OBJECTS AND REASONS

The object of this Bill is to transfer the powers and duties of the Commissioner for Local Government under the Public Health (Division of Lands) Ordinance, 1928, to the Commissioner of Lands and Settlement in consequence of the reorganization of the Department of Local Government, Lands and Settlement. It is considered unnecessary for the Chief Secretary to be the Chairman of the Board and provision is now made for the Commissioner of Lands and Settlement to assume the duties of Chairman.

No expenditure of public moneys will be involved if the provisions of this Bill become law.

OBJECTS AND REASONS

The boundaries of the Nairobi and Mombasa Municipalities are set out in the First and Third Schedules to the Local Government (Municipalities) Ordinance, 1928

With a view to obviating an amendment to the Ordinance each time an alteration is required to be made to the boundaries of these municipalities it is considered desirable that the Governor should be empowered to alter those boundaries in the same manner as he may alter the boundaries of municipalities established under section 11 of the Ordinance. Clauses 2 and 3 of the Bill make provision accordingly

It is considered that there is no necessity for the Estimates of Municipal Boards to receive the approval of the Governor in Council, and clause 4 contains provision for the approval of such Estimates by the Standing Committee for Local Government, subject to an appeal to the Governor in Council

The Standing Committee established under the Local Government (Municipalities) Ordinance is at present distinct from the Standing Committee established under the Local Government (District Councils) Ordinance. It is desired to combine these two committees, and clause 5 makes provision for the constitution of a single Standing Committee for Local Government

No expenditure of public moneys will be involved if the provisions of this Bill become law

- (8) For controlling and regulating native dances on farms or elsewhere within the district
- (9) For regulating, managing and controlling the use of hospitals and dispensaries established by the Council, and for fixing the charges to be made in connexion therewith

No by-law made under this section shall be inconsistent with or repugnant to the provisions of this Ordinance or of any Ordinance dealing with public health, or of any other law in force within the district

(h) for regulating the retirement, removal and resignation of members of such committees of management or trustees and for the filling of vacancies caused thereby,

(i) for prescribing that no pension or right to a pension shall be capable of being assigned or transferred or otherwise ceded or of being pledged or hypothecated or of being attached or subjected to any form of execution under a judgment or order of a court of law, and for withholding, suspending or entirely discontinuing the payment of the same in the event of the beneficiary attempting to assign, transfer or otherwise cede, pledge or hypothecate any pension or right as aforesaid,

(j) for prescribing that in the event of any person in receipt of an annuity being convicted by any court of His Majesty's dominions and being sentenced to imprisonment without the option of a fine for a period exceeding one month any such annuity shall during such period of imprisonment be payable to his dependants,

(k) for entering into an agreement with one or more other councils to establish a united pension, provident or benevolent fund for the benefit of persons in the service of all or any of those councils

- (i) every such united fund shall be established by separate resolution passed by each of the councils and approved by the Governor and shall be subject to such by-laws as may be made under paragraphs (a) to (j) hereof and adopted by each of the councils concerned,

OBJECTS AND REASONS

The Standing Committee established under the Local Government (District Councils) Ordinance is at present distinct from the Standing Committee established under the Local Government (Municipalities) Ordinance, and the object of clauses 2 and 15 of this Bill is to combine these two Committees

The District Commissioner of the district is statutorily a member of the District Council. It is desired, however, that the Ordinance be amended to provide that, where the area under the jurisdiction of a District Council contains two or more administrative districts, such district commissioners as may be appointed by the Governor in Council, or the district officers deputed respectively by the district commissioners so appointed, shall be members of the Council. Clause 3 of the Bill is designed to achieve this end.

Sections 25 and 27 of the Principal Ordinance provide, inter alia, for the appointment of a Returning Officer at each election and for nomination papers to be delivered to the Returning Officer at an appointed time and place. Difficulties have been experienced in cases where an election has been held in two or more wards, and clauses 4, 5 and 6 of the Bill are designed to overcome these difficulties by providing for the appointment of a Returning Officer for each ward. Clause 7 transfers the duty of publishing the result of an election from the Returning Officer to the Clerk, and clause 8 clarifies the procedure to be followed when a candidate retires after an election has been adjourned for the purpose of taking a poll.

