An Ordinance to Amend the Local Government (Rating) Ordinance, 1928.

10th June, 1930.

Date of commencement.

ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of Kenya, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:--

1. This Ordinance may be cited as "the Local Govern- Short title. ment (Rating) (Amendment) Ordinance, 1930," and shall be read as one with the Local Government (Rating) Ordinance, No. 20 of 1928. 1928, hereinafter referred to as "the Principal Ordinance."

2. Section 5 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby Addition or amended by the addition thereto at the end thereof of the proviso to section 5 of following proviso:--

- "Provided that in the case of the first valuation roll prepared for any local authority, the Commissioner for Local Government may by certificate under his hand declare that the value of any improvements as required to be shown by paragraph (e) of this section need not be included in such valuation roll, and such valuation roll shall be deemed to be a valid and proper valuation roll notwithstanding that it does not contain a valuation of such improvements."
- 3. Section 26 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby Amendment of amended by inserting the words "or tenants in common" after the word "owners" in the fifth line of the section.

4. When any rate imposed upon any tenants in common Tenants in of rateable property shall remain unpaid for a period of three months after the date on which such rate shall have become fixed to become due and payable, the local authority may at any time within twelve months after the imposing of the rate, demand the amount of such rate or any part thereof from any one of such tenants in common, and on non-payment thereof may, after one month from the date of such demand, recover the same from such tenant in common, and every such tenant in common by whom such rates have been paid or from whom they have been recovered may recover from each of the other tenants in common the proportion of such rates which is payable by him, and for the purposes of such recovery the production of the receipt for such rates so paid by or recovered from such tenant in common shall be conclusive proof that such amount was so paid by or recovered from him.

Jurisdiction of magistrate of the first class. Cap. 5.

5. Anything in the Courts Ordinance to the contrary notwithstanding, a magistrate of the first class shall be deemed to have jurisdiction to hear appeals under section 12 of the Principal Ordinance, to issue warrants under section 21 of the Principal Ordinance, and to hear and determine claims for the recovery of rates under section 22 of the Principal Ordinance, and these sections shall be construed as if the reference therein to the magistrate having jurisdiction were a reference to a magistrate of the first class.

Short title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as "the Wireless Telegraphy (Amendment) Ordinance, 1930," and shall be read as one with the Wireless Telegraphy Ordinance (Chapter 118 of the Revised Edition), hereinafter referred to as "the Principal Ordinance."

Amendment of section 2 of the Principal Ordinance.

- 2. Section 2 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby amended by adding thereto the following definition:—
 - " 'Apparatus for wireless telegraphy 'includes any wireless receiving apparatus."

An Ordinance to Amend the Criminal Procedure Ordinance.

10th June, 1930.

Date of commencement.

ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of Kenya, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:-

1. This Ordinance may be cited as "the Criminal Pro-Short title. cedure (Amendment) Ordinance, 1930," and shall be read as one with the Criminal Procedure Ordinance (Chapter 7 of the Cap. 7. Revised Edition), hereinafter referred to as "the Principal Ordinance."

2. Section 167 of the Principal Ordinance as substituted Repeal and by section 2 of the Criminal Procedure (Amendment) Ordinance, 1926, is hereby repealed and the following substituted 167 of the therefor:-

Ordinance.

"167. (1) Whenever a magistrate issues a summons No. 31 of 1926. he may if he see reason so to do and shall when the offence with which the accused is charged is punishable only by fine or only by fine and/or imprisonment not exceeding three months, dispense with the personal attendance of the accused provided that he pleads guilty in writing or appears by an advocate.

(2) But the magistrate inquiring into or trying the case may, in his discretion, at any subsequent stage of the proceedings, unless the accused has pleaded guilty, direct the personal attendance of the accused, and, if necessary, enforce such attendance in manner hereinbefore

provided.

(3) If a magistrate imposes a fine on an accused person whose personal attendance has been dispensed with under this section, and such fine is not paid within the time prescribed for such payment the magistrate may forthwith issue a summons calling upon such accused person to show cause why he should not be committed to prison for such term as the magistrate may then prescribe. If such accused person does not attend upon the return of such summons the magistrate may forthwith issue a warrant and commit such person to prison for such term as the magistrate may think fit.

- (4) If in any case in which under this section the attendance of an accused person is dispensed with previous convictions are alleged against such person and are not admitted in writing or through such person's advocate the magistrate may adjourn the proceedings and direct the personal attendance of the accused, and, if necessary, enforce such attendance in manner hereinbefore provided.
- (5) Whenever the attendance of an accused has been so dispensed with and his attendance is subsequently required, the cost of any adjournment for such purpose shall be borne in any event by the accused."

Application of Ordinance.

3. The provisions of this Ordinance shall apply to fines imposed before but unpaid at the date of commencement of this Ordinance.

Short title.

Cap. 1.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as "the Interpretation and General Clauses (Amendment) Ordinance, 1930," and shall be read as one with the Interpretation and General Clauses Ordinance, hereinafter referred to as "the Principal Ordinance."

Amendment of section 2 (40) and (41) of Cap. 1.

- 2. Paragraphs (40) and (41) of section 2 of the Principal Ordinance are hereby repealed and the following paragraphs are substituted therefor:—
 - " (40) 'Provincial Commissioner' means the officer in charge of a province, and 'District Commissioner' means the District Officer in charge of a district;
 - (41) 'District Officer' means any administrative officer subordinate to a Provincial Commissioner."

Repeal of section 25 of Cap. 1.

3. Section 25 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby repealed.

Amendment of designations used in Ordinances, etc. 4. An Ordinance to Amend the Defence Force Ordinance, 1927.

10th June, 1930.

Date of commencement.

ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of Kenya, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

- 1. This Ordinance may be cited as "the Defence Force Short title. (Amendment) Ordinance, 1930," and shall be read as one with the Defence Force Ordinance, 1927, hereinafter referred No. 12 of 1928, to as "the Principal Ordinance."
- 2. Section 4 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby replacement replacement section 4 of

- "4. (1) The Governor shall appoint a Central Defence Committee consisting of the Officer Commanding Troops, Commandant, and one delegate from each Defence Force District.
- (2) The Central Defence Committee shall perform such functions and shall execute such powers and duties as may be prescribed by this Ordinance or by any regulations made hereunder.
- (3) It shall be lawful for the Governor to appoint a Central Sub-committee, consisting of the Officer Commanding Troops, Commandant and three other members of the Central Defence Committee, for the performance of such functions and the execution of such powers and duties as may be delegated to the Sub-committee by the Central Defence Committee."

Repeal and replacement of sub-section (2) of section 23 of the Principal Ordinance.

