GOVERNMENT NOTICE No. 616

His Excellency the Governor in Council has approved of the following Bill being introduced into the Legislative Council.

A Bill to Confer Temporary Exclusive Rights in Respect of Telegraphic Press Messages.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of Kenya, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

- 1. This Ordinance may be cited as "the Telegraphic Short title. Press Messages Ordinance, 1933."
- 2. In this Ordinance, unless the context otherwise Interpretation. requires-
- "telegraph" means a line, wire, or other apparatus used for the purpose of telegraphic or telephonic communication, and includes a pneumatic tube, submarine or other cable and any apparatus for transmitting or receiving messages or other communications by means of signals, whether with or without the aid of wires;

"telegraphic message" includes a message or other communication sent by telegraph.

"telegraph office" includes any structure, room, place or receptacle of any kind, appointed by authority of the Postmaster General or used by a telegraph company for the receipt, despatch or delivery of telegraphic messages;

"time of publication" means the moment when the first copies leave the printing press to be put at the disposal of the public.

3. When any person publishes in any newspaper or other Protection of printed paper published or circulated in the Colony or supplies certain telefor such publication any message transmitted by telegraph messages from from any place within or outside the Colony and lawfully publication received by him, no other person shall, without the written certain period. consent of the first-mentioned person or his agent thereto lawfully authorized, print or publish, or cause to be printed or published, such message or the substance thereof or any extract therefrom until a period of seventy-two hours has elapsed

from the time of first publication; and the publication of the whole or any part of such message or the substance thereof, or of the intelligence therein contained, or any comment upon or reference to such intelligence shall be deemed to be a publication of the same:

Provided that—

- (a) such period shall not extend beyond eighty-four hours from the time when such message was received at a telegraph office;
- (b) the publication of any similar message lawfully received in like manner by any other person shall not be deemed or taken to be a publication of such first-mentioned message within the meaning of this Ordinance; and
- (c) no telegraphic message published as aforesaid shall be protected under this Ordinance unless it is printed with a heading which indicates that such message has been received by telegraph and unless the time and the date of its receipt at a telegraph office are stated in such heading, which heading, together with the date of publication of the newspaper, shall be prima facie evidence of the time of receipt and date of publication, respectively, of such message.

Transmission of protected messages for publication prohibited. 4. During the period in which a telegraphic message is protected from publication under section 3 hereof, no person shall, without the written consent of the person whose consent is necessary under that section, tender for transmission for purposes of publication the intelligence contained in that message or the substance thereof or any extract therefrom.

Presumptions in prosecutions under Ordinance.

Anincy of Issu

- 5. In any prosecution under this Ordinance the production of any document which—
 - (a) purports to be a telegraphic message;
 - (b) contains the intelligence published or supplied for publication; and
 - (c) is addressed to and has been delivered to the person publishing or to some person on his behalf by an officer of the Posts and Telegraphs Department or a telegraph company,

shall be prima facie evidence that the message published or supplied for publication is a message published under the protection of this Ordinance; and proof that any person is the responsible editor of any newspaper in which there has been any publication contrary to the provisions of this Ordinance shall be prima facie evidence that such person wilfully caused the unlawful publication.

6. Any person who contravenes any provision of this Penalties. Ordinance shall be guilty of an offence and shall be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding twenty pounds; and in the case of a second or subsequent conviction to a fine not exceeding fifty pounds.

OBJECTS AND REASONS.

This Bill is the result of representations made by Messrs. Reuters, Ltd., to the effect that certain newspapers in the Colony, which do not subscribe to Reuter's Service, have, during recent months, published Reuter's messages. It is considered that legislation to prevent such piracy is desirable.

No expenditure of public moneys will be involved if the provisions of this Bill become law.

A Bill to Amend the Ancient Monuments Preservation Ordinance, 1927.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of Kenya, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Short title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the Ancient Monuments Preservation (Amendment) Ordinance, 1934, and shall be read as one with the Ancient Monuments Preservation Ordinance, 1927, hereinafter referred to as the Principal Ordinance.

No. 17 of 1927.

2. The Principal Ordinance is hereby amended by the addition of the following new section as section 20:—

Powers to grant permission to excavate or remove monuments or antiquities. "20. Notwithstanding anything in this Ordinance contained, the Governor may grant permission to any person to excavate and/or to remove from the Colony any monument, antiquity or protected monument, or any portion of a monument, antiquity or protected monument. Such permission shall be granted subject to such conditions as to the Governor may seem fit, and may include a requirement that a portion of any monument, antiquity or protected monument shall be surrendered to the Crown".

OBJECTS AND REASONS.

The law relating to the preservation of ancient monuments is at present under consideration with a view to revision, but it will be some time before the advice of the British Museum authorities, to whom the matter has been referred, will be available.

Under the existing law no excavation or removal is permissible once a monument has been protected, and it is

proposed in this Bill to confer powers on the Governor to grant permission in appropriate cases. The proposed amendment is in accordance with the most modern practice in other countries, and, pending the complete revision of the law on the subject, is necessary to enable facilities to be extended to a distinguished archaeological expedition which is shortly visiting the Colony.

No expenditure of public moneys will be involved if the provisions of this Bill become law.

