Section 4 of the Principal Ordinance proposed to be amended —

**Exempted  
persons**

4 This Ordinance shall not apply to —

(a) The officers and crews of His Majesty's fleet or of the fleet of any friendly power

(b) Any member of His Majesty's military forces

(c) Any person duly accredited to the Colony by or under the authority of the Imperial or any other Government

(d) Any person the subject of a foreign power having treaty rights within the dominions of the Sultan of Zanzibar who is not a prohibited immigrant under section five and who is possessed of a guarantee in the form set out in Schedule B of this Ordinance signed by the local consular representative of such power

(e) The wife, and any child appearing to the immigration officer to be under the age of sixteen, of a person not being a prohibited immigrant, provided they are not themselves prohibited immigrants under subsections (b), (c), (d), (e), (f), (g) and (h) of section five

(f) Any person who shall satisfy an immigration officer that he has been formerly domiciled in the Colony or has been resident therein for a period or periods in the aggregate of not less than five years and that he does not come within the meaning of any of the subsections (b), (c), (d), (e), (f), (g), and (h) of section five

Section 5 of the Principal Ordinance proposed to be amended —

5 The immigration into the Colony by land or sea of any person being or appearing to be of any of the classes defined by the following subsections (hereinafter called "prohibited immigrant") is prohibited, that is to say —

(a) Any person without visible means of support, or any person who is likely to become a pauper or a public charge

(b) Any idiot or insane person

## **A Bill to Amend the Immigration Restriction Ordinance**

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of Kenya, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows —

**1** This Ordinance may be cited as the Immigration Restriction (Amendment) Ordinance, 1929 " and shall be read as one with the Immigration Restriction Ordinance (Chapter 62 of the Revised Edition), hereinafter called " the Principal Ordinance "

**2** Paragraph (b) of section 4 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby amended and shall be read as if the words " or all forces " were added at the end thereof

" 5 (h) Any person entering or endeavouring to enter the Colony who not having received a free pardon has been convicted in the Colony of murder or of any offence for which a sentence of imprisonment has been passed for a term of not less than six months. "

(c) Any person suffering from a loathsome or a dangerous contagious disease or from trachoma

(d) Any person who not having received a free pardon, has been convicted in any country other than the Colony of murder or any offence for which a sentence of imprisonment has been passed for any term, and who by reason of the circumstances connected therewith is deemed to be an undesirable immigrant but this provision shall not apply to offences of a political character not involving moral turpitude

(e) Any prostitute, and any person living on or receiving or who may have lived on or received any part of the proceeds of the prostitution of others

(f) Any person who in consequence of information received from any trusted source or from any Government, whether British or Foreign, through official or diplomatic channels, is deemed by the Principal Immigration Officer to be an undesirable immigrant

Provided that every decision of the Principal Immigration Officer under this paragraph shall be subject to the confirmation or otherwise of the Governor in Council, whose decision shall be final

(g) Any person who has been ordered to leave the Colony

(h) Any person being a passenger or serving on any vessel calling at any port in the Colony who not having received a free pardon has been convicted in the Colony of murder or of any offence for which a sentence of imprisonment has been passed for any term

6 (1) Any person desiring to enter the Colony shall, before being allowed to do so, appear before the immigration officer, who shall, after such examination as he may consider necessary, inform such person and the master of the ship if any which has conveyed him to the Colony, whether he is a prohibited immigrant or not. Provided that if such person withholds or conceals from the immigration officer any fact or information which would bring such person within any of the classes of prohibited immigrants defined in section 5, he shall be deemed to have contravened this Ordinance

(2) If such person appear on examination to be a fit and proper person to be received as an immigrant into the Colony, the immigration officer shall furnish him with a certificate in the form set out in Schedule A of this Ordinance

9 (1) No person who comes within the definition of a prohibited immigrant shall be released from the operation of this Ordinance, or allowed to be or remain in the Colony, merely because he has not been notified not to land, or because he may have been allowed to land through oversight or through want of knowledge that he was a prohibited immigrant

(2) Proof adduced within three years after any person has entered the Colony that he belongs to any of the classes whose entry is prohibited shall be sufficient evidence that such person was a prohibited immigrant, and such person shall then be liable to be dealt with as a prohibited immigrant

(i) If a native of Asia or Africa, the sum of ten pounds, or such other sum as the Governor in Council may from time to time order,

The word "clearance" as used in this Ordinance includes all the documents ordinarily issued by the commissioner of customs to a ship about to leave port, including the document known as the bill of health

