THE CENTRAL BANK OF KENYA ACT*(Cap. 491)***REGULATION OF INTEREST RATES AND TERMS OF CREDIT OF SPECIFIED BANKS AND SPECIFIED FINANCIAL INSTITUTIONS**

IN EXERCISE of the powers conferred by sections 39 and 41 of the Central Bank of Kenya Act, the Central Bank of Kenya has determined the following to be the maximum and minimum rates of interest which specified banks and specified financial institutions may pay on deposits and charge for loans, advances or instalment facilities:

1. The maximum rate of interest which specified banks may charge for loans or advances shall be 14 per cent per annum calculated on a reducing balance method, with monthly rests.
2. The maximum rate of interest which specified financial institutions may charge for loans, advances or instalment facilities shall be 19 per cent per annum calculated on a reducing balance method, with monthly rests.

3. The rates of interest mentioned in paragraphs 1 and 2, shall include service charges, commitment fees, negotiation fees, application fees, documentary fees, appraisal fees, front-end and all other sundry charges or fees imposed or charged on a loan, advance or instalment facility by a specified bank or a specified financial institution.
4. The minimum interest rates which specified banks or specified financial institutions may pay on deposits shall be 11 per cent per annum.
5. This notice shall come into force on 15th June, 1984, and shall apply on deposits, loans, advances or instalment facilities outstanding on the books of any specified bank or specified financial institution on or after that date.

- (h) General economic research on international and domestic market costs and prices and their effects on consumer and producer prices as well as the extent of comparative efficiency in production processes.
- (i) Time series of the above data to determine whether or not there is transfer pricing over or under-invoicing and its effects on domestic pricing.

Senior Economist/Statistician (Two Posts) (No. 133/84)

THE INDUSTRIAL COURT

CAUSE No. 58 OF 1983

Parties:

Railways and Harbours Union (K)

and

Kenya Railways Corporation

Issue in dispute:

Wrongful dismissal of J. E. Omondi.

THE Railways and Harbours Union (K) shall hereinafter be referred to as the claimants and Kenya Railways Corporation shall hereinafter be referred to as the respondents.

2. The parties were heard in Nairobi on 22nd March, 1984, and relied on their written and verbal submissions.

AWARD

3. The Notification of Dispute Form "A" dated 10th January, 1983, duly signed by the parties was received by the court on 10th June together with the statutory certificates signed by the Minister for Labour and the Labour Commissioner.

The grievant, J. E. Omondi, started working for the now defunct East African Railways and Harbours administration on 18th August, 1960, and eventually became a station master grade RB 4 with effect from 27th March, 1969. He was dismissed on 26th October, 1979, for gross misconduct the main reason being:

"According to the evidence available you as the station master in charge failed to carry out the full duties attached to your post with regard to the proper remittance of Railways earning as provided in the Traffic Account Manual and as a result of your gross negligence of duty the Corporation has lost a total of Sh. 6,750. Furthermore, three counterfoils of the cash remittance notes which were supposed to have accompanied the remittance of the station earnings to the accounts department Nairobi were found in your possession at Kajiado station on 21st April, 1979."

The claimants took up the matter on his behalf and after having lodged an appeal with the managing director which was rejected they reported a trade dispute to the Minister for Labour and the ministry's finding was that because Mr. Omondi had been acquitted in the criminal court concerning loss of KSh. 6,750 from the railway station where he was the station master the dismissal action taken by the respondents was excessively harsh and he should have been retired normally in public interest. It recommended that dismissal action should be reduced to normal termination of service which should facilitate retirement in the public interest. The respondents rejected the recommendation and the dispute is now before the court.

The claimants have in the main relied on staff regulation G. 9 (f) which reads:

"An employee acquitted of a criminal charge in any court may not be dismissed or otherwise punished on any charge upon which he has been acquitted but this does not prevent his being dismissed or otherwise punished on any other charges arising out of his conduct in the matter unless the charges raised substantially the same issue as those on which he has been acquitted."

The claimants argued that since the criminal court where Mr. Omondi had been charged for stealing the respondents' property amounting to KSh. 6,750 in the various counts had acquitted him the respondents had acted wrongfully in disregarding the decision of the criminal court and by dismissing him on substantially the same grounds which had featured prominently in the criminal court contrary to the aforesaid regulation.