A Bill to Provide for the Giving of Notice to the Assurance Company concerned on Assignment of a Policy of Life Assurance.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of Kenya, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Short title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the Assignment of Life Policies Ordinance, 1934.

Interpretation.

2. In this Ordinance, except where the context otherwise requires:—

"policy of life assurance" or "policy" means any instrument by which the payment of moneys, by or out of the funds of an assurance company carrying on business within the Colony on the happening of any contingency depending on the duration of human life, is assured or secured;

"assurance company" means and includes every corporation, association, society or company, now or hereafter carrying on the business within the Colony of assuring lives or survivorships, either alone or in conjunction with any other object or objects.

Notice of assignment to be given.

3. Notwithstanding anything contained in sections 130 and 131 of the Indian Transfer of Property Act, 1882, as applied to this Colony, no assignment made after the passing of this Ordinance of a policy of life assurance shall confer on the assignee therein named, his executors, administrators, or assigns, any right to sue for the amount of such policy, or the moneys assured or secured thereby, until a written notice of the date and purport of such assignment shall have been given to the assurance company liable under such policy at its principal place of business for the time being within the Colony, or, in case they have two or more principal places of business within the Colony, then at some one of such principal places of business, and the date on which such notice shall

be received shall regulate the priority of all claims under any assignment; and a payment bona fide made in respect of any policy by any assurance company before the date on which such notice shall have been received shall be as valid against the assignee giving such notice as if this Ordinance had not been passed.

4. Every assurance company shall, on every policy issued by them after the expiration of one month from the places of business to be coming into operation of this Ordinance, specify its principal place or principal places of business within the Colony at which notices of assignment may be given in pursuance of this Ordinance.

Principal policies.

5. Any such assignment may be made either by endorse- Assignment by ment on the policy or by a separate instrument in the words endorsement or to the effect set forth in the Schedule hereto, such endorse-instrument. ment or separate instrument being duly stamped.

Every assurance company to which notice shall have Notices of been duly given of the assignment of any policy under which it is liable shall, upon the request in writing of any person by whom any such notice was given or signed, or of his executors or administrators, and upon payment in each case of a fee not exceeding five shillings, deliver an acknowledgment in writing under the hand of the manager, secretary, treasurer, or other principal officer of the assurance company of its receipt of such notice; and every such written acknowledgment, if signed by a person being de jure or de facto the manager, secretary, treasurer or other principal officer of the assurance company the acknowledgment of which the same purports to be, shall be conclusive evidence as against such assurance company of its having duly received the notice to which such acknowledgment relates.

OBJECTS AND REASONS.

It is a practice in the Colony for banks to make advances to a customer secured by the assignment of a life policy in the name of the borrower who assigns such policy to the bank.

The Indian Transfer of Property Act, 1882, is applied to the Colony, and a decision of one of the High Courts in India on sections 130 and 131 of that Act has recently been brought to the attention of Government, through the banks. The effect of this decision is that priority of claim to moneys secured under a life policy which has been assigned goes by the date of assignment of the policy, and not by the date when notice of assignment is received by the assurance company. The banks point out, that, in view of this decision, they will be very reluctant to give accommodation to a customer on the security of a life policy until the matter is remedied, seeing that they have no means of knowing whether an assignment of a life policy has been made prior to the assignment to them.

This Bill, which corresponds with the English law on the subject, has therefore been drafted, providing that no assignment of a policy of life assurance shall confer on the assignee any right to sue for the amount, until a written notice of the date and purport of such assignment shall have been given to the assurance company liable under such policy, and the date on which such notice shall be received shall regulate the priority of all claims under any assignment.

No expenditure of public moneys will be involved if the provisions of this Bill become law.

A Bill to Regulate the Sale and Distribution of Sugar.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of Kenya, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the Sale of Sugar Short title. Ordinance, 1934.

2. In this Ordinance—

Interpretation.

"the Agency" means the body of persons established under section 3 of this Ordinance;

"East African Territory" means either or both the Tanganyika Territory and the Uganda Protectorate, as the case may

"miller" means a person who by a process of milling or crushing converts sugar cane into any form of sugar for purposes of sale;

"sell" means to effect the first sale of sugar after its production and includes a contract so to sell;

"sugar" means any saccharine substance or syrup manufactured from any material from which sugar can be manufactured but shall not include molasses.

3. (1) There shall be constituted a board to be known as Constitution the "Agency", which shall consist of such persons as the Governor from time to time shall nominate, and of every miller in Kenya who produces sugar in excess of an annual quantity of six hundred tons.

- (2) The Agency shall be responsible for carrying into effect in the Colony the provisions of this Ordinance, and shall. so far as may be, work in conjunction with the millers in Uganda and Tanganyika.
- (3) The Agency shall be a body corporate having perpetual succession and a common seal and shall be capable in law of suing and being sued.

Agency only to purchase sugar.

4. (1) No person other than the Agency shall accept delivery of sugar from a miller and no miller shall deliver sugar for sale within the Colony or for export from the Colony except to the Agency.

Penalty.

(2) Any person who is guilty of a breach of the provisions of this section shall on conviction before a magistrate of the first class be liable for a first offence to a fine not exceeding one hundred pounds, or to imprisonment for six months or to both such fine and such imprisonment, and for a second or subsequent offence to a fine not exceeding three hundred pounds or to imprisonment for twelve months or to both such fine and such imprisonment.