## OBJECTS AND REASONS

As intimated by His Excellency the Governor on the 24th August, 1928, during the debate in Legislative Council on the second reading of the Immigration Restriction (Amendment) Bill, a Committee was appointed to examine into the provisions of the Immigration Restriction Ordinance with a view to recasting and generally strengthening the same, with special reference to the exclusion from the Colony of the class of Europeans known as "poor whites"

The amendments, as proposed in this Bill, are the recommendations of that Committee

*Clause 4*—It is considered that a person who has been formally domiciled in the Colony or has been resident therein for a period or periods in the aggregate of not less than five years should not be denied admittance to the Colony because he has been convicted in the Colony of murder or of any offence for which a sentence of imprisonment has been passed for any term

*Clause 5*—This widens the provisions of the paragraph which is at present confined to any person being a passenger or serving on any vessel calling at any port in the Colony who not having received a free pardon has been convicted of murder or of any offence for which a sentence of imprisonment has been passed for any term. It is proposed to restrict the provisions of the paragraph to offences for which a sentence of less than six months imprisonment has been imposed

*Clause 7*—Under section 8 of the Principal Ordinance any prohibited immigrant making his way into or being found within the Colony commits an offence, and it is considered only fair to provide that such an immigrant should have an opportunity of leaving the Colony within a reasonable time before he renders himself liable to punishment

*Clause 8*—This clause makes it quite clear that proof adduced within three years after any person has entered the Colony that at the date of entry he belonged to any of the prohibited classes, renders that person a prohibited immigrant

*Clause 9*—It is proposed that any person, other than a native of Asia or Africa, who might become a charge upon the Colony, should pay the sum of fifty pounds, instead of thirty-seven pounds ten shillings, as the condition of his being allowed to land. It is also proposed that a prohibited immigrant allowed to land upon making a deposit should be granted a conditional permit, and that in lieu of requiring a deposit the immigration officer should have the power to require the intending immigrant to give security by means of a bond, the bond to become void if the immigration officer is satisfied within a period of twelve months that he is not likely to become a pauper. It is considered that the present time, namely, six months, is too short to make certain whether or not an immigrant is likely to become a public charge

*Clause 10*—Conditional permits are at present dealt with by Rules made under the Principal Ordinance, but these Rules are scanty, and the proposed clause is designed to make further and more elaborate provisions with regard to conditional permits

*Clause 11* —It is proposed that power should be given to the Governor to authorise the Principal Immigration Officer to make contracts for the conveyance of a prohibited immigrant to any port outside the Colony as well as, at present, to a port or place in or near to the immigrant's country of birth—it may not always be possible to send an immigrant to the latter place

*Clause 12* —By the deletion of the words as proposed in this clause the onus of preventing desertion will lie upon masters and agents of ships

*Clauses 14 and 15* —It is considered that the sums mentioned in paragraphs (a) and (b) of section 21 of the Principal Ordinance are too low

*Clause 16* —It is considered that the provisions of section 37 are too severe and it is proposed that they should only apply to murder or to cases where a court has actually imposed imprisonment, and that in such cases the Governor may, if he thinks fit, make an order requiring such person to leave the Colony within a time fixed by the order, and that thereafter such person will be liable to be dealt with as a prohibited immigrant

## OBJECTS AND REASONS

The Widows' and Orphans' Pension Ordinance does not clearly indicate the procedure to be adopted with regard to the contributions of an officer transferred from East Africa, who remains a contributor to the East African Widows' and Orphans' Pension Scheme and who is subsequently re-transferred to East Africa but to another Colony in the group

Such an officer must contribute under the Widows' and Orphans' Pension Ordinance of his new Colony but, unless he elects specifically under section 27 to cease his former contributions, there appears to be nothing to prevent his continuing such contributions and remaining registered for a full pension from the funds of his first Colony

This Bill clearly defines the position of such an officer by providing that he shall cease to contribute under the Ordinance from the date of his appointment to the service of another East African Government

“ Provided that no employer, owner, or occupier shall give or issue to any native any such permission or permit as is mentioned in paragraphs (b), (c) or (d) of this section without the written authority of a district commissioner to give or issue permissions or permits

The district commissioner may authorise any employer, owner, or occupier to give or issue such permissions or permits either generally or to such numbers of natives only as the district commissioner may decide, and subject to such conditions as the district commissioner may think fit

Provided further that every employer, owner or occupier who is authorised to give or issue such permissions or permits as aforesaid shall within seven days of giving or issuing any such permission or permit report to the district commissioner the giving or issuing of such permission or permit together with the particulars prescribed by section 4 of this Ordinance ”