The facts leading to this dispute are that in April, 1979, the Railway Examiner of Accounts was carrying out auditing of railway accounts on Nairobi/Nyahururu line and on reaching Matathia station he checked cash remittance notes, coaches summary books and goods cash books. He noticed that some of the cash remittance receipts had not been acknowledged by the chief accountant, Nairobi. He travelled to Nairobi to confirm if the amount entered in some of the remittance notes had been received by the chief accountant, Nairobi and found that some of them had not been received. The matter was reported to the police and Mr. Omondi was charged as aforesaid for stealing KSh. 6,750 and as stated earlier he was acquitted by the criminal court. The respondents, however, charged him departmentally that he seriously neglected his duties by not seeing that all station earnings were correctly remitted. He thereby contravened instructions of Traffic Accounts Manual clause 1021 (a) and 1022 (c).

This dispute revolves around whether or not departmental action taken by the respondents raised substantially the same charges on which he was acquitted in the criminal court and whether or not Mr. Omondi had contravened Traffic Account Manual clauses 1021 (a), (b) and 1022 (c).

The claimants strongly maintained that Mr. Omondi was cleared of the charges by the criminal court and the respondents were precluded from preferring substantially the same charges departmentally. They further maintained that the respondents had failed to prove that Mr. Omondi had contravened Traffic Accounts Manual clauses 1021 and 1022.

The respondents, however, strongly maintained that he was charged departmentally with different charges from those he was acquitted by the criminal court in terms of staff regulation G. 9 (f) and that he failed to offer a satisfactory defence to the charges preferred against him. The respondents stressed that there was no denying the fact that they incurred the loss of KSh. 6,750 in the process and that they had lost all confidence in Mr. Omondi and they could not retain an unreliable employee in their employment.

The court notes with interest that the three remittance counterfoils which were supposed to have accompanied cash remittance of the station earnings to the chief accountant's office were found in Mr. Omondi's possession at Kajiado station on 21st April, 1979, where he was arrested after he had absconded from his station when the loss was detected.

The court has no hesitation in finding that the criminal charge and the departmental charges are quite different in that in the criminal charge he was charged with stealing and departmentally he was charged for contravening Traffic Accounts Manual clause 1021 (a). It is obvious that if he had strictly complied with the laid down instructions in the manual then the money involved could not have been lost. The court is also satisfied that Mr. Omondi who was the station master at Matathia under the Traffic Manual was personally responsible for the correct remittance of all earnings and therefore must be held responsible for the loss of KSh. 6,750 which the respondents have incurred. All the respondents' employees are clearly warned that any mishandling of the cash is a severe offence and would be dealt with accordingly.

It would indeed be a great tragedy if respondents' employees in similar situations like Mr. Omondi is in this dispute were allowed to be reinstated to their jobs after they had caused a substantial loss to the respondents or to award them retirement in public interest which would earn them a lifetime pension with certain lump sum of cash as well! The respondents are dealing with public funds and the court would not like to make an award which would tie down their hands regarding awarding their own staff punishment commensurate with the degree of offence committed.

Mr. Omondi was in charge of a station and it was his duty to ensure that all money due to the respondents was collected promptly, entered in the books and kept in a safe place and he was also responsible to ensure that the money so collected reached the chief accountant's office safely. If the money got lost then Mr. Omondi had to tell how it was lost and who was responsible for the loss if not him. This he has failed to do.

After careful consideration of all the submissions the court must reject the claimants' demand for Mr. Omondi's reinstatement and/or awarding him any compensation or retirement in the public interest.

and
Golden Biscuits (K) Ltd.

Issues in dispute:

Wages.
Working hours.
Annual paid leave.
Leave travelling allowance.
House allowance.
Effective date and duration.

THE Kenya Bakers and Confectioners Workers' Union shall hereinafter be referred to as the claimants and Golden Biscuits (K) Ltd. shall hereinafter be referred to as the respondents.

2. The parties were heard in Nairobi on 5th and 20th March, 1984, and relied on their written and verbal submissions.

AWARD

3. The Notification of Dispute Form "A" dated 17th August, 1983, duly signed by the parties was received by the court on 11th October together with the statutory certificate signed by the Labour Commissioner.

The parties entered into a collective agreement which was effective from 1st January, 1981, for a period of two years that has expired on 31st December, 1982.

