His Excellency the Governor in Council has approved of the following Bill being introduced into the Legislative Council.

J. F. G. TROUGHTON, Acting Clerk of the Legislative Council.

A Bill to make Special Provision in Regard to the Pension of Walter Harragin.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of Kenya, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

- 1. This Ordinance may be cited as the Harragin Short title. Pension Ordinance, 1934.
- 2. Notwithstanding the proviso to Regulation 10 of the European Officers' Pensions (Consolidation) Regulations, 1930, the service of Walter Harragin from the 5th day of October, 1933, to the 24th day of January, 1934, both days inclusive, shall be deemed to be pensionable service for the purposes of the European Officers' Pensions Ordinance, 1927, as if during that period he were the substantive holder of the office of Attorney General, and shall count for pension and gratuity under the said Ordinance.

Pensionability of service of W. Harragin from the 5th October, 1933, to the 24th January, 1934.

The definitions of 'Instrument' and 'Trade machinery' which it is proposed to amend:—

2. In this Ordinance unless the context otherwise requires:—

"Instrument" means any instrument given to secure the payment of money or the performance of some obligation and includes any bill of sale, mortgage, lien, or any other document that transfers or purports to transfer the property in or right to the possession of chattels, whether permanently or temporarily, whether absolutely or conditionally, and whether by way of sale, security, pledge, gift, settlement, or lease, and also the following:—

- (a) Inventories of chattels with receipt thereto attached.
- (b) Receipts for purchase-money of chattels.
- (c) Other assurances of chattels.
- (d) Declarations of trust without transfer.
- (e) Powers of attorney, authorities, or licences to take possession of chattels as security for any debt.
- (f) Any agreement, whether intended to be followed by the execution of any other instrument or not, by which a right in equity to any chattels, or to any charge or security thereon or thereover, is conferred.

A Bill to Amend the Chattels Transfer Ordinance, 1930.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of Kenya, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:

- This Ordinance may be cited as the Chattels Short title. Transfer (Amendment) Ordinance, 1934, and shall be read as one with the Chattels Transfer Ordinance, 1930, herein- No. 24 of 1930. after referred to as the Principal Ordinance.
- 2. Section 2 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby Amendment of amended by deleting the second paragraph lettered (a) in the section 2 of the Principal definition of "instrument" (which paragraph immediately Ordinance. succeeds the line reading "'Instrument' does not include the following:—") and substituting therefor the following paragraph:—

"(a) Securities over, or leases of, fixtures (except 'trade machinery' as hereinafter defined, when mortgaged or charged apart from the land to which it is attached) when mortgaged, charged or leased in any mortgage, charge or lease of any freehold or leasehold interest in any land or building to which they are affixed, and whether or not such fixtures are specifically included in such mortgage, charge or lease by mention thereof in separate words"

and by deleting the definition of "trade machinery" and substituting therefor the following:-

"Trade machinery" means the machinery used in or attached to any factory or workshop as hereinbefore defined and machinery and plant used in connexion with the production, preparation or manufacture of agricultural products, but does not include-

- "Instrument" does not include the following:-
- (a) Securities over, or leases of, fixtures (except "trade machinery" as hereinafter defined), when mortgaged or leased in any mortgage or lease of any freehold or leasehold interest in any land or building to which they are affixed, and whether or not such fixtures are separately mortgaged or leased by mention thereof in separate words, and whether or not power is given by such mortgage or lease to sever such fixtures from the land or building to which they are affixed without otherwise taking possession of or dealing with such land or building.
- (b) Assignments for the benefit of the creditors of the person making the same.
- (c) Transfers of or agreements to transfer instruments by way of security.
- (d) Transfers or assignments of any ship or vessel or any share thereof.
- (e) Transfers of chattels in the ordinary course of business of any trade or calling.
- (f) Debentures and interest coupons issued by any Government or local authority.
- (g) Bills of sale of chattels in any foreign parts, or at sea.
- (h) Bills of lading, warehouse-keepers' certificates, warrants, or orders for the delivery of chattels, entries in auctioneers' books, or any other document used in the ordinary course of business as proof of the possession or control of chattels, or authorising or purporting to authorise, either by indorsement or delivery, the possessor of such document to transfer or receive the chattels thereby represented.
- (i) Debentures and interest coupons issued by any company or other corporate body and secured upon the capital stock or chattels of such company or other corporate body.
- (j) Mortgages or charges granted or created by a company incorporated or registered under the Companies Ordinance.