- 3. Sub-section (2) of section 23 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby repealed and the following substituted therefor:—
 - "(2) In the case of sudden and imminent danger in any province or district, when it is not possible to obtain the authority of the Governor without undue delay, the civil officer in charge of such province or district may, for the defence of the province or district or any part thereof or for the protection of life and property therein, by proclamation in the name of the Governor call out the members of the Defence Force resident in such province or district, but in such case such officer shall forthwith report to the Governor such calling out and any subsequent step taken by him."

An Ordinance to Amend the Detention Camps Ordinance, 1925.

Date of commencement.

10th June, 1930.

ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of Kenya, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Short title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as "the Detention Camps (Amendment) Ordinance, 1930," and shall be read as one with the Detention Camps Ordinance, 1925, hereinafter referred to as "the Principal Ordinance."

Repeal and replacement of section 5 of the Principal

Ordinance.

No. 6 of 1926.

No. 25 of 1925.

- 2. Section 5 of the Principal Ordinance, as amended by the Detention Camps (Amendment) Ordinance, 1926, is hereby repealed, and the following substituted therefor:—
 - "5. (1) When a native is convicted of any offence and the Court, after taking into consideration the apparent age, antecedents, character and state of health of the person accused and all the circumstances of the case, is of opinion that the offence would be adequately punished by a fine or a sentence of imprisonment not exceeding six months, the Court may instead of awarding a sentence of a fine or imprisonment award a sentence of detention in a detention camp, and the prisoner shall thereupon be detained in a detention camp.
 - (2) A sentence of detention shall in no case exceed the period of imprisonment to which the prisoner could have been sentenced if this Ordinance had not been passed.

- (3) Where any Ordinance provides that an offence is punishable by fine only or by fine and imprisonment in default of payment of such fine, the Court may order that in default of payment the prisoner undergo a sentence of detention in lieu of imprisonment."
- 3. Section 6 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby re- Repeal and pealed and the following substituted therefor:

section 6 of the Principal Ordinance.

- "6. Where a sentence of fine or imprisonment or detention comes before the Supreme Court on appeal or in exercise of its powers of revision or confirmation the Supreme Court may, after taking into consideration the apparent age, antecedents, character or state of health of the prisoner and all the circumstances of the case, alter any sentence of fine or imprisonment to a sentence of detention or a sentence of detention to a sentence of fine or imprisonment."
- 4. Section 7 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby re-Repeal and pealed and the following substituted therefor:-

replacement of section 7 of the Principal Ordinance.

- Where a sentence of fine or imprisonment or detention is awarded by a Native Tribunal, a revising officer may, after taking into consideration the apparent age, antecedents, character and state of health of the prisoner and all the circumstances of the case, alter any sentence of fine or imprisonment to a sentence of detention or a sentence of detention to a sentence of fine or imprisonment."
- 5. No native shall be sentenced to detention for a period of detention. exceeding six months in all, and no sentence of detention shall be passed on any native who is proved to have previously undergone more than one term of imprisonment.

6. Section 13 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby repealed.

An Ordinance to Amend the Electric Power Ordinance.

Date of commencement.

10th June, 1930.

ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of Kenya, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Short title.

Cap. 165.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as "the Electric Power (Amendment) Ordinance, 1930," and shall be read as one with the Electric Power Ordinance (Chapter 165 of the Revised Edition), hereinafter referred to as "the Principal Ordinance."

Amendment of section 19 of the Principal Ordinance.

2. Section 19 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby amended by deleting the seventh line of paragraph (a) of the section and substituting therefor the following words:

"distributing licence, such local authority shall make" and by substituting the words "decision of the Governor in Council" for the words "Governor's decision" in the third line of paragraph (g) of the section.

Repeal and replacement of se tion 39 of the Principal Ordinance.

Area of supply and regulation of supply beyond area.

- 3. Section 39 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby repealed and the following section is substituted therefor:—
 - "39. (1) The area of supply shall be the area named for that purpose in the licence.
 - (2) The licensee shall not at any time supply electrical energy or (except for the purpose of a licence) erect or lay down any works beyond the area of supply otherwise than as may be permitted under authority of the Governor in Council either under sub-section (3) of this section or under section 37.
 - (3) Where the owner or occupier of any premises is desirous of obtaining a supply of electrical energy from any licensee within whose licensed area of supply those premises are not situate, the Governor in Council may, with the consent of the local authority (if any) within whose district the premises are situate and the licensee (if any) authorised by licence to supply electrical energy to such premises, authorise the first-mentioned licensee to supply electrical energy to those premises on such terms and subject to such conditions as the Governor in Council may think fit:

Provided that, if in the opinion of the Governor in Council any consent required by this sub-section is unreasonably withheld, the Governor in Council may proceed as if such consent had been given:

Provided further that the authority granted under this section shall lapse with the termination, for whatever cause, of the licence.

- (4) An authority given by the Governor in Council under sub-section (3) of this section shall, unless it specifically states otherwise, confer any such powers and impose any such duties on the licensee as would have been conferred or imposed by this Ordinance if the premises and the route along which the lines are to be laid for the purpose of giving supply were within the licensee's local area, anything in the licence notwithstanding.
- (5) If the licensee supplies electrical energy or erects or lays down any works in contravention of this section, the Governor in Council may revoke the licence on such terms as he thinks just."

An Ordinance to Amend the Immigration Restriction Ordinance.

10th June, 1930.

Date of commencement.

ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of Kenya, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :--

1. This Ordinance may be cited as "the Immigration Short title. Restriction (Amendment) Ordinance, 1930," and shall be read as one with the Immigration Restriction Ordinance (Chapter 62 Cap. 62. of the Revised Edition), hereinafter called "the Principal Ordinance."

2. Paragraph (b) of section 4 of the Principal Ordinance Amendment of is hereby amended and shall be read as if the words "or air forces " were added at the end thereof.

section 4 (b) of the Principal Ordinance.

3. Paragraph (d) of section 4 of the Principal Ordinance Amendment of is hereby amended by the deletion therefrom of the words "and who is possessed of a guarantee in the form set out in Principal Schedule B of this Ordinance signed by the local consular representative of such power".

Ordinance.

Amendment of section 4 (f) of the Principal Ordinance.

- 4. Paragraph (f) of section 4 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby amended and shall be read as if the last line thereof were deleted, and the following substituted therefor:—
 - " (d), (e), (f) and (g) of section 5."

Repeal and replacement of section 5 (h) of the Principal Ordinance.

- 5. Paragraph (h) of section 5 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby repealed and the following paragraph is substituted therefor:—
 - "5. (h) Any person entering or endeavouring to enter the Colony who not having received a free pardon has been convicted in the Colony of murder or of any offence for which a sentence of imprisonment has been passed for a term of not less than six months."

Repeal of section 6 (2) of the Principal Ordinance.

- 6. Section 6 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby amended:
 - (a) by deleting the figure (1) after the number 6 at the beginning of the section; and
 - (b) by deleting sub-section (2).

Repeal and replacement of section 8 of the Principal Ordinance.

