- Ensure accurate budgeting and estimation of actual construction material requirements to ensure that the least amount of material necessary is ordered.
- Minimize damage or loss of materials at the construction site through proper storage and handling.
- Consider reuse of building materials and use of recycled building materials.

Minimization of local increase in construction

Construction vehicles should enter and leave the site at appropriate times.

traffic

- Using signs and barriers the Contractor will direct vehicles and pedestrian traffic as needed around the construction site.
- Some activities may be scheduled in offpeak traffic times to minimize impacts.

Increased solid waste generation

- Use of an integrated solid waste management system i.e. through a hierarchy of options
- Order materials in the sizes and quantities they will be needed, rather than cutting them to size, or having large quantities of residual materials.
- Use of durable, long-lasting materials to reduce the amount of construction waste generated.
- Dispose waste more responsibly by dumping at designated dumping sites or landfills only.\(\lambda\)
- Waste collection bins to be provided at designated points on site.

Dust emission

- Downwash of trucks (especially tyres) prior to departure from site.
- Cover stockpiles of sand, soil and similar materials or surround them with wind breaks.
- Post signs that limit vehicles speed onto unpaved roads and over disturbed soils.
- Avoid excavation works in extremely dry weathers.
- Sprinkle water on access routes to reduce dust generation by construction vehicles.
- Personal protective equipment to be worn.

Exhaust emission

- Construction equipment to be maintained properly tuned and maintained as per the manufacturers specifications.
- · Vehicle idling time shall be minimized.
- Alternatively fuelled construction equipment shall be used where feasible
- Avoid unnecessary racing of vehicle engines at loading/offloading points and parking areas

Noise and vibration

- Install portable barriers to shield compressors and other small stationery equipment
- Use quiet equipment (i.e. equipment designed with noise control elements).
- Ensure that construction machinery is kept in good condition to reduce noise
- The noisy construction works will be planned to be during the day.

Increased energy consumption

- Ensure electrical equipment and appliances are switched off when not being used.
- Install energy saving fluorescent tubes and bulbs at all lighting points instead of bulbs which consume higher electric energy.
- Monitor energy use during construction and set targets for reduction of energy use

Increased water demand .

- · Harvest rainwater.
- Install water conserving taps and monitor water usage.
- Promptly detect and repair of water pipe

and tank leaks.

Promote recycling and reuse of water as much as possible.

Increased storm water run-off

- Surface runoff and roof water shall be harvested and stored for reuse.
- Apply soil erosion control measures such as leveling of the project site to reduce run-off velocity.

Oil Spills

- A designated garage section of the site fitted with oil trapping equipments to be planned for changes.
- Prompt cleaning of oil and fuel spills.
- Proper disposal of clothing or rags contaminated with oil.

Occupational health and . safety

- Enforcing safety procedures and preparing contingency plan for accident response in addition safety training shall be emphasized.
- Suitable, efficient, clean, well-lit and adequate sanitary conveniences should be provided for construction workers.
- Ensure that machinery, equipment, personal protective equipment, appliances and hand tools comply with the prescribed safety and health standards.
- Provide PPE and enforce usage.
- Provide firefighting equipment, fire safety training and conduct drills
- Train first aiders, have stocked first aid
- Keep a record of all hazardous chemicals used at the premises, crossreferenced to the appropriate chemical safety data sheets.

Safety and security

Ensure the general safety and security at all times by providing day and night security and adequate lighting within and around the construction site.

Waste water management •

Monitor the efficiency of the effluent treatment plant to ensure that the sewage released from the facility do not pollute the environment.

Production process air emissions

Use and Monitor the efficiency of the TARDIS in trapping and neutralizing air emissions.

PURSUANT to regulation 21 of the Environmental Management and Co-ordination (Impact Assessment and Audit) Regulations, 2003, the National Environment Management Authority (NEMA) has received an Environmental Impact Assessment Study Report for the above proposed project.

The Proponent (Kipeto Energy Limited) is proposing to construct an overhead 17km long transmission line for evacuating power generated by a 100MW capacity wind farm. The transmission line will start from a substation to be constructed at the wind farm and terminate at the proposed Kenya Power Isinya switching substation.

Below is a summary of the anticipated impacts and the proposed mitigation measures:

Impacts

Traffic issues

Proposed Mitigation Measures

- Clearly define construction routes and required access roads.
- Use the minimum number of trips for delivering construction plant and equipment.
- Schedule the delivery hours to avoid peak hour traffic, weekends and evenings.
- Rehabilitate temporary access roads prior to the EPC contractor leaving the site.
- Position entry and exit points strategically to ensure minimal effects on traffic.
- Clearly signpost primary routes to the site.

Waste handling

- storage area location by considering prevailing winds, distances to water bodies, general onsite topography and water erosion potential of the soil.
- Impervious surfaces must be provided where necessary.
- Designate, demarcate, fence off and secure all storage areas.
- Provide fire prevention facilities at all storage facilities.
- Store all hazardous materials such as oils, paints, thinners, fuels, chemicals, etc. in properly constructed and impermeable bunded areas.
- The EPC contractor to acquire MSDSs for all chemicals and hazardous substances used on site.
- Hazardous material storage areas must be signposted clearly
- Use a NEMA licensed waste handler for disposal of all used oils from the camp
- Dispose off any excess concrete mixes consultation with the Project Manager.
- Immediately contain, recover and cleanup any spillages that may occur.

Improper use and. management of borrow pits

Borrow pit localities must be negotiated with the relevant local authority to ensure consensus of their location.

The EPC contractor must also compile an information document which states the methods which will be utilized when creating borrow pits.

Impacts related to soils• and geology

- Provide wind screening and storm water control to prevent soil loss from the site;
- Use silt fences and/or sand bags in areas that are susceptible to erosion.
- Sensitive areas need to be identified prior to construction so that the necessary precautions can be implemented.
- Regularly maintain all erosion control mechanisms.
- Retain vegetation where possible to avoid soil erosion.
- Vegetation clearance should be phased to ensure that the least area of soil is exposed.
- Re-vegetate disturbed surfaces immediately after construction activities.

Impacts related to surface• water and groundwater

- Provide adequate sanitary facilities for male and female construction workers in accordance with the Public Health Act requirements.
- Ensure that sanitary facilities are regularly serviced and emptied to reduce the risk of surface or groundwater pollution.
- Site staff shall not be permitted to use any other open water body or natural water source adjacent to or within the designated site for the purposes of bathing or washing of clothing.
- Treated water should be used for all activities such as washing of equipment or disposal of any type of waste, dust suppression, compacting, etc.
- An Effluent Discharge License shall be acquired from NEMA for the camp site to ensure effluent discharge compliance in accordance with the discharge limits stated in L.N. 120: Water Quality Regulations, 2006.

Impacts of air quality

- The EPC contractor will dampen unsurfaced and un-vegetated areas with a water bowser or sprinklers when necessary to reduce dust.
- Excavations and other clearing activities must only be done during agreed working times and permitting weather conditions to avoid drifting of dust into neighboring areas;
- A speed limit of 40km/h must not be exceeded.
- Any complaints emanating from the lack of dust control shall be attended to immediately by the EPC contractor.

Impacts of noise on surrounding areas

- Construction site yards, workshops and other noisy fixed facilities should be located well away from noise sensitive areas.
- Truck traffic should be routed away from noise sensitive areas, where possible.
- Construction activities are to be contained to reasonable hours during the day and early evening. Night-time activities near noise sensitive areas should not be allowed.
- Noise from laborers must be controlled;
- Construction equipment must be kept in good working order and where

- appropriate fitted with silencers which are kept in good working order.
- The contractor must take measures to discourage laborers from loitering in the area and causing noise disturbance.

Terrestrial Plant alteration.

- Avoid grading in areas with high slope angles to avoid future possible erosion.
- Minimize grading of rugged areas by looking for alternative passage within the 60 m ROW.
- Avoid cutting of short trees that heights are lower than the power line (at least 15m).
- When points of erecting pylons is exactly on cluster of bushes offset backwards or forward within the proposed line to avoid destruction of the potential habitats for reptiles and small mammals.

Temporary obstruction of movement of wild herbivorous

- Speed of vehicles should be controlled at a maximum limit of 40km/h.
- Drivers shall give priority to any wildlife crossing the roads at all times.
- Avoid grading or clearing of vegetation where the mound of moles and Aardvark holes occur.
- Operation of construction activities should be restricted to day time from 8am to 5pm. This provides time for foraging for nocturnal animals.
- Observe wildlife migratory patterns with weather changes.

Introduction of alien• invasive plant species

- Equipment to be used should be decontaminated e.g. washing equipment to remove soil potentially carrying AIPS propagules.
- Avoid importing soils/gravel to use for level grounds for vehicles to pass in ROW should be avoided. If brought from outside, the surface of the soil should be removed to avoid mixing of soils potentially harboring AIPS propagules with the lower soil profiles.
- Since AIPS appears later after soil disturbance after math proliferation of AIPS should be controlled by reducing their population and recruitment.

