Consumption from 9,001 to 18,000 litres per month—three shillings and thirty cents per one thousand litres or fifteen shillings per one thousand gallons

Consumption above 18,000 litres per month—three shillings and seventy-five cents per one thousand litres or seventeen shillings and five cents per one thousand gallons

Registered water kiosk operators—The registered water kiosk operators will be buying water from the City Council at one shilling and thirty-two cents per thousand litres or six shillings per one thousand gallons and they in turn shall retail the water at ten cents per debe (a debe being an 18 litre or four gallon container)

- 2 *Sewer Tariffs*—The sewer services will be charged at one shilling and forty cents per 1,000 litres of sewerage or six shillings and thirty-five cents per one thousand gallons

Failure by the employer to implement the signed agreement between the parties in respect of meals allowance

1 The Kenya Game Hunting and Safari Workers Union shall hereinafter be referred to as the Claimants and African Bushtrails Safaris Ltd shall hereinafter be referred to as the Respondents

2 The parties were heard in Nairobi on 27th June, 1977, and 4th and 28th September, 1978, and relied on their written and verbal submissions. The Respondents also called the following witnesses to give evidence on oath —

AWARD

3 The Notification of Dispute Form "A" dated 10th June, 1976, duly signed by the parties was received by the Court on 14th April, 1977, together with the statutory certificate signed by the Labour Commissioner

The Court had fixed this dispute for hearing originally on 27th June, 1977, and after a preliminary exchange of views the Court recorded the following —

"Parties agree to try to settle the matter by making another attempt with the assistance of J M Mwashimba, Ag Deputy Chief Industrial Relations Officer and his assistants. In case of deadlock parties to apply for a new hearing date"

The Court must record its appreciation at the very detailed investigation which Mwashimba has carried out in this dispute with full co-operation of both the parties

Unfortunately the parties did not accept Mwashimba's recommendation for the settlement of this dispute and the Claimants applied to the Court to proceed with the hearing

During the hearing both the parties agreed that the Court should go through Mwashimba's report in addition to the evidence led by them and the verbal and written submissions by them

This dispute stems from a collective agreement which was signed on 9th October, 1975, between the Claimants and the E A Professional Hunters' Association which was effective from 1st May, 1975, and was to remain in force for a period of two years from that date

In this agreement clause 16 (i) on meal and accommodation allowance reads —

"16 (i) An employee required to perform work away from his principal place of employment shall unless his employer provides him with free meals during such period of absence be entitled to be paid subsistence allowance as follows —

(a) Morning meal Sh 4

(b) Mid day meal Sh 5

(c) Evening meal Sh 6

Provided that in the case of an employee who is supplied with rations such subsistence allowance will not be paid unless the employee cannot prepare the rations provided for him and the allowance shown shall be reduced by —

(a) Morning meal cts 25

(b) Mid-day meal cts 75

(c) Evening meal Sh 1 "

Prior to this agreement the allowance payable per day in the event of free rations not being given for one day was Sh 11 and as is stated above this particular item was increased to Sh 15. The Claimants have claimed a sum of Sh 3,990 in respect of meal allowance arrears on behalf of their members working for the Respondents the details of which appear hereinafter —

The Claimants' contention is that when the previous collective agreement expired on 30th April, 1975, the Respondents continued to give the same amount of rations and made no adjustments in this respect when the new agreement commenced with effect from 1st May, 1975, increasing the daily allowance to Sh 15. They further allege that the Respondents were providing rations to their employees which were totally inadequate and that the workers were forced to eat game meat. Moreover, the supplies of flour were not adequate and finished before the safari ended forcing the workers to use their own money to buy the necessary food

The Claimants have therefore pressed for the payment of the difference between the old and the new rate in respect of meal allowance per day being Sh 4 to be paid to their members as detailed hereinabove

The Respondents have submitted that this allowance is payable only when an employer does not provide a worker with free meals during periods of absence due to safaris. They added that as far as they were concerned they provided their employees with adequate rations and many times unused rations had to be returned to the stores after a safari and that they provided items like kimbo, tea, milk, soap (cake and flakes), sugar and salt (the same first class salt used by the hunters). In these circumstances they totally rejected the demand made by the Claimants.

