- (g) prepare technical documents and papers in the field of his/her expertise for the Permanent Secretary of Education and for the use of the Planning Unit after his/her departure;
- (h) undertake any other duties which may be assigned to him/her within his/her field of competence.

Qualifications

- (a) University degree or equivalent in Education and/or Economics.
- (b) Broad and varied experience in the economics of education and in cost and financing, preferably in developing countries.

Language qualifications.—English.

Duration of appointment.—One year starting as soon as possible after deadline, with possibility of extension.

Organizational location.—Stores Section, Purchase and Stores Division and Bureau of General Services.

Duties and responsibilities

Under the authority of the Chief of Division, the incumbent will be responsible for managing the Organization's stores. He will be in charge of planning, organizing, co-ordinating and supervising all the activities of the units coming under his

orders (supplies, furniture, paper-cutting, maintenance of office equipment, etc.). In this capacity, his responsibilities will include the following

- (a) assisting in the preparation of detailed work plans and , implementing them when they have been approved;
- (b) receipt, storage and distribution of supplies, furniture, equipment and duty-free wines and spirits, carrying out the necessary supervision at all stages responsibility for maintaining all the movable property of the Organization in good order;
- (c) on the basis of detailed statistical records of use, and also in the light of the storage capacity available, drawing up itemized procurement plans established in accordance with exact calculations of the quantities required and the periodicity of use. In particular, maintaining a strict balance of stocks, so as to ensure that covering stocks, which are neither excessive nor inadequate, exist in respect of each item. In this connexion, assisting in studies with a view to the gradual introduction of computerized management methods;
- (d) co-operating closely with the Purchase Section before issuing invitations to tender and placing orders to replenith stocks. In this connexion, seeking optimum standardization and compiling and filing appropriate technical documentation;
- (e) keeping stores accounts, organizing and supervising periodical inventories, and checking stores and accounts as necessary. Preparing supply price-lists and catalogues and making out invoices to permanent delegations. Drawing up reports and statistics on the activities of the Section as necessary.

Duties and responsibilities

Under the supervision of the Director of the Office, plan and carry out regional, sub-regional and national activities of Unesco

- in the Arab States, relating to engineering education and research. In particular, the incumbent will be responsible for-
 - (a) planning and implementing in the region overall programmes for the education and training of engineers and higher technicians, and other technologists as well as for the development of engineering research;
 - (b) maintaining liaison with the work of the international and national experts and consultants working on such programmes, as well as the planning of studies for fellowship candidates and the procurement of laboratory equipment, with a view to strengthening co-ordination of activities in the region;
 - (c) assuming regional co-ordinating responsibility for the implementation of Unesco regional projects of engineering education, training and research;
 - (d) establishing liaison with the appropriate national and international professional engineering societies, association—and in particular the Federation of Arab Engineers (AAE) and the Federation of African Organizations of Engineers (FAOE)—and national societies of engineers and technicians:
 - (e) organizing training courses for practising engineers in priority areas of Unesco's programme;
 - (f) assisting the efforts of national or regional scientific or engineering institutions and associations in the adaptation and transfer of technology;
 - (g) assisting in UNDP country programming exercise, as required;
 - (h) carrying out any other related duties as may be assigned.

Qualifications and experience required

- (a) Doctoral degree or equivalent in engineering, with substantial professional experience.
- (b) Several years' experience in teaching and research together with experience in industry as an engineer.
- (c) Experience in planning and administration in an educational or research institution, preferably in several countries.
- (d) Experience in the designing curricula for training engineers or technicians in the developing countries.
- (e) Interest and preferably experience in working conditions in the Arab States.
- (f) Excellent knowledge of English or French; working knowledge of the other language highly desirable; knowledge of Arabic.