On 30th November, 1982, the claimants served on the respondents a notice of their intention to amend the said collective agreement. The claimants followed this by forwarding their proposals on the intended amendments on 9th December, 1982, and also suggested a date for a meeting. On 7th February, 1983, the respondents apparently informed the claimants that they could not accept the proposed amendments and further that there was no point in having a meeting as their factory had

been at a standstill for the last three weeks and they were unable to increase wages and salaries. They further pointed out that since August, 1982, they had already increased the salaries of some of their employees and that the 1981 agreement was very favourable compared to the statutory wages and fringe benefits applicable to their industry.

The parties, however, did have a meeting on 3rd February, 1983, but were not able to achieve a settlement on the aforesaid issues which are now before the court. This dispute covers about 46 employees of whom 60 per cent are females engaged in packing operations.

The Division of Manpower Planning and Development report states that the maximum compensation ceiling to which the workers were entitled due to the rise in the cost of living between January, 1981 to December, 1982, on the basis of lower income index is 25.9 per cent, i.e. 12.9 per cent per year. As against this the claimants have demanded a 60 per cent wage increase for a two-year period—30 per cent for the first year and 30 per cent for the second. The respondents have made a nil offer.

On the issue of house allowance the claimants demanded that the current house allowance of KSh. 150 per month should be increased to KSh. 400. The respondents again have made a nil offer.

On annual paid leave the current entitlement is 22 days which the claimants want to increase to 26 working days or 30 consecutive days. They have stressed that once they get their demand then this fringe benefit will be a closed chapter in further negotiations. Here again the respondents wish the existing provision to continue.

Similarly on leave travelling allowance the respondents want the present KSh. 200 to be maintained and have rejected the claimants demand that it should be increased to KSh. 400.

In short the respondents want the 1981 collective agreement to continue until the end of 1984. The court will deal with the issue of working hours towards the end of the award and the court would now like to examine the parties' submissions on their respective demands on the aforesaid issues.

The respondents have pleaded that by the end of 1983 they had sustained a loss of about four million shillings which was due to various factors like power cuts which lasted for about six months in 1980 and then the shortage of raw materials in 1981 such as wheat flour, fat, sugar and packaging paper and then in 1982 because of the departure of two working directors. The problem was further compounded as the import licence for ammonia bicarbonate was not easily available. They pleaded that despite all these hardships they had kept in their employment 50 unionizable employees though at times they operated only two or three times a week. In order to arrest this situation they had recruited two professional and experienced persons to the posts of managing director and general manager and they anticipated that the unfavourable trend in their business would come to an end by the end of this year.

The claimants bitterly attacked the respondents and the D.M.P.D. whose analysis some supports the respondents' gloomy performance on the ground that all their submissions were intended to mislead the court and pointed out that the power cuts to which the respondents referred were in 1980 and when the first collective agreement was signed this should have figured prominently at that time. They failed to see the purpose of raising this point now. They pointed out that the attitude adopted by the respondents was not new to them because they had right from the beginning displayed a hardened attitude towards them and that all along even before the first collective agreement was negotiated they were dodging them and their managers used to come and go and nobody took the negotiations seriously. They submitted that the respondents had no regard to the guidelines and although the claimants deal with 286 employers in the country they had not come across even one who had such a negative attitude towards them as the respondents. They stated that the respondents had threatened them at one stage by waving at them contact addresses of people in high positions in the country but added that such gestures could not make them sacrifice the interest of their members. They added that the respondents' main director had several other companies in the country which were very prosperous and the claimants could not believe that the respondents could not afford to give the workers their entitlements under the guidelines. They queried the source of money which had enabled the respondents to employ two very expensive expatriates who were costing the respondents KSh. 250,000 and KSh. 300,000 per annum.

The court notes that the first collective agreement which is the subject matter of revision was really for one year only and the claimants did not press for negotiations for the second year of its life. The court also has no doubt that the respondents

are running at a loss as they set up their business with a bank loan of seven million shillings at an interest of 11 per cent per annum which means they are paying KSh. 70,000 per month. The D.M.P.D. investigator confirmed this and also that the accumulated loss at the end of 1983 was eight million shillings. The court finds it interesting that despite all these difficulties they have engaged two highly paid expatriates no doubt to salvage their undertaking and also to avoid any redundancies. The court has carefully considered the respondents' financial position and in view of the fact that they have already in the previous agreement enjoyed one year's standstill the court feels that it would be grossly unfair to the workers to subject them a further wage standstill of two years. The court feels that the respondents should pay the workers a reasonable wage increase with effect from 1st July, 1983. The court accordingly awards that the respondents should grant their employees a wage increase of 10 per cent of their monthly wages as at the end of June, 1983. The court further awards that the respondents should grant all their employees another 7 per cent wage increase on their wages at the end of December, 1983, with effect from 1st January, 1984.