Agency to supply East African demands:

5. (1) Subject to the provisions of section 13 of this Ordinance the Agency may sell sugar in any market whether within or without the Colony, but it shall be the first duty of the Agency to supply the demands of the Colony and of the other East African Territories to the satisfaction of the Governor.

Agency to deal only in East African sugar.

(2) The Agency shall purchase and sell only sugar produced in the Colony or in an East African Territory:

Provided that, if the Governor in Council is satisfied that the production of sugar is insufficient for the requirements of the Colony and the East African Territories, he may authorize the Agency to purchase and sell sugar other than sugar produced in the Colony or in an East African Territory.

Agency to accept all

(3) The Agency shall accept all sugar offered to it which sugar offered, is suitable for human consumption.

Power of Agency to call for returns.

6. The Agency may from time to time require millers to furnish such returns as it shall deem necessary. Any miller, who fails to furnish such returns when required so to do by the Agency, or who furnishes false returns, shall be guilty of an offence under this Ordinance.

Quotas.

- 7. (1) The Governor in Council shall from time to time allot to every miller a quota expressed as a percentage of all sales of sugar in Kenya, Uganda and Tanganyika and the allotment of such quotas shall be published in the Gazette.
- (2) The Governor in Council may appoint such person or persons as may be deemed necessary to assist him in calculating such quotas upon a fair and proper basis and may empower such person or persons to take evidence upon oath or otherwise, for such purpose.

- (3) Within a period of one hundred and fifty days reckoned from the date of the delivery of his sugar to the Agency under the provisions of this Ordinance the Agency shall pay to each miller the net amount realized by the sale of his sugar after allowing for a pro rata deduction in respect of the expenses of the Agency.
- (4) Whenever the Agency pays to a miller the amount provided for in the last preceding sub-section it shall at the same time pay to such miller any sum which may be due to him in respect of the sale by the Agency of his surplus sugar in overseas markets, after making therefrom a similar deduction for the expenses of the Agency.
- 8. The Agency for the purposes of section 12 of this Millers to Ordinance may require millers to furnish particulars of all contracts in writing duly made by them prior to the 20th day of March, 1934. Any miller who fails to furnish such particulars when required so to do by the Agency or who furnishes false particulars shall be guilty of an offence under this Ordinance.

9. (1) The Agency shall be responsible, subject to any Method of Rules made under section 16 of this Ordinance, for carrying out the sale of sugar delivered to it in accordance with the business. provisions of this Ordinance and for making payments to millers in accordance with the quotas allotted under section 7 of this Ordinance.

(2) The Agency shall make rules of procedure governing the proper conduct of the meetings and business of the Agency.

Such rules shall provide, inter alia, that-

- (a) every proposed decision by the Agency shall be voted upon by the Agency and shall only be brought into effect by a majority vote in favour thereof; and
- (b) the voting power of every member of the Agency, including the Chairman, shall be regulated in proportion to the quota allotted to him under section 7 of this Ordinance.
- (3) The Agency may from time to time employ such staff as may be required and may pay salaries and allowances to such staff, and generally may incur such expenditure as may be necessary for carrying out the purposes of this Ordinance.

(4) An appeal shall lie to the Governor by any miller against a decision of the Agency, and the Governor's decision thereon shall be final, save that every decision of the Agency affecting the interests of millers in an East African Territory shall be subject to confirmation by the Governor of the Territory concerned and shall not be given effect to without such confirmation.

Agency to transactions

10. The Agency shall keep proper records of its trankeep record of sactions and shall also keep complete and accurate statements of account in respect of all its operations under this Ordinance. Such records and accounts shall be available for inspection by any miller at the office of the Agency upon his request, and at all times by any person appointed by the Governor for the purpose of such inspection.

Penalties.

11. Any person contravening or failing to comply with any of the provisions of sections 6 or 8 of this Ordinance shall be liable on conviction by a magistrate of the first or second class to a fine not exceeding fifty pounds.

Prior contracts.

- 12. (1) All sugar contracts entered into by millers on or subsequent to the 20th day of March, 1934, shall be null and void and of no effect.
- (2) (a) All deliveries in respect of sugar contracts entered into by a miller prior to the 20th day of March, 1934, shall be effected through the Agency and payments in respect thereof shall be the subject of a separate account to be kept by the Agency in the name of the miller.
- (b) When in any such contract the price contracted for by the miller is greater or less than the price of sugar as fixed by the Agency the amount by which the contract price exceeds or falls short of the Agency price shall be deemed to be a profit or a loss, as the case may be, for the miller who entered into such contract.
- (c) All deliveries in respect of such contracts shall be reckoned as part of the quota allotted to the miller under this Ordinance and shall in no case exceed the amount of such quota. Any such contract shall be deemed to be null and void and of no effect as regards the delivery of any quantity of sugar over and above the amount of the quota so allotted to the miller.

13. The Governor in Council may by proclamation pro- Governor in hibit either wholly or in part the export of sugar from the Colony to any place outside the Colony during a period to be specified in such proclamation or he may by proclamation determine the amount of sugar that may be exported from the Colony during a period to be specified in such proclamation.

prohibit export of

It shall be lawful for the Governor in Council by Power of notice published in the Gazette, to fix a maximum price for Gouncil to fix the sale of sugar by the Agency to purchasers in Kenya and maximum Uganda.