The Claimants relied on the evidence which had been gathered by Mwashimba who had interviewed various employees and the Respondents called four witnesses. Apart from Mr and Mrs Carlos Da Cruz, they called Kiara and Mashua to give evidence. Both of these witnesses stated that during safaris the Respondents provided them with food and prior to the tent being pitched in the bush they were given a daily allowance. They further added that food during safari was sufficient. Kiara admitted that while in Nairobi he worked as a shamba boy and Mashua stated in Court that he had told lies to Mwashimba when he was interviewing them and since then he had realized that it was best to tell the truth. He added that the claim which had been formulated by the Claimants on behalf of their members including himself was false.

The Court has decided not to place any reliance on the evidence of these two witnesses, particularly Mashua. His whole conduct of first telling lies to Mwashimba and then giving a different account while giving evidence in Court leaves a lot to be desired.

After careful consideration of all the submissions and having gone through Mwashimba's investigation report and the evidence given by witnesses in Court, the Court has come to the conclusion that what the Claimants really are after is the difference of Sh 4 per day in the allowance payable when the workers are on safari because they feel that this was an additional benefit which they had won for their members and the Respondents having failed to increase the rations which they provided to their employees should compensate them by paying them this amount of Sh 4 for all the days they were on safari. There is also a further allegation that the rations which were supplied by the Respondents to their employees during safari were not adequate. Unfortunately in the collective agreement it is not provided anywhere what would constitute a free meal which was to be provided to an employee during safari. So the position is that the Respondents state that they provided their employees with adequate food and the workers allege that the food so provided was not adequate.

The Court notes that Mwashimba has stated in his report that the records produced by the Respondents did not quite support the Respondents' earlier statements. First the Respondents stated that all the employees' money had been paid. They used to get free ration and Sh 11 instead of Sh 9. Later, however, with the help of the records it was stated that the employees received Sh 10 instead of Sh 9. It would therefore show that there was an underpayment if the rate of Sh 10 was to be accepted.

Mwashimba adds that secondly the records show overpayment as well as underpayment as some employees from the records had been paid Sh 4 per day as being claimed by the Claimants in this case, in arrears but the Respondents have referred to this payment as *ex gratia*.

The Court has also come to the same conclusion as Mwashimba that there is a lot of doubt in this dispute in respect of allowance paid and in respect of the adequacy and quality of the rations given.

The Court can see the reason which prompted the Claimants to forward this claim of Sh 4 per day in respect of their members for all the days they were on safari but the Court cannot accept that the workers are entitled to the whole of this amount. The increase in the allowance by Sh 4 under the collective agreement must have taken into account the increase in the cost of foodstuffs in addition to increasing the benefit under this item to the workers.

After careful consideration of all the submissions the Court awards that all the employees involved in this dispute whose names are set out hereinabove with the exception of P Mashua, should be paid meal allowance arrears at the rate of Sh 2 per day for the days worked as shown against their names. Mashua, according to his own statement, would not like to be a party to this claim.

One other aspect which cropped up during this hearing and which the Court feels it must make a comment on is the very unfriendly relationship between the Claimants' General Secretary and the Respondents' proprietors, Mr and Mrs Da Cruz. The Court was astonished to hear the sort of insults which the

General Secretary had hurled at them and by the attitude of the Respondents in being so intolerant of the Claimants that they had to call the police on one occasion.

The Court is not at all happy at this sort of situation and would strongly advise both the parties that they should understand that the first and foremost point in establishing good industrial relations is to show mutual respect and courtesy to each other. The Court hopes that the parties will heed this advice and improve their relationship.

