A copy of a plan of the pipeline route identifying the land affected can be inspected during all normal working hours at the District Offices, Port Harcourt, Bori and Ahoada, the Federal Ministry of Lagos Affairs, Mines and Power, Lagos; the Commissioner of Lands' Office, Enugu; and the Offices at Owerri, Umuobiakani and Port Harcourt of the aforesaid Company.

3. Any person who considers that his land or interest in land will be injuriously affected by the grant of the licence should lodge verbally or in writing within three weeks from the date of this notice with the Provincial Secretary, Ahoada-Rivers Provinces, Port Harcourt, the Administrative Officer-in-charge of Ogoni Division of the Administrative Officer-in-charge of Ahoada Division, notice of objection stating the interest of the objector and the grounds of objection.

Any public officer who receives a verbal objection in the course of his duties shall record the name and address, interest and grounds of objection of any person lodging such a verbal objection and shall forward such details to the Provincial Secretary, Ahoada-Rivers Provinces, Port Harcourt, the Administrative Officer-in-charge of Ogoni Division or the Administrative Officer-in-charge of Ahoada Division.

5. Matters relating to the amount of compensation payable by the aforesaid Company for its use of the land affected shall not be material grounds to include in a notice of objection.

6. The Provincial Secretary, Ahoada-Rivers Provinces, Port Harcourt, the Administrative Officer-in-charge of Ogoni Division and the Administrative Officer-in-charge of Ahoada Division shall enquire into objections (if any) duly lodged in accordance with paragraphs 3 and 4 above at their offices at Port Harcourt, Bori and Ahoada respectively at 10 a.m. on the 4th day of June, 1959, giving all parties an opportunity to be heard, and reports thereof shall be sent without delay to The Permanent Secretary, Ministry of Lagos Affairs, Mines and Power, Lagos for submission to the Minister who shall advise the Governor-General whether or not the Licence shall be granted.

7. Compensation (if any) payable by the aforesaid Company for its use of the land affected shall be determined by negotiation between the Company and the landowners and occupiers.

**MINISTRY OF FINANCE—CUSTOMS AND EXCISE NOTICE
THE TEMPORARY IMPORTATION OF
MOTOR VEHICLES OVERLAND BY
APPROVED ROUTES**

This Notice sets out the requirements to be fulfilled by persons wishing to import motor vehicles overland by approved routes into Ghana for a temporary use or purpose.

2. Methods of Temporary Importation.—Motor vehicles of a kind liable to import duty may be temporarily imported without payment of duty by any one of the following methods:—

(a) *On Carnet or Triptyque.*—A motor vehicle may be imported under this system provided the relative documents are valid and have been issued by an approved Club or Association which guarantees the payment of the duty in the event of failure to comply with the regulations governing temporary importation. For this reason documents such as International Fiscal Permits are not acceptable. A carnet or triptyque is deemed only to cover the vehicle and such appropriate spares and equipment specified therein. Any other items must be cleared in accordance with the alternatives set out in (b) and (c) below.

(b) *On Deposit of Duty.*—As an alternative to importation on carnet or triptyque, a motor vehicle may be admitted on deposit of the appropriate duty chargeable.

(c) *Under Bond.*—In lieu of a deposit, the importer may elect to enter into a bond in the Form C.B. 15, with a Bank established in Ghana as surety to secure the duty chargeable.

3. Rates of Duty.—The current rates of import duty on motor vehicles chargeable are as follows:—

- (i) Where the wheelbase is less than 9 feet 3 inches each £G50
- (ii) Where the wheelbase is, or is greater than 9 feet 3 inches each £G150.

4. Restrictions as to hours.—Attendance is given free of charge between 6 a.m. and 6 p.m. daily (including Sundays and Public Holidays) at Customs

Stations established on the frontiers. No provision is normally made for attendance outside these official hours.

5. *Period for which Motor Vehicles may be temporarily imported.*—Subject to compliance with the conditions set out in paragraph 2 above, permission to import motor vehicles temporarily is granted on condition that the vehicles are re-exported from Ghana within 3 months from the date of importation. Provided a motor vehicle is the *bona fide* property or *bona fide* in the use of any person on a temporary visit to Ghana, applications to allow an additional period may be submitted to the Comptroller for consideration. Where a motor vehicle is imported on carnet or triptyque, the period cannot be extended beyond the date of its validity.