Governor in

15. If the Agency fails to comply with any of the provi- Penalty. sions of this Ordinance relating to its duties and obligations, the Agency and every member thereof who is knowingly a party to such default shall be liable on conviction by a magistrate of the first class to a fine not exceeding three hundred pounds.

16. The Governor in Council may make Rules—

(a) prescribing the duties and functions of the Agency;

(b) prescribing the appointment of officers and the conduct of meetings of the Agency;

(c) prescribing the returns and the forms thereof to be made by millers and by the Agency;

(d) prescribing the obligations to each other of the Agency and the millers in respect of anything arising out of this Ordinance;

(e) generally for the better carrying out of the provisions of this Ordinance.

17. After the date of the coming into operation of this Erection of Ordinance no person shall erect, in any place in the Colony, power-driven machinery for the manufacture of sugar save with the written permission of the Governor.

prohibited.

After the date of the coming into operation of this Conversion Ordinance no person using a mill for the manufacture of the sugar cane product known as jaggery shall change the use of such mill for the purpose of manufacturing white sugar therein.

of mills prohibited.

19. Any person contravening or failing to comply with Penalty. the provisions of sections 17 and 18 of this Ordinance shall be liable on conviction by a magistrate of the first class, for every such offence to a fine not exceeding three hundred pounds.

Exemption.

20. The Governor, by writing under his hand, may for good and sufficient reason exempt any miller from the operation of any of the provisions in this Ordinance contained, and may further, at any time in his discretion revoke any exemption so granted.

Date of commencement.

21. This Ordinance shall come into operation on the 1st day of January, 1935.

OBJECTS AND REASONS.

The object of this Bill is the rationalization of the sugar industry in East Africa.

- 2. The provisions of the Bill are intended to assure to every miller in the Colony a share of the East African sugar market based on a reasonable economic output.
- 3. Legislation on similar lines will be introduced in Uganda and Tanganyika.
 - 4. No expenditure of public moneys will be involved if the provisions of this Bill become law.

A Bill to Amend the Shop Hours Ordinance, 1925.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of Kenya, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:-

This Ordinance may be cited as the Shop Hours Short title. (Amendment) Ordinance, 1934, and shall be read as one with the Shops Hours Orpinance, 1925, hereinafter referred to as the Principal Ordinance.

No. 24 of 1925.

2. Notwithstanding anything contained in the Principal Shops Ordinance it shall be lawful for any person or company carrying on the retail trade or business of a dealer or dealers in apparatus wireless apparatus to keep the shop in which such retail trade or business is carried on open between the hours of eight and ten o'clock at night for the purpose of giving demonstrations of the capabilities of wireless apparatus, but for no other purpose.

dealing in wireless may be kept open between 8 p.m. and 10 p.m. for demonstration

OBJECTS AND REASONS.

The East Africa Wireless Company have asked for permission to carry out demonstrations of wireless apparatus in their showrooms between the hours of 8 and 10 p.m., in view of the fact that overseas stations only operate for general purposes after 6 p.m. Greenwich time. As the law stands at present the company cannot hold such demonstrations, but this Bill enables them to do so.

No expenditure of public moneys will be involved if the provisions of this Bill become law.

Section 44 of the Principal Ordinance which it is proposed to replace:—

44. This Ordinance shall continue in force until the 31st day of December, 1933, and shall then expire:

Provided that the Governor may by proclamation with the approval of the Legislative Council and of the Secretary of State declare that this Ordinance shall remain in force until a date to be fixed in such proclamation or until repealed.

A Bill to Amend the Native Tribunals Ordinance, 1930.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of Kenya, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:--

This Ordinance may be cited as the Native Tribunals Short title. (Amendment) Ordinance, 1934, and shall be read as one with the Native Tribunals Ordinance, 1930, hereinafter referred to No. 39 of 1930. as the Principal Ordinance.

2. Section 44 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby repealed and the following section is substituted therefor:-

"44. This Ordinance shall continue in force until the 31st day of December, 1936, and shall then expire:

Repeal and replacement of section 44 of the Principal Ordinance.

Provided that the Governor may by proclamation with the approval of the Legislative Council and of the Secretary of State declare that this Ordinance shall remain in force until a date to be fixed in such proclamation or until repealed."

This Ordinance shall be deemed to have come into operation on the 31st day of December, 1933.

OBJECTS AND REASONS.

This Bill gives effect to the Resolution passed in Legislative Council on the 30th day of November, 1933.

No expenditure of public moneys will be involved if the provisions of this Bill become law.

A Bill to Amend the Diseases of Animals Ordinance.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of Kenya, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

- 1. This Ordinance may be cited as the Diseases of Short title. Animals (Amendment) Ordinance, 1934, and shall be read as one with the Diseases of Animals Ordinance (Chapter 157 of the Revised Edition), hereinafter referred to as the Principal Ordinance.
- 2. Section 2 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby Amendment of amended as follows-

section 2 of the Principal Ordinance.

- (a) by the substitution of the words "birds and bees" for the words "ostriches and poultry" which occur in the definition of the term "stock";
- (b) by the insertion of the following definition after the definition of the term "stock":--
 - "'Birds' include domestic fowls, turkeys, geese, ducks, guinea fowls, pea fowls, pigeons, pheasants, parrots, ostriches, and the eggs of such birds."

