AMENDMENT TO FEDERAL GENERAL ORDERS

It is notified for general information that with effect from the 3rd of August, 1959, the existing Federal General Order 04212 has been cancelled and replaced by the following new General Order :—

"04212. INVESTMENTS.

(a) Public officers are not prohibited from making investments in such business concerns operating in Nigeria as are established and conducted with Government support or participation, or in foreign business concerns which do not operate in Nigeria.

(b) (i) A public officer, whether or not his whole time is at the disposal of the Federal Government, shall on appointment to the service of the Federal Government disclose to the Governor-General particulars of any investment or shareholding, other than as permitted at (a) above, which he may possess (whether in his own name or in that of any member of his family) in any company, syndicate or firm carrying on business in Nigeria, or any direct or indirect interest in such company, syndicate or firm or in any local occupation or undertaking. If the Governor-General shall decide that by reason of the facts disclosed the officer's private affairs might be brought into real or apparent conflict with his public duties or in any way influence him in the discharge of his duties, the officer shall to such extent as the Governor-General may direct divest himself of such investments or interests.

(ii) Except as permitted at (a) above, no officer may directly or indirectly acquire or possess shares or any interest in any company, syndicate, firm or other occupation carrying on business in Nigeria unless he has obtained the prior approval of the Governor-General.

(iii) An officer may at any time be required to submit confidentially to the Secretary to the Governor-General full information of any investments of his own or of his immediate family which have any connection with Nigeria; and the Governor-General may require an officer to divest himself within a stated time of any investment which, in the view of the Governor-General, it is contrary to the public interest for him to continue to hold."

ARBITRATION AWARD

By H. U. KAINE, Esq. in the Trade Dispute between West African Airways Corporation (Nigeria) and members of the British Airline Pilots Association (West Africa) July 1959.

FINDINGS

According to my terms of reference I am requested (1) to ascertain whether each of the contracts of service of the members of the British Airline Pilots Association (West Africa) whose names and periods of service with W.A.A.C. (Nigeria) Limited are listed on the first Schedule attached thereto has been validly terminated by W.A.A.C. (Nigeria) Ltd. in accordance with all the provisions of the said contracts of service set forth in the second Schedule attached thereto but subject to any modifications or variations thereto which may be established by evidence in any particular case.

(2) To ascertain the amount of compensation in lieu of damages payable by West African Airways Corporation (Nigeria) Limited to such member or members if any whose contract or contracts of service has not or have not been validly terminated and whose financial position or positions has been or have been prejudicially affected by the purported terminations.

(3) To determine the quantum of the compensation in cash or in kind due to those members whose contracts have been validly terminated.

The first question that I have to decide is whether the contract or contracts has been or have been validly determined.

It is the case of the Association that there was no redundancy, in other words that the alleged redundancy was the make-up of the Company and was not supported by any justifiable cause or reason. If this was so, then the termination of the appointments of the pilots on the ground of redundancy was wrongful because it was a matter which could be avoided by the Management, and if the termination was wrongful I would then go further to say whether or not the termination was valid.

This question then arises. Were the Pilots too many for the services which the Company was prepared to operate?

Captain Hayward told me that each pilot was supposed to fly 1,000 hours a year. He admitted that while he was in the employment of the Company he did not fly more than 700 hours a year. When Captain Messenger was asked to explain the flight operational plan for 1959, Exhibit "J", he said that according to the plan the grand total of hours provided to be flown on the planes as from the 1st day of May, 1959 was 10,772 hours 40 minutes; that each crew was supposed to do 1,000 hours a year but the plan allowed 750 hours a year for each crew; that 15 crews would be required to do the flights which means that each would have to do 718 hours a year; that there are at present 18 crews on the establishment which means that each pilot should fly 598 hours a year; that had eleven pilots not been declared redundant there would have been 29 crews and the number of hours would have been reduced to 371 hours per crew per annum.

There is no doubt that from these figures there is a clear case of redundancy because if all the pilots had been left each pilot would have been doing 371 hours a year instead of 1,000 hours or the barest minimum of 750 hours.

The question then arises whether the grand total of hours could not have been raised to accommodate all the pilots. This brings us to the question of how the operational programme is made. The Articles of Association of the Company, paragraph 6 Exhibit "24", provides *inter alia* as follows:—

"The Company will provide and operate internal services within Nigeria in accordance with an operational programme to be furnished to the Company by the Government Member after any necessary prior consultations with the Company. The Company will provide and operate such services on behalf of the Federal Government of Nigeria at cost plus commission on an agreed basis on revenue collected. The company shall not introduce or continue to operate any air transport services to or from any territory of West Africa and any other part of the world at the instance of the Government Member the operation of which in the opinion of a commercial Member may prove uneconomical without the consent in writing of the Commercial Member unless any loss which may be incurred on any such services shall have been guaranteed by the Federal Government."