Section 34 (3) of the Principal Ordinance provides that, in the event of the office of chairman becoming vacant, a successor shall be appointed at the next meeting but one of the Council after the vacancy occurs. This seems unnecessary, and in clause 9 provision is made for the appointment of a successor at the next ordinary meeting of the Council.

Clause 10 makes provision for the appointment of a deputy chairman and defines his functions.

It is desired that District Councils should have power to acquire houses as residences for their staff, to establish pension, provident or benevolent funds, and to make contributions to public libraries. Clause 11 is designed to make the necessary additions to section 57 of the Principal Ordinance, whereunder the powers of Councils are defined, and as the establishment of pension, provident or benevolent funds requires the making of appropriate by-laws, clause 12 is designed to make the necessary additions to section 66 of the Principal Ordinance which contains the by-law making powers.

As the law stands at present no transfer of premises within the area under the jurisdiction of a District Council can be made until a certificate to the effect that all rates have been paid is submitted by the Council concerned to the registration officer. It is obviously unnecessary for such a certificate to be submitted if no rate is in existence, and by clause 13 the requisite amendment is made.

It is considered that there is no necessity for District Councils' Estimates to receive the approval of the Governor in Council and Clause 14 contains provision for such approval to be given by the Standing Committee for Local Government. A right of appeal to the Governor in Council against any decision of the Standing Committee already exists under section 119 (5) of the Principal Ordinance.

No expenditure of public moneys will be involved if the provisions of this Bill become law.

A Bill to Establish a Board of Trustees for the Purpose of Administering Museums in the Colony which may be vested in the Board, and to Provide for the Management and Control of the Museum carried on in the Coryndon Memorial

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of Kenya, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows —

1 This Ordinance may be cited as the Museums Trustees Ordinance, 1938, and shall come into operation on such date as the Governor may, by notice in the Gazette, appoint

ESTABLISHMENT OF BOARD OF TRUSTEES

2 In this Ordinance, unless the context otherwise requires, the following expressions have the meanings hereby respectively assigned to them —

“Coryndon Memorial” means the land and buildings vested in the Board by section 8 of this Ordinance,

 - (b) two members to represent scientific interests, to be nominated by the East Africa and Uganda Natural History Society. Provided that if such Society ceases to exist such members shall be deemed to have resigned and the Governor in Council, on the advice of the Board, may reappoint the two members who are so deemed to have resigned or appoint two other persons interested in the natural sciences to be members of the Board,
 - (c) one member representing the Municipal Council of Nairobi, to be nominated by such Council, and

- (c) subject to the provisions of this Ordinance do all such other things as appear to it necessary or expedient for furthering the interests and increasing the utility of any museum,
- (d) apply any money received on the sale, or disposal of any movable property or by way of payment for admission to any museum, or by way of gift or grant or otherwise, in the purchase of any object which in the opinion of the Board it is desirable to acquire for any museum or in furthering the interests and increasing the utility of any museum

- (e) solicit and accept and receive, subscriptions, donations, devises and bequests (whether of movable or immovable property and whether absolute or conditional) for the general purposes of any museum or for any special purpose of any museum or subject to any trust,
- (f) affiliate with other institutions of a generally similar character,
- (g) do all such other lawful things as are incidental or conducive to the attainment of the objects set out in this section and in section 6 of this Ordinance

- (g) for regulating the keeping and presentation of accounts,
- (h) for securing the due administration of any museum and preserving the objects collected therein,
- (i) for regulating the admission of members of the public to any museum and regulating the payments to be made for admission thereto and prescribing a penalty not exceeding twenty-five pounds for contravention or non-compliance with any such regulation, and
- (j) generally for carrying out the objects and purposes of this Ordinance

Provided, however, that an employer of a servant engaged under a contract of service shall not render himself liable to the aforesaid penalties by inducing or attempting to induce such servant to proceed to any place within the Uganda Protectorate or the Tanganyika Territory or within the dominions of the Sultan of Zanzibar beyond the Colony or to any port on Victoria Nyanza