**25      3** Any permission or permit given or issued under the provisions of the Principal Ordinance may at any time be revoked by the employer, owner, or occupier giving or issuing the same or by a district commissioner

Power to revoke

Provided that any employer, owner or occupier who revokes any permission or permit given or issued by himself shall within seven days report to the district commissioner the revocation of such permission or permit and the reasons therefor

## OBJECTS AND REASONS

The reason for the introduction of this amending Bill is that cases have occurred in which natives employed on farms have used their arms in a manner dangerous to peace and good order

The Bill while recognising the occupier of a farm as the person who should take the immediate responsibility of issuing

to his native employee a permit to carry such aims as are necessary to the purposes of his employment preserves the right of Government to exercise in the interest of the community in general control over the arming of natives To this end the Bill vests a controlling authority in the district commissioner whose sanction, either special or general, must be obtained before permits are issued and to whom all issues and revocations must be reported The district commissioner is also given power to cancel any permit which he considers may involve public danger





## LOCUST REPORT TO 5-12-29

BANDS of hoppers are at present known to be scattered over a vast extent of country, principally in the Northern Frontier Province, Embu, Kitui, Donyo Sabuk, Machakos and Voi, whilst they are shortly expected to appear in the southern portion of the Masai Reserve

The reports from districts indicate the position to be as follows —

*Northern Frontier Province* — Anti-hopper operations are being carried out by seven Locust Officers, chiefly in the vicinity of Archer's Post and Kauro. The work of destruction is, however, greatly handicapped by the lack of labour and the heavy rains, which have increased the transport difficulties

*Embu* — One Officer with full equipment has proceeded to the Embu District, where hoppers have just hatched. Further staff will be despatched if necessary

*Kitui* — Hoppers are appearing in great numbers over the northern parts of the district, the worst infestation being in the vicinity of Mivukoni, Tseikuru, Katse, Gai and Ndatani

Egg laying by large swarms of yellow locusts has also taken place at Nzui, Mui, Kombe and Mutah on the eastern side of the district

One Locust Officer is operating at Mivukoni, and further staff is being despatched

*Machakos* — Oviposition has taken place in the Katheka and Meanyani locations, over an area of more than 2,000 acres. Hoppers are appearing, and one officer with bran-bait is on the spot

Thanks to the timely warning and instructions given by the administrative officers to the natives in this district, they are themselves dealing with the hoppers as they hatch out, but skilled supervision will greatly assist

*Donyo Sabuk* — The eggs laid on the Nzeeni Estate have hatched out and hoppers are plentiful. The work of destruction is being taken in hand. There are also native reports of hoppers on the Yatta Plains near Kithopo and at Kampi-ya-Faro on the old Kitui road

*Voi* — Hoppers have hatched out on the Mhinga Estates, and at Ndi and Mbololo

*Masai Reserve* — There are patches of yellow mature locusts between Taveta and Maktau. Yellow locusts in large numbers appear to be searching for laying grounds near Laitokitok and Selati Hill

*Baringo and Southern Turkana* — A road has now been constructed from Kaipeddo to the Kerio River, which will greatly facilitate all future operations in that area

*Tanganyika Territory* — Scattered but extensive laying has now been confirmed in the Pare and numerous other districts of the Territory. A very large swarm of red locusts is reported between Gelei and Ktumbweni. An anti-hopper campaign commences on the 9th December, by which date it is expected that the majority of hoppers will have hatched out

(c) Every person engaged in the hawking of any goods or in the selling of newspapers in public places shall while so engaged wear on his left arm in a conspicuous place a numbered badge which shall be issued by the Municipal Council

(d) No hawker or vendor of newspapers shall sell exchange or part with a badge so issued, and no person shall wear any such badge not issued by the Municipal Council

(e) The maximum number of badges to be issued to the vendors of newspapers may be fixed from time to time by the Municipal Council

Offences against this By-law shall be cognisable by the Police

3 By-law No 325 of the Principal By-laws is hereby repealed and the following substituted therefor —

“ 325 The following fees shall be paid to the Municipal Council under this section —

(a) For a licence to a person to hawk vegetables, fruit or farm produce (other than meat) in any part of the Municipality not within the commercial area as defined by By-law No 3 (7) of the Principal By-laws—

Per month	Sh 1
or per annum	Sh 10

(b) For a general hawker's licence—

Per month	Sh 20
or per annum	Sh 200

(c) Upon the issue of every badge issued in pursuance of By-law 324 (c)—deposit Sh 2 (returnable upon the cancellation of the licence and/or the return of the badge) ”