6. *Procedure at Importation.*—A person wishing to import a motor vehicle temporarily must produce it together with the covering carnet or triptyque to the proper officer at the frontier Customs Station. If it is desired to resort to one or other of the methods described in paragraph 2 of this Notice, entry must be made on Form C. 59, which may be obtained on application to the proper officer. Where on account of financial restrictions, or for any other reason, importers are unable to complete the required formalities at the frontier, they may be permitted to proceed to their destinations in Ghana on completing and signing an undertaking in the Form C. and E. No. 165. Such undertakings require that motor vehicles specified therein must be produced to the proper officer at the Custom House or Station nominated by the importer and formalities completed within seven days from the date of importation. Failure to comply with the conditions of such an undertaking renders the motor vehicle liable to seizure.

Where it is intended to re-export motor vehicles at a port or station other than the station of importation, importers are advised, in their own interests, to notify the proper officer at the place of importation as soon as possible of their intentions so as to obviate any unnecessary delay or difficulty in the matter of refunding any duty deposited as security.

7. *Procedure at Re-exportation.*—Motor vehicles temporarily imported must be produced to the proper officer at the frontier Customs Station at the time of re-exportation, together with the covering carnet or triptyque of Form C 59, as appropriate, by the importer. If the proper officer is satisfied as to the identity of the vehicle, and that the conditions of importation have been fulfilled, the amount of any duty deposited will be refunded or steps taken to discharge the bond liability as the case may be.

8. *Motor Vehicles imported temporarily overland for a period not exceeding seven days.*—A dutiable vehicle registered in, and normally kept in territories adjacent to Ghana may be imported temporarily overland without security for the duty chargeable provided the importer declares his intention to re-export the vehicle within a period of seven days. Importers desiring to avail themselves of this facility must produce their motor vehicles to the proper officer at the frontier Customs Station at the time of importation and re-exportation. At the time of importation, importers will be required to declare particulars of their vehicles in a register kept for the purpose. Failure to comply with the conditions attached to this facility will result in the withdrawal of the arrangements on any future occasion.

9. *Special exemptions from the terms of this Notice.*—The following classes of dutiable motor vehicles may be imported temporarily into Ghana without security for the duty:—

(a) Vehicles which are the property of the Government of another West African territory, provided:

(i) they are driven by an official driver; and

(ii) the driver produces written evidence at the station of importation identifying the vehicles and showing that they are on official journeys which necessitate entry into Ghana. This written evidence must be signed by a responsible official of the Government concerned.

(b) Vehicles which are the property of West African Research Organisations, or members thereof, provided the importer:

(i) reports to the proper officer at the Customs Station of importation; and

(ii) produces written evidence, signed by the Head of the Organisation, detailing the status of the importer; the reason for his journey into Ghana, and the particulars of the vehicle concerned.

Note.—The exemption set out in (a) above does not apply to Government Officials entering Ghana in their own private vehicles, even if they are engaged on official business on behalf of their Governments.

NOTICE BY THE BOARD OF CUSTOMS AND EXCISE

TEMPORARY IMPORTATION AND EXPORTATION

Commencement: 1st June, 1959.

Notes:—Forms mentioned in this Notice may be printed privately provided they conform in all respects (including colour) to the approved forms, specimens of which can be seen at any Custom House.

2. *The attention of all concerned is invited to the Customs and Excise Management Ordinance, No. 55 of 1958.*

General.—The Board of Customs and Excise are prepared to remit or repay customs duty on specified goods where they are satisfied that other provisions for relieving re-exported goods from duty (such as drawback, warehousing, and the arrangements made with adjacent French Territories) are inapplicable or inappropriate, and that there are special reasons why, with a view to promoting the interests of trade, duty should not be charged, provided that written application is made to Mosaic House, Lagos.

The main classes of goods concerned are commercial samples and advertising materials (see Part I of this notice), commercial and private motor vehicles (see Part II), and other goods (see Part III).

The Board of Customs and Excise may authorise, on written application, goods imported for a temporary use or purpose to be retained in Nigeria as a permanent importation. Where granted, in addition to any particular requirements, the importer must comply in all respects with the conditions set forth in Customs and Excise Notice 13. "The Entry Ex-Ship or Aircraft of Imported Goods for Home Consumption".