“Provided further, however, that the General Manager of the Kenya and Uganda Railways and Harbours Administration shall not render himself liable to any of the aforesaid penalties by inducing or attempting to induce any servant of such Administration to proceed to any place within the Uganda Protectorate or the Tanganyika Territory or to any port on Victoria Nyanza whenever in the opinion of the General Manager it is necessary for such servant so to proceed ”

8 Section 37 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby repealed and the following is substituted therefor — Repeal and replacement of section 37 of the Principal Ordinance

“37 On the termination of his contract of service every servant, if he so desires, shall be provided at the expense of his employer with—

(a) reasonable transport or the cost thereof to the servant's place of engagement, and

(b) a sufficient supply of food for the servant's consumption on the way back to his place of engagement or an amount of money sufficient to purchase such supply of food ”

9 Section 69 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby amended by deleting therefrom the full stop which occurs at the end thereof and substituting therefor the following — Amendment of section 69 of the Principal Ordinance

“, but so that no employer or servant shall be punished twice for the same offence ”

OBJECTS AND REASONS

In order to avoid congestion and delay clause 2 allows assistant and sub-assistant surgeons to carry out medical examinations under sections 42, 43 and 79, as well as under section 40 Powers of medical officers under the Ordinance, except powers under sections 77 and 79, are also given to registered medical practitioners

Clause 3 provides that a servant need not wait to be paid until the expiration of forty-two days if he completes his ticket contract before that time

It is inconvenient for the Chief Secretary to attest and approve all foreign contracts of service so clause 4 provides that such contracts shall first be attested by magistrates and then approved by the Chief Secretary

Clause 5 corrects an error in section 11 of the Ordinance, in that the proviso is only intended to relate to domestic servants and sailors

A further proviso is added exempting the General Manager, Kenya and Uganda Railways and Harbours Administration, when he deems it necessary to take railway employees out of Kenya, e.g. a wash-out or break-down on the line in Uganda or Tanganyika

The offence of harbouring a servant, who has unlawfully left his employment, is less severe than the other offences specified in section 18 and accordingly clause 6 provides a lesser penalty for this particular offence

Clause 7 amends section 27 to ensure that no employer is prosecuted for continuing to employ a physically unsuitable juvenile unless the employer has been notified to that effect

Clause 8 provides for free transport back to the place of engagement, in addition to the present provision of free food, of a voluntarily engaged servant on the termination of his contract

Clause 9 clarifies the law to ensure that no employer or servant is prosecuted twice for the same offence

No expenditure of public moneys will be involved if the provisions of this Bill become law

LOCUST REPORT

THE SITUATION IN KENYA ON 10TH NOVEMBER, 1938

The Migratory Locust (*Locusta migratorioides*)

THERE has been but little change in the distribution of the various swarms throughout the Colony and, with the exception of one or two which have entered Kamasia country, swarms have continued to circle within fairly narrow limits. The position in the various areas is as follows —

Trans Nzoia-Uasin Gishu—The large swarm in the district, which was joined by a less mature swarm from North Kavirondo, has continued its laying activities. Baiting is being carried out against the hopper bands in north-east Trans Nzoia, Endebess and Hoey's Bridge and a successful kill is reported from Endebess. Further hoppers are expected to emerge at Hoey's Bridge as the laying swarm remained there for over a week, laying throughout the time, before passing on to Soy, Turbo, Moiben and Eldoret. A mature swarm was in the neighbourhood of Eldoret on the 4th November and is now reported to be in the Burnt Forest wheat area. Wheat crops to the west of Eldoret have been badly damaged.

Kerio Valley—One of the swarms which entered the Elgeyo District from Uasin Gishu has now laid near the Marakwet Forest Reserve over an area estimated at one to two square miles. The other swarm is reported to have proceeded along the Kamasia Hills and was reported to be flying east towards Baringo on 7th November. The latter swarm is also ready to lay and efforts are being made to keep track of it.