Poaching

- Personnel should be screened when entering and leaving construction sites.
- Local people should be alerted by the constructors to be able to detect visitors potential of poaching.

Aquatic habitat alteration •

- Contractor should work within the construction space of the ROW.
- If by any chance there will be need for temporary use of extra space then, such areas should not have tree species .Constructor should consult relevant authority e.g. KWS and KFS.

QUARTERLY REPORT FOR THE PERIOD OCTOBER TO DECEMBER 2012

Message from the Chairperson

In the last three months the Commission for the Implementation of the Constitution (CIC) has continued in engaging various partners and stakeholders in the implementation process with significant success albeit a number of challenges. It has been particularly important that the country is gearing up to the first general elections under the Constitution of Kenya 2010 and a number of actors tasked with the duty of ensuring peaceful, free and fair elections were yet to conclude those vital tasks and assure the nation that the elections will be free and fair. The CIC however commends the partners for the achievements so far made and is grateful for the support offered by implementing partners and various stakeholders in promoting constitutionalism at this crucial time.

During the reporting period the Commission participated in the development of the Medium Term Expenditure Plan (MTEP) – an important policy and planning tool for the country that will provide critical support to the transition to devolved governance, enforcement of socio-economic rights and overall assistance in the attainment of good governance. Besides various legislation and policy instruments CIC also undertook its constitutional roles in the formulation of the Health Sector Policy as well as the Administrative Justice Policy.

It is evident in this report that implementing partners and the public at large have to be aware of challenges of the constitution implementation process which can only be overcome by constantly adhering to the implementation guidelines that were established after careful and comprehensive consultations and keen consideration of the letter and spirit of the Constitution of Kenya 2010. All actors in this process have to acknowledge that it is their constitutional duty to promote constitutionalism and protect the sovereignty of the people of Kenya. The Executive for instance, continues to breach these guidelines by rolling out policies and publishing Bills without involving CIC and the public, contrary to the Constitution and the laid down guidelines. These unconstitutional practices should cease and the Commission will continue seeking judicial intervention where the concerned parties fail to respect and uphold the Constitution of Kenya 2010.

The citizens should continue to be vigilant and the implementers should consistently uphold the letter and spirit of the Constitution. It is anticipated that this report provides a clear reflection of where we stand as a nation in the realization of the promises of the constitution and indicates what is likely to be achieved in the next three months as the country gears up for the inaugural elections under the Constitution of Kenya 2010.

Executive Summary

This is the eighth quarterly report of the Commission for the Implementation of the Constitution, covering the period of October to December 2012.

The mandate, specific functions and objects of the Commission as stipulated in the Constitution and the Commission for the Implementation of the Constitution Act, 2011, is to monitor, facilitate and oversee the development of legislation and administrative procedures required to implement the Constitution; to coordinate with the Attorney-General and the Kenya Law Reform Commission in preparing for tabling in Parliament the legislation required to implement the Constitution; and to report every three months to the Constitutional Implementation Oversight Committee on the progress and challenges faced in the implementation of the Constitution.

Other functions of the Commission are to work with other constitutional commissions to ensure that the letter and spirit of the Constitution is respected, the sovereignty of the people of Kenya protected, observance by all State organs of the democratic values and principles is observed and constitutionalism is promoted.

The Commission has defined four key result areas, which guide its work on its mandate and provide the basis for accountability to other institutions and the people of Kenya. These result areas are:

Result 1: A respected, well-functioning and independent Commission effectively delivering on its mandate.

Result 2: Policies which are compliant with the letter and the spirit of the Constitution.

Result 3: Laws which are compliant with the letter and the spirit of the Constitution.

Result 4: Effective institutional frameworks and administrative procedures for the implementation of the Constitution.

During the reporting period, the Commission received and reviewed a number of policies, legislation and regulations from various Ministries. The Commission continued to encourage comprehensive policies to guide development of legislation. Among policies reviewed include, the Health

Sector Policy, Universal Health Coverage Policy, and National Council in the Administrative of Justice Policy. The Commission has also engaged sector-working groups on Medium Term Plan, 2013 – 2018 to ensure they reflect the Constitution.

The Commission received a number of Bills from various Ministries for review/audit. Section 2.2 summarises these Bills, highlighting those processed and passed to AG, including Registration of Persons and Refugee Bills, National Government Coordination Bill, 2012, The Public Procurement Bill, County Government Public Finance Management Transition Bill, 2012, Controller of Budget Bill, 2012, Division of Revenue Bill, 2013, The Transition County Allocation of Revenue Bill, 2013, and The County Allocation of Revenue Bill, 2013. The Commission raised issues on Health related bills (The Universal Health Bill, Kenya Medical Supplies Authority Bill, 2012, and the Proposed Amendment to the National Health Insurance Fund Act, 1998), Geology, Minerals and Mining Bill, and Bills related to Agriculture (Agriculture, Livestock, Fisheries and Food Authority Bill, 2012; Kenya Agriculture and Livestock Research Bill, 2012, Pyrethrum Bill, 2012, Crops Bill, 2012, and The Kenya Plant Health Inspectorate Service Bill, 2011), which on the Commission's opinion, contain sections that are not in line with the Constitution and should be audited.

Despite the knowledge of process to develop laws, the executive continues publishing Bills without following the due process. This became worse towards the end of the quarter, i.e., in December 2012 when 30 Bills went through Parliament and enacted on 14th January 2013. This disregard of the process has continued to be a major challenge to the implementation of the Constitution. The Commission recommends for public vigilance and monitoring of this process and raising issues where the process is contravened.

The next quarter (January – March, 2013) is very critical since it is during the quarter that the general elections will be held. The Commission plans to carry on with its mandate, including reviewing of policies, bills and regulations to implement the Constitution. Review of the policy framework for education and training to realign education and training sectors in Kenya will be carried out. The Commission will also be completing the review of environment and natural resources sector polices and policy framework on Traditional Dispute Mechanism, among others.

Under development of legislation, the Commission will review all the Acts assented to in hurry towards the end of December 2012 and propose amendments if found unconstitutional. During the quarter, the Commission will also complete the implementation guide for integration of Bill of Rights in the public service and immigration regulations.

On Transition to Devolved Government, the Commission will work with Parliament to prepare the system of devolved governance on National Assembly, Senate and County Assemblies, as well developing a M&E mechanism of constitution implementation at County Government level.

Finally, the Commission will be monitoring of the political parties nominations process and general elections, and overseeing the preparations for the next general elections and observing elections before, during the voting day and after.

Introduction

This is the eighth quarterly report of the Commission for the Implementation of the Constitution (CIC) and it covers activities between October and December 2012. The report discusses the progress in and the state of implementation of the Constitution of Kenya, 2010. It highlights the achievements, challenges, impediments and lessons learned in this period and makes recommendations to address those challenges.

To facilitate its work, CIC has organized itself into eight thematic areas. These are Citizenship and Bill of Rights; Land and Environment; Public Service and Leadership; Representation of the People and the Legislature; the Executive and Security; the Judiciary and Constitutional Commissions; Devolved Government; and Public Finance

Each thematic area monitors, oversees and facilitates the implementation of the Constitution and works with relevant agencies, public institutions, state and non-state actors, development partners and the people of Kenya on various implementation issues.

The report has six sections. The first section summarizes the mandate and role of the Commission. Section two discusses the implementation of the Constitution during the reporting period, focusing on development of policies, legislation, regulations, and public/stakeholders engagements. Section three addresses the strategies of promoting constitutionalism and protecting the sovereignty of the people. The fourth section gives a summary of advisories, press briefing and media interviews. Section five highlights challenges and lessons learnt, with recommendations. Finally, the sixth section gives an overview of the major activities planned for the fourth quarter.

The report has four annexes: nnexes 1a - d: Enacted Laws, Annex 2 is Advisories, Annex 3 is Litigation Status as at 9th, October 2012 and Annex 4 is Launch of First Annual Progress Report Supplement.

1. Mandate and Role of the Commission for the Implementation of the Constitution

The Commission is established under Paragraph 5(6) of the Sixth Schedule of the Constitution. The mandate and specific functions and objects of CIC are found in the Constitution and the Commission for the Implementation of the Constitution Act, 2010. These functions are:

- 1. To monitor, facilitate and oversee the development of legislation and administrative procedures required to implement the Constitution;
- To coordinate with the Attorney-General and the Kenya Law Reform Commission (KLRC) in preparing for tabling in Parliament the legislation required to implement the Constitution;
- 3. To report every three months to the Constitutional Implementation Oversight Committee on:
 - a. progress in the implementation of the Constitution; and
 - any impediments in its implementation;
- 4. To work with each constitutional commission to ensure that the letter and spirit of the Constitution are respected; and
- 5. To exercise such other functions as are provided for by the Constitution or any other written law.

This mandate is further amplified by Article 249 (1) which sets out that these functions are intended to protect the sovereignty of the people, secure observance by all State organs of democratic values and principles, and promote constitutionalism. The Commission is independent in the performance of its mandate and is not subject to the direction and control of any person or authority, other than the Constitution and relevant laws. This enjoins the Commission to remain accountable to the people of Kenyan, to uphold the principle of public participation and to secure from all State organs, without fear or favour, the compliance with the values and principles of governance in the Constitution.