- 7. Section 8 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby repealed and the following section is substituted therefor:—
 - "8. Any prohibited immigrant making his way into, or being found within the Colony may be ordered by the immigration officer to leave the Colony, and if such prohibited immigrant shall fail to leave the Colony within such time as may be considered reasonable by the immigration officer, he shall be guilty of an offence against this Ordinance. Any person convicted under this section may, in addition to liability to removal or otherwise, be imprisoned with or without hard labour for any term not exceeding six months, provided that such imprisonment shall cease if and when arrangements are made for the deportation of an offender from the Colony."

Repeal and replacement of section 9 (2) of the Principal Ordinance.

- 8. Sub-section (2) of section 9 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby repealed and the following sub-section is substituted therefor:—
 - "9. (2) Proof adduced within three years after any person has entered the Colony that he belonged at the date of entry to any of the classes whose entry is prohibited shall be sufficient evidence that such person is a prohibited immigrant and such person shall then be liable to be dealt with as a prohibited immigrant."

Repeal and replacement of section 11 of the Principal Ordinance.

- 9. Section 11 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby repealed and the following section is substituted therefor:—
 - "11. (1) Any person appearing to be a prohibited immigrant under paragraph (a) of section 5, and not coming within the provisions of any of the paragraphs (b), (c), (d), (e), (f), (g), and (h) of the said section, may be granted a conditional permit to enter the Colony upon depositing with the immigration officer—
 - (a) if a native of Asia or Africa, the sum of ten pounds or such other sum as the Governor in Council may from time to time order;

(b) in the case of any other person, the sum of fifty pounds:

Provided that the immigration officer may, in lieu of requiring such deposit, require the intending immigrant to give security by bond, in the form set out in Schedule A to the amount of such deposit with one or more sureties to be approved by the immigration officer and resident in the Colony conditional on the intending immigrant satisfying the immigration officer within a period of twelve months from the date of his entering the Colony that he is no longer a prohibited immigrant and is not likely to become a pauper or a public charge.

- Whenever the condition of a bond taken under the preceding sub-section shall have been broken the Attorney General or the Principal Immigration Officer may sue and recover for the use of His Majesty the amount secured by such bond."
- 10. The following section, to be numbered 11A, shall be Insertion of deemed to be inserted between sections 11 and 12 of the Principal Ordinance:

section 11a between sections 11 and 12 of the Principal Ordinance.

- "11A. (1) Whenever the immigration officer shall, Conditional under the provisions of the last preceding section, allow a permits. person appearing to be a prohibited immigrant to enter the Colony, he shall grant to such person a conditional permit in the form set out in Schedule B to this Ordinance.
- (2) Every person to whom such permit has been granted shall report himself personally or by letter at such times as may be specified in the permit to the officer issuing such permit or to such officer in the service of the Government as the officer issuing the permit may from time to time direct: Provided that whenever a holder of a conditional permit shall at any time during the continuance of such permit change his place of residence in the Colony he shall immediately report such change of residence in the manner hereinbefore provided.
- (3) If such person shall, at any time within a period of twelve months from the date of his entering the Colony, satisfy the immigration officer that he is no longer a prohibited immigrant and is not likely to become a pauper or a public charge, the immigration officer may cancel the conditional permit granted to such person and return to him his deposit.
- (4) If such person shall, at the conclusion of the period aforesaid, fail to satisfy the immigration officer that he is no longer a prohibited immigrant and is not likely to become a pauper or a public charge, his deposit may be forfeited and he may be treated as a prohibited immigrant: Provided that if at any time during the period aforesaid it shall appear to an immigration officer that it is not likely that such a person will, at the conclusion of the period aforesaid, satisfy him that he is no longer a prohibited immigrant and that he is not likely to become a pauper or a public charge, then and in such case, the immigration officer may bring such person before a magistrate and such magistrate may declare that such person is a prohibited immigrant, and that his deposit shall be forfeited."

Amendment of section 12 of the Principal Ordinance.

11. Section 12 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby amended and shall be read as if the words "or, with the consent of the Government of the country concerned, to such port or place outside the Colony as the Governor may direct "were inserted between the words" birth "and and "which occur in the fifth line thereof.

2. Section 4 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby repealed and the following section is substituted therefor:-

- "4. (1) It shall be lawful for the Governor to declare any building within the Colony to be a house of detention for the occupation of vagrants or of any class of vagrants.
- (2) The Governor may from time to time appoint such superintendents and medical and other officers for the management of such houses of detention as he may think
- (3) Every such superintendent, medical and other officer shall be deemed to be a person employed in the public service within the meaning of the Penal Code."

The Public Revenue for the year 1930, and other funds of the Colony and Protectorate of Kenya are hereby charged towards the services of the year ending the 31st day of December, one thousand nine hundred and thirty, with a sum of three million five hundred and fifty-five thousand, five hundred and thirty-five pounds.

Application of money granted.

3. The money granted by this Ordinance shall be applied for the purposes and services expressed in the Schedule annexed hereto.

Treasurer's authority for payment.

4. The Treasurer of the Colony and Protectorate of Kenya is hereby authorised and required from time to time upon the warrant or order of the Governor to pay out of the revenue and other funds of the Colony and Protectorate of Kenya, for the several services specified in the Schedule, the said sum of three million five hundred and fifty-five thousand, five hundred and thirty-five pounds, which will come in course of payment during the year ending on the thirty-first day of December, one thousand nine hundred and thirty.

An Ordinance relating to Children born out of Wedlock.

Date of commencement.

10th June, 1930.

ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of Kenya, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Short title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as "the Legitimacy Ordinance, 1930."

Interpretation.

- 2. In this Ordinance, unless the context otherwise requires—
- "Legitimated person" means a person legitimated by this Ordinance;
- "Date of legitimation" means the date of the marriage leading to the legitimation, or where the marriage occurred before the commencement of this Ordinance, the commencement of this Ordinance;
- "Disposition" means an assurance of any interest in property by any instrument whether inter vivos or by will;
- "Intestate" includes a person who leaves a will but dies intestate as to some beneficial interest in his movable or immovable estate;
- "Entailed interest" means an interest in tail or in tail male or in tail female or in tail special.

Legitimation by subsequent marriage of parents. 3. (1) Subject to the provisions of this section, where the parents of an illegitimate person marry or have married one another, whether before or after the commencement of this Ordinance, the marriage shall, if the father of the illegitimate person was or is at the date of the marriage resident in the Colony, render that person, if living, legitimate from the commencement of this Ordinance, or from the date of the marriage, whichever last happens.

Interest in property of spouse and issue of legitimated person.

(2) The legitimation of a person under this Ordinance does not enable him or his spouse, children or remoter issue to take any interest in movable or immovable property save as is hereinafter in this Ordinance expressly provided.

Re-registration of births of legitimated persons.

(3) The provisions contained in the Schedule to this Ordinance shall have effect with respect to the re-registration of the birth of legitimated persons.