House allowance.—The court awards that the current entitlement of house allowance of KSh. 150 per month per employee should be increased by 12½ per cent with effect from 1st July, 1983.

Annual paid leave.—The court awards that the existing provision should continue for the time being.

Leave travelling allowance.—The court awards that the leave travelling allowance should be increased from KSh. 200 to KSh. 250 with effect from 1st January, 1984.

Working hours.—This particular item generated a very heated argument particularly from the claimants. It appears that the parties are not agreed on the interpretation of the existing clause on the working hours which reads as follows:

"The normal working week shall consist of 48 working hours spread over 6 working days of the week, provided that:

Shifts will be arranged so as to give employees a full half hour break during the period of a normal shift and where by reason of overtime it is necessary to extend the period of work beyond 8 hours a further 15 minutes break shall be arranged and treated as part of overtime. All breaks shall be taken to suit the convenience of production."

The claimants pointed out that even before the above clause was agreed the practice which the respondents had followed included half hour break in the working hours which meant that the workers actually worked for 45 hours in a week but sometime in 1982 when a new manager had been appointed he demanded that the half hour break should not be included in the working hours. They accused him of misinterpreting the aforesaid clause. His misinterpretation caused a serious industrial problem and at one stage the manager had locked in the workers on a Saturday requiring them to work additional three hours to make 48 hours that week.

The respondents referred to the advice given to them by a labour officer who had advised them that all their employees who worked the maximum of 48 hours per week and any extra hours above that should be paid as overtime. This was seriously challenged by the claimants who said that this particular officer had gone there to investigate casual employees and had no business to give an interpretation on a clause in the collective agreement. The respondents also referred to a memo prepared by M. Alibhai suggesting that the claimants' general secretary and his deputy had agreed with the management that lunch break should not be included in working hours and that overtime should be paid after 48 hours work every week. And further that Saturday was a working day. The claimants rejected this memo saying that there had been no such agreement as otherwise they would have signed it.

The court has carefully considered this rather tricky issue and has decided to make the following award in order to ensure smooth operations at the respondents' undertaking without prejudice to the workers' rights.

The court awards that the normal working week shall consist of 45 working hours spread over six working days of the week with effect from the date of the court award.

Effective date and duration.—The court awards the effective date to be 1st January, 1983, except where otherwise stated and that the collective agreement should remain in force until 31st December, 1984.

and

Kenya Cargo Handling Services Ltd.

Issues in dispute:

Wages and salaries.

Increase of housing allowance.

THE Dockworkers' Union shall hereinafter be referred to as the claimants and Kenya Cargo Handling Services Ltd. shall hereinafter be referred to as the respondents.

2. The parties were heard in Nairobi on 26th, 27th and 28th March, 1984, and relied on their written and verbal submissions.

AWARD

3. The Notification of Dispute Form "A" dated 26th October, 1983, duly signed by the parties was received by the court on 8th November together with the statutory certificate signed by the Labour Commissioner.

This dispute covers about 7,625 employees of the respondents out of whom 4,299 are dockworkers, 1,476 graded staff, 1,324 clerical staff and 526 supervisors.

The parties had a previous collective agreement which expired on 30th April, 1981, but the negotiations for the 1981/83 collective agreement were overtaken by the release of the Waruhiu Commission report and the parties took it into account and signed an agreement on 27th July, 1981, which agreement was, however, not registered by the Industrial Court as the parties did not forward it to the Minister for Labour for that purpose. It was nevertheless implemented with effect from 1st October, 1980. This meant that there was a seven-month overlapping as the agreement was backdated to 1st October, 1980, although the two-year period of the previous agreement was to expire on 30th April, 1981. This dispute has arisen as a result of the parties' efforts to revise the said unregistered collective agreement.

It is accepted that the respondents are a parastatal body category 4 and the Kenya Ports Authority (K.P.A.) which is also a parastatal owns 95 per cent shares of the respondents with the Kenya Railways and government owning 4 per cent and 1 per cent, respectively.

The Division of Manpower Planning and Development report reveals that the claimants would be entitled to about 15.65 per cent for the first year and another 15.65 per cent for the second year representing the maximum compensation ceiling of three-quarters of the rise in the cost of living for the period 1st May, 1981 to 30th April, 1983.