In its operations, the Commission is guided by the national values and principles of governance as stipulated in Article 10(2) (see box 1 below) and other articles of the Constitution. These provisions regulate all public policy decisions and are binding upon all State organs, State officers, public officers and all persons whenever any of them interprets or applies the Constitution or any law thereof.

- (a) Patriotism, national unity, sharing and devolution of power, the rule of law, democracy and participation of the people;
- (b) Human dignity, equity, social justice, inclusiveness, equality, human rights, non-discrimination and protection of the marginalized;
- (c) Good governance, integrity, transparency and accountability; and
- (d) Sustainable development.

Box 1: National Values and Principles of Governance

The Commission plays a coordinating role in implementation of the Constitution and it is imperative that it has access to information on all initiatives, activities and actors involved in the implementation of the Constitution.

1.1 Implementation in the Context of the Commission's Mandate

The implementation of the Constitution with regard to the mandate of the Commission involves:

- (a) Facilitating the development of new laws, policies, administrative procedures/and regulations required to implement the Constitution;
- (b) Reviewing existing laws, policies, administrative procedures, regulations and legislation required to implement the Constitution;
- (c) Ensuring that the institutional and legislative structures necessary to give effect to the Constitution, especially in relation to the devolved government, are in place;
- (d) Ensuring the participation by the people of Kenya in the review process. The Constitution protects the power of the people to determine how they wish to be governed at the national and county levels in accordance with the national values and principles set out in Articles 1, 10, 118 and 232;
- (e) Ensuring that where new laws are developed or existing ones are amended the new laws and the policies which informed development of the laws are to be forwarded to the AG, KLRC and the Commission for review;
- (f) Ensuring that the legislative process adheres to the provisions of Article 261 of the Constitution on consequential provisions;
- (g) Coordinating with the AG and KLRC in drafting Bills in coordination with originating institutions;
- (h) Coordinating with the AG and KLRC, the Parliamentary Constitution Implementation Oversight Committee (CIOC) and other parliamentary committees to ensure timely enactment of legislation.
- Coordinating development of change-management strategies.
- (j) Monitoring effective implementation of the Constitution in devolved units of governance.

The Commission notes that the Constitution can only be fully implemented when all state and non-state actors involved in its implementation play their part complementarily. To facilitate that process, the Commission has adopted a cooperative and consultative approach and regularly engages with all partners in diverse forums.

1.2 Key Result Areas

In the execution of its mandate, CIC has adopted the results-based approach and defined key result areas highlighted in the box below to guide its work and provide the basis for accountability to other institutions and the people of Kenya.

- Result 1: A respected, well-functioning and independent Commission effectively delivering on its mandate.
- Result 2: Policies, which are compliant with the letter and the spirit of the Constitution.
- Result 3: Laws, which are compliant with the letter and the spirit of the Constitution.
- Result 4: Effective institutional frameworks and administrative procedures for the implementation of the Constitution.

Box 2: CIC Key Result Areas

1.3 Technical Arrangements

To achieve its constitutional mandate as stipulated in constitution, CIC Act and other statutory provisions, the Commission has designed and adopted an appropriate technical structure of eight Thematic Areas, drawn from the subject matter of the different chapters of the Constitution, with each thematic area convened by a commissioner, and the Chair as an overall coordinator and spokesperson of the Commission. The teams spearhead engagement with relevant sectors and report to the Commission. These are:

- Citizenship and Bill of Rights this thematic area coordinates activities dealing with human rights and citizenship as found in Chapters
 Three and Four of the Constitution.
- 2. Land and Environment this thematic area coordinates the implementation of Chapter Five on land and environment.
- Public Service and Leadership this thematic area coordinates the implementation of Chapter Six on Leadership and Integrity and Chapter Thirteen on Public Service.
- Representation of the People and the Legislature this thematic area deals with the implementation of Chapters Seven and Eight on representation of the people and the legislature
- Executive and Security this thematic area coordinates the implementation of Chapters Nine and Fourteen on the Executive and on security.
- The Judiciary and Constitutional Commissions this thematic area coordinates the implementation of Chapter Ten on the Judiciary and Chapter Fifteen constitutional commissions and independent offices.
- Devolved Government this thematic area coordinates the implementation of Chapter Eleven and the Sixth Schedule, paragraph 15(2)(d) on devolution.

8. Public Finance - this thematic area coordinates the implementation of Chapter Twelve which deals with public finance management.

2. Status of Constitution Implementation

The Commission has continued to support review of policies, legislation and regulations to ensure that they are in line with the Constitution they are meant to implement. During the reporting period, the Commission processed policies, laws and regulations discussed below. Annex 1a gives a summary list of legislation developed during the months of October-December and annex 1b is the cummulative status of enactment of legislation to date.

This section highlights key outcomes on development of policies, laws and administrative regulations, operationalization of constitutional commissions, progress in transition to devolved government and preparedness for the next general elections scheduled for 4th March 2013.

2.1 Development of Policies

The Commission has advised implementing agencies prior to development of laws to develop comprehensive policies, which subsequently guide development of laws, systems and structures to implement the Constitution. During the quarter, the Commission worked on ten policy related documents from various sectors, which are discussed below.

(a) Health Sector Policy, Universal Health Coverage Policy, and Establishment and Granting of Operational Autonomy to National Health Referral Facilities Position Paper.

The Ministry of Health submitted to CIC a policy paper on Universal Health Coverage in Kenya, supporting the NHIF Bill, and a position paper on the establishment and granting of operational autonomy to National Health Referral Facilities, both of which had been approved by Cabinet.

In CIC opinion, although the Universal Health Coverage Policy covered a number of issues, it did not clearly address key issues as outlined in an advisory letter ref No: CIC/3/14/Vol.2 of 11th December 2012 (RE: KENYA MEDICAL SUPPLIES AUTHORITY BILL 2012 AND PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE NATIONAL HEALTH INSURANCE FUND ACT 1998) that would meet the constitutional standards. The Commission's position is that various mechanisms seeking to enhance access to health should be anchored in the policy, which should provide a roadmap and give guidelines on the enhancement of financing and accessing the right to health.

(b) Environment and Natural Resources Sector Policies

The Commission received environmental and resource sector policies and started the review. A one-day workshop was organized, drawing participants from environment and natural resources sector to harmonise the laws and policies to avoid overlaps. The harmonisation report will be submitted next quarter.

(c) National Policy on Access to Justice

The national policy on access to justice is aimed at actualising access to justice as provided for in Article 48 of the Constitution. The Commission sought to consolidate current government laws and policies on access to justice and develop a framework for the consolidation and harmonization of national policies, strategies and legislative instruments relating to access to justice in Kenya. A proposed framework has been developed. In October 2012, a stakeholders' consultative forum on access to justice was held during which gaps and overlaps in laws, policies and administrative processes relating to access to justice were identified. Stakeholder meetings will be organized to next quarter to discuss the contents of the framework and agree on the way forward. An internal concept paper on the same is awaiting approval.

(d) Medium Term Plan, 2013 - 2018 (MTP2) Development

The Executive arm of Government is in the process of preparing the 2nd Medium Term Plan (MTP) 2013 -2017 – a policy document that outlines the road map towards realizing the Kenya Vision 2030. It is envisioned that the 2nd MTP will serve as a foundation for the subsequent development of sectoral and organizational plans at both the national and devolved level. Further, the MTP2 is designed to inform the budgeting and performance management process in Government.

Given the importance of the MTP2 the Commission is partnering with the relevant institutions to ensure that a Constitutional focus is mainstreamed not only in the development process but also that the final flagship projects, programmes and other initiatives are reflective of the letter and spirit of the Constitution. With regards to the process followed, CIC's focus is on mainstreaming a citizen centered and values driven approach as articulated in the Circular issued by the Head of Public Service/Secretary to Cabinet in April 2011 (Circular No. OP/CAB/17/84/1A). Secondly, addressing the issue of inclusive consultation as envisioned in the Constitution. Finally, engaging in a process that respects the two levels of Government in accordance with Chapter 11 of the Constitution-respect the governance, functional role and institutional integrity of governments at both the national and county level. Additionally, CIC is seeking to engender a constitutional focus in the results, program and project definition.

Given that the MTP2 will be completed by mid 2013, CIC will continue to engage with the sector working groups as well as enhance its engagement with the Ministry of Planning, National Development and Vision 2030 and the National Steering Committee.

(e) Shaping and Reshaping National and County Executive

This is a policy dialogue aimed at; (i) adhering to constitutional principles when shaping and reshaping government; and (ii) facilitating a structured engagement of non-state actors/public participation into the process. The Commission developed a policy paper, which will be shared with the executive during the month of January.

2.2 Development of Legislation

During the reporting period, the Commission various Bills and processed them. The section below gives an update of all the Bills received, those processed, approved and submitted to AG for tabling to Parliament and those in CIC opinion require further consultations.