- (a) the fixed motive powers, such as the waterwheels and steam and other engines and the steam boilers, donkey engines and other fixed appurtenances of the said motive powers;
- (b) the fixed power machinery (such as the shafts, wheels, drums and their fixed appurtenances) for transmitting the action of the motive powers to the other machinery, fixed and loose; or
- (c) the pipes for steam, gas and water

(k) Hire-purchase agreements.

"Trade machinery" means the machinery used in or attached to any factory or workshop as hereinbefore defined, but does not include—

- (a) the fixed motive powers, such as the waterwheels, and steam and other engines, and the steam boilers, donkey-engines, and other fixed appurtenances of the said motive powers;
- (b) the fixed power machinery (such as the shafts, wheels, drums, and their fixed appurtenances) for transmitting the action of the motive powers to the other machinery, fixed and loose; or
- (c) the pipes for steam, gas, and water.

(Note.—The words in italics were deleted by Ordinance No. 36 of 1932, but they are now to be revived—see Clause 3 of this Bill.)

3. The Chattels Transfer (Amendment) Ordinance, Repeal of 1932, is hereby repealed, and the provisions of the Principal Ordinance repealed by the said amending Ordinance are and revival of hereby revived, and shall be deemed to have been of full force and effect as from the date of commencement of the Principal Ordinance. Ordinance: Provided that nothing in this section contained shall be deemed to invalidate or render void any mortgage or charge granted or created by a company incorporated or registered under the Companies Ordinance or the Companies Ordi- Cap. 93. nance, 1933, and registered as a chattels mortgage prior to the No. 28 of 1933. commencement of this Ordinance.

OBJECTS AND REASONS.

The provisions of the Registration of Titles (Amendment) Ordinance, 1933, made it clear that fixtures attached to land the subject of a charge under the Registration of Titles Ordinance will be available as security for the holder of such charge as if the transaction has been effected by a legal mortgage.

It is in consequence necessary to amend the Chattels Transfer Ordinance, 1930, to obviate the possibility of fixtures attached to land, which will now form part of a chargee's security, being also security for money advanced on chattels mortgage.

This is effected by Clause 2 of this Bill.

Clause 3 is necessitated by the fact that in 1932 an Ordinance was passed to provide for the creation of chattels mortgages by companies. That Ordinance was enacted because certain chattels mortgages granted by companies had been registered in error, but the fact was overlooked that other companies which, with a proper appreciation of the law, had registered such charges under section 109 of the Companies Ordinance might be adversely affected by their failure to register chattels mortgages as well.

Clause 3 provides that a company cannot grant or create a chattels mortgage, but at the same time preserves the validity of such chattels mortgages which have been accepted for registration.

A Bill to Amend the Interpretation and General Clauses Ordinance.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of Kenya, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

- 1. This Ordinance may be cited as the Interpretation Short title. and General Clauses (Amendment) Ordinance, 1934, and shall be read as one with the Interpretation and General Cap. 1. Clauses Ordinance (Chapter 1 of the Revised Edition), hereinafter referred to as the Principal Ordinance.
- 2. The Principal Ordinance is hereby amended by the addition of the following section:—

"26. Where in any Ordinance powers are conferred Power of on or duties are appointed to be performed by a Provincial officers in Commissioner, then, in districts which are not included extra-proin any province, such powers shall be exercised or such duties performed by the officer in charge of such district, and in any such case the word 'province' shall be construed as if it were equivalent to the word 'district' ".

Section 11 of the Principal Ordinance which it is proposed to amend:—

Sentences requiring confirmation by Supreme Court.

- 11. (1) No sentence imposed on a native by any subordinate court exceeding six months' imprisonment (whether such sentence shall be a substantive sentence of imprisonment or a sentence of imprisonment in default of payment of a fine or a combination of such sentences) or twelve strokes shall be carried into effect, and no fine exceeding fifty pounds shall be levied, until the record of the case or a certified copy thereof has been transmitted to and the sentence has been confirmed by the Supreme Court.
- (2) The Supreme Court may exercise the same powers in confirmation as are conferred upon it in revision by Part XI of this Code.

Section 289 of the Principal Ordinance which it is proposed to amend:—

Close of case for prosecution.