OBJECTS AND REASONS.

The object of this Bill is to widen the scope of the Diseases of Animals Ordinance so as to enable control to be exercised over bees and varieties of birds not at present included in the Ordinance.

No expenditure of public moneys will be involved if the provisions of this Bill become law.

A Bill to Consolidate the Law Relating to the Advancement and Control of the Coffee Industry.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of Kenya, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Short title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the Coffee Industry Ordinance, 1934.

Interpretation.

2. In this Ordinance, unless the context otherwise requires—

"Board" means the Board established under this Ordinance;

"buni" means coffee dried in the fruit or cherry;

"coffee" means the fruits or parts thereof of Coffee species and includes "clean coffee", "parchment coffee", "buni" and roasted and/or ground berries;

"coffee dealer" includes any person who buys or sells, cleans or grades commercially in a factory other than on the plantation, or otherwise deals in, unroasted coffee;

"coffee plantation" includes any area of land or contiguous areas of land under single ownership on which coffee is grown for the production of berries, or for the growing and sale of coffee plants;

"coffee planter" includes any person who owns, manages or occupies a coffee plantation;

"Conference" means any meeting of delegates, appointed by coffee planters licensed under the provisions of this Ordinance, convened for the purpose of the election of members of the Board as provided under section 3 of this Ordinance and for the consideration of any other matters affecting the coffee industry;

"Director" means the Director of Agriculture;

"export" means export from the Colony to a place outside the limits of the Colony;

"inspector" means any magistrate, European police officer or any European officer of the Department of Agriculture;

"trade samples" means samples of coffee not exceeding ten pounds in weight.

3. (1) There shall be constituted a Board to be known Constitution as "the Coffee Board", which shall consist of—

of the Board.

- (a) the Director, who shall be the first chairman;
- (b) two members, to be appointed by the Governor, of whom one shall be a member of the Department of Agriculture;
- (c) four coffee planters who shall be elected at the Conference by coffee planters who own, occupy or manage coffee plantations situated to the east of the Meridian of longitude thirty-six degrees twentyfive minutes east of Greenwich;
- (d) four coffee planters who shall be elected at the Conference by coffee planters who own, occupy and manage coffee plantations situated to the west of the Meridian of longitude thirty-six degrees twentyfive minutes east of Greenwich:

Provided that, until such time as a conference is convened in accordance with the provisions of sub-section (2) of this section, the Board established by section 3 of the Coffee Industry Ordinance, 1932, shall be deemed to be the Coffee No. 50 of 1932. Board for the purposes of this Ordinance, save that, as and from the date of the coming into operation of this Ordinance, the Board shall not include the two members elected under the provisions of paragraph (c) of sub-section (1) of section 3 of the Coffee Industry Ordinance, 1932, but shall include the No. 50 of 1932. two additional coffee planters who were elected at the Conference held in July, 1934, and who would have been members of the Board if the provisions of paragraphs (c) and (d) of this sub-section had been in operation at that date.

(2) The Board shall convene a Conference in the second half of each calendar year after the passing of this Ordinance at which the election of such members to the Board as is provided in sub-section (5) of this section shall be made.

- (3) Subject to the provisions of paragraph (a) of subsection (1) of this section the Board shall elect a chairman and a vice-chairman annually.
- (4) Members of the Board other than those referred to in paragraphs (c) and (d) of sub-section (1) of this section shall hold office during the Governor's pleasure.
- (5) With respect to the members elected at each Conference, the following provisions shall apply:—
 - (a) Of the four members of the Board elected under the provisions of paragraph (c) of sub-section (1) of this section, one shall retire annually.
 - (b) Of the four members of the Board elected under the provisions of paragraph (d) of sub-section (1) of this section, one shall retire annually.
 - (c) The order of retirement of members under paragraphs (a) and (b) of this sub-section shall be by rotation which shall be decided by the Board by ballot.
 - (d) Any member retiring as aforesaid shall be eligible for re-election.
 - (e) A candidate for election under paragraph (c) or (d) of sub-section (1) of this section shall lodge with the Secretary of the Board, at least thirty days before the date of the election, a nomination paper signed by not less than seven coffee planters.
- (6) In any case in which the Board is satisfied that any member of the Board is incapacitated by illness, absence, or other sufficient cause from performing the duties of his office the Board may appoint some fit person to be a deputy to act for that member during such incapacity; and any deputy shall, while he acts as such, have all the powers and authorities of the member for whom he is so acting.
- (7) In the absence of the chairman and vice-chairman from any meeting of the Board a chairman for such meeting shall be chosen by the members present.
- (8) The chairman of a meeting shall have a casting vote in addition to a deliberative vote.
- (9) The Board shall fix the number of members required for a quorum.