- (c) providing technical support for operational projects in all areas of technical and vocational education, and assisting in the formulation, supervision and evaluation of field projects, as well as in the briefing of experts and the evaluation of their performance;
- (d) analysing and commenting on project documents, reports, programmes and lists of equipment relating to the various branches of technical and vocational education;
- (e) assisting in studies and investigations, and preparing technical documents on subjects related to the various aspects of technical and vocational education and teacher-training for this type of education;
- (f) drafting correspondence on the implementation of such aspects of the Programme as are entrusted to him;
- (g) undertaking missions to Member States to advise them on improving technical and vocational education curricula, or to evaluate field projects;
- (h) performing such other tasks as may be requested of him, in his field of competence, by the official responsible for the programme on technical and vocational education.

Qualifications and experience required

- (a) University degree or equivalent, in at least one special subject relating to technical and vocational education.
- (b) Extensive experience of technical and vocational education, including technical teacher-training, and good experience in industry.

Initial appointment will be at D-2 grade, with a net salary equivalent to US\$33,552 (US\$30,756 if without dependants) per annum, payable mainly in French francs, plus the following prescribed annual allowances: post adjustment (which varies according to the cost of living), at present \$33,216 for staff members with dependants, \$30,456 for staff members without dependants; family allowance of \$450 for each dependent child (if there is no dependent spouse, this indemnity is not payable in respect of the first dependent child). - 1. The Kenya Union of Journalists shall hereinafter be referred to as the Claimants and Nation Newspapers Ltd. and Standard Ltd. (Publishers) shall hereinafter be referred to as the Respondents.
- 2. The parties were heard in Nairobi on 1st and 2nd October, 1979 and relied on their written and verbal submissions.

AWARI

3. In exercise of the powers conferred on the Minister for Labour under section 7A of the Trade Disputes Act (Cap. 234), the Minister referred this dispute to the Industrial Court on 25th July, 1979 as the parties had failed to sign the Notification of Dispute Form "A". The Court received the Minister's letter with the Labour Commissioner's certificate on 27th July, 1979.

The parties' previous collective agreement which was effective from 1st April, 1976 for a period of two years expired on 31st March, 1978. The fact that the Minister had to use his own special powers to refer the items on which the parties were in deadlock when revising the collective agreement does not speak well for the relationship between the parties as far as the industrial relations are concerned.

It is partinent to note that the Minister also referred another dispute to the Industrial Court on the same day between the same parties on the issue of level of representation. This dispute was stood over at the request of the publishers i.e. Nation Newspapers Ltd. and the Standard Ltd. on the condition that it would not prejudice Cause No. 42/79.

During the hearing the parties tried to blame each other for this most extraordinary delay which has resulted before the dispute was referred to the Industrial Court as the collective agreement had expired on 3lst March, 1978. The Court, however, is not inclined to make any finding as to who caused this delay because the parties have agreed on the effective date of the new collective agreement to be 1st April, 1978. They have also agreed that it should be of two years' duration. The Court, must, however, express its deep concern at this state of affairs as the journalists have been denied salary increases from 1st April, 1978 while the parties were trying to get even with each other. The Court would urge the parties that they should have a serious reappraisal of their relationship which obviously is very strained due to various causes with a view to bringing about an immediate improvement. The deteriorating situation should be arrested as otherwise both of them will unnecessarily suffer due to industrial confrontation and discord.

As is to be expected, by far the most important issues in dispute are the ones concerning wages and housing and the arguments which the parties put forward on these two items have also a strong bearing on the remaining issues as far as the total labour costs are concerned.

The Claimants have based their case on the submission that from 1st April, 1972 they have been under-compensated for the rise in the cost of living despite the parties' own voluntary agreements and the Court awards. They maintained that the compensation granted to the journalists remained far below that allowed by the Guidelines 5 and 6 and their real earnings eroded by as much as 78.9 per cent for the highest paid employee and as much as 71 per cent for the lowest paid group.

