RABIES PROGRESS REPORT.

IT is satisfactory to report that no case of rabies has been reported since the last progress report was published in January, although two very suspicious cases occurred in the Nandi Reserve in jackals. Unfortunately the jackals escaped and no material was collected. In this area the bounty system of Sh. 1 for every jackal tail brought in many tails.

Poison baiting is still being carried out in certain native reserves in North and Central Kavirondo and in the Kibigori area. The Eldama Ravine area, which as mentioned in our last report was being baited, has produced fairly satisfactory results.

Most of the poisoning campaign is being withdrawn and in view of the present satisfactory position with regard to rabies it is not proposed to issue any more reports unless further outbreaks are reported and confirmed.

LOCUST REPORT, 1ST MARCH, 1934.

KENYA.

The Red Locust.

Coast.—The area of infestation has been enlarged this week by the movement of swarms northward from Malindi. These crossed the Tana River between Garsen and Kau flying in a north-easterly direction and were reported to be a few miles south-west of Witu on the 26th February. The situation in Kilifi, Digo and Voi remains much the same except that further swarms were reported to have crossed the border into Digo last week. The Shimba hills have remained constantly infested with flying swarms, apparently attracted by the forest. All efforts to shift them from this area in order to save some valuable maize have been unavailing.

Masai-Machakos.—The slow drift of locusts between Kapiti Plains and Sultan Hamud from Masai into Ukamba has continued, the general direction of flight being north-east. It is probable that very light swarms have moved towards Ngong and Nairobi, as a single specimen was seen and identified at Muthaiga on the 23rd after the heavy rain storm, and some have been reported on the M'bagathi road.

Narok-Sotik-Kisii.—Some extension of the area of infestation has occurred to the north-east, a light swarm having been reported flying north-east over Narok township on the 22nd February. The flight lasted half an hour.

Details are now to hand regarding the swarms reported last week to be circling in Kisii. A large swarm entered from Tanganyika about the 10th February, and was at Mirogi on the 12th; it left via Homa Bay on the 13th but stragglers have remained in many locations and scattered laying has occurred. Damage to crops is reported to be negligible.

No further report has been received from Trans Mara or Sotik.

A very small scattered swarm believed to be of red locusts passed over Muhoroni towards Songhor on the 24th. A few stragglers have been left at Muhoroni but not enough to do any harm.

General.—With the exception of the large swarms reported in Lamu district, little alteration has occurred in the three main areas of infestation in the Colony. Some extension of the areas has taken place by light diffuse swarms, not doing much damage. Egg-laying is general but no hatching has as yet been reported.

The Migratory Locust.

A very small and scattered band of hoppers—presumed to be of the migratory locust—was reported near the Uganda border at Busia on the 23rd February. The infestation is only slight, no damage has been done and the hoppers are being destroyed by beating.

TANGANYIKA TERRITORY.

The following extracts are taken from the Tanganyika Report for the week ending 15th February:—

Lake and Western Provinces.—The general situation is not very serious, flying swarms are small and laying is not of great density. The damage done by flyers to crops is nowhere really serious, and at present there is no cause for alarm.

Eastern Province. Dar es Salaam.—Position in southern half of Province satisfactory and operations may cease there at the end of the month. Northern half—heavy infestation.

Bagamoyo.—Southern half is heavily infested and laying has again occurred. Defensive measures are hampered by the acute famine conditions prevailing. The northern half is not so heavily infested.

Rufiji.—Further egg-laying is reported. Practically the whole district is infested.

Morogoro.—No further laying, hatching general, egg-digging is progressing. Considerable destruction of hoppers is being effected.

Tanga Province.—No report.

Northern Province.—It has been represented that calamity will arise if all hoppers in the Province are not killed. All necessary action is being taken, and it is reported that many egg pods in the Arusha district are parasitized.

It would be sound to take a view of the whole position and to realize that, however much money is spent and whatever effort within our compass is made, escapes are certain to be numerous, as many hopper bands will never be found. Calamity arose when flyers moved north over the Territory on a front stretching from the Lake to the Indian Ocean and laid here. Whilst every effort will be made, at reasonable cost, to reduce the intensity of the hopper stage, there is little possibility of destroying so many as to reduce the subsequent infestation of flyers to such small dimensions that natural causes will eliminate the remnants. No influx of bird life has been reported as yet, but in the Territory there should be a strong parasite infection, so that there is some hope of a fairly heavy natural reduction in numbers.

IMPERIAL PREFERENCE, INDIA—SUBMISSION OF INVOICES.

WITH reference to General Notice 1529, published in the Kenya Gazette, dated the 14th November, 1933, it is hereby notified for general information that His Majesty's Trade Commissioner in India has reported the introduction by the Government of India of a change in the procedure to be followed in respect of goods, consigned to India, for which preferential tariff treatment is claimed.

2. In order to assist the Customs authorities in guarding against fraudulent claims for preference and to protect importers of genuine Empire goods against fraudulent competition, the Central Board of Revenue has decided that in future a copy of the certified invoice tendered with the bill of entry shall be surrendered for retention by the Custom House. This requirement will involve the preparation of an additional copy of the invoice, where a copy is intended to be retained by the importer, and the Central Board of Revenue of India have asked that wide publicity may be given to this new rule in the Colonial Empire as well as in the United Kingdom.

3. The new procedure is to be brought into immediate operation, but it is understood that the Board of Revenue has directed the Collectors of Customs that for a period of three months from the 16th of December, 1933, locally prepared copies of invoices accompanying goods to be admitted into India as preferential rates of duty should be accepted in lieu of copies signed by the supplier or manufacturer, where these are not available.

If these amounts are not paid within the time stated the Commissioner of Lands may order that the deposit made by the grantee be forfeited, and the grantee shall have no further claim to the grant of the plots.