4. (1) A person claiming that he or his parent or any remoter ancestor became or has become a legitimated person may, whether domiciled in this Colony or elsewhere and whether a natural-born British subject or not, apply by petition to the Supreme Court praying for a decree declaring that the petitioner is the legitimate child of his parents, and the Supreme Court shall have jurisdiction to hear and determine such application and to make such decree declaratory of the legitimacy or illegitimacy of such person as to the Court may seem just; and such decree shall be binding to all intents and purposes on His Majesty and on all persons whomsoever.

Declarations of legitimacy of legitimated persons.

- (2) Every petition under this section shall be accompanied by such affidavit verifying the same, and of the absence of collusion, as the Court may by any general rule direct.
- (3) In all proceedings under this section the Court shall have full power to award and enforce payment of costs to any persons cited, whether such persons shall or shall not oppose the declaration applied for, in case the said Court shall deem it reasonable that such costs should be paid.
- (4) A copy of every petition under this section, and of the affidavit accompanying the same, shall, one month at least previously to the presentation or filing of such petition, be delivered to the Attorney General, who shall be a respondent upon the hearing of such petition and upon every subsequent proceeding relating thereto.
- Where any application is made under this section to the said Court, such person or persons (if any) besides the said Attorney General as the Court shall think fit shall, subject to the rules made under this section, be cited to see proceedings or otherwise summoned in such manner as the Court shall direct, and may be permitted to become parties to the proceedings, and oppose the application.
- (6) The decree of the said Court shall not in any case prejudice any person, unless such person has been cited or made a party to the proceedings or is the heir-at-law or next of kin, or other real or personal representative of or derives title under or through a person so cited or made a party; nor shall such sentence or decree of the Court prejudice any person if subsequently proved to have been obtained by fraud or collusion.
- (7) No proceeding to be had under this section shall affect any final judgment or decree already pronounced or made by any Court of competent jurisdiction.
- (8) The Rules Committee appointed under the Civil Procedure Ordinance, 1924, may make rules for carrying the No. 3 of 1924. provisions of this section into effect.

- 5. (1) Subject to the provisions of this Ordinance, a Rights of legitimated person and his spouse, children or more remote issee shall be entitled to take any interest—
 - (a) in the estate of an intestate dying after the date of legitimation;
 - (b) under any disposition coming into operation after the date of legitimation,
 - (c) by descent under an entailed interest created after the date of legitimation;

in like manner as if the legitimated person had been born legitimate.

persons, etc., to take interest in property.

Ranking of legitimated children inter se and in relation to legitimate children.

(2) Where the right to any property, movable or immovable, depends on the relative seniority of the children of any person, and those children include one or more legitimated persons, the legitimated person or persons shall rank as if he or they had been born on the day when he or they became legitimated by virtue of this Ordinance, and if more than one such legitimated person became legitimated at the same time. they shall rank as between themselves in order of seniority.

Succession on intestacy of legitimated persons and issue.

6. Where a legitimated person or a child or remoter issue of a legitimated person dies intestate in respect of all or any of his movable or immovable property, the same persons shall be entitled to take the same interests therein as they would have been entitled to take if the legitimated person had been born legitimate.

Application to illegitimate person dying before marriage of parents.

7. Where an illegitimate person dies after commencement of this Ordinance and before the marriage of his parents leaving any spouse, children or remoter issue living at the date of such marriage, then, if that person would, if living at the time of the marriage of his parents, have become a legitimated person, the provisions of this Ordinance with respect to the taking of interests in property by, or in succession to, the spouse, children and remoter issue of a legitimated person (including those relating to the rate of death duties) shall apply as if such person as aforesaid had been a legitimated person and the date of the marriage of his parents had been the date of legitimation.

Personal rights and obligations of legitimated persons. 8. A legitimated person shall have the same rights, and shall be under the same obligations in respect of the maintenance and support of himself or of any other person as if he had been born legitimate, and, subject to the provisions of this Ordinance, the provisions of any Ordinance relating to claims for damages, compensation, allowance, benefit, or otherwise by or in respect of a legitimate child shall apply in like manner in the case of a legitimated person.

Death duties.

9. Where a legitimated person or any relative of a legitimated person takes any interest in movable or immovable property, any succession, legacy or other duty which becomes leviable after the date of legitimation shall be payable at the same rate as if the legitimated person had been born legitimate.

Provisions as to persons legitimated by extraneous law.

- 10. (1) Where the parents of an illegitimate person marry or have married one another, whether before or after the commencement of this Ordinance, and the father of the illegitimate person was or is, at the time of the marriage, domiciled in a country, other than the Colony, by the law of which the illegitimate person became legitimated by virtue of such subsequent marriage, that person, if living, shall in the Colony be recognised as having been so legitimated from the commencement of this Ordinance or from the date of the marriage, whichever last happens, notwithstanding that his father was not at the time of the birth of such person domiciled in a country in which legitimation by subsequent marriage was permitted by law.
- (2) All the provisions of this Ordinance relating to legitimated persons and to the taking of interests in property by or in succession to a legitimated person and the spouse, children and remoter issue of a legitimated person (including

those relating to the rate of death duties) shall apply in the case of a person recognised as having been legitimated under this section, or who would, had he survived the marriage of his parents, have been so recognized; and accordingly, this Ordinance shall have effect as if references therein to a legitimated person included a person so recognized as having been legitimated.

(3) For the purposes of this section, the expression Meaning of " country " includes any part of His Majesty's Dominions, as well as a foreign country

11. (1) Where, after the commencement of this Ordinance, Right of the mother of an illegitimate child, such child not being a child and legitimated person, dies intestate as respects all or any of her mother of movable or immovable property, and does not leave any child to succeed legitimate issue her surviving, the illegitimate child, or if he is on intestacy of the other. dead, his issue, shall be entitled to take any interest therein to which he or such issue would have been entitled if he had been born legitimate.

- Where, after the commencement of this Ordinance, an illegitimate child, not being a legitimated person, dies intestate in respect of all or any of his movable or immovable property, his mother if surviving shall be entitled to take any interest therein to which she would have been entitled if the child had been born legitimate and she had been the only surviving parent.
- (3) This section does not apply to or affect the right of Entailed any person to take by purchase or descent any entailed interest interest. in movable or immovable property.

- 12. (1) Nothing in this Ordinance shall affect the Saving. succession to any dignity or title of honour or render any person capable of succeeding to or transmitting a right to succeed to any such dignity or title.
- (2) Nothing in this Ordinance shall affect the operation or construction of any disposition coming into operation before the commencement of this Ordinance, or affect any rights under the intestacy of a person dying before the commencement of this Ordinance.

SCHEDULE.

REGISTRATION OF BIRTHS OF LEGITIMATED PERSONS.