PART I.—COMMERCIAL SAMPLES AND ADVERTISING MATERIALS

A.—TEMPORARY IMPORTATION OF SAMPLES BY TRAVELLERS FROM ABROAD

2. **Exemption from Duty.**—Imported commercial samples and advertising materials either of negligible value or which are at the time of importation rendered useless as merchandise by reason of marking, tearing, perforation or other treatment but not in such a manner as to destroy their usefulness as samples, may be imported exempt from import duties of customs under the Second Schedule to the Customs Tariff Ordinance, No. 60 of 1958.

The proper officer must be satisfied at the time of importation that the goods are to be used solely for soliciting orders for goods of the kind represented by the samples.

In determining whether the samples are of negligible value or not the proper officer may consider the aggregate value in any one consignment, but not the aggregate value of samples sent by the consignor to different consignees. Goods thus qualifying for exemption from duty should be entered in accordance with the conditions set forth in the notice, "The Entry Ex-Ship or Aircraft of Imported Goods for Home Consumption".

It should be noted that no further conditions are imposed subsequent to release by the proper officer.

2. **Special Conditions where Goods are not Exempt.**—Imported commercial samples and advertising materials which do not qualify for exemption from duty under the conditions of the foregoing paragraph, may be relieved from duty provided they comply with the conditions set out in the paragraphs below, and are finally exported within a prescribed time after importation.

4. **Conditions of Temporary Importation.**—The sample must be an article which is representative of a particular category of goods already produced, or must be an example of goods the production of which is contemplated, on condition that such article:

(a) is owned by a person outside Nigeria and is imported solely for the purpose of being shown or demonstrated in Nigeria for the soliciting of orders for goods to be supplied from outside Nigeria;

(b) is not sold or put to normal use (except for purposes of demonstration) or used in any way for hire or reward whilst in Nigeria;

(c) is intended to be re-exported within six months or such longer period as the Board of Customs and Excise may allow, and

(d) is capable of identification on re-exportation.

The concession does not apply to similar articles imported by the same person, or sent to the same consignee, in such quantity that, taken as a whole, they no longer constitute samples within the ordinary commercial meaning. Commercial travellers will be allowed admission of their samples for the period stated in sub-paragraph (c) above upon duty being deposited or secured by bond.

5. Status of Traveller.—In order to be eligible for the concession the traveller must represent a firm established abroad or must himself be a merchant so established who is travelling with samples of his own wares. In either case he must be making only a temporary visit to Nigeria. Samples (other than those covered by paragraph 13) sent to a firm or agent permanently established in Nigeria are not admissible as commercial travellers' samples.

The traveller need not actually accompany his samples on importation. They may arrive before or after him and may be cleared by an authorised agent. (But see paragraph 7 below).

6. Declaration on Importation.—Full particulars regarding the traveller and the articles imported must be given in the Form C.59. The form must be furnished in duplicate. One copy will be returned to the traveller for presentation with the samples on their re-exportation.

7. List of Samples.—The traveller or his agent must produce with the samples a list thereof, in duplicate, describing each article in sufficient detail for identification purposes, and showing the value of each article separately. The values to be shown on the lists are the full c.i.f., prices at which similar articles may be sold to independent purchasers in Nigeria, and travellers may be required to produce current price lists or other documentary evidence in support of the values stated.

For convenience of examination the contents of each container should, where possible, be shown separately on the lists, and the traveller should pack the articles in the same way on his return abroad.

8. Marks and Seals.—Unless the samples bear satisfactory identifying marks, additional marks or seals may be applied to them for identification purposes. If the articles are such that they cannot be positively identified on re-exportation, temporary importation facilities may be withheld.

9. Security for Duty.—An amount sufficient to cover the duty on the samples must be paid provisionally on importation. Alternatively, the duty may be secured by bond in the Form C.B.15, but it should be noted that bonds for this purpose are accepted only if sureties are persons resident in or are limited companies registered in Nigeria.

10. Notice of Arrival and Departure.—In order to avoid delay, travellers are advised to notify the Customs, in advance, of the time and place of their arrival, and again of their departure.

11. Production of Goods at Re-export and Declaration by the Traveller.—The goods should be presented at the export station in sufficient time to enable the officer to examine them. The duplicate copy of Form C.59 must be produced, together with the officially stamped list of samples imported, and, where applicable an export licence.