- (10) The chairman shall, upon receipt of a requisition signed by three members of the Board calling upon him to do so, within one month after the date of such requisition convene a meeting of the Board.
- (11) The Board shall be a body corporate having perpetual succession and a common seal, and shall be capable in law of suing and being sued, and of purchasing, holding and alienating land and other property movable or immovable.
- (12) The Board shall meet not less than once in three Meetings. months.
- (13) The Board may, subject to the provisions of this Ordinance, make By-laws governing-
 - (a) the conduct of the business of the Board; and
 - (b) the election of delegates to the Conference.
- 4. (1) No person shall conduct the business of a coffee Licence to dealer unless and until he is licensed in that behalf by the deal in coffee. District Commissioner of the district in which his principal business premises are situated:

Provided that no retail seller of provisions shall require a licence for the purchase of clean coffee from a licensed coffee dealer or coffee planter or for the sale of such coffee in retail quantities not exceeding five pounds in weight, and that such retail seller shall keep a register of all purchases of such coffee :

And provided further that no licence shall be required by any preson who deals only in coffee grown outside the Colony.

- (2) The issue of such licence shall be in the discretion of the District Commissioner who, before issuing any such licence, shall consult the Director thereon. It shall be competent for the District Commissioner to prescribe as a condition of the issue of a licence that it shall be endorsed by the District Commissioner of every district in which business under the licence is to be carried on.
- (3) Every such licence shall specify the premises on which such business may be carried on.
- (4) Every licence under this section shall be issued annually and, subject to any cancellation which may be imposed under section 16, shall remain in force until the thirtieth day of June next following the date on which it was issued.
- (5) There shall be payable in respect of every such licence and every renewal thereof a fee of ten pounds:

Provided that only one licence fee shall be payable in respect of any or all premises in which the business of the licensee is carried on throughout the Colony.

Licensee to keep books.

5. (1) Every licensee under section 4 of this Ordinance shall keep on his licensed premises a register in English or Kiswahili of all purchases or sales of coffee made in pursuance of his licence, and shall within forty-eight hours of each such sale or purchase insert in such register the name and address of each vendor or purchaser of coffee, as the case may be, the quantity purchased or sold and the date of the transaction:

Provided that if the method of dealing in or disposing of coffee be otherwise than by purchase or sale the licensee shall enter in the register the method of such dealing or disposal and the date thereof.

(2) It shall be lawful for an inspector to enter upon the premises of any coffee planter or coffee dealer or retail seller of provisions and inspect all coffee kept therein and to demand the production of and inspect any licence or any register kept in pursuance of this section, and any obstruction or denial of entry and any refusal to produce such licence or register shall be deemed to be an offence.

Licensee to exhibit his name, etc.

6. Every licensee under section 4 of this Ordinance shall always keep, exhibited in English characters not less than three inches deep, over the outer door of his shop or place of business, his name and the words "licensed coffee dealer", in English or Kiswahili.

Licensee to

7. Every licensed dealer shall submit such returns at submit return. such periods to such persons as the Governor by rule may prescribe.

Saving for sale to licensed dealer.

8. Nothing in section 4 of this Ordinance contained shall be deemed to prohibit any licensed coffee planter from selling the produce of his own plantation to a licensed coffee dealer, or to any person for his own consumption, or for planting, or from exporting the same from the Colony:

Provided that such licensed coffee planter shall enter in a book to be kept for that purpose a full and true account of all such sales and dealings and shall produce such book for inspection upon demand made by an inspector:

Provided further that any person may without a licence buy from a licensed coffee dealer or licensed coffee planter coffee for his own consumption or for planting, but for no other purpose.

9. (1) No person shall plant or maintain any coffee Coffee planters plantation unless and until he is in possession of a licence issued to him in respect of such plantation by the District Commissioner of the district in which such coffee plantation is situated.

- (2) There shall be payable in respect of every licence issued under this section a fee of thirty shillings.
- (3) Every licence under this section shall be issued annually and shall expire on the thirtieth day of June next following the date on which it was issued.
- (4) The issue of licences under this section shall be in the discretion of the District Commissioner who, before issuing any such licence, shall consult the Director thereon: Provided that no such opinion shall be necessary in the case of coffee planters previously licensed under the Registration of Coffee Plantations and Coffee Dealers Ordinance.

Cap. 152.

- (5) The provisions of this section shall not apply to any coffee plantation in any native reserve.
- 10. (1) It shall be lawful for the Governor, on the Levy. recommendation of the Board, from time to time by proclamation in the Gazette to impose a levy on all coffee produced in and exported from the Colony, hereinafter referred to as "the levy": Provided that the amount of such levy shall in no event exceed one shilling per one hundredweight or part of a one hundredweight of coffee, and provided also that no levy shall be imposed in respect of buni:

Provided further that, unless and until the Governor may impose a levy under the provisions of this section, the levy last imposed by the Governor under the powers conferred upon him by sub-section (1) of section 10 of the Coffee Industry Ordinance, 1932, shall remain in full force and effect:

No. 50 of 1932.

Provided further that nothing in this section contained shall prohibit any licensed coffee planter or coffee dealer or the Board from exporting trade samples without payment of such levy.

(2) No levy shall become operative until two months after the date of the proclamation imposing it.

(3) As from the date on which a levy becomes operative under sub-section (1) of this section no coffee produced in the Colony shall be exported from the Colony unless the levy has been paid to the Commissioner of Customs in respect of such coffee and any person who exports or attempts to export any such coffee from the Colony without paying such levy thereon shall be guilty of an offence.

Coffee levy fund.