The Claimants demanded a monthly salary increase of 75 per cent based on the lowest scale that of K.Sh. 2,225 p.m. which would amount to K.Sh. 1,670 spread over two years. They maintained that the profits of both the Respondents had gone up considerably due to increased sales and increases in the advertising rates. Further this increased productivity and profitability had been brought about by a workforce of journalits which had remained static in number at about 35 persons for the Standard and 55 for the Nation.

The Claimants added that out of their entitlement of K.Sh. 1,670 increase p.m. a sum of K.Sh. 800 should be awarded as a separate house allowance to them with the remaining going on the salary increases.

The Respondents have very strongly resisted the Claimants' demand on all the items saying that the demand for 75 per

cent increase made by the Claimants should be rejected. They asked the Court that the anniversary increases which the journalitis had enjoyed over the years should be taken into account when any salary increase was formulated and that contrary to what the Claimants had stated they had created new jobs.

The Respondents maintained that in April 1976 when the parties' previous collective agreement came into effect the cost of living index for the upper income group stood at 113.1 per cent and in March 1978 when the agreement expired the cost of living stood at 137.1 per cent. The rise in the cost of living for the period was therefore 21.22 per cent. The Respondents argued that from April 1976 to July 1978 the journalists had been over-compensated by 13.70 per cent and between April 1978 to July 1979 by 13.33 per cent. They submitted that there was in fact very little if any that could be granted to them under the Guidelines.

The Respondents, however, made an offer by stating that the present salary structure should be retained and that with effect from 1st April, 1978 all the wages should go up by 8 per cent and there should be a further 6 per cent increase for the second year. They accepted that these increases should be applied to all journalists.

The Employment Promotion Division at the Court's request has carried out a very detailed analysis of the parties' claims and offers in relation to the Guidelines. This analysis reveals that the permi sible compensation ceiling for price increases under the Guidelines which were in force in 1978 i.e. two thirds of cost of living increase would entitled the Claimants on an average to the following wage increases:

April 1972 to March 1974 15.6 per cent April 1974 to March 1976 . . . 20.2 per cent April 1976 to March 1978 . . . 16.7 per cent

In case the Court decides to apply the 1979 wage Guidelines to this dispute then the Claimants' entitlement for the aforesaid periods would be as follows:

11.8 per cent.

15.2 per cent.

12.5 per cent.

The Court would first of all like to di pose of the submission made by the Claimants that they are entitled to be fully compensated for the alleged under-compensation which their members have suffered from 1972. Guideline (iv) clearly states that compensation for price increases other than those caused by increased taxation may be granted based on the rise of the Nairobi Wage Earners' Price Index from the time of the most recent revi ion of wages and salaries. The "most recent revision of wages and salaries", as far as the journalists are concerned, was the Court award which was announced on 30 h August, 1977 giving an effective date of 1st April, 1976 for the collective agreement. The Court, therefore, rules that the Claimants are entitled to claim compensation for the increase in the cost of living from that date only.

The Court has, however, come to the conclusion that the journalists should be given the benefit of the Guidelines which were in operation in 1978 which would entitle them to an overall wage increase averaging about two thirds of cost of living. The full text of this Guideline as in 1978 is stated below:

"(iv) (a) Compensation for cost of living increases will be allowed in full only for the lower paid groups. Wage increases should decline progressively as a percentage of wage for those in higher paid groups. Overall, wage increases should average about two thirds of cost of living but awards in lower paid industries may be greater and awards in higher paid industries lower."

The Claimants have also relied on Guidelines (v) and (vi) both of which read as follows:

"(v) Workers are entitled to a basic minimum standard of living. It will be for the Court to decide what that minimum should be from time to time in each occupation. But in deciding that minimum, it is suggested that the Court should always have regard to the standard of living of people who are not in wage employment, particularly the standards of the average small farmer in the rural areas.

(vi) As far as possible, priority in the allocation of awards should be given to lower paid workers provided this does not cause either a contraction in the opportunities for the employment of general unskilled labour or a decline in the incentives for workers to improve the levels of their work skills by training. Reasonable differentials should be established to reward skills and training, particularly as regards manual and technical skills."