AWARD

3 The Notification of Dispute Form "A" dated 8th May, 1978 duly signed by the parties was received by the Court on 31st July together with the statutory certificates signed by the Minister for Labour and the Labour Commissioner.

The two persons involved in this dispute had their services terminated after a party which was hosted by the Respondents and the Casino de Paradise to which about 71 guests were invited. It was alleged that certain malpractices had taken place during the party as a result of which deliberate overcharging had taken place and a falsified invoice in respect of the party was presented to the management with an attempt to cover misappropriation of the day's cash sales. The details of all these allegations are set out in great detail in the parties' written submissions and will be referred to only as and when necessary in the award hereinafter.

Peter Mwaura's services were terminated with effect from 7th July and he was told that he would receive pay up to and including 6th July, 1977 along with any leave earned, any travel allowance earned and any overtime earned.

Shem Bunyoli suffered a normal termination and the management advised him that he would be paid the following:

- One month's pay in lieu of notice
- Any leave earned
- Any travel allowance earned
- Any overtime earned

Mr Bunyoli at the time of termination of his employment had worked for the Respondents in the position of a Head

Barman for 7½ years and there is no dispute that he had received no warning during this period or that his work performance was not up to the standard as required by the management.

Mr Mwaura on the other hand had been working for the Respondents from 1st April, 1977 as a Barman. It was claimed on his behalf that he was persuaded by a member of the Respondents management to resign from his job with Red Bull Restaurant and join them.

The Respondents admitted that the party on 6th July, 1977 in the evening was an impromptu affair and no prior special arrangements had been made for it. The Court believes Mr Bunyoli when he says that when he came on duty at 7 p.m. on that day he found many people in the main bar and he started helping Mr Mwaura to serve them. It was then that he was told by Mr Mwaura that some of the patrons were invited guests and that prior to that he had no information regarding this party.

The Court is satisfied that despite Mr Bunyoli being the Head Barman the real person in charge of that party that evening was Mr Mwaura and that Mr Bunyoli was assigned to help him and that Mr Bunyoli was not assigned any special duties and that what he did there was nothing more than to serve the guests. This is borne out by the fact that the invoice which was presented to the Managing Director in the morning of 7th July in respect of the previous night's party was prepared by Mr Mwaura. If Mr Bunyoli had been responsible for this party as a Head Barman then surely he would have been required to prepare this invoice.

It turned out that this invoice for Sh 5,701/55 was a false invoice in that it included cash sales of whisky worth Sh 531/15 which amount had been paid in cash by a distinguished customer and which amount Mr Mwaura had failed to reflect on to the N.C.R. audit machine.

The Managing Director having become suspicious caused an investigation by the General Manager which revealed the following in respect of cash sales:

"The Barman paid in to the cash office Sh 934 95 made up as follows —

The N.C.R. Cash Register Audit roll was checked and it gave the reading of 775 50 made up as follows —

Further the General Manager found out that a distinguished guest in his presence had paid a sum of Sh 531/15 in cash in respect of two bottles of Black Label Whisky and that this amount did not appear on the audit roll of the N.C.R. machine.

It also came to light that after the closing stock had been worked out and calculated and compared to actual sales as charged by Mr Mwaura to the parties the following facts emerged —

After careful perusal of all the relevant documents that were produced in this dispute and consideration of the evidence given by the witnesses the Court has no hesitation in coming to the conclusion that Mr Mwaura had indeed cooked up fictitious figures in order to hide the unknown total amount of money which he had obviously dishonestly appropriated together with Sh 531/15 being the cost of two bottles of whisky purchased by a distinguished guest who was at the hotel that night.

The Court rejects the half hearted and at times silly attempts made by Mr Mwaura to give a satisfactory explanation to all these dishonest deeds. There is no merit whatsoever in his statement that there was an excess because of the cocktail drinks that were ordered or because they also sold the barman's tot and so on.

The Court having come to this conclusion in respect of Mr Mwaura has now to decide to what extent, if any, Mr Bunyoli was a party to all this sordid affair.

