NIGERIA (CONSTITUTION) ORDERS IN COUNCIL, 1954 to 1958

Concurrent Legislation (Designation as Federal Ordinances) Order, 1959

Commencement : 8th January, 1959

In exercise of the powers conferred by subsection (6) of section 57 of the Nigeria (Constitution) Order in Council, 1954, the Governor-General has declared that the Ordinances and parts thereof specified in the Schedule hereto shall, insofar as they relate to any matter included in the Concurrent Legislative List contained in Part II of the First Schedule to the said Order in Council, have effect in relation to each Region and the Southern Cameroons as if they were Laws enacted by the Federal Legislature, with effect from the date of publication of this Order.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

The Ordinances specified in the Schedule to this Order are Ordinances which relate to items on the Concurrent Legislative List, and they therefore would fall to be amended when necessary by Regional Legislatures. These Ordinances are however peculiarly designed for central administration and it would be more convenient therefore that they should be subject to amendment by the Federal Legislature. This has been agreed at the Resumed Constitutional Conference, and by Regional Governments, and the power conferred by the Constitution is accordingly now used to declare them to be, in effect, Federal Ordinances.