Registration of Persons and Refugee Bills

The Registration and Identification Bill 2012, and the Refugee Bill 2012, which seek to give effect to Chapter Three of the Constitution were processed, completed and forwarded to Attorney General.

The Consumer Protection Bill, 2011

As reported in the 7th quarter report, CIC learned through the media that Parliament had discussed and moved on the Consumer Protection Bill to the Second Reading. In this regard, CIC has resolved to audit the Act after enactment.

The Universal Health Bill, The Kenya Medical Supplies Authority Bill, 2012, and The Proposed Amendments to The National Health Insurance Fund Act 1998

The Ministry of Health submitted to CIC three Bills that had not been forwarded by the Attorney General as per the constitutional requirements. In auditing these bills, the Commission was guided by the constitutional provisions on the right to health under Article 43 of the Constitution, relevant ratified international instruments, Article 21 on the State responsibility in respect of this right, the Fourth Schedule to the Constitution which distributes functions between the National and the County governments and Section 14 of the Sixth schedule to the Constitution which provides for the procedure required for review of legislation relating to devolved government.

The Ministry, through the Kenya Medical Supplies Authority Bill, 2012 proposes an establishment of an Authority to develop, maintain and manage a system of procurement of drugs and medical supplies for the national and county governments. CIC notes that, as per the 4th Schedule of the Constitution, procurement of drugs and other medical supplies is a function of County Governments while the setting of standards is a national government function. The Establishment of a Kenya Medical Supplies Authority to undertake this function is therefore unconstitutional based on the provision of this Schedule. Because of this, CIC did proceed to give its analysis of the clauses of the Bill. The Commission therefore advised that any establishment of such an entity must await the taking of office by county governments and the discussions by the intergovernmental agency on how counties would like to handle the issue of procurement of drugs. However, this is among the Bills that were enacted on 14th January 2013.

For the proposed amendments to the NHIF Act, 1998, CIC is of the opinion that Schedule Four of the Constitution, which provides for the distribution of functions between the National Government and the County Government, empowers the National Government to deal with the Health Policy and the County Government with Health Services. Provision of National Health Insurance is of itself a service that falls within the mandate of the County Government. The Commission proposed that the conversation would best be held when the county government is in place because as is, the Bills impose upon counties a mechanism on access to healthcare, denying the counties the opportunity to determine the most suitable mechanism for them and hence finalization of the bills should be put on hold.

The operation of a health insurance scheme is about facilitating service delivery on health. This is a function that is shared between the national and county governments with the national government only mandated to take charge of national referral hospitals. It is the view of CIC that any policy or law on health financing should be geared towards implementing article 43 which is about facilitating access to health for all. Where health service delivery is concerned the discussion has to involve both national and county governments.

In this regard, CIC recommended that the current service delivery mechanisms be allowed to operate in their current state during the transitional period or as the Transitional Authority may advise before the national and county governments come into operation. The amendment of the NHIF Act as proposed will amount to exercising duties of county governments and this is unconstitutional.

Geology, Minerals and Mining Bill

CIC submitted the Geology, Minerals and Mining Bill to the Attorney General with the Commission's comments on how the Bill should look before it becomes law. The Commission drew attention to specific clauses, which should be inserted or amended to conform to the letter and spirit of the Constitution, in addition to the following general comments.

- (a) The Bill is not clear on whether the government equity is freely carried or the government will pay for it.
- (b) The Bill is silent on compensation by way of resettlement /relocation. There is no reference as to the need to prescribe regulations as to the manner in which the compensation should be carried out.
- (c) There are three land regimes in the country and the cabinet secretary has no right in any of them.
- (d) Standard Agreements for all needs to be outlined to avoid corruption and confusion.
- (e) Health and safety issues are minimal in the Bill.
- (f) Asset termination and community rights on land when operations cease.
- (g) There is nothing on stability agreements. The clause needs to be reviewed to cater for stability agreements.
- (h) The rights of mineral license holders have more protection and rights than Kenyans especially community landowners.
- (i) You cannot give powers regarding minerals to cabinet secretary. All powers are with the NLC

The Commission also organized for a media engagement on the Geology, Minerals and Mining Bill 2012 where investigative journalists from various media houses were taken through the Bill, and salient mining issues in Kenya to raise their awareness on the silent issues when covering mining reporting.

Bills on Agriculture

Five bills on devolution related to agriculture have been developed. By close of the quarter, these bills were pending before the house and were in violation of Articles 261(4) and Section 14 of the Sixth Schedule to the Constitution. They include: (a) Agriculture, Livestock, Fisheries and Food Authority Bill, 2012, (b) Kenya Agriculture and Livestock Research Bill, 2012, (c) Pyrethrum Bill, 2012, (d) Crops Bill, 2012, and (e) The Kenya Plant Health Inspectorate Service Bill, 2011.

These Bills, which have undergone a Second Reading in Parliament, have constitutional issues that need to be carefully reviewed. Although CIC recommends that these Bills be brought back for public consultation and wrote to Parliament to express its concerns, Agriculture, Livestock,

Fisheries and Food Authority Bill, 2012 and Kenya Agriculture and Livestock Research Bill, 2012, Pyrethrum Bill, 2012, and Crops Bill, 2012 are among the bills enacted on 14th January 2013.

The Contempt of Court Bill, 2012 and The Magistrates' Courts Act (Cap. 10 of the Laws of Kenya)

The Commission carried out a desk review of key documents, reports, studies and best practices on contempt of court and magistrates' courts. A technical committee was constituted to review the bills and made recommendations. Two-day technical drafting retreat was held in October 2012 to incorporate recommendations of technical committee. Revised draft bills were prepared based on the recommendations of the Technical Committee and changes adopted by plenary. The bills are now pending the Commission's approval before the final consultative meeting with the Kenya Law Reform Commission and the Attorney General in preparation for tabling in Parliament.

Vetting of Judges and Magistrates (Amendment) Bill, 2012

Consultative meetings were organized attended by CIC, Judges and Magistrates' Board and CIOC to propose amendments to the Vetting of Judges and Magistrates Act. The Vetting of Judges and Magistrates (Amendment) Bill was prepared and passed, giving way to the on-going vetting of Judges and magistrates.

National Government Coordination Bill, 2012

The National Government Coordination Bill, 2012 was reviewed, finalized and submitted to AG and Parliament for debate. It was enacted on 14th January 2013.

The Public Procurement Draft Bill

The Public Procurement Oversight Authority (PPOA) shared with the CIC the zero draft of the Public Procurement Bill to implement Article 227 of the Constitution. The Commission is undertaking a preliminary review of the Bill as we await the formal submission of the Bill by the Attorney General.

County Government Public Finance Management Transition Bill, 2012

The purpose of this bill is to provide a legislative framework for the realization of Article 218 of the Constitution and put in place mechanisms for strengthening public finance management capacities of county governments during the Transition Phase. The Bill was finalised, forwarded to Attorney General for publication, debated in Parliament and passed.

Controller of Budget Bill, 2012

The Bill is formulated pursuant to the provisions of article 228 of the Constitution to provide for the operation of office of the Controller of Budget. It was subjected to the Internal CIC plenary process, followed by a Roundtable involving the Attorney General, Commission on Revenue Allocation, The Treasury, Kenya Law Reform Commission and CIC, and approved for debate in the House.

The Division of Revenue Bill, 2013

This Bill is aimed at providing for the equitable division of revenue raised between the national and county governments in 2013/14 financial year and for connected purposes. It was subjected to the Internal CIC plenary process, which was then followed by a Roundtable involving the Attorney General, Commission on Revenue Allocation, The Treasury, Kenya Law Reform Commission and CIC. It was debated by the house but not passed.

The Transition County Appropriation Bill, 2013

The Transition County Appropriation Bill 2013 was signed into law on 14th January 2013 is aimed at authorizing the issuance of money out of the relevant County Revenue Fund and its application towards the service of the year ending on the 30th June, 2013 and to appropriate that sum for certain respective county public services and purposes. It was audited in CIC and discussed with the Attorney General, Commission on Revenue Allocation, The Treasury, Kenya Law Reform Commission and CIC.

The Transition County Allocation of Revenue Bill, 2013

The Bill is aimed at providing for allocations for wages and administration costs for the county executive and county assemblies for the period commencing March to June 2013 and the responsibilities of national and county governments in relation thereto and for connected purposes. The Bill went through the due process, discussed with the Attorney General, Commission on Revenue Allocation, The Treasury, Kenya Law Reform Commission and CIC. It was debated by the house and passed into law. The president assented to it on 14th January 2013.

The County Allocation of Revenue Bill, 2013

The Bill is aimed at providing for the equitable division of revenue raised between the national and county governments in 2013/14 financial year, and for connected purposes

The Bill was subjected to the Internal CIC plenary process, which was then followed by a Roundtable involving the Attorney General, Commission on Revenue Allocation, The Treasury, Kenya Law Reform Commission and CIC. It was debated by the house and passed into law.