- 11. (1) There shall be established a fund, to be known as "the coffee levy fund" which shall consist of all moneys paid in respect of the levy, and licences issued under section 4 of this Ordinance, and of such sums as the Legislative Council may from time to time vote for the purpose.
- (2) The coffee levy fund shall be in the custody of the Treasurer, who, as soon as possible after the last day of each month, shall pay the amount of such fund into an account opened in the name of the Board with a bank approved by the Governor, and the receipt of such bank for sums so paid shall be a full and effectual discharge to the Treasurer.
 - (3) The Board shall apply such moneys as follows:—.
 - (a) In payment of the expenses, commission, and other charges incurred by the Board or for which the Board may become liable in the course of its business.
 - (b) To the cost of advertising the merits of Kenya coffee and increasing its sale by efforts to extend existing markets and exploiting new markets, and any matters incidental thereto.
 - (c) To the remuneration of and the payment of travelling and out-of-pocket expenses to individual members of the Board at rates to be approved by the Governor.
 - (d) To the employment of such staff as the Board may think fit for the purpose of carrying out its functions.
 - (c) With the approval of the Governor in Council, to any other service which in the opinion of the Board is calculated to promote the welfare of the coffee industry or the more economic production or preparation of coffee.

The accounts of the coffee levy fund shall be audited Audit and in such manner as the Governor may direct, and shall, as accounts. soon as may be after the close of each year and after audit as aforesaid, be published in such manner as the Governor may. direct.

The Board shall prepare annually a report of its Annual report. operations which shall be submitted to the Conference and be published in such manner as the Governor may direct.

14. No member of the Board shall be personally liable Liability of for any act or default of the Board done or omitted to be done in good faith in the course of the operations of the Board.

15. (1) The Director shall keep a register of the distinguishing marks used by persons or by societies to mark and identify the coffee grown by such persons or by the individual members of such societies when such coffee is offered for sale in or exported from the Colony,

Registration of distinguishing

. . (j. 1

- (2) (a) Every person who uses any such mark and every society, the members of which use any such mark, shall submit a copy of the mark to the Director not later than two months after the date of the coming into operation of this Ordinance, and in the case of any mark adopted by a person or by a society after the expiration of the said period of two months, such copy shall be so submitted not later than one month after the date of the adoption of such mark.
- (b) If the Director approves of a mark he shall register the same and shall issue to the person or society, as the case may be, a certificate in the form set out in the Schedule to this Ordinance.
- (3) The Director may in his discretion, and without assigning any reason, refuse to register a mark, or he may require an applicant to submit an alternative mark for his approval.
 - (4) Any person who or any society which—
 - (a) fails to register a mark as required by sub-section (2) of this section; or
 - (b) uses a mark which has not been so registered within the period of two months after the date of the coming into operation of this Ordinance; or

(c) uses a mark which has been adopted after the expiration of the aforesaid period of two months but which has not been registered within one month after the date of the adoption of such mark as required by sub-section (2) of this section,

shall be guilty of an offence against this Ordinance.

(5) For the purposes of this section the word "society" means any association of persons registered as a co-operative No. 24 of 1931. society under the provisions of the Co-operative Societies (Registration) Ordinance, 1931, or of any law amending or replacing the same.

Penalty.

16. Any person who is guilty of an offence against this Ordinance or who contravenes or fails to comply with any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be liable, on conviction before a magistrate of the first or second class, for every such offence, contravention or failure to comply with the provisions of this Ordinance to a fine not exceeding one hundred pounds or to imprisonment for a period not exceeding six months or to both such fine and imprisonment; and if the magistrate thinks fit, to the cancellation of any licence issued under section 4 of this Ordinance.

Offences cognizable to police.

17. All offences under this Ordinance shall be cognizable to the police.

Power to make rules.

- The Governor in Council may make Rules—
- (a) prescribing the returns and the form thereof to be made by licensed coffee dealers;
- (b) generally for the better carrying out of the provisions of this Ordinance.

Repeal.

19. The Coffee Industry Ordinance, 1932, as amended by the Coffee Industry (Amendment) Ordinance, 1933, is hereby repealed:

Provided that a coffee dealer's licence or a coffee planter's licence issued to any person under the provisions of the said Ordinance shall remain in force until the thirtieth day of June next following the date on which it was issued, and it shall not be necessary for any person to whom such licence was issued to take a licence under this Ordinance until after the said thirtieth day of June.

This Bill re-enacts the provisions of the Coffee Industry Ordinance, 1932, and embodies the following amendments:—

It is proposed to change the constitution of the Board by replacing the two members representing trade interests with two additional coffee planters. This proposal is in accordance with an agreement reached between the Board and the coffee dealers.

The other important amendment proposed is in regard to the compulsory registration of distinguishing marks used by persons to identify coffee grown by them when such coffee is marketed.

The minor amendments proposed provide for—

- (a) the remuneration of individual members of the Board at rates approved by the Governor;
- (b) the separate licensing of separate estates under single ownership in the same district; and
- (c) the election of delegates to the annual Coffee Conference to be confined to coffee planters.

No expenditure of public moneys will be involved if the provisions of this Bill become law.

A Bill to Provide for the Control of the Production of Tea in the Colony.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of Kenya, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Short title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the Tea Ordinance, 1934.

Interpretation.

2. In this Ordinance, unless the context otherwise requires—

"tea" means the plant known botanically as Camellia Thea.

"tea planting" includes planting and infilling.