The claimants have based their demand on the premise that the respondents should enjoy the same salaries and house allowance as the K.P.A. employees. They argued that there was no justification whatsoever that the workers who generated the revenue of the K.P.A. should continue to receive lower rates of pay than their parent company. They went as far as to say that most of the K.P.A. revenue came through the efforts of the respondents' employees, i.e. the dockworkers.

The respondents, however, denied this by presenting the following breakdown of the revenue between the K.P.A. and the respondents:

The claimants were very critical of the manner in which the K.P.A. and the respondents have organized their operations in that K.P.A. have devised a way under which the respondents operated on a deficit budget which necessitated them paying bank charges in 1982 amounting to nearly 8.6 million shillings and in 1983 to KSh. 17 million.

The claimants drew the court's attention that their members are very hardworking and have maintained the efficiency of the Mombasa port at a very high level by handling record tonnages. This they achieved by working 197 hours per week and stressed that they worked under more hazardous conditions than the K.P.A. employees who served under better conditions and worked only 159 hours per week.

The respondents had initially made a nil offer to the claimants on the two issues in dispute but prior to the hearing of the dispute they made an attempt by trying to settle it outside the court by making an offer to them which offer the claimants rejected. The respondents repeated that offer during the hearing. This offer brings up the salaries of the unionizable employees of the respondents more or less at par with the proposed salary scales for the K.P.A. employees. The claimants submitted that they would be only too happy to accept this offer provided the respondents also adopted the K.P.A. house allowance rates for all their employees. This the respondents rejected on the ground that it was just not financially possible for them to do so. Instead they made the following offer on house allowance:

The respondents stressed that circumstances beyond their control had forced them to resort to deficit budgeting and that at one stage their overdraft had risen to 162 million shillings which was reduced to a more acceptable figure by the introduction of contingency revenue to them by K.P.A. effective from 1st January, 1983.

The respondents pleaded that the new cost input sharing system which had replaced the contingency financing arrangement had placed financial limitations on their labour costs. They explained that under the contingency arrangement the average monthly operating revenue for 1983 was KSh. 36 million as compared to an average monthly operating expenditure of 33 million. Now since January this year the operating revenue based on the new cost input sharing system was 23 million shillings as compared to the operating expenditure of 30 million shillings. They emphasized that despite all their financial limitations and their inability to pay they had come out with an offer on salary scales which under the circumstances was most reasonable and requested the court to endorse it.

On house allowance the respondents stated that until 1977 they had always paid their employees a consolidated wage and that it was the Industrial Court that first awarded a small house allowance of KSh. 30 to the dockworkers in that year. The parties then themselves had increased the house allowance considerably with the result that the respondents' employees were now enjoying house allowance ranging from KSh. 300 to KSh. 800 per month. The respondents stated that keeping all these points in view their offer of raising the house rates to KSh. 338.70 at the lowest going up to KSh. 889.20 for higher income groups per month was fair under the circumstances.

The court has carefully considered the parties' submissions in this dispute and the report compiled by the Division of Manpower Planning and Development. The court has always pointed out in the past in all the disputes concerning the dockworkers and would like to reiterate it once again that the dockworkers play an important role not only in the economy of Kenya but in the neighbouring countries also who depend on the Mombasa port for the import and export of their commodities. It is therefore imperative that conditions should be created which will ensure continued industrial peace at the docks.

The court notes that there has been a decline in the respondents' labour force from 9,161 workers in 1978 to 7,759 in 1983.

The court would like to add that there is a certain amount of validity in the claimants' argument that the whole set up of the respondents *vis-à-vis* the K.P.A. who own 95 per cent shares in the respondents' undertaking renders the respondents; to use the claimants' words "into a toothless bulldog". This matter, however, is for the government to consider. The court has to make its award on the facts as they exist now.

The court finds that both parties are agreed on the new salary scales as proposed by the respondents which would place them more or less at par with the K.P.A. employees' new salary

scales. The court notes that the claimants have made their acceptance of this offer conditional on the house allowance rates also going up to the level of the K.P.A. This issue the court will tackle later in the award.