Review of The Education Bills

The Constitution recognizes Education as a fundamental right of the people of Kenya and requires the State to provide basic education to all Kenyans. The functions of providing education are shared between the national and county governments as contained in the Fourth Schedule of the Constitution. In order to meet these constitutional requirements, the Ministry of Education generated a number of Bills as contained in annex 3.

The education Acts have been assented to give effect to the following Constitutional provisions:

The Kenya National Examination Council (Amendment) Act, 2012, which repeals some provisions of the KNEC Act CAP 225A and provides for the establishment, powers and functions of the Kenya National Examinations Council in its management and administration of national examinations in Kenya.

The Basic Education Act, 2012 gives effect to Article 53(b) of the Constitution. The Act provides for the promotion and regulation of free and compulsory basic education; the accreditation, registration, governance and management of institutions of basic education; and the establishment of the National Education Board, the Education Standards and Quality Assurance Commission, and the County Education Board.

The Universities Act, 2012 provides for the development of university education; the establishment, accreditation and governance of universities; and the establishment of the Commission for University Education, the Universities Funding Board and the Kenya University and Colleges Central Placement Service Board.

The Science, Innovation and Technology Act, 2012 seeks to facilitate the promotion, coordination and regulation of the progress of science, technology and innovation in the country; assign priority to the development of science, technology and innovation; and to entrench science, technology and innovation into the national production system.

The Technical and Vocational Education Training Act, 2012 provides for the establishment of a technical and vocational education and training system; the governance and management of institutions offering technical and vocational education and training; the coordinated assessment, examination and certification and the institution of a mechanism for promoting access and equity in training to assure standards, quality and relevance.

The Kenya Institute of Curriculum Development Act, 2012 provides for the establishment and functions of the Kenya Institute of Curriculum Development and its governing Council.

Note that the Cabinet approved all the above Bills before formal submission and review by CIC. The Commission therefore wrote advisory opinions to the Minister of Education, the Attorney General, the Prime Minister and to the President, reminding all parties of the need to conform to the constitutionally provided mechanism for publication of Bills as stipulated in Article 261(4) of the Constitution, i.e., the Attorney General should coordinate with the Commission for the Implementation of the Constitution in the preparation of Bills for tabling in Parliament. This is an important process in the publication of Bills to ensure that they are technically sound and in line with the letter and the spirit of the Constitution.

Despite tight timelines between the date of submission to CIC and respective publication dates, CIC reviewed the Bills and submitted advisory opinions on identified unconstitutional provisions to the Ministry of Education, the Attorney General and Parliament, but they have since been assented to by the President. CIC will still further audit the Acts to ensure constitutionality.

The Election Campaign Financing Bill, 2012

The Election Campaign Financing Bill, 2012 seeks to regulate the amount of money that may be spent by or on behalf of a candidate or party in respect of any election. The Bill provides for the management, spending, controls, regulation and transparent accountability of funds during an election and referendum campaigns.

Although the Bill was published for tabling in Parliament on 16th November 2012, and despite CIC's advice for the Bill to be fast-tracked for debate, the Bill was not introduced into the National Assembly. With the term of the tenth Parliament having expired on 14th January 2013, the Election Campaign Financing Bill will be debated after the swearing in of the new members of Parliament after the 4th March 2013. The implication of this is that the ongoing campaigns for the next general elections do not have any mechanism for regulated expenditures.

Review of Amendments to The Elections Act, 2011 and Political Parties Act, 2011

Parliament has so far amended the Elections Act, 2011 through the following Acts:

- (1) The Statute Law (Miscellaneous Amendments) Act, 2012 assented on 6th July, 2012
- (2) The Elections (Amendment) Act, 2012 assented on 11th October, 2012
- (3) The Elections (Amendment) (No.2) Act, 2012 assented on 11th October, 2012
- (4) The Elections (Amendment) (No.3) Act, 2012 assented on 31st December, 2012
- (5) The Statute Law (Miscellaneous Amendments) (No.2) Act, 2012 assented on 31st December, 2012
- (6) The Political Parties (Amendment) Act, 2012 assented on 31st December, 2012

CIC reviewed the Elections (Amendment) Acts (No1 & 2) and submitted an advisory to Parliament to ensure that unconstitutional provisions were not passed, and further to the President in a bid to prevent the assent of unconstitutional provisions. CIC did not however have an opportunity to review the Elections (Amendment) Act (No.3), the Statute Law (Miscellaneous Amendments) (No.2) Act, 2012 and the Political Parties (Amendment) Act, 2012. The Commission has however, raised concerns on these amendments, which are largely contrary to the spirit of the Constitution, especially as relates to the institutionalization of political parties.

2.3 Development of Administrative Procedures and Regulations

For state actors regulations must be in line with the laws governing the operations of the institution and in line with the Constitution. In the reporting period, the Commission processed the following regulations.

(a) An Implementation Guide for Integration of Bill of Rights in the Public Service

The Constitution of Kenya, 2010 ushered in a new constitutional dispensation centred on sovereignty of the people where government operations and policies would be based on the essential values of human rights, equality, freedom, democracy, social justice and rule of law. For these values to be achieved, and in order to protect the sovereignty of the people of Kenya, the Bill of Rights (Chapter Four of the Constitution of Kenya, 2010) sets out the human rights and fundamental freedoms that every person in Kenya is entitled to. Article 19(1) of the Constitution states that the Bill of Rights "is the framework for social, economic and cultural policies" in Kenya. In effect, the Bill of Rights provides the framework for setting public policies and for the operations of government on a day-to-day basis.

Due to the centrality of the Bill of Rights in the work of government, state organs and public officials, CIC is developing an implementation guide to provide guidance on human rights and fundamental freedoms and how public institutions and public officials in the executive, legislative and judicial

branches of government as well as in Independent Commissions and Tribunals can apply these rights and freedoms in their day-to-day work. It is intended to be a practical and non-technical guide to help public officials to understand, appreciate and apply human rights in their every day work.

CIC has with assistance from consultants, developed the first draft and an editorial committee constituted to edit the document. The revised draft is expected in February 2013.

(b) Immigration Regulations

The Ministry of Immigration and Registration of Persons submitted to CIC for audit, immigration regulations. The regulations will be reviewed and finalized in the next quarter.

(c) Rules and Court Proceedings on Enforcement of Bill of Rights

The Commission has engaged with the Judiciary to discuss and finalize these rules.

(d) Simplified Version of Chapter Five

CIC has received financial assistance from WWF to develop a simplified version of Chapter Five of the Constitution and other provisions relating to land and environment. The version will;

- (1) include relevant chapters and articles of the constitution that require simplification,
- (2) present articles in a format easily understood by members of the public with no legal training.
- (3) contain a summary of key environmental issues and a detailed explanation of the articles in English Language that is simple for the general public to understand and follow.
- (4) provide the readers with cases where the specific articles may apply and possible results based on local or international Jurisprudence.

CIC and WWF are also in the process of developing cartoon work that illustrates the provisions of Chapter Five.

(e) Public Service Commission Regulations

The review of the draft Public Service Commission regulations is aimed at ensuring that the regulations. Chapter 13 of the Constitution on Public Service and other relevant provisions. Consultative meetings were held between CIC, KLRC, AG's office and the PSC to review the regulations and the following agreements reached.

- (i) In order to comply with Article 94 (6) of the Constitution of Kenya, 2010, matters of principle that are currently anchored in the draft Public Service Commission Regulations, 2012 should be in substantive law. Rather than practically relegating everything of substance pertaining to public service to regulations, principles underpinning better regulation and administration of public service should be addressed in legislation.
- (ii) Amend the PSC Act through the Miscellaneous Amendments Act to provide for the process of appointment of the Deputy Public Prosecutor, appointment and removal of the Principal Secretaries, high commissioners, ambassador or other diplomatic or consular representative of the republic of Kenya. for provide for the appointment and removal process of the same.
- (iii) Develop public service management Bill.

Note that the advisory was not taken on board through the Miscellaneous Amendments Bill, 2012 to cater for the appointment and removal of State Officers in offices which have not been catered for in any legislation. CIC will resume consultations after appointment of the PSC commissioners on priority legislation and subsidiary legislation.

(f) National Intelligence Service, Kenya Defence Force and National Police Service Administrative Procedures

NIS, KDF and NPS have developed draft administrative procedures to implement respective Acts. The Commission wrote to the Ministry of Internal Security to start engagement on auditing the administrative procedures, and a meeting was held in November, 2012 which agreed to finalise the regulations.

(g) Institutional Framework for Working with Constitutional Commissions

The Constitution provides for a framework for all Commissions to work together as follows:

- (i) The Constitution requires that the Commission for Implementation of the Constitution "work with each constitutional commission to ensure that the letter and spirit of the Constitution is respected." - Section 5 6 (d) (and Section 4(e) of the CIC Act 2010)
- (ii) The Common objects of the commissions set the scene for a shared agenda i.e., protecting the sovereignty of the people; securing the observance by all state organs of democratic values and principles and promoting constitutionalism Article 249 (1)
- (iii) The same general powers to all commissions are conferred to all Commissions which provide a framework for working modalities. These general powers are conducting investigations, powers for conciliation; mediation as well as negotiation; and the power to issue a summons to a witness to assist for the purposes of its investigations for the Kenya National Human Rights and Equality Commission, Judicial Service Commission and National Land Commission, Auditor General. Article 252
- (iv) The Constitution also states that the commissions are subject only to the Constitution and the Law as well as that they are independent and not subject to direction or control by any person or authority, which further clarifies the working modalities context. Article 249 (2)
- (v) The composition of the commissions as provided for in the Constitution consists of a chairperson, vice chairperson, members and a Secretary who is the Chief Executive Officer of the commission.