This provision goes to show that it is the Federal Government and not the Company that fixes the number of hours to be flown in a year although in consultation with the Company and it also goes to show that the Company is not a free agent in fixing the operational plan.

There is also the provision in paragraph 6 of the Article of Association that an international route cannot be opened unless either the Government guarantees the loss to be incurred or the commercial members give an undertaking in writing that the venture would not prove uneconomical. These in my mind are safeguards to prevent the company from recklessly running the Government into very heavy expenses and make the Company careful in choosing their operations.

It is however the Association's case that there would have been no redundancy if the Company had opened up services to other routes which would have provided the pilots with employment and they blamed the Company for not listening to or seeking their advice. They suggested that the Nigerian Airways should not have allied themselves with B.O.A.C. on the London to Lagos route but should have plied the routes with their own strato-cruisers and avoided the 15-year agreement. This suggestion was examined in great detail especially as regards the rights which the Association described as Cabotage rights and it was found that the Association was not well informed as to what was the legal position with respect to their suggestions. It was made clear that there are legal provisions which make it impossible for the Nigerian Airways to operate on the Lagos to London route without the agreement of B.O.A.C. and without in fact working hand in hand with B.O.A.C. on that route.

The Counsel for the Company referred me to Regulations 21 and 30 of the Regulations made under the Civil Aviation Act 1949 and it was clear that Regulation 21 which makes it unlawful for any person to use any aircraft to provide any services in Nigeria without a permit granted by the Minister of Civil Aviation does not apply to B.O.A.C. in respect of such journeys on such routes as the Governor-General may specify. He also referred me to section 4 subsection 2 of Air Transport Services Act, Vol. 5 Halsbury's Laws of England third Edition, dealing with the Monopoly of the Air Corporations Paragraph 79 which reads:—

"Reservation of air services to the Corporations and Associates.—No person other than the Air Corporations and their Associates may carry passengers or goods by air for hire or reward upon any Scheduled Journey between two places in the United Kingdom or between one place within the United Kingdom and another outside the United Kingdom".

It is clear that under this provision the Nigerian Airlines cannot set up an air service between Lagos and London to compete with B.O.A.C. without making itself an associate of B.O.A.C.

Captain Hayward later agreed that what he described as Cabotage rights in Nigeria would not apply to B.O.A.C. now that Nigeria is a dependency of the United Kingdom Government, the two countries forming as it were one political unit but the position all the parties agree may differ after 1960 when Nigeria attains her independence.

These legal considerations are against the Association's contention, that Nigerian Airlines could set up competitive services with B.O.A.C. now. Coupled with this may be added the fact that the strato-cruisers which the Association said the Nigerian Airlines could buy have been proved not to be available for sale. Captain Hayward promised to let me see the Magazine, in which they were advertised for sale but he failed to do so. I may also mention that it was agreed by the Association that none of their pilots could fly strato-cruisers without undergoing some training which according to Captain Messenger would cost a large sum of money and even this training according to Captain Hayward can only be taken with B.O.A.C. using their simulators which Captain Messenger said are no more in existence because they have been converted into something else. Captain Messenger also mentioned that the Nigerian Airlines will also be compelled to build a hangar to house the aeroplanes which he said would cost at least one million pounds.

Also I cannot see how the Nigerian Airlines will compete with B.O.A.C. with strato-cruisers which all the parties agree are expensive to run and a little bit out of date when B.O.A.C. is running such modern aircraft as Britannias.

The next suggestion which the Association put forward was that the fares which were being charged by the Nigerian Airways were too high for the majority of the people of Nigeria who are supposed to patronise them and therefore they suggested that the services offered by the Nigerian Airways could not be profitable because they could not be within the reach of many. They suggest that the fares should be reduced and that second class air services should be introduced and they concluded that if these were done, there will be many patronisers and the Company will have not only a high load factor but will be compelled to increase the services and instead of sending away pilots they will have to need more pilots to cope with the increased work.