Licences to plant tea.

- 3. (1) After the date of the coming into operation of this Ordinance no person shall plant tea on any land in the Colony which has not been planted with tea prior to such date unless he is in possession of a licence issued to him in that behalf by the Director of Agriculture.
- (2) Every such licence shall specify the acreage of such land on which tea may be planted by virtue of such licence, and no licensee under this Ordinance shall plant tea on any such land in excess of the acreage so specified.
- (3) The total area of land in the Colony in respect of which licences are issued under this section shall at no time exceed one thousand acres.

Replanting of old area.

4. No tea shall be replanted on land, which has been planted with tea prior to the date of the coming into operation of this Ordinance, unless such land has been properly maintained. All such replanting shall be limited to the replacement of tea bushes which have been uprooted from such land.

Prohibition of export of tes seed.

5. The export of tea seed from the Colony is prohibited.

(1) After the date of the coming into operation of Restriction on this Ordinance no person shall import tea seed into the Colony seed. unless he is in possession of a written permit issued to him in that behalf by the Director of Agriculture.

- (2) Every such permit issued under this Ordinance shall specify the amount and description of tea seed which may be imported by virtue of such permit.
- 7. Every licence and permit issued under this Ordinance shall be in such form and subject to such conditions as may licences and be prescribed by the Director of Agriculture.

Form and conditions of permits.

The Director of Agriculture may, in his discretion, refuse to issue a licence or permit under this Ordinance on any ground which may appear to him to be sufficient. Any person aggrieved by any such refusal may appeal in writing permits. to the Governor within fourteen days of the date of such refusal. The decision of the Governor on any such appeal shall be final.

Power of Director of Agriculture to refuse licences and

9. No person to whom a licence or permit under this Licences and Ordinance has been issued shall lend, transfer, or assign the same to any other person, save with the written permission of the Director of Agriculture endorsed on the licence or permit.

permits not to be assigned.

(1) Every licensee and permit holder under this Power to Ordinance shall at all times allow the Director of Agriculture or any person authorized by the Director of Agriculture to enter upon any land or into any buildings occupied by such licensee or permit holder and to make any such inspection and inquiry as may be necessary for ascertaining whether the provisions of this Ordinance have been or are being complied with.

(2) Any person who hinders or obstructs the Director of Obstruction to Agriculture or any person authorized by him in the exercise of any power under this Ordinance or who fails to give any information required in connection with this Ordinance shall be guilty of an offence against this Ordinance.

be an offence.

11. Every licensee and permit holder under this Ordin- Returns. ance shall submit such returns at such periods and to such persons as the Director of Agriculture may from time to time require.

Penalty.

12. Any person who contravenes or fails to comply with any of the provisions of this Ordinance or who fails to observe any of the conditions or restrictions subject to or upon which any licence or permit has been issued under this Ordinance shall be guilty of an offence against this Ordinance and shall be liable on conviction by a magistrate of the first class for every such offence to a fine not exceeding two hundred pounds or to imprisonment for a period not exceeding six months or to both such fine and imprisonment.

Offences committed by bodies corporate. 13. Where any offence against this Ordinance committed by a body corporate is proved to have been committed with the consent or approval of any director, manager, secretary or other officer of the body corporate he, as well as the body corporate, shall be deemed to be guilty of the offence and shall be liable to be proceeded against and punished accordingly.

Powers of Director of Agriculture as to tea planted without licence or in excess of licensed acreage.

- 14. (1) When any person has been convicted of an offence which consists in or includes—
 - (a) the planting of tea on land which has not previously been planted with tea without a licence issued to him in that behalf as required by section 3 of this Ordinance; or
 - (b) the planting of tea on an acreage exceeding that specified in a licence,

the Director of Agriculture shall require such person, within a stated period of time, to uproot all tea which has been so planted.

(2) If any such person fails within such period of time to carry out the requirements of the Director of Agriculture, it shall be lawful for the Director of Agriculture, or any officer of his Department authorized by him, to enter upon the lands occupied by such person and to uproot at the expense of such person all tea so planted without licence or planted in excess of the licensed acreage, and any such expense may be recovered by the Director of Agriculture as a civil debt.

Duration of Ordinance.

15. This Ordinance shall continue in force until the 31st day of March, 1938, and shall then expire: Provided that the Governor may by proclamation, with the approval of the Legislative Council, declare that this Ordinance shall remain in force until a date to be fixed in such proclamation.

OBJECTS AND REASONS.

This Bill is designed to restrict the production of tea in the Colony, in accordance with the requirements of an International Restriction Scheme embracing all the larger and most of the smaller tea-producing countries of the world. The purpose of the restriction scheme is the improvement of the price of tea.

- 2. For the period of the scheme an acreage allotment of 7,900 acres for fresh tea planting on land not previously planted with tea has been given to the East African Territories, including Nyasaland. By agreement between the territories an acreage of 1,000 acres is allotted to Kenya.
- 3. The Bill seeks to give legislative effect to the scheme in the Colony by providing for a licence system for fresh plantings of tea, by controlling the import and prohibiting the export of tea seed and by limiting the replanting of tea to areas which have been properly maintained.
- 4. Similar legislation will be enacted in the other East African Territories.
- 5. No expenditure of public moneys will be involved if the provisions of this Bill become law.