The Constitutional provisions set the scene for structured and issue-based engagement for a shared strategic focus i.e., informed by the powers and authority of each Constitutional Commission. In moving forward to fully realize the letter and spirit of the law, there is opportunity to strengthen the existing engagement mechanisms as provided for in the Constitution. In this regard, CIC is working with other Commissions to put in place a robust and participatory governance framework.

(h) Training Needs Assessment on Principles and Values of the Constitution

The Commission engaged a consultant to carry out a training needs assessment in all ministries, departments, state organs on principles and values of the Constitution on security, executive, human rights; and legislation and administrative procedures; and prepare a training curriculum. The consultancy has developed publication materials on security in reference to Chapter 14 of the Constitution and the enacted Acts for distribution to the people of Kenya and members of the security sector on their rights, duties and obligations under the law. Stakeholders and validation forums are planned for the January-March 2013 quarter after which the materials will be distributed to the people, police stations, camps, barracks; and engage the media for sensitization.

(i) Compendium of Reporting Agencies

A number of policies, laws, and regulations have been developed to implement the constitution. In addition, The Courts have made far-reaching decisions that have tremendous impact on the implementation of CoK 2010. CIC is planning to compile a compendium on these laws and decisions including a discussion on their implications. It is expected that the compendium shall help the state agencies to share best practices on steering and reporting on the implementation of the Constitution process. The compendium should also present a global summary of institutional compliance and a reference point for coordinated and adequate reporting on the part of government agencies.

(j) Administrative Procedures and Systems Necessary to Implement Chapter 12 of the Constitution

The Commission worked with the Transition Authority on the development of Criteria for the Transfer of Assets as well as the Functional Assignment Framework anticipated under the Constitution and the Transition to Devolved Government Act. Drafts of functional assignment and the criteria for assets transfer were developed for stakeholder validation.

(k) Institutional Framework and Relationship under Public Finance Management Act, 2012

The Commission planned to facilitate survey and review of the Institutional Framework and Relationship under the Public Finance Management Act, 2012 as well as other legislations that impact on the Public Finance Management framework under the Constitution/PFM Act. It commissioned a consultancy to undertake the constitution implication of Chapter 12, its institutional impact and the capacities or otherwise, inherent thereto for purposes of aligning with the Constitution, A final report has been received and is awaiting validation before adoption.

To sensitize the public on the new Public Finance Management Framework, CIC has conceptualized ICT materials for development. They will be submitted to printers for finalization.

(1) Regulations on Devolved Government

CIC has been expecting to receive the final draft regulations from the office of the Attorney General, which include the following: Transition to Devolved Government Regulations, Urban Areas and Cities Regulation, County Government Regulations and Intergovernmental Relations Regulations.

To facilitate this monitoring process, the Commission has developed a monitoring tool on devolved government and a draft-reporting template for the Transitional Authority. The structure of the report is developed in accordance with Sections 7, 16(1), 23(1), 24(1)(a)-(i), 26(1)-(4) and the Fourth Schedule of the Transition to Devolved Government Act, 2011.

(m) Monitoring Tool for Transition to Devolved Government

Section 15 of the Transition to Devolved Government Act, 2011 requires CIC, pursuant to section 15 (d) of the Sixth Schedule to the Constitution, to monitor and oversee the transition process to devolved government, including monitoring of progress of the implementation of the transition plans (section 16(4)(a). Further, Sections 7(n), 25(1) and 26(4) of the Act requires the Transition Authority to submit progress reports on transition to CIC monthly, in every three months and annual report after the first elections under the Constitution of Kenya, 2010.

To facilitate this monitoring process, the Commission has developed a monitoring tool on devolved government and a draft-reporting template for the Transitional Authority. The structure of the report is developed in accordance with Sections 7, 16(1), 23(1), 24(1)(a)-(i), 26(1)-(4) and the Fourth Schedule of the Transition to Devolved Government Act, 2012.

2.4 Establishment and Operationalization of New Constitutional Commissions and Independent Offices

Chapter 15 of the Constitution establishes ten commissions (Table 1 below). By end of the reporting quarter, all commissions had been established except two; The National Land Commission and The Public Service Commission. However, the President had approved names of members of the Public Service Commission, who are expected to be in office from January 2013.

3. Promoting Constitutionalism and Protecting Sovereignty of the People of Kenya

3.1 Stakeholder Engagements

Article 249(1) of the Constitution requires all constitutional commissions to carry out their functions with the object of protecting the sovereignty of the people of Kenya. To this end, the Commission engages with stakeholders, issues public advisories on apparent breaches of the Constitution and seeks judicial intervention to enforce implementation of the Constitution. This section highlights some of the stakeholder engagements undertaken during the reporting period, as well as public advisories and media briefings undertaken by the media and judicial intervention undertaken by the Commission.

(a) Engagement with National Gender and Equality Commission

CIC held a meeting with National Gender and Equality Commission (NGEC) on equipping targeted women groups and persons with disabilities to understand and exercise their constitutional rights for inclusion and representation in parliament. The NGEC expressed their willingness to facilitate the forums. CIC will hold a follow-up meeting with NGEC during the coming quarter.

(b) Meeting with Prime Minister

The Commission met with the Prime Minister on the implementation of implementation of socio-economic rights. The Commission plans, during the coming quarter (January-March) to meet with officers from the Prime Minister's office to chart the next actions

(c) Consultative meetings with the Ministry of State for Public Service, Ministry of Energy and Ministry of Labour

These meetings were aimed at getting updates on the progress on the implementation of the Constitution. A meeting with the Ministry of Labour in early November discussed the status of policies, legislation and administrative procedures, which are yet to be submitted to the Commission for audit.

(d) Consultative meeting with the Office of the President on National Security Policy

This is one of the security policies the Commission had set out to audit. In December, the Office of the President organized a meeting in which CIC was invited. The ministry will submit a meeting report and a revised policy for CIC audit in line with section 5(6) of the Constitution.

(e) Involvement in the Public Finance Management Reform Programme

This is a policy reform initiative aimed at coordinating reforms within the public finance system especially systems change in budget formulation, public procurement, external audit, revenue collection, budget execution, internal audit, parliamentary oversight, payroll, debt and guarantee inter alia.

(f) Meeting with Transition Authority

In accordance with Section 15 of the Transition to Devolved Government Act, 2011, that requires CIC to monitor and oversee the transition process to devolved government, including monitoring of progress of the implementation of the transition plans (section 16(4)(a), the Commission participated in a consultative workshop with the Transition Authority, Regional Development Authorities and other stakeholders to discuss issues pertaining to guidelines and criteria of transfer of assets, liabilities and transfer of functions to Counties. Another meeting was held with the Ministry of Health to discuss issues on functional assignments.

Subsequent meeting with the Thematic Area focused on identification of infrastructure for county assembly and executive offices, transfer of assets and liabilities during the transition period and county budgets.

To facilitate the Transition Authority to submit progress reports on transition to CIC monthly, in every three months and annual, as by Sections 7(n), 25(1) and 26(4) of the Act, the Commission held a meeting with the Transition Authority to discuss the reporting to CIC, and developed reporting template.

(g) Media Training on Devolution

The Commission organized and facilitated media training on Devolution one each, in Nyeri, Isiolo, Garissa, Machakos, Mombasa and Nairobi attended by 155 journalist representing six major media houses. The training focused on devolution and the role of the media. A database and network of journalists was established. Resultantly, the media started engaging institutions such as CIC, IEBC, TA, for updates on preparedness for elections and transition to devolution.

(h) Taking the Constitution to Schools

The Commission held meetings at St Teresa Girls Secondary, St. Charles Khumwendo Secondary School, Kisumu on Devolution, and St. Lucy's School for the blind and visually impaired young women, in Ingoji on awareness for the rights of pupils with special needs and their place in society as enshrined in the Constitution.

(i) Meeting with IEBC

The Commission held a meeting with IEBC to discuss (1) IEBC Administrative Procedures, (2) Policy guidelines for the Realization of Article 82 (1) (C), and Proposals on working together in fulfillment of Section 5 (6) (D) of the Sixth Schedule. The meeting noted that IEBC has made progress regarding legislation and administrative procedures; including:

- (i) Elections Regulations: On the 2nd of November, the (i) Elections (General) Regulations, 2012 and (ii) The Elections (Registration of Voters) Regulations, 2012 were gazetted. However, there are gaps for example, lack of provision of returning officers for the presidency.
- (ii) Rules of Procedure on Settlement of Disputes (draft): in exercise of the powers conferred by sections 74 and 109 of the Elections Act, the IEBC had constituted a technical team which had drafted the Rules of Procedure. These were yet to be adopted at IEBC plenary.

