whom it recommends the Council to appoint. If the Council, instead of adopting the recommendation of the Committee, resolves to vote upon the three candidates submitted, the Chairman of the Council shall put to the Council the three names in alphabetical order, each member of the Council being at liberty to vote for one or more, as he thinks fit, and the name of the candidate who has received the fewest votes shall be struck out. The Chairman of the Council shall then put the names of the other two candidates, and having declared which of them has received the most votes, he shall finally put the question whether such candidate shall be appointed to the office. If a majority of the members present vote in his favour he is to be declared to be appointed. If a majority of those present vote against him, the matter of the appointment is to be referred back to the Committee concerned

68 The Council shall, as soon as possible after the annual appointment of members as provided in section 10 (1) of the Ordinance, proceed to the appointment of the Standing Committees, and to the reconsideration, if it be deemed necessary, of the references to be made to them. The Council may appoint new Committees at any time

69 Every Standing Committee shall hold office until the first meeting of its successor

70 The powers and duties of the Committees shall be specially delegated to them by the Council. The Council may at any time withdraw, extend, or modify any references to a Committee, provided, nevertheless, that any proposition to withdraw or modify a reference shall first be referred to the Committee concerned for consideration and report to the Council

71 The Council may transfer any reference from one Committee to another after such report as aforesaid

72 The Council may from time to time refer any new matter to a Committee

73 The mover of any new reference to a Committee shall be summoned to attend the first meeting of the Committee where the matter of such reference is considered, and shall be entitled to be heard thereupon

74 Any member of a Committee may resign his seat on the Committee by notice in writing, signed by him and sent to the Chairman of the Committee or the Clerk

75 The existence of a vacancy or vacancies upon a Committee does not affect the validity of any of its acts or proceedings

76 Every vacancy on a Committee shall be notified by the Committee to the Council at its first meeting after such vacancy has arisen. The vacancy may be filled by any other member of the Council appointed by the meeting

77 When two members on different Committees agree to exchange from one Committee to another they shall notify the same to the Clerk and the Chairman of the Committees affected, and the matter shall be brought forward by the Committees in their reports at the next meeting of the Council. If the Council agree to the exchange the same shall take effect forthwith

78 When any member of the Council is granted leave of absence from the meetings of the Council and Committees, the Committee concerned may appoint another member to act during the period for which leave is granted, in the place of such absent member on any Committee of the Council to which he has been appointed, any such appointment shall be subject to confirmation at the next meeting of the Council

COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE COUNCIL

79 The Council may resolve itself into a Committee of the whole Council, when the rules governing debate in open Council shall not apply

80 The quorum of the Committee of the whole Council shall not be less than one-half of the members of the whole Council

COMMITTEE MEETINGS

81. Each Committee shall from time to time fix its own day and hour of meeting

82 No business shall be entered upon or transacted in any Committee during the sitting of the Council except by permission of the Council

83 Notice of the time and place of every Committee meeting and an agenda of the business to be transacted thereat shall be posted to every member at his usual place of residence or at his business address, not less than ten days before such meeting

Provided that the accidental omission to serve such notice and agenda shall not affect the validity of the proceedings

Provided also that the Chairman may at his discretion call an emergency meeting, giving such notice as may be possible

84 Except in matters of urgency (of which the Chairman of the Committee shall be judge), no business shall be transacted at any meeting of the Committee except such as is set out in the agenda paper

85 The Clerk shall keep an attendance book in which he shall record the attendance of members at each meeting of the Committee

86 Members of the Council have the right of attending any Committee, the Chairman of the Committee may also permit a member so attending to speak

87 The Council shall regulate the quorum of any Committee, but such quorum shall not be less than one-third of the number of the members of the Committee inclusive of *ex officio* members

