### A BILL ENTITLED

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE FORFEITURE OF LANDS ORDINANCE, 1953, AND THEREBY TO PROVIDE FOR THE FORFEITURE AND PENAL SETTING APART OF LANDS AND INTERESTS IN LAND OF PERSONS PARTICIPATING OR AIDING IN ARMED OR VIOLENT RESISTANCE AGAINST THE FORCES OF LAW AND ORDER AND FOR THE SIMPLIFICATION AND EXPEDITION OF PROCEDURES UNDER THE SAID ORDINANCE

ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of Kenya, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows —

Short title and commencement No 11 of 1954 1. This Ordinance may be cited as the Foifeiture of Lands (Amendment) Ordinance, 1955 and shall be read and construed as one with the Forfeiture of Lands Ordinance, 1953 (hereinafter referred to as the principal Ordinance), and shall come into force upon such day as the Governor shall 5 by Proclamation in the Gazette declare that Her Majesty's assent has been given thereto

Amendment of long title of the principal Ordinance

2. The long title of the principal Ordinance is amended by inserting immediately after the word "ORGANIZING", appearing therein the words "OR PARTICIPATING OR 10 AIDING IN"

Amendment of section 2 of the principal Ordinance

- 3 Sub-section (3) of section 2 of the principal Ordinance is amended in the following respects—
  - (1) by relettering paragraphs (a) (b) and (c) thereof as paragraphs (b) (c) and (d) respectively, and 15
  - (11) by inserting therein a new paragraph (a) as follows—
    - (a) "Local Board" means the Local Land Board established under section 3 of the Native Lands Trust Ordinance,

4 Section 3 of the principal Ordinance is amended in <sup>20</sup> the following respects—

  - (3) A native land rights confiscation order may be made against one or more persons named therein and shall be published in the Gazette and shall take 35 effect in accordance with the provisions of this Ordinance upon such publication or upon such day as shall be specified therein
  - (4) In this section "the appointed day" means such day as may be appointed by the Governor by 40 notice in the Gazette for the purposes of this section

(5) Any one or more of the orders aforesaid may be made in respect of the same person

5. Section 7 of the principal Ordinance is amended by Amendment deleting sub-section (2) thereof

Effect of and disposal of land 10 affected by a native land rights confiscation order

7A Where a native land rights confiscation order is made against any person, the following provisions shall apply as respects any land, situate within the Native Lands, in which such person has any interest, whether such interest be in possession or reversion, vested, contingent or otherwise—

(a) where the land is not clan land or land otherwise held communally, according to native law and custom, all the right, title and interest of such person in or to the land shall, forthwith upon the order coming into effect and, without further or other assurance than this Ordinance, vest in the Local Board (as if such Board were a body corporate with perpetual succession empowered to hold and dispose of land or any right, title or interest in or to land) and the Local Board may at any time thereafter, with the approval of the Provincial Commissioner, dispose of the same, whether by way of gift, sale, exchange, tenancy, licence or other assurance, or may, to the extent of such right, title or interest as aforesaid, authorize the user of the land for such local or general public purpose or communal purpose as the Provincial Commissioner may approve, and any proceeds of sale, rents or profits derived by or accruing to the Local Board from or in respect of the land shall be applied in the first instance in or towards defraying any compensation payable or paid under section 12 of this Ordinance in respect of any share or interest in the land, and, subject thereto, shall be paid into the revenues of the African District Council within whose area the land is situate or, if there is no such Council, into the African Trust Fund established under the African

(b) the Provincial Commissioner shall, as soon as may be, in consultation with the Local Board ascertain and certify the boundaries or extent of any such land, and the nature or extent of any such right, title or interest, as vests in the Local Board by reason of the provisions of paragraph (a) of this section, and every certificate of the Provincial Commissioner under this paragraph shall be lodged with and form part of the records of the Local Board and shall, subject to the provisions of section 13 and of sub-section (2) of section 17 of this Ordin-

- (c) where the land is clan land, or land otherwise held communally, according to native law and custom, all the right, title and interest therein of thereto of such person shall forthwith upon the order coming into 5 effect, be extinguished,
- (d) a Provincial Commissioner may at any time, after consulting the Local Board, and whether or not an action suit, claim or proceeding has been brought or instituted 10 or is pending or in course of being heard in relation to any land, certify whether or not such land is clan land, or land otherwise held communally, according to native law and custom and any such certificate 15 shall be final and binding in all respects for the purposes of this Ordinance

### PART IV—GENERAL

Section 18 of the principal Ordinance is amended by substituting for sub-section (1) thereof the following 15 sub-section—

(1) The Governor may by order at any time revoke or vary any forfeiture order, setting-apart order or native land rights confiscation order, and any order made under this sub-section in relation to a native land rights confiscation order may be made so as to apply to all the persons against whom the order is made or to some one or more of such persons only or in respect of any particular land or interest affected thereby

Provided that the revocation or variation of a forfeiture order, setting-apart order or native land rights confiscation order shall not prejudice or affect anything lawfully done or suffered thereunder prior to such revocation or variation

Section 19 of the principal Ordinance is amended by Amendment of 30 inserting immediately after the words "setting-apart order", section 19 of the principal where those words twice appear therein, the words "or native Oidinance land rights confiscation order"

#### MEMORANDUM OF OBJECTS AND REASONS

This Bill amends the Forfeiture of Lands Ordinance, 1953, in such a manner as to extend the powers of forfeiture conferred thereby so as to include power to forfeit the native land rights not only of persons leading or organizing but also of persons participating or aiding in, armed or violent resistance against the forces of law and order In addition to the present procedure under the principal Ordinance for forfeiture or penal setting-apart of identified lands and interests in land, a simplified and more expeditious procedure is introduced whereby "native land rights confiscation orders" may be made naming any number of persons as subjects thereof, and forfeiting all existing lands and land rights of such persons in the Native Lands the lands and land rights affected by such orders will be subsequently identified, non-clan land being vested in Local Land Boards with wide powers of disposal, and rights in clan land being extinguished It is intended that the Bill after enactment and subject to Her Majesty's assent, shall be brought into force simultaneously with the withdrawal of the present surrender offer

Clause 4 sets out the provisions which, by way of amendment of section 3 of the principal Ordinance, will confer the powers to make "native land rights confiscation orders"

Clause 6 introduces a new section 7A into the principal Ordinance providing for the effect of such orders on lands and land fights of the persons named therein, for the disposal and user of non-clan lands affected thereby, and for the extinction of rights in clan land affected thereby

Clause 9 amends section 12 of the principal Ordinance in regard to compensation to innocent persons whose rights or interests are adversely affected by such orders and clause 10 brings within the jurisdiction of the Tribunal established under section 11- of the principal Ordinance questions and disputes as to the nature or extent of any interest or the boundaries or extent of any non-clan land, alleged to be affected by a native land rights confiscation order, since clan rights will merely be extinguished by such orders no question of compensation will arise in regard thereto

By clause 14, sub-section (1) of section 18 of the principal Ordinance (which relates to revocation or variation of orders) is amended to include within its scope native land rights confiscation orders

The remaining amendments contained in the Bill are either formal or consequential

No additional expenditure of public moneys will be incurred if this Bill is enacted