- (iii) Electoral Code of Conduct: This has been developed
- (iv) The Elections (Parliamentary and County Elections) Petition Rules (draft): IEBC developed a draft and had forwarded the same to judicial team dealing with elections matters for their consideration.
- (v) Political Parties Liaison Committee Regulations, 2012 (draft): These had been developed. The Office of the Registrar of Political Parties steered the process of finalization and operationalization.
- (vi) Political Party Act Regulations, 2012: Developed and the Office of the Registrar of Political Parties is steering the process of operationalization.
- (vii) Code of Conduct for Political Parties: Developed and the Office of the Registrar of Political Parties is steering the process of operationalization.
- (viii) Charge Sheet Forms Relating to the Election Act -Section 56 Offences (Draft)

The IEBC was granted additional powers to investigate and prosecute elections offences. Given this new mandate, it was reported that the commission is undertaking the following to ensure capacity to implement:

- Working with the Kenya Law School and other stakeholders to develop a capacity building program for IEBC officers. The target group is the regional coordinators and a curriculum was being developed
- In the interim to address the offences pertaining to the upcoming elections, the IEBC had formed an inter-agency committee with the
 Office of the DPP, the Ethics and Anti-corruption Commission, the Kenya Police and the Judiciary.

Progress by IEBC on article 82 (1)(c): IEBC commenced voter registration in earnest and had embarked on various information and education initiatives to mobilize voters to register and avoid the last minute rush that had been noted in the past. IEBC also clarified the following:

- (a) Article 90 allocation of party seats; IEBC in consultation with the Office Of The Registrar Of Political Parties had taken administrative action to yet the 57 lists provided by the parties for compliance.
- (b) Campaign Financing Act: IEBC was awaiting enactment of the Bill which was in parliament. The Bill was never enacted.

(j) Meeting with the Registrar of Political Parties

CIC met with the office of the Registrar of Political Parties in November 2012. The purpose of the meeting was to discuss the progress made by the office of the Registrar of Political Parties in the implementation of the Constitution, more so the mechanisms put in place to regulate political parties during the election period, and developing a monitoring mechanism. In addition, the two offices agreed on modalities of working together, as required by Section 5(6)(d) of the Sixth Schedule of the Constitution.

(k) Meetings with Non State Actors and Stakeholders

Other than state agencies and constitutional commissions, the Commission held a number of meetings with different non-state actors and stakeholders. These included the Kenya Youth Scenario's convened by the Institute for Economic Development at which the IEL presented a report of youth scenarios as envisioned by the youth based on the prevailing political environment and impeding elections; the Networking in Heels Women in Leadership conference at which women explored opportunities in the Constitution. The Commission also hosted the 4Cs, a civil society and explored ways in which the Commission and the civil society can work together for the benefit of the people of Kenya. The CIC also attended a retreat organized by the Kenya Private Sector Association and the National Assembly to review the country's preparedness for elections and the role of the government and the people of Kenya in the first general elections under the new Constitution.

(1) Meetings with Development Partners and Visiting Dignitaries

CIC held consultative meetings with a number of foreign embassies on the process of constitution implementation. They include: the Danish Ministry of Foreign Affairs, U.S Embassy, and the German Bundenstag Committee on Legal Affairs. Others include former UN Secretary General, Dr. Kofi Annan, and Ambassador Kochake, the Regional director for sub Saharan Africa and the Sahel.

The Commission hosted a Joint Steering Committee meeting, which brought together the Commission, the UNDP and development partners. The purpose of the meeting was to review the performance of the Commission and to share outstanding work of the Commission for purposes of resource mobilization to facilitate the discharge of the CIC mandate. During the meeting, CIC presented a progress report on the implementation of the constitution, a technical paper on the interpretation of the mandate of CIC and a summary future outlook of CIC. The Commission plans to have more sessions with development partners at a bilateral level for purposes of sharing the CIC work plan for the year 2013.

(m) Launch of Annual Report

Having prepared the Annual Report for the year 2012/2013 the Commission publicly launched the report at the KICC, which was attended by senior state and public officials, representatives from public and private sector organisations and representatives from all the 47 counties. The launch facilitated wide distribution of the Annual Report. In tandem with the report the Commission also published a Supplement in two daily newspapers with nationwide circulation to give the people of Kenya an overview of the status of implementation of the Constitution. Annex 2 is a copy of the supplement.

(n) A Joint Steering Committee with UNDP and Development Partners

The United Nation Development Programme (UNDP) is one of the major funding agencies of CIC. In February 2012, CIC, UNDP and Ministry of Finance signed a Project Support Agreement to support selected strategic areas of CIC. In November 2012, organized an joint steering committee meeting attended by UNDP, IDLO and other development partners. During the meeting, CIC presented a progress report covering the period of January – September 2012 on the implementation of the constitution, a technical paper on the interpretation of the mandate of CIC and a summary future outlook of CIC.

(o) CIC Website

CIC has developed a more interactive website (www.cickenya.org) linked to the CIC social media pages with discussion forums. This has increased visitors to the site. The new website was launched live to the public on 4th December 2012. CIC activities on Devolution and Executive & Legislature featured immediately on the website, the Chairperson's registration as a voter; with the site garnering over 3,000 views.

(p) CIC Documentary

The Commission is working on a documentary, "Implementation of the Constitution, History and Impact". The theme of the documentary is implementing the constitution and its impact on the people of Kenya. It will be completed in the next quarter.

4. Public Advisories, Press Briefings and Media Interviews

The Commission considers the media as a critical partner in the implementation of the Constitution, and as a means to communicating to the public on the progress of constitution implementation. During the months of October – December 2012, the commission organised a number of public press briefings to apprise the people of Kenya on implementation of the Constitution. The briefings were followed by publication of public advisories to reach a wider audience. These included, a joint media conference by CIC, TA and CRA on 13th December 2012 to address issues threatening the implementation of devolved governance and, Press Conference on the Nominees to the Positions of Inspector General of Police and the two deputies on 19th December 2012.

The Advisory on Devolution sought to bring to the share with the people of Kenya the fact that there were various laws being rushed through parliament without participation of the people as required by the constitution. Some of these laws seek to hijack the devolution process as stipulated in Chapter 11 of the constitution and the fact that the Executive was also processing several policy positions that conflict with the constitutional provisions on devolution in a move deemed to be a capture of functions by the executive before the county governments come into office. Many of the laws were passed. The Commission now calls upon the people of Kenya to audit the laws rushed through parliament and take necessary corrective action for provisions that are unconstitutional.

The advisory on Police Service Appointments flags the apparent breach of the Constitutional requirement on gender parity in the purported appointment of the Inspector of police and two deputies from the same gender.

5. Challenges and Recommendations

Despite the knowledge of Circular No. OP/CAB/17/84/1A of April 2011 by the Head of Public Service/Secretary to Cabinet explaining the procedures of developing legislation, there has been a blatant violation of the law and this procedure. This has been the most challenge in the implementation of the constitution. The Attorney General for example, publishes Bills, such as Office of Deputy Public Prosecutor, before presenting them to CIC.

CIC will continue to do its mandate and issue advisories on Bills found to be against the letter and spirit of the Constitution. Where it warrants, the Commission will seek judicial interventions to safeguard the Constitution.

6. Focus for the Next Quarter: January - March, 2013.

The Commission has prioritized in the coming quarter the development and review of polices, legislation and administrative procedures and regulations; preparing for March 2013 elections, and Transition to Devolved Government.

- Development of Policies
- (a) Review of the policy framework for education and training for realignment of education and training sectors in Kenya.
- (b) Working with the Ministry of Education and the Ministry of Higher Education in the implementation of the education policy and the preparation of the Medium Term Plan (2013-2017).
- (c) Completing the review of environment and natural resources sector.
- (d) Review of legal/policy framework on Traditional Dispute Mechanism.
- 2. Development of Legislation
- (a) Review the assented education Acts to ensure that they are in line with the letter and spirit of the Constitution, and where necessary, propose amendments to the Acts.
- (b) The Commission plans to audit all the 30 bills passed in December 2012 to identify unconstitutional clauses and propose amendments.
- 3. Development of Administrative Procedures and Regulations
- (a) Completing the implementation guide for integration of Bill of Rights in the public service.
- (b) Finalization of the review of immigration regulations.
- (c) Compiling of compendium of policies, laws and regulations developed to enable state agencies share best practices on steering and reporting on the implementation of the constitution.

4. Towards Transition to Devolved Government

- (a) Work with Parliament to prepare the system of devolved governance on National Assembly, Senate and County Assemblies.
- (b) Engage with Monitoring and Evaluation Directorate of the Ministry of Planning, National Development and Vision 2030 on M&E mechanism of constitution implementation at County Government level.

Preparedness for 2013 General Elections

- (a) Monitoring of the political parties nominations process and general elections.
- (b) Monitoring, facilitating and overseeing the preparations for the next general elections to be held on the 4th of March 2013.
- (c) Observation of the elections process before, on elections day on 4th March 2012, and after.
- (d) Facilitation of capacity building of the media to ensure factual and fair reporting during the campaign period.