88 The election of a Chairman shall be the first business of every Committee

89 The Chairman of a Committee, or in his absence the deputy Chairman, shall preside at every meeting of the Committee at which he is present. The Chairman shall be entitled to vote in the first instance and, in case of an equality of votes, may give a second or casting vote. Where he has not voted in the first instance he may, in case of an equality of votes, give a casting vote. He shall sign the minutes when the same have been passed by the Committee. It shall be his duty, if present, to bring up the report of the Committee to the Council and to move the same, subject, however, to Standing Order No 12

90 In the absence of the Chairman of a Committee the members shall appoint, from among their own number, an acting Chairman who shall, when presiding, have the same powers and rights of voting as those possessed by the Chairman. He shall, in the absence of the Chairman, bring up the report of the Committee at which he was acting Chairman, to the Council and move the same, subject, however, to Standing Order No 12

91 No member of the Council shall be Chairman of more than one Standing Committee

COMMITTEE PROCEDURE

92 The Council may make regulations as to procedure of all or any of the Committees

VOTING

93 Every matter brought before a Committee shall be decided by a majority of those present and voting. The voting shall be by show of hands. Any two members of the Committee then present and voting may require the names of the persons voting and the votes given to be entered in the minutes, and any member present and voting may require that his dissent from any resolution may be similarly recorded

MINUTES

94 Minutes of the proceedings of every meeting of the Committee shall be drawn up and printed or typewritten, and shall, if confirmed, be signed at the next ensuing ordinary meeting by the Chairman

95 The minutes of the last meeting shall be taken as read with a view to confirmation, provided that a copy of the minutes shall have been posted to each member of the Committee ten days previously

96 No motion or discussion shall be allowed upon the minutes, except as to their accuracy

REPORTS

97 The Council may, except where any law or by-law otherwise requires, delegate to any Committee full authority to do any act on its behalf, and any acts of a Committee done in pursuance of such authority shall be valid and binding upon the Council, and need not be approved by the Council

98 All Committees must report their proceedings to the Council and every act of a Committee which is not done in pursuance of authority expressly delegated by the Council must receive the approval of the Council before being valid

99 The reports of Committees shall, where necessary, contain the recommendations of the Committee on the matter reported on. The report shall be divided into paragraphs, which shall be numbered consecutively. Every report presented by a Committee to the Council shall be signed by the Chairman of the meeting at which the report was agreed to

100 When the Chairman of a Committee is absent from the meeting of the Council at which a report of the Committee is to be presented, the report shall be brought up by any other member of the Committee present, who shall have been deputed by the Committee, or shall be called upon by the Chairman of the Council to bring up the report

101 After any recommendation of a Committee has been agreed to by the Council the same shall forthwith be carried out by the Committee to which it is referred

MOTIONS TO RESCIND AND NEGATIVE MOTIONS

102 No motion to rescind any resolution which has been passed within the preceding three months, nor any motion to the same effect as any motion which has been negatived within the preceding three months, shall be in order unless notice thereof shall have been given and specified in the agenda, and the notice shall bear, in addition to the name of the member who proposes the motion, the names of three other members, and when any such motion has been disposed of by the Council it shall not be competent for any member to propose a similar motion within a further period of three months

This order shall not apply to motions which are moved by the Chairman or other member of a Committee in pursuance of a report of a Committee

SAMPLES AND CANVASSING FOR ORDERS

103 All communications respecting the supply of goods to the Council must, until further order, be addressed in writing to the Clerk. Personal canvassing of members of the Council for orders or leaving samples of goods by travellers and others is strictly prohibited

SUSPENSION OF STANDING ORDERS

104 Any Standing Order affecting procedure and conduct of meetings may be suspended with the consent of a majority of the members of the whole Council. Provided that every resolution to suspend a Standing Order shall state the purpose for which the suspension is required, and no such resolution shall be effective after the business to which it refers has been dealt with. The suspension of any Standing Order shall not be deemed to affect in any manner the obligation to comply with any provisions of the Local Government (District Councils) Ordinance, 1928.

INTERPRETATION OF STANDING ORDERS

105 The rulings of the Chairman of the Council as to the interpretation of Standing Orders shall be embodied in the minutes of the Council, and a register shall be kept by the Clerk of such rulings. The Chairman of the Council shall sign each separate entry of a ruling given by himself.