This argument sounds very laudable indeed but when it is properly examined we shall find that the Corporation has done most of these things in the past and they did not prove very profitable. First of all I have to say that Captain Hayward agreed that internal services were not always profitable and that they have to be subsidised by the services on the international routes. The Nigerian Airways is therefore not in a position to subsidise the internal services with the earnings from the international services because they run the international services in a pool with B.O.A.C.

As regards the suggestion of reducing fares and introducing second class fares the representatives of the Association later agreed that the old Corporation had done these things as far back as 1948 but they did not prove profitable. They however contended that the old Corporation failed because they were not using the right type of aircraft like DC-3 but the Company pointed out that they were using Wayfarers which were roomy and yet the load factor was very low. The Company therefore contended that they have to rely on the experience which they acquired from the old Corporation.

I am of the opinion that the Company is right; at least they should not be expected to introduce anew all these old ideas already abandoned as not profitable within their short span of life which is just under a year. I remember that Mr Travelyan one of the witnesses for the Company said that last year the Corporation introduced what he described as excursion fares and made the return trip the same price and yet those services made no difference on the air traffic. It may be pointed out that the Federal Government had the authority to order these second class services to be operated in accordance with article 6 of the Articles of Association but it must be remembered the Government will have to guarantee whatever losses that may be incurred.

The Association also suggested that the Nigerian Airways could have explored the possibility of establishing their own air services to carry pilgrims to Mecca and back. The Company pointed out that the air services to Mecca will be for only two months in the year when Nigerians go to Mecca on pilgrimage. The Association replied by saying that when the Aircraft are not in use to Mecca they could be used on what they described

as the Colonial Coach Service to London. The Association however agreed that the services to Lagos may not prove very profitable since there are often no passengers to be carried on the return journey except a few stranded pilgrims and that the Sabina Airways which now operate the services for the Nigerian Airways are in a unique and favourable position to do so.

I am therefore satisfied that the proposals made by the Association are *prima facie* very highly laudable but on examination they are not so very glorious as they appear and some of them are even for certain considerations and under the present circumstances not practicable. There is nothing however to prevent the Company from reviewing its position on the attainment of Independence by Nigeria. I have not chosen to deal with the 15-year agreement which the Association alleged that the Company signed with B.O.A.C. and which the Company did not deny. All that I have to say is that whatever may be the contents of the document, it is clear from the evidence before me that at present with Nigeria as a British dependency our association with B.O.A.C. is inescapable. It is not within my terms of reference to suggest what Nigeria would do upon attaining independence. That I believe will look after itself but as far as the case of redundancy is concerned I am of the opinion that it does not help the Association's case.

There is also evidence before me that when Ghana Airways broke away the subventions which the old Corporation was getting from the Ghana Government came to an end but it did not reduce the cost of running the Nigerian Airways proportionately with the result that the Company is faced with an unhappy position and is therefore trying to see how the affairs of the Company could be run without incurring a heavy deficit. They have to cut down those services which in their opinion prove unprofitable and try to raise the load factor in the existing services so as to obviate the operational costs considerably.

As far back as December 1958 the members of the Association knew that when those pilots who were loaned to the Ghana Airways came back the establishment would be overstuffed. This is the reason why the Association endeavoured as far back as December 1958 to submit proposals about how a case of redundancy could be dealt with. I am therefore satisfied that there is a genuine case of redundancy and that the redundancy was created by circumstances which are not within the control of the Company but was necessitated by the breaking up of the old Corporation due to the attainment of Independence by Ghana and the subsequent withdrawal of its air services from the Corporation.

The next matter I have to examine is whether the procedure to enforce redundancy was properly followed. There is a standing Order Appendix R to the Association's memorandum which the Company has to follow in a matter of redundancy. The principle therein laid is "Last-in-first-out". There is no doubt that all those declared redundant were the last to be employed with the exception of one solitary case but even there the Standing Order gives the Company the discretion to make the selection in such a way that they may not lose their most capable officers. I would say that as far as the policy of Last-in-first-out was concerned the Company endeavoured to adhere to it.

I am however not very happy about how the matter reached the ears of the members of the Association. It is also true that a certain list Exhibit "M" was handed to Mr Sunderland as far back as early February in accordance with the requirement of the Standing Order Appendix R but I am not satisfied that the list contained what was really needed. It is supposed to be a list of only those pilots to be declared redundant and the reasons for that redundancy appended thereto, but unfortunately it was just a list of all the officers in the employ of the Company just in their order of coming in but there is nothing on the list to show who and who are to be declared redundant and nothing shown on the list as the cause of redundancy.