12. Examination at Re-exportation.—The samples will be examined on exportation and the traveller may be required to account for any which are not produced. If necessary, adjustment of the amount paid provisionally on importation (or discharge of bond as the case may be) may be deferred pending further enquiry as to whether all conditions of the concession have been complied with. The goods will be subject to import duties of Customs as at the date of importation.

13. Special Conditions applicable to particular Goods.—(i) Commercial (or trade) samples temporarily imported from:

Denmark
Egypt
Federal Republic of Germany
Finland
Greece
India
Indonesia
Japan
Netherlands (including Surinam, Netherlands Antilles and new Guinea)
Norway
Pakistan
Spain
Sweden
Switzerland

may be imported by persons established in Nigeria, subject to paragraphs 7 to 8 above.

(ii) Road vehicles and industrial and agricultural machinery or equipment of the value of £400 or more from the above countries. The Board may require a declaration as to the place of destination, and may require proof at any time that the goods are at such declared place, and may seal or otherwise preclude the operation of the same during the time for which duty free admission is permitted, and may limit the places where such goods may be operated for demonstration purposes.

(iii) Advertising films from the above countries may be admitted for temporary importation subject to conditions set forth in paragraph 7 to 8 above provided it is positive cinematograph film of a width not exceeding 16 mm. consisting essentially of photographs (with or without a sound track) showing the nature or operation of products or equipment whose qualities cannot be adequately demonstrated by samples or catalogues, and further provided that the films:—

(a) relate to products or equipments offered for sale or for hire by a person established in one of the countries specified in paragraph 13 above;

- (b) are of a kind suitable for exhibition to prospective customers, but not for general exhibition to the public;
- (c) are imported in a packet which contains not more than one copy of each film and which does not form part of a larger consignment of films;
- (d) are intended to be re-exported within six months, or such longer period, as the Board of Customs and Excise may allow and;
- (e) are covered where required by a report from the Board of Censors appointed under section 6 of the Cinematograph Ordinance.

Films other than the above may not be admitted under the provisions of this Notice.

B.—NIGERIAN COMMERCIAL TRAVELLERS PROCEEDING ABROAD

14. *List of Samples*.—Commercial travellers proceeding abroad may have their samples examined and a list thereof certified by this Department. On prior notice being given the samples, accompanied by a list in duplicate containing a full description thereof, including quantity and value, may be produced at any port or frontier station for examination.

For convenience, the contents of each container should if possible, be shown separately; and the articles should be packed in the same manner on re-importation.

15. *Export Licence*.—Any necessary export licence must be produced at the time of exportation—for details see separate notice.

16. *Exchange Control*.—Details of any exchange control requirements may be obtained from the Exchange Control Officer, Lagos.

PART II.—MOTOR VEHICLES

17. *Methods of Temporary Importation*.—Motor vehicles of a kind liable to import duty may be temporarily imported without payment of duty by any of the following methods:—

(a) *On Carnet or Triptyque*.—A motor vehicle may be imported under this system provided the relative documents are valid and have been issued by a Club approved by Federation Internationale de Automobile (F.I.A.) or Association approved by Alliance Internationale De Tourisme (A.I.T.) which guarantees the payment of duty in the event of failure to comply with the regulations governing temporary importation. A carnet or triptyque is deemed only to cover the vehicle and such appropriate spares and equipment specified therein. Any other items must be cleared in accordance with the alternatives set out in (b) and (c) below.

(b) *On Provisional Payment of Duty*.—The import duty as assessed by the proper officer is paid provisionally at the place and at the time of importation in the Form C. 59 (in duplicate). After payment a receipt for the payment and the duplicate copy of Form C. 59, will be handed to the importer.

(c) *Under Bond*.—In lieu of a deposit, the importer may elect to enter into a bond in the Form C.B. 15. The surety to the bond must be either a Bank or an Insurance Company established in Nigeria.

18. *Rate of Duty*.—The rate of duty is that in force at the date and time of importation—see Customs Tariff Ordinance No. 60 of 1958.

19. *Restriction as to Hours*.—At Customs Stations established on the frontier, official attendance is given free of charge between 6 a.m. and 7 p.m. daily, including Sundays and Public Holidays for temporary importation of motor vehicles overland by approved routes. Provisions is not normally made for attendance outside these official hours. Attendance at ports is given between 6 a.m. and 4.30 p.m. but these hours may be extended by application in the Form C. 1 to the proper officer.