After careful consideration of all the submissions the Court awards that the present salary structure should be retained and the Court awards that it should be varied as stated below with effect from 1st April, 1978:

The Court further awards that all the journalists with the exception of the four posts which are excluded in the recognition agreement should benefit from this Court award to the same extent and that even if they are beyond 7th or 8th year they should get these salary increases and the anniversary increases.

The Court award is applicable to only those journalists who are in employment at the date of the announcement of the Court award.

Housing

The Court rejected the deconsolidation of the wages in order to give a separate house allowance as demanded by the Claimants in 1977. This time the Claimants have asked for K.Sh. 800 out of their alleged entitlement of K.Sh. 1,670 to be given to them as a separate house allowance with the balance going towards wage increases.

The Court has already rejected the claim that the journalists are entitled to an increase of K.Sh. 1,670 and the Court has awarded them their full entitlement under the 1978 Guidelines under wages. The Court is neither inclined to deconsolidate this item from the wages nor is there anything left to award the Claimants under this heading.

The Court gave detailed reasons in the previous award for rejecting this demand and the Claimants have not produced any new arguments this time which could have persuaded the Court to award them a separate house allowance. As a matter of fact the Claimants themselves in their final submission had this to say on their claim under this item:

"The union would like to refer the Court to page 10 and 11 table 2 of the E.P.D. report for figures on rents.

The fact we have to live with is that there is very little control on rents and most of us rent houses without benefit of lease or without receiving receipts.

The landlords are not interested in whether we get housing allowance or how much as long as we pay them cash every month, wherever we get that cash from.

To get a separate housing allowance will assist journalists tremendously in budgetting their income and eventually it will also help in instituting some measure of control on rents by showing what the various income groups have at their disposal to pay rent. The 1972 agreement to consolidate expired with it and was moreover cancelled and anyway cannot supersede the agreement itself."

The Claimants in their above submission have in fact highlighted the point on which the Court has rejected their demand for deconsolidation in the past and which no doubt prompted the Claimants in 1972 to voluntarily agree with the Respondents to the following clause:

"The salary scales are consolidated containing an element for housing amounting to 10 per cent and the provision of housing is the responsibility of the employee and no housing allowance is granted. In future negotiations the salaries will remain consolidated with no claims to separte the housing element."

After careful consideration of all the submissions the Court rejects the Claimants' demand on housing.

Annual leave

The Claimants demand that the present leave entitlement of 30 days should be increased to 35 working days. The Court has carefully considered this demand and has decided that no change in the existing provision is justified just now. This demand is accordingly rejected.

Leave allowance

The Claimants have asked the Court to award a leave allowance of K.Sh. 2,000 to bring it in line with what the Respondents give to other staff members most of whom receive it as an extra month's salary in a year. The Claimants further want this allowance to be accumulated in case they don't take the leave in any year.

The Respondents have submitted that the current leave allowance of K.Sh. 600 is generous and there should be no further improvement.

The Court awards that the current entitlement of K.Sh. 600 leave allowance should be increased to K.Sh. 800 to be paid to an employee once a year when he proceeds on annual leave and the Court further rules that this allowance is not accumulable but should be paid at this rate for the year April 78 to March 79.

Sick leave

The Claimants have demanded that the journalists should be entitled to sick leave of one year on full pay and half year on half pay but the Court finds that this demand is totally unrealistic and without any merit whatsoever and it is accordingly rejected. The existing provisions should continue in force.

Maternity leave

Since the Claimants have linked their demand on this item to their demand under sick leave which the Court has rejected the Court rejects the Claimants' demand under this item as well.

Medical expenses

Under this item the Claimants' demand is that the families of their members should also benefit under the existing provision with the same limitations as applied to the families of expatriate employees/journalists. They argued that the health care of their families require their members to spend a big amount of money because of the high cost involved.

The Respondents submitted that the cost of living index included an item "household operation" which incorporated medical attention and added that in any case since medical attention was free in all Government hospitals the journalists could refer their families to such hospitals.