The court accordingly awards the following salary scales for the respondents' employees:

House allowance:

On this issue the court understands the reasons behind the claimants' demand for the house allowance rates to be standardized with the K.P.A. but the fact remains that until 1977 the respondents' employees enjoyed a consolidated salary and that in 1977 the court awarded them for the first time a house allowance of KSh. 30 which the parties subsequently raised to KSh. 300 at the lowest going up to KSh. 800 at the highest. The court finds that in view of this historical background and the financial constraints of the respondents it would not be advisable to give such a big house allowance increase as demanded by the claimants as to do so would throw the industry into a financial crisis. After careful consideration of the submissions and taking into account the guidelines the court awards the following house allowance increases:

Issue in dispute:

Interpretation of part 1 (a) (i) of parties' collective agreement.

THE Kenya Timber and Furniture Workers' Union shall hereinafter be referred to as the claimants and Furniture Manufacturers' Group of FKE shall hereinafter be referred to as the respondents.

2. The parties were heard in Nairobi on 11th April, 1984 and relied on their written and verbal submissions.

AWARD

3. The Notification of Dispute Form "A" dated 31st August, 1983, duly signed by the parties was received by the court on 6th December, 1983, together with the statutory certificate signed by the Labour Commissioner.

The parties entered into a collective agreement from 1st May, 1982, for a period of two years from that date. In this agreement under part 1 rates of pay, the parties set out the minimum rates of pay for the various groups including clerical by setting out in nine columns previous minimum, first year increase of 11 per cent, new wage with effect from 1st May, 1982, housing with effect from 1st May, 1982, total first year, second year increase 10 per cent, wage with effect from 1st May, 1983, housing with effect from 1st May, 1983, and finally total second year. The parties then proceeded to incorporate the following clause (a) (i):

"The employees earning over and above the rates of their respective group shall have their personal rates increased by the amount agreed in column 2 and 6 above thus maintaining their personal differentials."

For case of reference column 2 sets out the first year increase of 11 per cent and column 6 the second year increase of 10 per cent as follows:

The claimants' interpretation of this clause is that those employees who were earning over and above the rates of their respective groups were to get for the first year an 11 per cent wage increase and for the second year a 10 per cent wage increase on their personal rates thus maintaining their differential with other employees.

The respondents' interpretation is that personal wages of those who are above the rates of their groups were to go up by the figures as worked out by the parties and set out in columns 2 and 6, respectively and not by 11 per cent and 10 per cent as put forward by the claimants. The respondents gave an illustration in support of their interpretation by saying that an employee in job group 1 (a) earning KSh. 700 per month (i.e. KSh. 99 more than the basic wage of KSh. 601 as at 30th April, 1982) was to have his pay increased by KSh. 60 making his new personal rate KSh. 766 per month effective 1st May, 1982, thus maintaining his personal differential of KSh. 99. If the claimants' demand as per their interpretation was accepted and this employee was given a wage increase of 11 per cent which is KSh. 77 it would increase his personal differential from KSh. 99 to KSh. 110. This the respondents maintained was contrary to the provision of part 1 (a) (i) of the agreement.

The court notes that the claimants have argued that prior to the clause in the current collective agreement, the subject matter of this dispute, the parties had the following clause in the collective agreement which expired at the end of April, 1982:

"Irrespective of the fact that an employee may have been earning a wage above the minimum for his group or grade he will receive the increase appropriate for his group or grade thus maintaining his personal differentials."

The claimants submitted that the above clause which had been in force for many years was amended to read as it appears now in the collective agreement as set out hereinabove. This they maintained enabled them to get the percentage increase for the first and second year on their personal rates.

The court has very carefully considered this matter and finds that the operative words in part 1 (a) (i) are "by the amount agreed in column 2 and 6 above" and "thus maintaining their personal differentials". The court might have been inclined to agree with the claimants' interpretation but for the fact that if it was intended to give them percentage increases mentioned in columns 2 and 6 then it was a simple matter for them to have stated so by saying that the personal rates will be increased by the percentages agreed for the first and second years. This the parties failed to do. Moreover the underlying object of this clause is to enable those earning above their rates to maintain their personal differentials. This they will be able to do in accordance with the respondents' interpretation because if the claimants' interpretation is accepted then the differential will increase.

The court has in the past repeatedly emphasized to the parties that they should take great care in ensuring that what they have in mind and they agree is eventually correctly reproduced in the collective agreement. If any party fails to do so then it does so at its own risk. In this case it was up to the claimants to make sure that if they intended to give percentage increases agreed for first and second year of the collective agreement to those earning above the rates for their groups then they should have seen to it that it was so specified. This they failed to do and on the wording as it appears which is the subject matter of this dispute, the court has no hesitation in finding that the respondents' interpretation is correct. The claimants' demand is accordingly rejected.