- 289. (1) When the evidence of the witnesses for the prosecution has been concluded, and the statement (if any) of the accused person has been given in evidence, the accused person shall be asked whether he means to give or adduce evidence.
- (2) If he says that he does not, the advocate for the prosecution may sum up the case against the accused person; and if the court considers that there is no evidence that the accused person committed the offence, it may then, in a case

A Bill to Amend the Criminal Procedure Code.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of Kenya, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the Criminal Pro-Short title. cedure Code (Amendment) Ordinance, 1934, and shall be read as one with the Criminal Procedure Code, hereinafter referred No. 11 of 1930. to as the Principal Ordinance.

2. Section 11 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby Amendment of amended by the addition at the end of sub-section (1) of the section 11 of following proviso:—

"Provided that where a sentence of corporal punishment is imposed by any subordinate court in addition to a sentence of imprisonment or detention such sentence shall be subject to the confirmation of the Supreme Court as is provided in this sub-section and no such sentence of corporal punishment shall be carried into effect until confirmed by the Supreme Court."

3. Section 289 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby Amendment of amended as follows:—

- (a) By the substitution of the following sub-section for Ordinance. sub-section (1) thereof:—
 - "(1) When the evidence of the witnesses for the prosecution has been concluded, and the statement or evidence on oath (if any) of the accused person before the committing court has been given in evidence, the court shall inform the accused person of his right to address the court, either personally or by his advocate (if any), to give evidence on his own behalf or to make an unsworn

- (3) If the accused person, or any one of several accused persons, says that he means to give or adduce evidence, and the court considers that there is no evidence that the accused committed the offence, the court may then, in a case tried with the aid of assessors, record a finding, or, in a case tried by a jury, direct the jury to return a verdict, of not guilty.
- (4) If the accused person, or any one of several accused persons, says that he means to give or adduce evidence, and the court considers that there is evidence that he committed the offence, the court shall call on the accused person to enter on his defence.

verbal statement and to call witnesses in his defence, and in all cases shall require him or his advocate (if any) to state whether it is intended to call any witnesses as to fact other than the accused person himself. Upon being informed thereof the judge shall record the same."

(b) By the substitution of the words:—

"If the accused person informs the court that he does not wish to exercise any of the rights mentioned in the last preceding sub-section"

for the words—

"If he says that he does not" which occur in the first line of sub-section (2) thereof.

OBJECTS AND REASONS.

The objects of this Bill are—

- (a) to ensure that where a sentence of corporal punishment in addition to a sentence of imprisonment or a fine is imposed by any subordinate court such sentence shall be subject to the confirmation of the Supreme Court, and that no such sentence of corporal punishment shall be carried out until confirmed by the Supreme Court; and
- (b) to provide for the unsworn statement by an accused person at his trial before the Supreme Court. His Majesty's Court of Appeal for Eastern Africa has recently pointed out this defect and the question of amending the law has been considered to be of sufficient importance to justify a short Bill being introduced at an early date.

A Bill to Provide for the Change of Titles of Certain Public Officers.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of Kenya, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Short title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the Public Officers (Change of Titles) Ordinance, 1934.

Substitution of new title of a public officer. 2. Wherever the title of the public officer set out in the first column of the Schedule hereto appears in any Ordinance, Rule, Regulation, Order or Notice now in force it shall be deemed to be replaced by the corresponding title set out in the second column of the said Schedule.

Provision for future change of titles.

3. Whenever any change of title of any public officer occurs after the coming into operation of this Ordinance the Governor, if occasion requires, may, by notice in the Gazette, make any necessary substitution in or addition to the said Schedule and the provisions of section 2 of this Ordinance shall apply accordingly in conformity with every such substitution or addition.

A Bill to Impose a Levy on the Export of Sisal Fibre and to Regulate the Expenditure of the Proceeds thereof and of Sums Granted for the Purpose for the Improvement of the Sisal Industry.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of Kenya, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the Sisal Industry Short title and Ordinance, 1934, and shall come into operation on such date as the Governor may, by proclamation in the Gazette, appoint.

commencement.

2. In this Ordinance—

Interpretation.

"committee" means the committee constituted by section 7 of this Ordinance;

"Director" means the Director of Agriculture;

"fund" means the fund established by section 6 of this Ordinance;

"sisal fibre" means the fibrous product derived from the plant Agave rigida, var. sisalana and allied species.

3. There shall be paid to the Commissioner of Customs Levy on a levy on all sisal fibre produced in and exported from the sisal fibre Colony.