The Court notes that at present it is provided as follows:

"That the employees covered by the collective agreement will be free to receive treatment from any Registered Medical Practitioners, hospitals, medical institutions and purchase prescribed medicine/drugs by such doctors, and will have their expenses reimbursed or paid directly by the management, where an employee is unable to pay own cash."

After careful consideration of all the submissions the Court rejects this demand.

Mileage

The Claimants argued that the price of petrol between 1972 and 1978 had gone up by something like 400 per cent and so have the price of cars and of parts and servicing. They asked that current mileage allowance of K.Sh. 1/25 per km. should be increased to K.Sh. 3 per km.

The Respondents offered to increase the current rate to K.Sh. 1/50 per km.—an increase of 40 per cent.

The Court awards that the mileage allowance to be paid to paid to employees travelling on duty in their own vehicles should be increased to K.Sh. 2 per km.

Gratuity

The Claimants' demand on this item is restricted, according to them, to a few journalists who are entitled to this benefit. They demand that the gratuity should be paid at the rate of 60 days for each completed year of service for the period prior to National Social Security Fund.

The Claimants also demand that the Respondents should apply the pension scheme which they are operating besides the N.S.S.F. for the benefit of other employees to the journalists as well.

The Respondents have opposed both these demands on the ground that the existing gratuity benefits were very generous and that the introduction of a pension scheme was not a negotiable item.

The Court notes that in Cause No. 29 of 1974 it awarded that on completion of two years' continuous service an employee would be entitled to a minimum of 15 days' pay for every completed year of service by way of gratuity to be based on the employee's wage at the time of the termination of service. This scheme is for the period between 1st January, 1955 to September, 1966.

In 1977 the parties agreed to increase the entitlement to 30 days' pay for every completed year of service.

After careful consideration of all the submissions on this item the Court rejects both demands made by the Claimants. Safari subsistence allowance

The Claimants demand that this allowance thould be awarded as follows:

They argued that this would enable their memoers to meet the enormous increase in the prices asked by hotels and restaurants.

The Respondents have opposed any alteration in the exiting rates which are as follows

They have, however, offered that should an employee incur higher expenses that those stipulated above they should be required to produce receipts and the Respondents would reimburse such expenses.

In addition to above if any journalist incurs higher expenses than the above rates then the Respondents should reimburse him such amount on production of receipts.

Acting allowance

The Claimants want this provi ion to be amended to read "when acting during five working days the salary difference to be paid". They submitted that among the senior journalists there is frequent standing in for colleagues who have more senior or other specialized posts. They accused the Respondents of manipulating these arrangements in such a manner that the journalists do not earn any acting allowance. They further demand that the Respondents should pay the difference between the two actual salaries during the acting period instead of daking into account the minimum talary for the post for calculating the difference.

The Court can see no merit in this demand and rules that the present provision should continue.

Overnight allowance

The Claimants submitted that this should be increased to K.Sh. 300 in line with other increases.

The Respondents stated that the current allowance of KSh. 100 should remain but should a journalist spend more than this

amount then he should produce receipts and they would reimburse the amount on the same basis as the safari allowance.

The Court awards that the present allowance of K.Sh. 100 should continue as before and in case any journalist spends more than this amount then on production of the receipt the Respondents should reimburse him such amount.

Transport allowance

The Claimants have asked for a K.Sh. 300 p.m. transport allowance as they maintained that a disproportionate part of their salary is spent just on going on duty.

The Respondents have very strongly opposed this demand saying that it is the responsibility of an employee to transport himself to and from his job.

The Court rejects this demand.

Finally the Court would like to record that although the Respondents had asked for the award to be of three years' duration since this item is not an issue in dispute they withdrew their demand with the result that the duration period will remain as in the past i.e. two years from 1st April, 1978.