To begin with the Court must record that it was very much impressed by the demeanour and straightforward manner of Mr Bunyoli when he gave evidence during the hearing. He appeared to be an honest and straightforward person. The only serious piece of evidence against him was given by the Respondents' witness, M Mbogo, who said that he gave a sum of Sh 300 to Mr Bunyoli in respect of one bottle of Black Label Whisky and that he saw Mr Bunyoli prepare the cash sale for Sh 271/10. The Court could not find any cash sale which had been written by Mr Bunyoli for Sh 271/10 as alleged by this witness although later in cross-examination this witness stated that he did not see Mr Bunyoli writing as the cash book was on the other side of the counter.

In any case, the Court has no doubt that Mr Mwaura was in charge of the N.C.R. machine and it was his duty to make appropriate entries on the audit roll in respect of all cash that was handed to him by Mr Bunyoli and the others for that matter. It was not Mr Bunyoli's responsibility to operate the machine.

Out of the evidence of Mr Bunyoli and Mr Mbogo the Court finds that Mr Bunyoli's evidence is truthful and the Court cannot accept Mr Mbogo's evidence against Mr Bunyoli on the points as alleged by him against Mr Bunyoli.

The General Manager's memorandum on the investigation which he carried out states that Mr Bunyoli was Head Barman and worked behind the bar from 7 p.m. to 12.30 a.m. During that time he was seen physically using the N.C.R. machine and handling cash. As a barman of many years' experience he should have noticed that something was wrong, if not he should not be in the position of Head Barman.

The Court finds that there was no satisfactory evidence, if any, to prove what is mentioned in the General Manager's memorandum re Mr Bunyoli using the N.C.R. machine and handling cash. Probably he did receive some cash but the Court finds that he handed that cash over to Mr Mwaura for entering on the cash machine.

The Respondents cannot escape a certain amount of responsibility for what happened that night in that they had not made any special arrangements for this party and had entrusted it to an employee who had been with them for about three months only and further the Head Barman, Mr Bunyoli, had no prior notice of this party until the time when he came on duty at 7 p.m. that night and according to his own words he started helping Mr Mwaura in serving the customers and that his duty was to see that things went smoothly and as far as he was concerned they did go smoothly. The Court has grave doubts if Mr Bunyoli had any hand in the dishonest acts that took place that night. The only failure on his part, as alleged by the Respondents, is that he should have detected that something wrong was going on during the party. This the Court finds hard to believe because the main culprit, Mr Mwaura, could easily have manoeuvred things without Mr Bunyoli being actually aware of what was going on.

Mr Bunyoli claimed in his evidence that the Assistant Manager, P Kiarie, had been against him since the strike of 1970 when he, Mr Bunyoli, had just joined the Respondents. Mr Bunyoli at that time was a shopsteward and the strike was against Mr Kiarie.

This dispute was investigated by Mrs D. A. Randiak of Nairobi Labour Office and the Permanent Secretary Ministry of Labour forwarded the following findings and recommendation to the parties.

"Findings

The Management confirm in their submission that there was no special arrangement made for an elaborate party such as the one they held on the day of the incident that caused two employees lose their jobs. Surely there ought to have been such arrangements to avoid unnecessary confusion as was likely to occur when the patrons of the bar buy drinks, while the guests are supposed to get their drinks free. Mr Mwaura was a barman on that particular day while Mr Shem although without any formal briefing found himself in what was more or less a dilemma. He is understandably a Head Barman who checks the stocks of the Barman in the three bars in the Hotel but on this particular occasion he was not assigned any role to do with the coordinating the activities of the party.

Mr Mwaura was seemingly in charge of the whole operation and ought to have recorded all the sales on the machine. Some undoubtedly glaring omissions occurred one of which a distinguished guest decided to pay for a bottle of his favourite drinks in the presence of the General Manager. The waiter concerned gave back the correct change but the sale was not entered in the machine. This one example led the
