NOTICE BY THE BOARD OF CUSTOMS AND EXCISE

Customs and Excise Notice No. 23

REFUNDS OTHER THAN DRAWBACK, REMISSION AND ABATEMENT

1. LAW.—(a) The attention of all concerned is invited to sections 27 and 120 to 127 of the Customs and Excise Management Act (No. 55 of 1958).

(b) In accordance with section 6 of the Customs and Excise Act 1962, No. 38, an administrative charge of 10s is deducted from every refund of duty approved and the claimant is paid the balance.

2. Any person entitled to exemption from payment of any duty, etc., is advised to comply with the conditions prescribed for the exemption before the goods are cleared out of Customs and Excise control. A subsequent claim for refund is usually inconvenient and often fails.

3. DEFINITIONS.—“Refunds” embraces all repayments of money brought to account as revenue or deposit.

4. “Bill of Sight” is a request by an importer or his agent to examine goods physically in the presence of an officer of Customs and Excise in order to establish their identity, quantity, and/or value.

5. FORMS.—All forms mentioned in this notice are “SALE” forms, specimens of which can normally be obtained from the proper officer of Customs and Excise at any Custom House.

6. The size and colour of each form must conform with the standard specimen.

PART I—REFUNDS

7. APPLICATION.—Application for refund of import and export duty is to be made on the form C.57—“Application for a Refund of Duty and Certificate of Over-Entry”—in triplicate. The form is to be submitted to the proper officer of Customs and Excise at the Customs House at the port or place of payment of duty.

8. CONDITIONS.—Refunds of import and export duty are considered provided that :—

(a) the claims are submitted within the prescribed period ;

(b) the goods have not been delivered out of Customs control ;

(c) the application Form C.57 is correctly completed ; and

(d) all necessary information and particulars regarding the claim are submitted on or with the application Form C.57.

9. In the case of applications for refund of deposit, rent, royalty or fees paid on Official Receipt, the original of the Official Receipt issued to the applicant at the time of payment is required to be submitted with the application.

10. TIME LIMIT.—Claims for refund of duty and fees are to be submitted :—

(a) in the case of “Bill of Sight” goods, within three months from the date of the passing of the relevant prime entry

(b) in the case of goods exported or intended for use as aircraft or ship stores, within a period of one year from the date of putting the goods on board for exportation or for use as aircraft or ship stores ;

(c) in the case of over-payment or other refund of import and export duty or fees, etc., within a period of one year from the date of such overpayment of duty or fee, etc. ; and

(d) in the case of :—

(i) deposit for temporary importation, within three months from the date the deposit was taken ;

(ii) deposit for transit goods, within one year from the date of entry of the goods ;

(iii) other deposits, within one year from the date the deposit was taken.

Any deposit not claimed within the time limits stipulated in sub-paragraph (d) will lapse to revenue.

11. Claims which have not been finally rejected are required to be re-submitted within the time limits stated in paragraph 10.

12. LIMIT OF CLAIM.—Claims for refund in respect of individual amounts not exceeding one shilling are not admissible.

13. REJECTED CLAIMS.—Whenever a claim is not accepted by the proper officer of Customs and Excise, the claimant will be notified and the reason/s for rejection stated. The claim may be re-submitted in accordance with paragraph 11 above.

14. APPROVAL OF REFUNDS.—Where the proper officer of Customs and Excise is satisfied that a claim is in order, he notifies the claimant of the approval of his claim.

15. PAYMENT OF REFUNDS.—On receipt of the notification, the claimant is required to attend at the Custom House where he will sign for the money approved, on production of documentary evidence to the satisfaction of the proper officer establishing his identity.

16. CLAIMS—GOODS IMPORTED BY PARCEL POST.—Claims for refund of over-payment of duty on goods imported by Parcel Post are subject to the conditions prescribed in Customs and Excise Notice No. 20—Government Notice No. 1173 of 1960.

NOTICE BY THE BOARD OF CUSTOMS AND EXCISE

TAX-FREE SHOPS

Customs and Excise Notice No. 44

Commencement: 1st October, 1965

LAW.—The attention of Airlines, Warehouse Keepers, Shipping Companies, passengers and others concerned is invited to Part IV sections 73 to 89 of the Customs and Excise Management Act (No. 55 of 1958) and the Customs (Warehousing of Goods) Notice 1959—Legal Notice No. 85 of 1959.