106 Notice of motion to review the ruling of the Chairman of the Council or the Chairman of any Committee must take the form of an instruction to the General Purposes Committee to consider and report to the Council on such ruling, and must be placed on the agenda in accordance with Standing Order No. 19.

APPOINTMENTS

107 Personal canvassing for appointments in the gift of the Council is strictly prohibited. Proof thereof shall disqualify a candidate for appointment.

108 The above Standing Order shall be quoted in advertisements calling for applications for appointments.

109 Members of the staff of the Council, including heads of departments, shall not, except with the written permission of the Council, engage in any work other than that of the Council, or be directly or indirectly concerned in the conduct of any private business, but shall, except in the case where such permission has been obtained, be required to devote the whole of their time to the Council's service, and any fees received by them when appearing as witnesses, or in any other capacity on the Council's behalf, and all moneys earned during the term of their engagement with the Council in connection with any outside work which has not been the subject of such permission as aforesaid, shall be paid to the Council.

110 No servant of the Council shall receive any present, pecuniary or valuable, from or on account of any person or persons who either have, or seek to have, any business relations with the Council.

This rule applies not only to the servants of the Council themselves, but to their families, and such servants of the Council are responsible for its observance by their families.

It is not intended to apply to cases of remuneration for special services rendered and paid for with the consent of the Council or to the ordinary gifts of personal friends.

CLERK TO THE COUNCIL

111 The Clerk shall be the chief administrative official of the Council. He shall be responsible for the proper conduct of the Council's business, and see that it is carried on with

order and regularity, and in accordance with what is prescribed by law, by the Standing Orders of the Council, and the orders of reference to the various Committees. He may also, if necessary, be appointed to act as Treasurer to the Council.

112 The Clerk to the Council shall exercise general supervision over the whole of the permanent staff, except heads of departments, and shall give particular attention to the punctuality of attendance of all members of the indoor staff at the central offices. He shall advise the Council on questions relating to the allotment of rooms among the different departments of the staff and on other questions of internal arrangements of the office.

113 The Clerk to the Council shall advise the Council upon questions relating to the appointment, pay, duties, promotion, superannuation, and dismissal of the members of the staff.

114 As Clerk to the Council he is also Clerk of all Committees of the Council.

115 The Clerk to the Council shall have charge of and be responsible for all records and documents of the Council, and shall conduct the correspondence of the Council, except such portions of it as the Council shall specially trust to the chief officer of any other department.

116 All communications addressed to the Council shall, where necessary, be laid by the Clerk to the Council before the Committee which has charge of the business to which the communication relates.

117 The Clerk shall prepare and circulate annually a return showing the attendance of members of the Council at meetings of the Council and Committees (including Sub-Committees whose proceedings are recorded).

PUBLICATION OF DOCUMENTS AND RECORDS

118 The Clerk to the Council shall, on application being made to him by any newspaper, supply to such newspaper or its representative the reports of Committees. The Clerk to the Council being the authorised channel through which the newspapers receive these documents, members of the Council are expected to refrain from sending to the Press documents supplied to them with a view to their consideration by the Council.

119 The Council may suspend and exclude, for such period as it may fix, any member who is guilty of the publication or disclosure of any document or record of the Council, or the proceedings of any committee of the Council, or of a Committee of the whole Council relating to any expropriation or purchase of land or other property by the Council, or any legal or arbitration proceedings in which the Council is concerned, or any matter the disclosure of which would be prejudicial to the interests of the Council, provided that no such suspension or exclusion shall be for a period of more than three months.

REPORTS OF OFFICIALS

120 All heads of departments and any other officers who may be instructed thereto by any Committee shall submit monthly reports relating to the working of their departments or the duties they perform, and shall make recommendations, where necessary, for the better carrying out of any works or services, or in connection with any matter for which they are responsible.