20. *Period for which Motor Vehicles may be Temporarily Imported*.—Subject to the foregoing, permission to import motor vehicles temporarily is granted on condition that the vehicles are re-exported from Nigeria within six months in the case of vehicles admitted under the authority of an international touring document (see paragraph 17 above), or 90 days in all other cases. Provided the motor vehicles is the bona fide property or bona fide in the use of any person on a temporary visit to Nigeria, these periods may be extended on application to the Board of Customs and Excise, or the nearest Collector. Where a motor car is imported on an international touring document, the period cannot be extended beyond the date of validity of the document.

21. *Procedure at Importation*.—A person wishing to import a motor vehicle temporarily must produce it together with the covering international (if any) touring document to the proper officer at the port or place of entry into Nigeria. Should importers cross the Nigerian frontier at places where Customs Stations are not established, they must proceed at once to the nearest Customs Station.

22. *Re-exportation*.—Where it is intended to re-export motor vehicles at a port or station other than the port or station of importation, importers are advised, in their own interest, to notify the proper officer at the places of importation and exportation of their intentions, as soon as possible, in order to obviate any unnecessary delay or difficulty in the matter of refunding any money deposited as security.

Motor vehicles temporarily imported must be produced by the importer to the proper officer at the port or place of exportation, together with the covering international touring document, or Form C. 59, as appropriate. If the proper officer is satisfied as to the identity of the vehicle, and that the conditions of importation

have been fulfilled, the amount of any duty provisionally paid will be refunded, or steps taken to discharge the bond liability as the case may be.

23. *Motor Vehicles imported temporarily overland for a period not exceeding seven days.*—A dutiable vehicle registered in, and normally kept in, territories adjacent to Nigeria and for which a "carte grise" is produced may be imported temporarily overland without security for the duty chargeable, provided the importer declares his intention to re-export the vehicle within a period of seven days.

Importers desiring to avail themselves of this facility must produce their motor vehicles to the proper officer at the frontier Customs Station at the times of importation and re-exportation. Importers will be required to declare particulars of the vehicle in the Form C. 59A. Failure to comply with the conditions attached to the facility given will result in the withdrawal of the arrangements on any future occasion.

24. *Special Exemptions.*—The following classes of dutiable motor vehicles may be imported temporarily into Nigeria without payment of duty or formality other than the declaring of the particulars of their vehicles in a register:

(a) vehicles which are the property of the Government of another West African Territory, provided

(i) they are driven by an official driver; and

(ii) the driver produces written evidence at the station of importation identifying the vehicle and showing that he is on an official journey which necessitate entry into Nigeria. This written evidence must be signed by a responsible official of the Government concerned.

Note.—The exemption does not apply to Government officials entering Nigeria in their own private vehicles, even if engaged on official business on behalf of their Governments.

(b) Load carrying vehicles registered in Tchad provided:

(i) they enter Nigeria by the approved roads, i.e., Fort Lamy-Gamboru-Maiduguri or Marua-Dar-el-Jimell-Bama-Maiduguri; and

(ii) after leaving police check points at Gamboru or Bama the vehicles proceed directly to Maiduguri and must not pick up or set down passengers or freight on the way, and report immediately to the Customs Station; and

(iii) vehicles comply in all respects with the provisions of the Nigeria Traffic Ordinance, 1947, and carry valid third party insurance policies; and

(iv) vehicles do not remain in Nigeria for longer than 120 days in any one calendar year.

25. *Import Licences.*—Import Licences are not required for vehicles temporarily imported.

26. *Reimportation Certificates.*—See paragraph 29.

PART III.—OTHER GOODS

A.—TEMPORARY IMPORTATION

27. *Special Provisions.*—Prior written application must be made to the Board of Customs and Excise, Lagos, for permission to import temporarily any goods (other than commercial samples, advertising materials and motor vehicles which are dealt with in Parts I and II of this notice) without payment of import duty. The conditions, and the Board's requirements will be advised to the importer.

B.—TEMPORARY EXPORTATION

28. *General.*—Goods exported from Nigeria may be reimported without payment of import duty except where the goods have undergone any process whilst abroad (see above). To qualify for this concession the goods must be pre-entered and examined.

29. *Pri-entry.*—Goods may be pre-entered at export by submission of an additional copy of the export entry, or by obtaining a reimportation certificate in the Form C. 80 from the proper officer at any Custom House or at the port or place of exportation.