1. The Registrar General may, on production of such evidence as appears to him to be satisfactory, authorise at any time the re-registration of the birth of a legitimated person whose birth is already registered under the Births and Deaths Registration Ordinance, 1928, and such re-registration shall be effected in such manner and at such place as the Governor may by regulations prescribe:

Provided that the Registrar General shall not authorise the re-registration of the birth of any such person in any case where information with a view to obtaining such re-registration is not furnished to him by both parents, unless-

(a) the name of a person acknowledging himself to be the father of the legitimated person has been registered under the Births and Deaths Registration Ordinance, 1928; or

- (b) the paternity of the legitimated person has been established by an affiliation order or otherwise by a decree of a court of competent jurisdiction; or
- (c) a declaration of the legitimacy of the legitimated person has been made under this Ordinance.
- 2. It shall be the duty of the parents of a legitimated person, or, in cases where re-registration can be effected on information furnished by one parent and one of the parents is dead, of the surviving parent, within the time hereinafter specified, to furnish to the Registrar General information with a view to obtaining the re-registration of the birth of that person; that is to say—
 - (a) if the marriage took place before the commencement of this Ordinance, within six months of such commencement;
 - (b) if the marriage takes place after the commencement of this Ordinance, within three months after the date of the marriage.
- 3. Where the parents, or either of them, fail to furnish the necessary information within the time limited for the purpose, the Registrar General may at any time after the expiration of that time require the parents of a person whom he believes to have been legitimated by virtue of this Ordinance, or either of them, to give him such information concerning the matter as he may consider necessary, verified in such manner as he may direct, and for that purpose to attend personally either at his office or at any other place appointed by him, within such time, not being less than seven days after the receipt of the notice, as may be specified in the notice.
- 4. The failure of the parents or either of them to furnish information as required by this schedule in respect of any legitimated person shall not affect the legitimation of that person.
- 5. No fee for re-registration under this schedule shall be charged if the necessary information for the purpose is furnished within the time above specified; but in any other case there shall be charged in respect of such re-registration such fees, not exceeding in the aggregate ten shillings, as may be prescribed by regulations under this schedule.
- 6. This schedule shall be construed as one with the No. 2 of 1928. Births and Deaths Registration Ordinance, 1928.

GOVERNMENT NOTICE No. 341.

THE DISEASES OF PLANTS PREVENTION ORDINANCE.

Rules.

IN EXERCISE of the powers conferred upon him by section 3 of the Diseases of Plants Prevention Ordinance (Chapter 155 of the Revised Edition), His Excellency the Governor in Council has been pleased to make the following Rules:—

- 1. These Rules may be cited as "the Diseases of Plants Prevention Rules, 1930".
 - 2. In these Rules:—
- (a) "Ordinance" means the Diseases of Plants Prevention Ordinance.
- (b) "Pest" and "disease" mean insect pest and plant disease respectively and shall include parasitic plants.
 - (c) "Maize" shall include sorghums and millets.
- 3. The Director of Agriculture may appoint inspectors for the purposes of these Rules.
- 4. The importation of plants and seed into the Colony will only be permitted as hereinafter provided.
- 5. An inspector may enter upon any lands, nurseries, or other places where he has reason to believe there is any pest or disease or where he has reason to believe there is any plant or seed which may prevent the proper control of any pest or disease.
- 6. An inspector may cause any plant or seed to be detained until it can be examined; any detention shall be at the risk of the owner thereof, and any inspector detaining any such plant or seed shall notify such owner or his agent where possible of such detention.
- 7. An inspector may give such instructions as he may consider necessary for the treatment or destruction of any plant or seed, or the container thereof, which he may suspect to be infected with, or constitute an obstacle to the proper control of, any pest or disease, and for the destruction of any parasitic plant. Such instructions shall be complied with by the owner or person in possession of such plant, seed or container within such period as may be specified by the inspector. An inspector may cause such treatment or destruction to be carried out at the expense of the owner or person in possession of such plant, seed or container in the event of either of those persons failing to carry out such instructions.
- 8. The Director of Agriculture may prohibit the movement within the Colony of any plant or seed and of coffee in any form whatsoever which may be diseased, or which he may suspect of being diseased or likely to spread disease, and he may prohibit for any prescribed period the planting or growing

of any plant or crop or variety thereof which he may consider likely to hinder the prevention of the spread and the proper control of any disease or pest.

- 9. Any owner or occupier of land who shall become aware of the existence of a disease or a pest upon such land shall forthwith notify the Director of Agriculture thereof and shall also send him specimens of such disease or pest.
- 10. No person shall sell, offer for sale, or in any way dispose of or receive any plant or seed, if the same is infected with any pest or disease.
- 11. Any person who without lawful excuse obstructs any inspector in the discharge of his duties under these rules, or who refuses to permit an inspector to examine any plant or seed, or who refuses to carry out the instructions of an inspector in the discharge of his duties under these Rules, or who otherwise contravenes the provisions of these Rules shall be guilty of an offence and shall on conviction be liable to a fine not exceeding one hundred pounds or in default of payment thereof to imprisonment of either description for a term not exceeding three months.
- 12. The Director of Agriculture may permit the admission into the Colony for scientific purposes of any plant seed, pest or disease.
- 13. Any plant or seed, or the container thereof, may be destroyed with or without compensation. The rate of any compensation to be paid shall be determined by the Director of Agriculture.

Importation of Plants, Seed, Fruit, etc.

- 14. All plants, seed and fruit, other than dried, canned or bottled fruits, imported into the Colony shall be examined by an inspector.
- 15. (a) Any package or parcel containing any plant or seed imported otherwise than by post, shall be delivered to an inspector by the Customs Department.
- (b) Where there is not a Customs officer at the place of importation, the importer shall deliver the package or parcel to an inspector before such package or parcel is opened.
- (c) Any package or parcel containing any plant or seed imported by post shall be delivered to an inspector by the Postal Department.
- (d) After examination and treatment (where necessary) such package or parcel shall be returned by such inspector to the Customs or Postal Department, as the case may be, for delivery to the addressee, except where such package, parcel, plant or seed is destroyed under the instructions of such inspector.
- 16. No compensation shall be paid in respect of any package, parcel, plant or seed destroyed under Rule 15 (d).
- 17. Any package or parcel containing any imported plant or seed shall bear on the outside thereof a label on which shall be set forth the following particulars:—
 - (a) The full name of the kind and variety and the place of origin of such plant or seed; and
 - (b) the name and address of the nursery or person supplying such plant or seed.

