LOCUST REPORT, 24TH MAY, 1934.

KENYA.

The Red Locust.

Coast Province.—From reports received from the special locust officer at Mombasa it would appear that the hopper infestation is heavy in the whole of the area from the Tanganyika border to Samburu, and that the most serious positions are in the vicinity of Ramisi and Mazeras. Beating, baiting and some spraying are all in active operation, but as some of the bands are in their third stage of development heavy and concentrated work will be required if control is to be established. Adequate supplies of poison and bait have been despatched to the Coast for distribution to the various centres. Very large numbers of bands have already been destroyed, principally by beating. Labour is plentiful and working well under supervision. Considerable discrimination has to be used in selecting the method of destruction in various districts, the prejudice against spraying and the broadcasting of poison bait being very marked in places where large numbers of native cattle and goats are present. The Elders in such districts have however been warned that unless beating is carried out thoroughly and systematically poison methods will have to be resorted to. In other districts, such as on sisal plantations, spraying is not feasible, and here baiting only is employed.

Though on the whole no extensive damage to crops is reported unconfirmed information has been received from Mudir-Gazi that crops have suffered rather heavily at Majigovi and Matofia; the two latter places are the only localities where flyers are reported. The following plants are stated to have been eaten: Maize, M'tama, Chiroko, Rice, Muhogo, Oleander and Mitata palm. Large quantities of birds of the finch and starling species ("Kuzi" and "Isingo") are taking heavy toll of hoppers in the Samburu country, where the infestation, though spread over an extensive area, is not regarded as serious.

Where there is plenty of succulent grass the hoppers appear to prefer this food to crops, and in most of the affected districts there is now no lack of green grass.

From the Kilifi district very heavy infestations are reported from the Rabai, Ruruma and Jibana locations. Energetic measures have been adopted by the local administrative officer who has organized a native campaign over an extensive area, and the work is progressing satisfactorily, enormous numbers of hoppers having already been destroyed. Owing to the heavy and continuous rains it has not been found possible to conduct any baiting operations in this district, but the method will be employed as soon as weather permits.

Destruction is in progress further north in the Malindi and Kipini areas, where large numbers of natives are employed on the work.

Machakos-Masai Area.—It has been found necessary to appoint a second locust officer to cope with the work in this area, and a scouting campaign over the whole district from Machakos to Kibwezi and down to the Chyulu Hills is being conducted.

The officer operating in the Mbitini-Mukaa-Nzau triangle reports that, apart from fresh hatchings still in progress, all the original hopper bands have been wiped out and there are now present only the more recent hatchings of some two to three weeks old. Excellent results are still being

achieved by means of poison bait under the direct supervision of the Chiefs concerned, but baiting is still very restricted in deference to native opinion. Emergences are definitely becoming fewer, and it is thought that hatchings will be complete very shortly.

A further hatching has been reported from Mashuru, about ten miles south of Kima, this is being dealt with.

Kisii-Narok Area.—The situation as regards South Kavirondo is distinctly easier, the few scattered hopper bands now remaining being under control. If no extensive fresh hatchings occur no anxiety need be felt as regards the Kisii infestation.

Though very few reports have been received from the Trans Mara region it is understood that the operations in that area are making good progress, and it is now hoped that, with the assistance of the large force of natives employed, what threatened to be a very serious infestation will be satisfactorily dealt with.

At Sianna heavy rains have been experienced and have rendered the work of destruction rather difficult, but nevertheless the Hon. Locust Officer is able to report that the Sianna Hills are now clear of hoppers. It will be remembered that this infestation was regarded as important, the hoppers, when detected, being in their fourth stage. An area to the west of Sianna is believed to be heavily infested, and though this "fly" country is extremely difficult of access the Hon. Locust Officer is making a great effort to deal with the hoppers; further reports will be received next week.

This officer reports that baiting has, on the whole, proved amazingly effective, the hoppers showing signs of "drunkenness" within half an hour and in one hour's time they are definitely weakening, though dying is a very slow process. On beginning to feel the effect of the poison the hoppers leave the bait and climb the long grass or trees, remaining suspended head downwards until they die, and scouring thick sticky stools. Close observations demonstrated that the hoppers are affected by a noise such as the beating of a tin to a distance not greater than ten feet and that their sense of sight does not penetrate beyond about thirty feet. Swift movement by boys carrying coloured flags was found effective and black flags have proved the most suitable.

As regards the hatchings referred to last week, some four to five miles over the Tanganyika border, these have now been dealt with and it is anticipated will be completely exterminated during the next few days. Hoppers have been reported from Central Kavirondo in the neighbourhood of the Sondu River, but as the hatchings were small they have been destroyed by beating.

A report from Muhoroni states that hatchings have taken place on the border of the Kano Reserve, but this small outbreak is being dealt with locally.

General.—In all districts where hatchings have taken place there is now a marked falling off in fresh emergences, it appears therefore that hatchings are almost completed. While the Coastal infestation is still a somewhat doubtful quantity, no serious effects are anticipated from any of the other affected areas, and though a few escapes may occur these should be of no economic significance.

Provided that the balance of the purchase money shall not be payable within the period stated or thereafter unless and until the Commissioner of Lands can present to the purchaser the grant of the plot duly executed.

And further provided that, if the purchaser so elect, the balance of purchase money may be paid in three equal annual instalments, subject to interest at the rate of 6 per centum per annum on the outstanding balance, the first of such instalments to be paid, together with the interest that shall have accrued due, on the 1st July, 1935, and thereafter instalments to be paid on the 1st July in each year.

6. The rent due to the 31st December, 1934, shall be payable to the District Commissioner, Nairobi, within seven days of the request therefor.

7. Subject to the provisos contained in condition No. 5, if the amounts mentioned are not paid as therein specified, the Commissioner of Lands may order the deposit made by the purchaser to be forfeited, and the purchaser shall have no further claim to a grant of the plot.

8. The purchaser of the plot shall within twelve months of the commencement of his grant submit to the Town Clerk, Nairobi, a plan of the building it is proposed to erect upon the Fifth Avenue frontage of the plot. The purchaser shall also submit to the Town Clerk, plans of all alterations or new buildings to be constructed on the remainder of the plot. Such plans shall conform in architectural design to the amenities of the neighbourhood. The buildings shall be constructed of stone, burnt brick, or concrete, on proper foundations. The buildings to be erected on the plot must be of not less than two stories in height, and must be of a value of not less than Cents 90 per cubic foot of building content.

The Commissioner of Lands, or such other person as he may appoint for the purpose, shall within one month of the approval of the plan by the Nairobi Municipal Council, notify the purchaser of his approval or otherwise of the plans, and shall also notify the date by which such buildings shall be erected. 12. Verandas may be erected within a road reserve with the previous consent of the Municipal Council, and must conform to a building line decided upon by them.

13. The term of the grant will be 99 years from 1st July, 1934.

14. Under the provisions of section 60 (b) of the Crown Lands Ordinance, the grantee will be required to pay Municipal rates upon the whole of the rateable interest and Government's contribution, in lieu of rates assessed on the plot. A clause will therefore be embodied in the grant providing for the necessary adjustment between the grantee and Government.