Annex 2: Advisories

Appointment of Police Chiefs in Contravention of The Law

The Mandate of The Commission

The Commission for the Implementation of the Constitution is established Section 5(6) of the 6th Schedule to the Constitution and is mandated to monitor, facilitate and oversee the development of legislation and administrative procedures required to implement the Constitution of Kenya, 2010. The ultimate goal is to protect the sovereignty of the people, secure the observance by all state organs of democratic values and principles; and to promote constitutionalism.

The Process of Implementation

In carrying out its mandate CIC seeks to ensure State Officers and State Organs adhere to the requirements of the Constitution of Kenya 2010 and to the Legislation passed by Parliament. It is in this context that CIC seeks to address matter relating to the appointments of the Inspector General of Police and the two Deputy Inspector Generals.

Violation of Section 14 of The National Police Service Act

The Commission is gratified that the long outstanding process of appointing the Inspector General of Police and the two Deputy Inspector Generals has now moved to Parliament. As the Commission has emphasized on various occasions, the failure to appoint these officers within the timelines set by law was not just an unfortunate disregard of the law, but had the capacity to compromise the security of the country at a critical time when we face numerous security threats including those relating to the forthcoming elections.

The Commission is however concerned that in nominating three officers of the same genderfor appointment, His Excellency the President and the Honourable Prime Minister violated the mandatory provisions of Section 14 of the National Police Service Act which provides as follows;

- "14. In the entire recruitment and appointment process of the Inspector-General or Deputy Inspector-General, the Commission, Parliament and President, as the case may be, shall
- (a) comply with the values and principles set out under the Constitution, and in particular, Article 10, 27 and 232 of the Constitution; and
- (b) ensure that at all times one of the three positions of the Inspector-General and the two Deputy Inspector-Generals is of opposite gender."

This Section was enacted in furtherance of the requirements of Article 27 of the Constitution that requires that;

"the State shall take legislative and other measures to implement the principle that not more than two thirds of members of elective or appointive bodies shall be of the same gender."

The recent Supreme Court Ruling on the gender issue emphasized that where legislative measures have been adopted that enable the application of the gender principle, that principle must be applied immediately. Indeed, in compliance with this legislative measure the National Police Service Commission that is mandated to recruit members of the National Police Service did interview, select and shortlist qualified candidates for each of the three positions, which candidates included qualified women to fill the positions. I reiterate that "there was no absence of qualified women candidates to fill the positions of IG and DIG's."

We are aware that there is an attempt to amend the National Police Service Act by deleting the said Section 14 through the Statute Law (Miscellaneous Amendments Bill) which we believe is currently before the National Assembly. Neither CIC, nor as far as we know, the other stakeholders, were involved in the proposed amendment. This in itself is both a violation of the constitutional process and principles, as well as an exhibition of bad faith. Such an amendment would in any event go against the spirit of the Constitution and would not cure the violation that has already occurred. Those who have initiated the proposed amendments must be exposed and held accountable for their anti-reform attempts to thwart the gains women and all Kenyans achieved through the promulgation of the Constitution of Kenya, 2010. On its part, Parliament must act on the basis of the status of the law at the point the name of the nominee for Inspector General was given to the Speaker. At that point, indeed as at this moment, the nominations are in clear violation of the Constitution.

We have written to His Excellency the President and the Honorable Prime Minister, the National Police Service Commission and the Speaker of the National Assembly pointing out the fundamental constitutional issues and requesting that the appointments of the three officers be halted until the threatened violation can be corrected. The failure to observe this mandatory provision not only breaches the Law and the spirit of the constitution but is a further assault on the gender gains which have been consolidated in the Constitution of Kenya 2010. This is a state of affairs that Kenyans must not tolerate.

In calling for the halting of the proposed appointments, CIC nonetheless expresses the hope that the mandated offices and organs will complete the long delayed process forthwith, and in full respect for the letter and spirit of the Constitution. The President, The Prime Minister and the National Assembly have thus far played an important and effective role in the implementation of the Constitution, pursuant to their respective constitutional mandates and oaths of office. We urge that fidelity to the Constitution and the law remains intact, even as the life of the 10th Parliament, as well as the tenure of the Coalition Government draw to a close. We wish to remind all state officers, all of whom took an oath of office from the Head of State to members of Parliament and Constitutional Commissions where they swore to "obey, preserve, protect and defend this Constitution of Kenya." Under article 2 of the Constitution, the Constitution is the supreme law of the Republic and binds all persons. The responsibility of a state officer is to exercise a public trust in a manner that is consistent with the purposes and objects of the Constitution. If the Executive is unable or has failed to protect and defend the Constitution, we urge Members of Parliament to intervene and exercise their legislative authority in the publics' interest to safeguard the Constitution by resoundingly rejecting the proposed amendment to the National Police Service Act.

We request Kenyans to remain vigilant to ensure that the constitution they passed with overwhelming support and the laws enacted thereunder are protected by all and are not violated by any person or authority. Even as the country enters a period of electoral campaigns leading to the first general election under the new dispensation, we urge the people of Kenya to demand from those seeking elective positions to show their commitment to true and faithful implementation of the Constitution. As Commission we remain committed to the performance of our mandate that includes protecting the sovereignty of the people without fear or favour and urge Kenyans to remain peaceful during the election period. May God bless Kenya.

2. Devolution Under Threat

Introduction

The Commission for the Implementation of the Constitution (CIC) is mandated to monitor, facilitate and oversee the development of legislation and administrative procedures required to implement the Constitution and to monitor the effective implementation of the system of devolved government.

The Transition Authority (TA) is established under the Transition to Devolved Government Act and its function is to facilitate and co-ordinate the transition to the devolved system of government as provided under section 15 of the Sixth Schedule to the Constitution.

The Commission on Revenue Allocation (CRA) is an independent commission set up under Article 215 and 216 of the Constitution of Kenya. Its core mandate is to recommend the basis for equitable sharing of revenues raised nationally between the National and the County Governments; and sharing of revenue among the County Governments.

These three independent bodies are therefore variously mandated to oversee the development, facilitation and monitoring of the devolution process.

Devolution

The Constitution of Kenya creates two levels of government, the National and County Governments. Under the devolved system of government, the functions and powers of both levels of government are set out in the Fourth Schedule of the Constitution.

Emerging Constitutional Threat

We have noted with great concern that there are currently various laws being rushed through parliament without participation of the people as required by the constitution. Some of these laws seek to hijack the devolution process as stipulated in Chapter 11 of the constitution. The Executive is also processing several policy positions that conflict with the constitutional provisions on devolution. Numerous institutions are being created that have a similar effect. This capture of functions before the county governments come into office is unconstitutional, illegal and unacceptable.

This consequential crisis will fully manifest itself when the county governments come into office. At that time, conflicts of mandate between both levels of Government will exhibit themselves, leading to extensive and wasteful litigation and unnecessary discord. This process must therefore be halted immediately.

As a result of the foregoing we are issuing a cautionary statement to Parliament and the people of Kenya that certain elements in the Executive are seeking to misuse the legislative and policy formulation process to circumvent the Constitution of Kenya 2012 on the issue of devolution.

The most recent example is Kenya Medical Supplies Authority Bill (2012), The Health Bill (2012), amendments to the National health Insurance Fund (NHIF) Act and the Agriculture, Livestock, Fisheries and Food Authority Bill (2012), the Crops Bills(2012). These laws purport to create new Authorities, which go against the objects and principles of devolved government. The Health Bill for instance seeks to elevate 21 district and provincial hospitals into national referral hospitals. Elevating district and provincial hospitals to national referral hospitals will deny 13 counties the

right to primary heath care facilities and therefore go against Art 43 of the Constitution. It will also deny counties the ability to carry out their functions of healthcare provision.

The creation of numerous semi autonomous government agencies which will be controlled by the National but which will carry out functions assigned to the county governments government goes against Article 6 of the constitution which recognizes both levels of government as distinct but interdependent. It conflicts with Article 174 (d), which recognizes the right of communities to manage their own affairs and to further their development.

Furthermore the creation of these offices places an unbearable strain on the public wage bill since many of these offices being created will lead to duplication of roles at both levels of government. These new institutions and offices are also setting up structures and entering into contractual agreements the consequences of which shall be a burden on the taxpayer and it will also limit the funds available for county governments to carry out their constitutional functions.

Way Forward We advise that there should be a moratorium on new laws or implementation of policies seeking to allocate functions to either level of government outside of the mechanism provided under the Transition to Devolved Government Act. All legislation creating new institutions and offices should be put on hold until the new county governments come into place. This will enable both the national and county governments reach a negotiated intergovernmental framework for cooperation that does not conflict with Chapter 11 of the Constitution. We urge all stakeholders to note the consequences of contravening the constitution under Chapter 6 of the constitution. We request all stakeholders consult the Transition Authority, the CRA and the CIC on all matters relating to transition and transfer of functions to the various levels of Government.