- 18. Except under a permit signed by the Director of Agriculture first obtained, and in accordance with any special condition which may be stated on such permit, the importation of the following plants, seeds, etc., is prohibited:—
 - (1) Peach stones.
- (2) Apple or pear stocks or cuttings. The term "stocks" shall include young rooted plants for budding or grafting purposes.
- (3) Potatoes. Permission, however, to import seed potatoes from the United Kingdom will only be granted if the consignment complies with the three following paragraphs:—
 - (a) The variety thereof is included in a list published by the Ministry of Agriculture of England and Wales of varieties immune from wart disease (Synchytrium endobioticum);
 - (b) the consignment thereof is accompanied by a certificate under the seal of either of the Boards of Agriculture of England, Scotland or Ireland, that wart disease has not been known to exist or is no longer in existence within a radius of five miles from the place where the tubers thereof were grown; and
 - (c) such consignment is accompanied by a declaration on oath by the consignor thereof that all the tubers of such seed potatoes were grown in the place mentioned in such certificate.
- (4) Citrus trees and citrus fruits other than citrus fruit grown on the islands of Zanzibar and Pemba.
 - (5) Gooseberry and current (*Ribes*). Stocks or cuttings.
 - (6) Sugar cane.
 - (7) Buckthorn and barberry.
 - (8) Vines or vitaceæ.
 - (9) Tea seeds or plants.
- (10) Cotton seed, except in transit for re-export. Permission, however, to import cotton seed will be granted if—
 - (a) imported into the Colony for use therein through Kilindini, Mombasa, or any other port or place of entry as may be approved by the Director of Agriculture on the application of the importer;
 - (b) the consignment thereof is accompanied by a certificate under the seal of the Department of Agriculture of the country from which it is consigned to the effect that it has been fumigated within one month before consignment to the Colony or that it is free from pest or disease.

All cotton seed unaccompanied by a certificate as specified in paragraph (b) hereof shall be delivered by the importer or his agent to an inspector for fumigation at the port or place of entry (or elsewhere as may be directed by the Director of Agriculture) and shall be removed by the importer or his agent immediately after such fumigation.

Any cotton seed imported in contravention of this clause may be detained and destroyed or otherwise dealt with as the Director of Agriculture may direct.

(11) Banana plants.

Maize.

- 19. The Director of Agriculture may from time to time by order to be published in the Gazette direct that any owner or occupier or manager of any land (in the case of forest or railway land the forest officer or railway officer in charge of that area shall be deemed to be the occupier) who plants or permits to be planted maize in such area or areas of the Colony as may be defined by the Director of Agriculture in such order shall, within fourteen days of such planting, give notice of such planting to such officer of the Department of Agriculture as the Director of Agriculture shall in such order specify. Such notice shall state the exact locality in which the maize has been planted and the acreage planted.
- 20. No person shall plant or permit to be planted any maize on any farm within such areas as are defined in the order referred to above unless he shall, prior to such planting, have destroyed or caused to be destroyed all maize roots, stalks and shelled cores which may have been on any such farm immediately prior to such planting as aforesaid, and no person shall permit any maize of the description known as "volunteer" maize to grow or be grown on any such farm provided that when shelled cores are reasonably required for fuel their destruction shall not be compulsory if such shelled cores are stored in a dry building to the satisfaction of an inspector.
- 21. No owner or lessee of any unoccupied farm within such areas as are defined in the order referred to above shall permit any person to plant maize thereon without the authority in writing of the District Commissioner of the district in which the farm is situated, and where this permission is granted such owner or lessee shall be responsible for the carrying out of the two last preceding Rules.
- 22. The Diseases of Plants Prevention Rules, appearing at page 1358 of the Revised Subsidiary Legislation, as amended by the Subsidiary Legislation (Operation) Rules, 1928 (Government Notice No. 1 of 1929) are hereby revoked.

GOVER NMENT NOTICE No 342.

THE DISEASES OF PLANTS PREVENTION ORDINANCE.

Rules.

IN EXERCISE of the powers conferred upon him by section 3 of the Diseases of Plants Prevention Ordinance (Chapter 155 of the Revised Edition), His Excellency the Governor in Council has been pleased to make the following Rules:—

- 1. These Rules may be cited as "the Diseases of Plants Prevention (Coffee) Rules, 1930" and shall come into force on the first day of June, 1930.
- 2. In these Rules, unless the context otherwise requires—
- "coffee plantation" shall include any land on which a coffee bush or coffee plant is growing whether the land is used solely as a coffee plantation or not;
- "Director" means the person for the time being holding the office of Director of Agriculture;
- "inspector" means any person appointed by the Director by notice in the Gazette as an inspector for the purposes of these Rules.

MOVEMENT OF COFFEE PLANTS.

- 3. No person shall move or cause to be moved any coffee plant from any of the administrative districts of Nairobi, Fort Hall and Kiambu (as defined by Proclamation No. 54 of February 25th, 1924), or from that part of the Machakos District known as the Donyo Sabuk area, bounded on the west, north and east by the Athi River and on the south by the line of meridian 1° 15" south, to any other part of the Colony: Provided that nothing in this Rule shall be deemed to prohibit the movement of coffee plants within or between the districts mentioned in this Rule, with the following exceptions:—
 - (a) No coffee plants shall be moved from the administrative districts of Kiambu, Nairobi or Fort Hall, into the Donyo Sabuk area as defined above.
 - (b) Coffee plants may be moved under a permit signed by the Director first obtained and in accordance with any special conditions which may be stated on such permit to any other part of the Colony from the Limuru area, more particularly described as that portion of the Kiambu district included in the following boundary:—

Commencing at the most northern corner of the Kiambu native reserve on the (southern) Chania River;

thence bounded southerly by the western boundary of that reserve to the Kamiti River;

thence by that river down-stream to the north eastern corner of L.O. No. 126;

thence south-westerly by the Kiambu native reserve boundary to the Kenya and Uganda Railway eastern 100 ft. zone;

thence southerly by that zone to its intersection with the southern boundary of L.O. No. 4885 extended thereto;

thence westerly from that extended boundary to the south-west corner of that portion; thence by a straight line due north-west to its intersection into the western boundary of Kiambu administrative district;

thence northerly by that district boundary to the Chania River;

thence by that river down-stream to the point of commencement.

- 4. The Director may from time to time declare by notice in the Gazette, any area to be a "closed area" for the purposes of these Rules.
- 5. No person shall move or cause to be moved into a closed area any coffee plant, or any other plant being a host to any species of coffee mealy bug, as the Director may, from time to time by notice in the Gazette, define.

IMPORTATION OF COFFEE PLANTS AND COFFEE.