Kamasia—Some of the scattered swarms which have been present in the Solai-Subukia area for some time were reported to be flying in the direction of Baringo and a further swarm has entered Southern Kamasia from the Kilombe Forest Reserve. This swarm has been in the vicinity of the Visoi-Sabatia Road for the past week and is ready to lay.

Rongai-Ravine—This swarm which has been present in this area since the end of October commenced to lay about 31st November near Rongai. A band of hoppers covering about 300 acres has appeared in the vicinity of Sabatia and bait is being sent there immediately. Further supplies of bait will be available in the Rongai District in good time for the hoppers when they emerge.

Thomson's Falls-Rumuri—There are still some scattered swarms in this area, but it is reported that no laying has taken place.

Kisumu-Londiani—A sparse swarm, ready to lay, appeared in the Kibos sugar area, on the 4th November, but it is reported that no laying has taken place.

South Kavirondo—There has been no confirmation of the report that a swarm was present near Watende, and it is probable that the swarm has now left the district.

Narok—The small swarm in this area, which did not cover more than 100 acres is now reported by the District Commissioner, Narok, to be much reduced in numbers, as many of the locusts are dead or dying. These locusts have not yet reached the laying stage, specimens have been received at Nairobi and are being examined in order to determine, if possible, from what disease they are suffering.

General

It is to be expected that egg-laying will become general from now onwards and it is essential that where this occurs, information should be sent in without delay.

Sudan—The following details are taken from the report issued by the Government of Anglo-Egyptian Sudan, for the month of September.

Breeding took place in the northern, central, western and southern areas and hopper bands appeared in these and in the north-eastern area. Control measures were continued with vigour and vast numbers of hoppers were poisoned and it is believed that practically all hoppers in controlled areas were destroyed. A number of swarms of young flyers appeared towards the end of the month and these probably emanated from the large uncontrolled area on both sides of the Nile.

In the southern area there were only seven reports of flying swarms. Mating occurred east of Juba towards the end of the month and hopper bands were reported from Renk, and were probably widespread from Malakal northwards.

Uganda—A telegraphed report from Uganda states that three swarms are present in Lango and one in Chua. Swarms are believed to be present in Gulu and West Nile and another swarm was seen flying west over Bunyoro. As in the case of the remnants of the Red Locust, which have nearly been exterminated, hoppers will be destroyed wherever they are reported.

Tanganyika—A report issued by the Director of Agriculture states that swarms arrived in the Musoma and Mwanza districts and further swarms are reported to be flying southwards from Kenya.

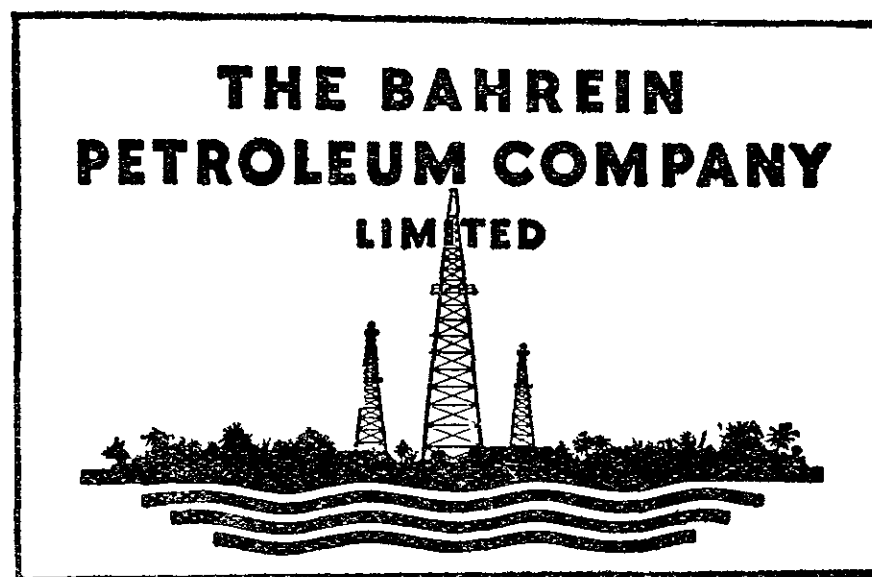