I have also to add that the manner in which the news of the redundancy reached the pilots was not a happy one. It was at a Social party that the news was broached and the General Manager had to confirm it when he was interviewed.

I could see that the Management was trying to see if the whole situation could be kept in the dark until Mr Sunderland who was sent to the United Kingdom to enquire how redundancy was made in other Airlines and also to see whether he could secure some jobs for the pilots to be declared redundant came back but the news broke out before his return and the General Manager was placed in an awkward position.

I have to add that this made the pilots feel that they were not taken into confidence by the Company and to say that if they had been told in time they would have been in a position to make suggestions. I agree with them. Be that as it may, there was a state of redundancy and the Management was bound under the unhappy circumstances to do something and to keep up its prestige as the employer. It is on account of this lack of consultation at the initial stage that the pilots turned round to say that the redundancy was a fake, that it was due to mismanagement and what not but I am sure that in their heart of hearts they knew that those contentions were untenable.

It is not necessary to dilate about the attempts of the Company to find alternative employments for the pilots. Suffice it to say that they did their best but the pilots were not satisfied with that best because of the initial disagreement. Some of the pilots however accepted the jobs which the Company helped them to obtain, others rejected the offers made to them. I can understand the spirit behind it and even the employment of Captain Messenger which was on the Managerial side was queried by the Pilots.

Since I have now found that there was really a state of redundancy I shall then follow up by saying in accordance with paragraph (1) of my terms of reference that the contracts of services of the members of British Airline Pilots Association have been validly determined in each case. I shall also go further to say that the redundant officers are not entitled to damages in accordance with paragraph 2 of my terms of reference.

It remains paragraph 3 of my terms of reference and that is to determine the quantum of the compensation in cash or in kind due to those members whose contracts have been validly terminated. I have to say that the redundant officers are entitled to some compensation. The management conceded this during the

hearing. They conceded that the Pilots were entitled to their own contributions to the Pension Fund and also to those of the Company but they do not agree with the compensations which the members of the Association are now asking for. I agree with the Management that some of their new claims are not maintainable.

The members of the Association in their draft agreement which was made in December 1958 and in their letter dated 27th February, 1959 Appendix 'I' as well as at the conciliation level made the following requests:—

- (1) Three months' notice of termination of contract.
- (2) Two months' salary for every year served with the Company.
- (3) The payment of Contributions made by the Company into the Pension Fund or a sum equal to that amount.
- (4) Shipment of all personal effects to be made at the Company's expense.

I shall deal with these items one by one. Item one was admitted by the Management and has been implemented. I was informed by the Management that they were prepared to release any officer who wanted to go before the time expires and pay him the full three months' salary. Item one is therefore granted. Item 3: The gap in item three has been bridged and the Management has conceded it. I shall go further to say that if it was not conceded I would have granted it bearing in mind the provisions of paragraph 20 (1) of European Contract Staff Pension Scheme Exhibit "B". Item 3 is therefore granted. Item 4: This was not pressed at the hearing and I understand that the Management was not opposed to it and had even confirmed that in writing. Item 4 is therefore granted.

It remains only item 2. I have taken into consideration what was done in other Airways when such a state of redundancy arose and also that the contribution of 28 per cent of the Nigerian Airways into the Pension Fund is about the highest.

I have also taken into consideration the provisions of paragraph 12 of the Agreement of Service Exhibit "A" but I feel inclined to and I award the redundant members of the Association a compensation at the rate of £150 in respect of each year served. I have to mention that this was the only offer made at the conciliation level by the Company to the Pilots but it was rejected by the Pilots because the Company did not agree to pay the Pilots its own contributions to the Pension Fund.

During the hearing the Association put up further claims which were never brought up nor considered at the conciliation level. They made the following claims:—

- (a) Cost of replacing aircraft types on licence. This claim ranges from £170-910 and was made by four of the redundant pilots.
- (b) Value of accommodation at £40 per month to end in five years. This claim ranges from £1,520-1,840, and was made by every redundant pilot.
- (c) Savings at £70 per month to end in five years. This claim was made by every redundant pilot and it ranges from £2,660-3,220.
- (d) Overseas Education for their children. This claim was made by nine pilots and it ranges from £720-3,120.
- (e) Local Education for their children. This claim was made by six pilots and it ranges from £20-80.
- (f) Value of Pension Fund in five years. This claim was made by every Pilot and it ranges from £2,800-5,100.

I am satisfied that there is no substance in these claims and I am sure that the Members of the Association did not expect me to take them seriously. The claims are therefore rejected without further comments.
