LAGOS TOWN PLANNING ACT (CHAPTER 95)

Lagos Town Planning (Declaration of Planning Area) Order 1967

Commencement: 10th December 1966

In exercise of the powers conferred by section 17 of the Lagos Town Planning Act as modified by the Constitution (Suspension and Modification) Decrees 1966 (Nos. 1 to 9), which powers have been delegated to me under the Military Administrator of the Federal Territory (Delegation of Powers) Notice 1966 (L.N. No. 68 of 1966), and of all other powers enabling me in that behalf, I hereby make the following Order:—

1. This Order may be cited as the Declaration of Planning Area (Maroko Village) Order 1967 and shall apply to the Federal Territory.

Citation and application.

2. All that piece of land at Maroko Village and its environs in Victoria Island, in the Federal Territory, comprising an area of approximately 946 acres, the boundaries of which are described in the Schedule hereto are hereby declared a town planning area.

Declaration of Town Planning Area.

SCHEDULE

Starting at a point on the south bank of Five Cowrie Creek the co-ordinates of which are 883842.82 feet North and 374919.08 feet East of Colony Zero, the origin of Lagos Cadastral Surveys, the boundaries run eastwards along the said south bank of Five Cowrie Creek for 2,500 feet to its intersection with the Federal Boundary, thence due South along the Federal Boundary for 6,480 feet to its intersection with the shore line, thence along the shore line westwards for 8,375 feet to the boundary of the reclamation of Victoria Island, thence along the reclamation boundary northwards to a point on the West bank of Kuramo Waters, thence along the west bank of Kuramo Waters north-easterly to its junction with the west bank of Itirin Creek, thence along the west bank of Itirin Creek in a north-easterly direction to its junction with the south bank of Five Cowrie Creek, thence eastwards along the south bank of Five Cowrie Creek to the starting point.

All lengths are approximate.