2. In exercise of the powers conferred on it by section 74 of the Customs and Excise Management Act (No. 55 of 1958), the Board of Customs and Excise is prepared to consider applications for licensing Tax-free Shops as private bonded warehouses where passengers departing from, or travelling in transit through, Nigeria may purchase goods free of Customs or Excise duty.

3. **SCOPE.**—The establishment of Tax-free Shops is, in the meantime, to be limited to Customs Airports. The shops are to be situated within the Departure Hall or Transit Lounge and the sale of goods therein is to be limited to outgoing passengers who have been cleared by Customs on the baggage floor—or are in transit—and are travelling beyond West African countries.

4. It is emphasized that the responsibility for securing suitable accommodation in the Departure Hall or Transit Lounge rests with the applicant who is required to approach the Airport authorities.

5. **GOODS WHICH MAY BE STOCKED.**—Both imported and locally manufactured excisable goods, with the exception of such goods as are under any provision of the Customs and Excise laws required to be stored in some other specific place, may be stocked in the Shops but goods which are not in the Duty Schedules to the Customs or Excise Tariff Act are not to be stocked therein.

6. **CONTROL.**—The provisions for warehousing as contained in Customs and Excise Notice No. 10—Government Notice No. 699 of 1959—in so far as it relates to private bonded warehouses apply, subject to modifications indicated below.

7. **PRESCRIBED BOOKS AND ACCOUNTS.**—Every proprietor is required to keep a register showing particulars of all goods received into and delivered from the shop. He is also required to keep a Sales Record Book in which particulars of all goods sold are to be accurately entered. Details of the purchasing passenger's journey, including his name, ticket number, destination, as well as particulars of the aircraft, are to be entered invariably in the Sales Record Book. Where both imported and excisable goods are stocked in a Shop separate sets of books and accounts are to be maintained for the two types of goods. All registers and sales record books are to be made available whenever required by the proper officer.

8. **MARKING OF GOODS.**—Every article in a Tax-free Shop is to be marked conspicuously, either by inscribing on it or gumming on it a label bearing, the following expressions:—

(a) "Duty-free. For Exportation only. Not for Use locally."

(b) "Purchased from..... (insert name)
Tax-free Shop at..... (insert name) Airport."

9. **PURCHASE INVOICE.**—Purchase Invoices (Form Sale 82) in triplicate—specimen is annexed hereto—are to be issued in respect of goods sold in a Tax-free Shop. Separate invoices are to be issued in respect of imported and excisable goods and full description of every item of goods sold is to be shown clearly on every Purchase Invoice.

10. **HANDLING OF GOODS.**—(a) Goods intended for a Tax-free Shop are to be released from the Quays or—in the case of excisable goods, from the factory—on warehousing entries and the normal warehousing procedure followed, including the issue of Certificates of Warehousing.

(b) At the time of purchase of any goods from a Tax-free Shop, a Purchase Invoice is to be completed in triplicate and the original delivered to the purchaser. The reverse of the travelling ticket of the purchaser—is to be suitably endorsed and stamped by the proprietor of the Tax-free Shop and the invoice quoted thereon. The purchaser is invariably to be advised to produce the goods together with the original Purchase Invoice to the Preventive Service officer on duty at the gangway of the aircraft at the time of embarkation.

(c) The duplicate copy of the Purchase Invoice is to be despatched through the Preventive Service officer in charge of the Baggage Floor to the officer schedule to be on duty at the gangway of the aircraft concerned.

11. **RETURNS.**—(a) The return periods for every Tax-free Shop are:—

(i) from the 1st to the 7th,

(ii) from the 8th to the 14th,

(iii) from the 15th to the 21st,

(iv) from the 22nd to the end of every month.

(b) At the end of every period the proprietor is required to submit an ex-warehouse export entry showing particulars of all goods released during the period. Every entry is to be supported by a statement of account showing particulars of all goods received into and released from the shop during the period. Copies of invoices on which goods were received into the shop are also to be attached. The whole return is to be submitted to the officer in charge of the accounts of the Tax-free Shop.

12. **WARNING.**—The proprietor of a Tax-free Shop is liable to heavy penalties and withdrawal of his licence if goods are released to unauthorised persons, or if any entry or supporting document is found to be false or incorrect in any material particulars or if any of the provisions of the Customs and Excise Laws are otherwise infringed.