- 3. Effective date and duration.
- 1. The Kenya Union of Commercial Food & Allied Workers shall hereinafter be referred to as the Claimants and Dosh & Co. (Hardware) Ltd. and Mamjee Brothers Ltd. shall hereinafter be referred to as the Respondents.
- 2. The parties were heard in Nairobi on the 24th day of October, 1979 and relied on their written and verbal submissions.

AWARD

3. The Notification of Dispute Form "A" dated 21st March, 1979 duly signed by the parties was received by the Court on 31st August together with the statutory certificate signed by the Labour Commissioner.

The parties' previous collective agreement was effective from 1st April, 1976 and remained in force for a period of two years. The parties had also agreed that the collective agreement would remain in force until it is amended by either party wishing to vary or terminate it by giving one month's notice in writing of such intention.

The Claimants notified the Respondents of their intention to vary the agreement on 27th June, 1978. The Respondents had, however, granted a wage increase of K.Sh. 60 p.m. to all their employees with effect from 1st April, 1978 in accordance with the relevant clause in the collective agreement.

The salary structure as contained in the previous collective agreement is simple and strainghtforward listing five categories of workers with their rates as follows:

In their proposals the Claimants had introduced a new type of salary structure based on the years of service ranging from 1 to 12 with built-in increments and demanded a wage increase on top of them. They also introduced a new grading structure.

The Court would like at the outset to reject this move on the part of the Claimants as circumstances do not warrant any change in the present grading and salary structure. In any case this is not an issue in dispute. Moreover, the Claimants representative could not forward any convincing argument in support of this change. The Court has accordingly decided to make an award on the existing grades as set out hereinabove.

In accordance with the Guidelines the scope for labour cost increases is as follows:

The Court notes that the Respondents are local private companies engaged in hardware business and currently provide employment to 136 people out of which 94 are unionizable workers. The Respondents have also increased their workforce by 12 in accordance with the Presidential directive and this represents additional labour costs amounting to K.Sh. 79,920 per year an increase of about 5 per cent in terms of annual total labour costs.

The Court has also taken into consideration that there are 19 other hardware businesses in Mombasa alone who are competing with the Respondents and who are not subject to any collective agreements with the Claimants with the result that they apply the statutory terms and conditions of employment. The Respondents are definitely at a disadvantage in this respect.

The Employment Promotion Division have estimated that the Claimants' demand on wage increase is about K.Sh. 103 on the average. The Claimants have also demanded a house allowance at the rate of 15 per cent of an employee's basic wage/salary and have demanded the deconsolidation of the existing consolidated wage structure.

iAfter careful consideration of all the submissions the Court has decided to reject the Claimants' demand for the deconsolidation of the present wage structure and the Claimants' demand for a separate house allowance is accordingly rejected. The Court has decided that the workers' entitled under the Guidelines should be given to them by way of wage increases.

The Court notes that the parties are now agreed that the effective date of the new collective agreement should be 1st April, 1979.

The Court awards that all the unionizable employees should get a wage increase of K.Sh. 65 p.m. with effect from 1st April, 1979 on their salaries which they were earning on 31st March, 1979.

The Court further awards another wage increase of K.Sh. 65 p.m. to all the unionizable employees with effect from 1st April, 1980.

Annual leave

The workers are entitled to 21 working days of leave with full pay at present and the Court can see no reason to increase it in the present dispute. The Claimants' demand to increase it to 26 working days is rejected.

Leave allowance

The Court has decided to accept the Respondents' offer on this issue and awards that the current leave allowance of K.Sh. 120 p.a. should be increased to K.Sh. 138 per annum. Housing and house allowance

Since the consolidated wage structure is to continue the Court makes no award on this issue.

Effective date and duration

The Court awards as per the parties' own agreement the effective date to be 1st April, 1979 with a duration period of two years from that date.

Finally the Court would like to add that although the parties gave different versions of the issues in dispute the Court was satisfied that the five issues as listed by the Claimants were the ones in dispute and the hearing accordingly proceeded on that basis.