- 6. Except under a permit signed by the Director first obtained and in accordance with any special conditions which may be stated on such permit the importation into the Colony is prohibited of coffee plants, whether living or dead, coffee beans or coffee (except roasted coffee beans, ground coffee and coffee extract).
- 7. The provisions of the last preceding Rule shall not apply to:—
- (1) Coffee plants, coffee beans and coffee imported for transit through the Colony which may be so imported subject to the following conditions:—
 - (a) Coffee plants, coffee beans and coffee must be securely packed in cases or in sound bags of substantial sacking securely sewn with overlapping edges to the satisfaction of the Director.
 - (b) Every case or cover containing such plant, bean or coffee, must clearly show by prominent and legible markers thereon the country of origin and the place of importation into the Colony, and no such case or cover shall thereafter be opened within the Colony, except at a godown or cleaning mill licensed for that purpose by the Director.
 - (c) Should any case or cover containing such plants, beans or coffee become so damaged in course of transit through the Colony as to render it possible for any such plant, bean or coffee or any part thereof to escape therefrom, such case or cover or any such plant, bean or coffee therein or therefrom may, at the discretion of the Director, be destroyed. No compensation shall be payable in respect of such destruction.
- (2) Trade samples of coffee beans or coffee not exceeding one half-pound in weight, imported through the Department of Agriculture.

- (3) Trade samples consigned to merchants in Mombasa and Kilindini under the following conditions:—
 - (a) That such samples be registered on arrival and kept under such conditions as the Director may think fit.
 - (b) That all such samples be either despatched by post to a destination outside the Colony or if not further required for trade purposes handed to an inspector for destruction.
- (4) Any coffee plant, coffee beans or coffee imported in contravention of this and the last preceding Rule shall be liable to be detained and destroyed or otherwise dealt with as the Director may direct.

INSPECTION OF LAND WHERE COFFEE IS GROWING.

- 8. An inspector may, at any reasonable time, enter upon any lands, on which he has reason to believe that any coffee bush is growing, for the purpose of inspecting the same.
- 9. Whenever an inspector shall consider that any coffee bush is infected with any pest or disease or that the condition of any coffee bush or the state of any land on which any coffee bush is growing is such as may give rise to any pest or disease he may—
 - (a) if such land is occupied, require, in writing, the owner or occupier thereof to take such action with regard to such land or any coffee bush or bushes thereon as he may consider necessary or advisable to control or eradicate any such pest or disease, or to prevent the spread of such pest or disease; or
 - (b) if such land is unoccupied or appears to such inspector to be unoccupied, treat or destroy any or all coffee bushes thereon in such manner as to him may seem necessary or advisable.
- 10. (1) Whenever under the powers conferred by Rule 9 an inspector shall require an owner or occupier to take any particular action with regard to any land or coffee bush thereon, he shall specify such period as to him may seem reasonable within which such action shall be completed.
- (2) If such owner or occupier shall fail to carry out such requisition the inspector may cause such treatment or destruction to be carried out at the expense of the owner or occupier.
- (3) Service of such requisition sent by post to such owner or occupier (or to the manager or person appearing to such inspector to be the manager of such land) shall be deemed to be good service upon the said owner or occupier.
- (4) When a requisition is to be applied to a whole district or locality and the Director is satisfied that considerable difficulty would be experienced in serving individual notices on owners, occupiers or managers, it shall be sufficient prominently to exhibit such requisition at the post office or post offices normally serving such locality and to publish such requisition in a newspaper circulating in the area, and in the Gazette.
- 11. The Director may divide each district where coffee is grown into groups and may number such groups. Each group shall embrace plantations of coffee under similar climatic conditions and the Director may place each farm in such group as appears to him suitable.

- 12. Each separate coffee plantation shall, where practicable, be included in a group and it shall be the duty of the owner of such plantation to ensure that his plantation is included in its appropriate group.
- 13. All the coffee of the terminating crop shall be stripped from the trees and such stripping shall be completed not later than a date which may be notified by the Director for each group: Provided that the Director may vary the date for an individual plantation if he is satisfied on representations made that good reason is shown therefor and that the Director may from time to time define for each group the meaning of the words "terminating crop."
- 14. Before the date notified for the completion of stripping, all coffee of any description including coffee lying on the ground in the plantation, around the factory, pulping station or drying ground, except coffee permitted under Rule 13, to remain on the trees, shall be collected. All coffee collected as aforesaid shall be disposed of within thirty days of the date notified, either through the normal commercial channels or by burning: Provided that all coffee infected with Stephanoderes (coffee bean borer) and/or the longicorn beetle Sophronica sp. shall forthwith be either burned or otherwise treated as ordered by the inspector and all Stephanoderes and/or Sophronica beetles, larvæ, pupæ and viable eggs shall be destroyed.
- 15. All loose coffee of every description on or near railway stations, godowns, cleaning mills and on or near any other place where coffee may be spilled, shall be collected and burnt regularly before the first day of each month. Failure to do so shall constitute an offence under these Rules on the part of the person in charge of such station, godown, mill or other place.
- 16. No person shall apply any coffee pulp or other coffee refuse to land on which any coffee plant is growing until such pulp has been rotted for such length of time as will ensure the death of any living Stephanoderes beetles and the destruction of any eggs present in such refuse.
- 17. No person shall dispose of any coffee for seed purposes unless such coffee shall have been inspected and certified as free from pests and diseases by an inspector authorized in that behalf by the Director. Each bag or container shall be sealed on being certified as aforesaid.
- 18. No person shall move any coffee from the plantation on which it was grown to any warehouse or other place and no person shall receive into any warehouse or other place any coffee so moved unless—
 - (1) such warehouse or other place is licensed for that purpose in accordance with the provisions of these Rules; or
 - (2) a permit for such movement has been granted by the Director or other person authorized by him in that behalf:

Provided that-

(a) coffee being despatched to a licensed warehouse or other place, or coffee intended for immediate export, may be delivered for such purpose at a railway station;

- (b) trade samples not exceeding ½ lb. in weight may be forwarded to merchants under the following conditions—
 - (i) that such samples be registered on arrival and kept under such conditions as the Director may think fit;
 - (ii) that all such samples be either despatched by post to a destination outside the Colony or if not further required for trade purposes handed to an inspector for destruction.
- 19. Special conditions applicable to the storage of coffee in licensed warehouses may be imposed by the Director who may also decline to licence any warehouse unless he is satisfied that such warehouse contains facilities for the treatment of coffee, and for the destruction of Stephanoderes and/or Sophronica either by fumigation or by heating or by any other method approved by the Director. All such licensed warehouses as aforesaid shall be subject to inspection at any reasonable time by an inspector.
- 20. If any coffee is found to be infested with Stephanoderes and/or Sophronica in a warehouse the keeper of such warehouse shall forthwith notify the Director of the fact and shall state the name of the owner of the farm from which such coffee was delivered.
- 21. Any coffee found to be infected with Stephanoderes and/or Sophronica during the period it is in the warehouse shall together with the bags containing it and any other coffee immediately in contact with it, be immediately effectively treated to the satisfaction of an inspector for the destruction of living Stephanoderes and/or Sophronica beetles, larvæ, pupæ and viable eggs.
- 22. On and after the 1st July, 1930, no coffee shall be moved from a plantation, warehouse or other place, except in new standard coffee bags, provided that coffee consigned from a plantation or a licensed warehouse for immediate export to Canada or the United States of America may be exported in new standard coffee bags or in new 28 in. x 38 in. Dundee bags.
- 23. A "standard coffee bag" shall be a "double warp light cee bag", measuring 40 in. x 28 in., weighing 2 lb., hemmed at mouth, 7 in. x 9 in./8 in. x 8 in.
- 24. Any person who without lawful excuse obstructs an inspector in the discharge of his duties under these Rules, or who refuses to carry out the instructions of an inspector in the discharge of his duties under these Rules, or who otherwise contravenes the provisions of these Rules shall be guilty of an offence and shall on conviction be liable to a fine not exceeding £100 or in default of payment thereof to imprisonment of either description for a term not exceeding three months.
- 25. The Diseases of Plants Prevention (Coffee) Rules, 1928, and the Diseases of Plants Prevention (Coffee) (Amendment) Rules, 1929, are hereby revoked.