- 4. Any person who exports or attempts to export from Penalty. the Colony any sisal fibre without paying such levy thereon shall be guilty of an offence, and shall be liable, on conviction before a magistrate of the first-or second class, to a penalty not exceeding one hundred pounds or to imprisonment for a period not exceeding six months.
- 5. (1) Not later than one month before the date on which Governor may this Ordinance is brought into operation the Governor, with alter rate of the advice of the committee, shall by order fix the rate of such levy and such rate shall remain in force until a new rate is imposed in manner hereinafter provided.

- (2) Not later than the 30th day of September in any year the Governor, with the advice of the committee, may by order alter the rate of such levy, and such altered rate shall come into force on the 1st day of January next following the date of such order.
- (3) The rate of such levy shall in no event exceed the sum of ten cents of a shilling on each hundredweight or part of a hundredweight of sisal fibre produced in and exported from the Colony.

Establishment of fund.

- 6. (1) There shall be established a fund which shall consist of—
 - (a) all moneys collected from the levy on sisal fibre at the rate for the time being in force under this Ordinance;
 - (b) a grant-in-aid from the Government of a sum equal in amount to the sum collected from the said levy on sisal fibre; provided that the grant-in-aid payable in respect of the first year of operation of this Ordinance shall not exceed the sum of one thousand pounds; and provided further that in respect of any succeeding year any sum which would otherwise be payable by the Government in excess of one thousand pounds shall be such sum as may be determined by the Governor in Council;
 - (c) such other contributions or donations as may from time to time be made to the fund.
- (2) Such fund shall be lodged with the Treasurer, and shall be placed by him to a separate suspense account in the name of the Director, who shall, with the consent of the committee, apply such moneys to the accomplishment of the objects and purposes of the fund.
- (3) The Director shall keep account of the receipts and disbursements in connexion with the fund and shall render to the committee statements showing such revenues and expenditure as required by them.
- (4) Within a reasonable time after the expiration of each year the committee shall cause to be prepared a statement of the receipts and disbursements during the previous year, and such statement shall be subject to such audit and published in such manner as the Governor may direct.

- 7. (1) There shall be constituted a committee to be Constitution known as the Sisal Industry Committee, which shall consist of—
 - (a) the Director of Agriculture, who shall be chairman;
 - (b) four members of whom one shall be a person associated with the sisal industry to be nominated by the Governor, and three shall be nominated by the Kenya Sisal Growers' Association.
- (2) The members of the committee, other than the Chairman, shall hold office for one year, and each such member shall be eligible for renomination to the committee at the expiration of each year.
- (3) If any member of the committee resign or die the authority which nominated such member may nominate another person to take the place of such member, and such person shall hold office until the expiry of the term of office of the member in whose place he is nominated and shall thereafter be eligible for renomination to the committee.
- (4) If any member of the committee is absent from the Colony for a period of more than four months during his term of office the authority which nominated such member may appoint a fit and proper person to serve on the committee during the absence of such member.
- (5) In the absence of the Director from any meeting of the committee a chairman for such meeting shall be chosen by the members present.
- (6) The Director or, in his absence, the chairman shall have a casting vote.
- (7) At its first meeting the committee shall fix the number required for a quorum and make rules for the conduct of its business.
- (8) The Director shall at any time summon a meeting of the committee upon receipt of a requisition signed by two members of the committee calling upon him to do so.
- 8. The committee shall be a body corporate having per. The committee petual succession and a common seal, and shall be capable in law of suing and being sued, and of purchasing, holding and alienating land and other property movable or immovable.

Purposes to which funds may be devoted.

- **9.** The fund shall be devoted to all or any of the following purposes—
 - (a) experiment, investigation and research in connexion with the sisal industry;
 - (b) the study of the economics of the production of sisal;
 - (c) experiments in connexion with the improvement of machinery or plant for the production of sisal fibre;
 - (d) the employment of such staff as the committee may think fit for the purpose of carrying out its functions;
 - (e) such contribution towards the maintenance of the Kenya Sisal Growers' Association as the committee may from time to time determine;
 - (f) the payment of travelling and out-of-pocket expenses to the members of the committee at rates to be approved by the Governor;
 - (g) any other service which in the opinion of the committee is calculated to promote the welfare of the sisal industry and the more economic production of sisal fibre.

Commissioner of Customs powers of exemption.

10. The Commissioner of Customs on the advice of the Director may exempt any consignments of sisal fibre exported for exhibition or experiment from payment of the levy imposed by this Ordinance.

