PROCLAMATION

Whereas by section thirty-five of the Administration of Estates Proclamation 1902 (Transvaal) (which Proclamation as amended by Ordinance No. 15 of 1905 has been applied mutatis mutandis to Swaziland) it is provided that sections thirty-six, thirty-seven and thirty-eight of the said Proclamation shall come into force with regard to all Letters of Administration at any time granted in any State (in which term is included the United Kingdom, any British Colony and British Possession) at and from the date to be notified declaring such State to fall under the provisions of the said sections:

And whereas proper provision has been made in British Guiana for the recognition therein of Letters of Administration

granted in Swaziland;

Now therefore under and by virtue of the powers in me vested by the said section thirty-five of the Administration of Estates Proclamation 1902 and by sub-section (2) of section two of the Swaziland Administration Proclamation 1907, I do hereby declare proclaim and make known that British Guiana shall at and from the date of the publication of this Proclamation in the Gazette fall under the provisions of section thirty-six of the Administration of Estates Proclamation 1902 as amended by section four of Ordinance No. 15 of 1905 and of sections thirty-seven and thirty-eight of the said Proclamation in the application of such Proclamation for the Said Proclamation in the application of such Proclamation to Swaziland.