Each report shall be submitted to the Committee having charge of the department concerned and copies thereof shall be sent to members of such Committee with the agenda paper referred to in Standing Order No 86

FINANCIAL

Revenue

121 All receipts shall be deposited daily to the credit of the Council's banking account without abatement

122 Written receipts on printed and numbered forms bearing the name of the district, of which duplicate copies shall be kept, shall be issued for all moneys received by or on behalf of the Council

123 All work not carried out departmentally, the cost of which does not exceed £75, shall be put up for public tender or not, at the discretion of the Council, or the Committees to whom the Council have delegated their powers

124 Tenders shall be received only in closed envelopes, and placed in a box appointed for the purpose

125 The tenders shall be opened by two members of the Council, in conjunction with the Clerk, who shall sit in public for that purpose fifteen minutes before the time fixed for the sitting of the Council, and one of the members of the Council so present shall date and sign each tender received. The tenders received shall thereafter be reported to the Council at the same meeting

The word "Council" in this section shall be read as implying any Committees to whom the Council have delegated their powers

Orders for Works and Goods

126 All orders for works and goods shall be given on official order forms, and copies of such orders shall be attached to all accounts before payment is made

127 All payments shall be made by cheque

128 No cheques shall be drawn for any amount the account for which is not signed by the Chairman of the Committee directing the expenditure, the Clerk, and the Engineer (if any)

129 All cheques for the payment of money shall be signed by the Clerk and the Deputy Chairman of the Council

LOCUST REPORT TO 10 9-29

FLYING SWARMS

From Lodwar it is reported that a large swarm has entered from the direction of the Sudan, continuing to fly south, and advices from a point further south confirm the size and direction

Advices from Baringo state that three large swarms have entered and are flying south. They should be reported from settled areas, as the tendency of flight is east by south. They will work their way along the Marmanet Escarpment, and possibly invade Subukia. Later reports indicate that a very large swarm has entered Subukia Valley and has done damage to maize

A medium sized swarm of red locusts passed over Lumbwa Township on Tuesday, flying from Kericho and proceeding north-east. There is an unconfirmed report that locusts have damaged maize in the Kericho District

Locusts continue to move about in the Kikuyu Reserve. They have slightly damaged maize, and have eaten potato tops, but the damage is not on a large scale

Tanganyika reports that the swarm from Ndurumu has proceeded slowly north-east, and is in the vicinity of Ngare Nairobi. Two pink swarms persist west of Lake Natron. There is a swarm in the Pare District above Gonja. A swarm from the east crossed Central Biharamulo and divided, one portion moving westwards towards Karagwe, and the other southwards towards Kibondo. A swarm crossed the Arusha-Mbulu road, flying north

HOPPER AND LAYING AREAS

Northern Turkana —Extensive hatchings have taken place in the Kateruk Valley, Lorogumu, Kampi-ya-Simba, generally along the Lodwar-Lochichar Road, and along the Turkwell River. Operations on scale have commenced, and staff has been doubled

Southern Turkana —Kaboyat Kolosia, Lokoniokat-Kabonyat areas are clear, and the Nadikam area is almost clear. The Katalear area, the Loiya Lotongot, and the Lokichar areas should be clear within a week. In the Loiapuwa and Lokapel areas fresh hatchings occurred, and in the Mabeye and Lokwiyam area there is a heavy infestation daily increased by new hatchings. Laying took place from 21st to 23rd of August on the south bank of the Turkwell River over an area of thirty square miles. Operations in the above two areas embrace an area of over 5,000 square miles

West Suk —Campaign almost over

Elgeyo and Maramet —Nothing to report

Baringo —The infested area is now clear, and more than half the staff has been evacuated. Flying swarms very close to maturity are again active in the region of Pakka, and laying is again expected. A nucleus of officers is employed scouting and overhauling stores and equipment

Northern Frontier Province —No definite news has yet come to hand, but hatching has taken place in the region of Barsaloi

Now that there is a more general tendency for swarms in the north to fly south and east, it behoves farmers to keep a careful watch, particularly in Laikipia and North Kenya, and the valleys leading thereto