Duration of Ordinance.

11. This Ordinance shall continue in force until the 31st day of December, 1938, and shall then expire provided that the Governor may by proclamation with the approval of the Legislative Council declare that this Ordinance shall remain in force until a date to be fixed in such proclamation.

OBJECTS AND REASONS.

This Bill provides for a levy on all sisal fibre produced in and exported from the Colony not exceeding ten cents per hundredweight or part thereof, the amount of such levy to be paid into a fund together with a grant-in-aid from the Government on a pound for pound basis.

The grant-in-aid is not to exceed £1,000 in respect of the first year and in any succeeding year to be determined, in respect of any sum payable in excess of £1,000, by the Governor in Council.

The fund is to be administered by a committee under the Chairmanship of the Director of Agriculture and is to be devoted to research in connexion with the sisal industry in accordance with the purposes set out in Clause 9 and in cooperation with the Tanganyika Territory where an Ordinance imposing an export tax on sisal for similar purposes was enacted in November, 1933.

The principles of the scheme provided for in the Bill were approved by the Agricultural Commission, 1929, and the Select Committee on the draft Estimates for 1930, recommended the introduction of legislation providing for the imposition of a levy, supplemented by a Government contribution. Financial difficulties then intervened and the scheme remained in abeyance until June, 1933, when it was revived jointly by the Kenya and Tanganyika Sisal Growers' Associations.

The provisions of the Bill are approved by the Kenya Sisal Growers' Association.

Clause 11 provides for expiry of the Ordinance on the 31st December, 1938, unless continued by proclamation with the approval of the Legislative Council.

Expenditure of public funds up to a maximum of £1,000 in 1934, and to a maximum of a sum equal to the proceeds of the levy in any succeeding year is entailed, if the provisions of the Bill become law.

Section 2 of the Principal Ordinance which it is proposed to amend:—

Interpretation.

2. (1) In this Ordinance unless the context otherwise requires:—

"collector" means a person appointed by the Treasurer to be a collector for any area or areas of the Colony;

"due date" means the time appointed for payment of the tax in accordance with the provisions of this Ordinance;

"taxable income" means the aggregate amount of the income of any taxpayer from all the sources specified in section 4 remaining after allowing the appropriate deductions and exemptions under this Ordinance;

"taxpayer" means an individual liable to tax under this Ordinance;

"year of assessment" means the period of twelve months commencing on the 1st day of January, 1933, and each succeeding period of twelve months.

(2) An individual shall be deemed to attain the age of eighteen on the eighteenth anniversary of his birth.

A Bill to Amend the Non-Native Poll Tax Ordinance, 1933.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of Kenya, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the Non-Native Poll Tax (Amendment) Ordinance, 1934, and shall be read as one with the Non-Native Poll Tax Ordinance, 1933, hereinafter referred to as the Principal Ordinance.

2. Section 2 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby amended—

 - (c) any pension, allowance, charge or annuity;
 - (d) rents, royalties, premiums and any other profit arising from property.

- (b) if he was during the year 1933 in the Colony for a period or periods amounting in all to six months or more and also in the Colony for any period during the year 1934 and leaves the Colony during the year 1934, and subsequently returns to the Colony; or
- (c) he comes to the Colony during the year 1934 intending to stay in the Colony for a period of six months or more.

- (c) the introduction of various minor changes which practical experience has proved to be necessary for the efficient and equitable collection of the tax.

LOCUST REPORT, 25TH JANUARY, 1934.

The Red Locust.—The swarm near Vanga, reported last week, moved down to the coast and is proceeding in a generally northerly direction along the coast-line. Rice, maize, sugar cane, muhogo (cassava) and coco-nut plantations have suffered extensive damage, and the locusts have feasted in mangrove swamps.

A large swarm entered Kenya near Taveta on the 21st January, and was observed to be flying southeast and south. A swarm, which may be the same, is reported to-day flying over Bura, twenty miles west of Voi.

Locusts were reported at Kajiado on the 23rd January; the full extent of the swarm is not yet known; the general direction of flight was westerly.

It is essential to obtain the fullest information concerning these and other swarms and observers are requested to report immediately to the Department of Agriculture the size and direction of flight of any swarms seen.

The Migratory Locust.—The position remains unchanged. Investigation of the Subukia infestation has shown that the hopper bands are very scattered and show definite signs of change to the solitary phase. Apart from Nakuru district the Colony is clear of this species.