THE STAGE PLAYS AND CINEMATOGRAPH EXHIBITIONS ORDINANCE.

Rules.

IN EXERCISE of the powers conferred upon him by the Stage Plays and Cinematograph Exhibitions Ordinance (Chapter 73 of the Revised Edition), His Excellency the Governor has been pleased to make the following Rules:—

- 1. These Rules may be cited as "the Cinematograph Short title. Films Censorship Rules, 1930," and shall come into force on the day of , 19 .
- 2. (1) For the purposes of these Rules there shall be Film Censorship Board (hereinafter referred to Board.

 as "the Board" which shall consist of—
 - (a) a person to be appointed by the Governor, and to be paid for his services such sum as the Governor may from time to time think fit, and who shall be chairman;
 - (b) the Chief Native Commissioner, or an administrative officer deputed by the Chief Native Commissioner;
 - (c) the Director of Education, or an officer of the Education Department deputed by the Director of Education;
 - (d) one of a panel of four European women to be appointed by the Governor.
 - (2) Two members of the Board shall form a quorum.
- (3) Questions before the Board shall be decided by the majority of votes of the members present and voting, and in the case of equality of votes the chairman shall have a second or casting vote.
- (4) Only one of the panel of four European women shall be entitled to vote at any meeting of the Board.
- (5) In the absence of the chairman from any meeting the members present at such meeting shall elect one of their number to act as chairman for the purposes of such meeting.

Duties of Board.

- 3. (1) It shall be the duty of the Board to examine every cinematograph picture duly submitted to it for examination with a view to such cinematograph picture being approved for purposes of exhibition to the public.
- (2) On the completion of the examination of any cinematograph picture the Board may—
 - (a) approve the same for exhibition to the public;
 - (b) refuse to approve the same;
 - (c) agree to approve the same subject to such excisions from the cinematograph picture as it thinks proper.
- (3) If the approval of the Board is given subject to the making of any excisions from the cinematograph picture as aforesaid, the Board shall have authority to make such excisions and to retain in the possession of the Board the excised parts.
- (4) The approval of the Board shall not be given with respect to any cinematograph picture or any part thereof which in its opinion depicts any matter that is contrary to public order or decency, or the exhibition of which would for any other reason be undesirable in the public interest. In the case of a cinematograph picture the exhibition of which is intended to be accompanied by a mechanical reproduction of sound (whether or not the device or arrangement for such reproduction is an integral part of the cinematograph picture) the Board may take such reproduction of sound into consideration in determining whether or not the cinematograph picture should be approved, or in determining what excisions, if any, should be made therefrom.
- (5) The approval by the Board of any cinematograph picture may be absolute, or may be given subject to a condition that the cinematograph picture may be exhibited only to non-Africans.

4. If any matter other than a certificate of approval is added to a cinematograph picture after it has been approved cinematograph by the Board, the picture shall, before exhibition or further picture after exhibition, be again submitted to the Board for examination, exhibition to and unless and until it has been again approved by the Board it shall be deemed not to have been approved.

5. Any person who, in any place for admission to which a charge is made in respect of any person or persons, or in any place to which the public are admitted, whether or not a charge is made for admission, exhibits any cinematograph picture or part of a cinematograph picture that has not been approved by the Board in the form in which it is so exhibited, shall be liable, on conviction before a magistrate, for every such offence, to a penalty of thirty pounds or to imprisonment of either description for a period not exceeding three months,

Censorship of posters and other advertising matter.

- The foregoing provisions of these Rules as to the censorship and exhibition of cinematograph picture shall apply to the exhibition of posters and other advertising matter used or intended to be used in relation to any cinematograph picture or pictures.
- 7. If any cinematograph picture contains any writing in any language other than English or if any poster or other advertising matter relating to any cinematograph picture is wholly or in part in any language other than English the Board may demand a true translation of such writing, poster

or other advertising matter in English, certified to the satisfaction of the Board, or may submit such writing, posters or other advertising matter for the examination and report of such person or persons as they may appoint for such purpose.

An appeal shall lie to the Governor in respect of any Right of 8. An appeal snall lie to the Governor in respect of any appeal from act or decision of the Board done or made or omitted to be decisions of done or made under the provisions of these Rules, and the Board. Governor may confirm, disallow or vary such act or decision of the Board or direct the Board to act in such manner as to the Governor shall seem fit, subject to the provisions of these Rules.

- 9. No licensing officer shall issue a licence for the exhibition of a programme of cinematograph pictures unless each picture in respect of which a licence is demanded has first been approved by the Board under these Rules.
- 10. For every licence in respect of the exhibition of a programme of cinematograph pictures a fee of ten shillings shall be charged:

Provided that the Governor may permit the free exhibition of any cinematograph picture which is, in his opinion, shown for educational or medical purposes.

11. Rule 16 (2) (b) appearing on page 370 of the Revised Subsidiary Legislation is hereby revoked.

THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT (DISTRICT COUNCILS) ORDINANCE, 1928.

NOTICE.

LOCUST REPORT FOR TWO WEEKS ENDING 11-6-30.

ONE swarm of flying locusts was reported at the end of May in the Trans Nzoia District, but there is no indication that any damage to crops was done. At present it seems that but little danger may be expected from the locust menace in the near future.

Northern Frontier Province.—The District Commissioner, Marsabit, reports the complete destruction by hoppers of practically all vegetation in and near the township of Marsabit, in spite of combined efforts to combat the menace. The locusts have now reached the flying stage, and moved off in a northerly and north-easterly direction.

Baringo.—Hoppers in these locations have been completely destroyed. Operations are continuing in the Njemps area, both against hoppers and young flying swarms. The tendency among those locusts that have escaped destruction is to fly in a northerly direction.

Turkana.—The previous report of laying in North Turkana has been confirmed by the presence of hopper bands between Lake Rudolf and the Puch mountains. In South Turkana there are small scattered bands in all the stages of maturity in the Khalasata and Turkwell valleys; the natives, under the general supervision of the administrative officers, are dealing with the situation as far as they can.