When goods are exported by parcel post and a Customs Officer is not available, a reimportation certificate (to support a claim for duty free reimportation may) be obtained from the proper post office official in the Form 20.

30. *Examination.*—The goods and the entry must be produced to the proper officer at the port or place of exportation for examination. The goods must be capable of identification and exporters may apply any necessary marks. In certain circumstances official seals may be applied to the goods for identification purposes.

31. *Reimportation.*—Goods at reimportation should be entered in accordance with the notice, 'Entry of Goods Ex-Ship or Aircraft for Home Consumption', and the additional copy of the export entry (see paragraph 29 above) or Form C. 80 attached in support of the claim for duty free admittance.

In the case of goods subject to *ad valorem* duty at the time of reimportation, duty will be assessed on any increased value due to the cost of any alteration, renovation, addition or repair to which the goods may have been subjected whilst abroad. Satisfactory evidence of the cost of such alterations should be submitted with the import entry.

COMMON ENTRANCE EXAMINATION FOR THE
SCHOOL YEAR BEGINNING JANUARY 1960**

The date of the next examination will be 4th July, 1959 for entry in January 1960.

2. It is hoped there will be vacancies for about 60 boys at Umuahia and Afikpo and for 30 at Owerri.

3. The examination papers will contain questions in English, Arithmetic, Geography, History and Rural Science based on the approved syllabus for Primary Schools.

4. The examination is open to *bona fide* pupils in Standards V and VI in Government and Voluntary Agency Schools approved for First School Leaving Certificate and it is not restricted to boys from the Eastern Region.

5. Application Forms may be obtained only from Provincial Education Officers. These must be completed in respect of each candidate and must reach the Provincial Education Officer not later than 16th May, 1959. The Provincial Education Officer will complete the space at the foot of the back of the form and return this section to the candidates who must produce it at the examination. If the form is incompletely or inaccurately filled in, the application is liable to be rejected. The candidate may be expelled if a false statement in his application form is discovered after he has been admitted to the School.

6. Each candidate must pay 5s to the Treasury. (No other method of payment will be accepted). The application Form and Treasury Receipt for the 5s of each candidate must be submitted through the candidate's Headmaster to the Provincial Education Officer. Applications made or forms submitted direct to the Principal will not be entertained.

7. Candidates must be of such an age on the 1st January, 1960 that they will be likely to benefit by secondary education. Normally this age does not exceed thirteen and in no case should it exceed fifteen years. Where no satisfactory evidence of age

can be produced the candidate will be judged on his general physical development. No boy will be disqualified from sitting for the examination on the grounds of height alone.

8. There will be centres for the examination at Aba, Afikpo, Awka, Bamenda, Benin, Bida, Calabar, Enugu, Ibadan, Jos, Kaduna, Kumba, Lagos, Makurdi, Ogoja, Okigwi, Onitsha, Owerri, Port Harcourt, Umuahia, Uyo, Warri, Zaria and at other places at the discretion of the Provincial Education Officer to whom application to sit is made.

9. The School fees which are payable termly in advance are as follows:—

Boarding and Tuition—£45 per annum.

Equipment—£8 per annum.

At Afikpo and Owerri there is a laundry fee of £1 per annum. On arrival at the College each boy must deposit the sum of £3 with the Principal. This sum will be used to cover breakages and the loss of, or damage to school property. A separate account will be kept for each boy and any credit balance will be refunded to him at the end of his school career.

10. Eleven open scholarships will be awarded at both Umuahia and Afikpo and eight at Owerri. They will be awarded in order of merit, on the results of the first annual examination, *not* as previously on the results in the Entrance Examination. The scholarships, which cover Boarding and Tuition Fees only, will normally be tenable for the duration of the school career. They will, however, be subject to periodical review and, provided due warning has been given, may be withdrawn at any time on the grounds of bad conduct or bad work.

11. Admission will be to Class I only. Candidates who pass the written examination will be called, in order of merit, for an interview with the Principal who reserves the right to reject any candidate on the grounds of age or for any other reason. Candidates called for interview must bring with them two recent full face head and shoulders photographs of passport size (2" x 2"). Unsuccessful candidates will not be informed of the result of the examination and any body who has not been called for interview by 30th September, 1959, can safely assume that he has failed the examination.
