- I, Nhlanhla Nene, Minister of Finance, acting in terms of section 16(2) and 26(2) of the Division of Revenue Act, 2014 (Act No. 10 of 2014), as amended by the Division of Revenue Amendment Act, 2014 (Act No. 38 of 2014), hereby publish in the attached Explanatory Memorandum and Schedules:
 - (a) Additional conditional allocations to provinces and municipalities authorised in terms of the Adjustments Appropriation Act, 2014;
 - (b) Roll-overs of conditional allocations to provinces and municipalities not transferred by national departments during the 2013/14 financial year, authorised in terms of the Adjustment Appropriation Act, 2014;
 - (c) The allocation of unallocated conditional grants to provinces and municipalities;
 - (d) The re-allocation of stopped conditional allocations between municipalities in terms of section 19 and 20 of the Division of Revenue Act, 2014, as amended;
 - (e) Technical adjustments on conditional allocations to provinces and municipalities; and
 - (f) Additional and amended frameworks in respect of conditional allocations to the provinces and municipalities.

For ease of reference only and where applicable, the attached Schedules reflect the main allocations, roll-overs, adjustments and total adjusted allocations.

This government Notice is set out as follows:

Explanatory Memorandum to the Allocations set out in the attached Schedule

This *Gazette* is published in terms of the Division of Revenue Act, 2014 (Act No. 10 of 2014), as amended by the Division of Revenue Amendment Act, 2014 (Act No. 38 of 2014) and provides information on additional allocations and adjustments to existing allocations to provinces and municipalities in the 2013/14 national financial year.

This is necessitated by the need to allocate the unallocated allocations to provinces and municipalities, and the re-allocation of funds in terms of Section 20 of the Division of Revenue Act, 2014, as amended.

This *Gazette* therefore updates information that was originally published in Government Gazettes No. 37613 of 09 May 2014.

This notice affects the following grant programmes:

PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT

National Health Insurance Conversion

- 1. The National Health Grant (NHG) is a schedule 6A indirect grant with three components; the national health insurance component, the health facility revitalisation component and the human papillomavirus vaccine grant component.
- 2. The NHG differs from a schedule 5A grant in that the funds reside in the budget of the NDOH and is not transferred to the respective province. The NDoH instead, using the funds, implements projects on the respective province's behalf.
- 3. In the 2014/15 financial year, R395 million was appropriated for the NHI component. The main purpose of this component is to:
 - 3.1. Develop and implement innovative models for contracting general practitioners within selected NHI districts;
 - 3.2. Identify and test alternative reimbursement models for central hospitals in readiness for the phased implementation of NHI; and
 - 3.3. Support central hospitals in strengthening health information systems and revenue management.
- 4. While NDoH assumes responsibility for the implementation of projects on the indirect grant, the Division of Revenue Act makes provision, in section 21, for the grant to be converted to a direct grant to provinces. Before the grant can be considered to be converted, the NDoH must be satisfied that:
 - 10.1. The conversion will prevent under expenditure or improve the level of service delivery on the allocation in question; and
 - 10.2. The affected national or provincial department or municipality has demonstrated the capacity to implement projects.
- 5. After verifying capacity, the NDOH requested for an amount of R6 955 520 to be converted to National Health Insurance grant, which is a schedule 5A direct grant, and be allocated to the Western Cape Department of Health.

- 6. The allocation would be used to implement the General Practitioner contracting project, for which the NDOH has received and approved a business plan.
- 7. The conversion will comprise of a shift of R6 955 520 from the NHI component of the NHG (Schedule 6A) to the NHI grant (Schedule 5A).

Immediate Disaster relief funds

- 8. Schedule 7, Part A of the Division of Revenue Act provides for funds to be released immediately to provinces where provinces have declared disasters and successfully applied through the National Disaster Management Centre for funding. The period for the release of funds range between 3 days and 3 months.
- According to section 26 of the 2014 Division of Revenue Act, the transferring national officer, which is COGTA, must notify National Treasury and the relevant provincial treasury within 14 days of the transfer to a province or municipality. National Treasury was notified on 03 December 2014.
- 10. National Treasury must subsequently publish the allocation by notice in a gazette within 21 days of being notified.
- 11. On 22 July 2014, National Treasury approved the transfer of funds amounting to R50.5 million from an unallocated Provincial Disaster allocation following heavy flooding experienced by the Mpumalanga province.
- 12. Funds to this disaster affected province have already been transferred. This gazette formalises the process as per the requirement of section 25 (3) of the 2014 DoRA

LOCAL GOVERNMENT

- 13. The following matters in relation to the local government sphere, are covered in this memorandum and the proposed Government Gazette:
 - 13.1. Adjustment allocations for re-allocations, roll-overs, additional funds and the technical movement of allocations between Schedules of the 2014 Division of Revenue Amendment Act.

Re-allocation of funds between municipalities

- 14. The Neighbourhood Development Partnership Grant (NDPG) is being reallocated to other municipalities due to non-performance of the grant allocation. These funds will be re-allocated to municipalities that have fast tracked the implementation of the projects and have accelerated expenditure against the original allocation.
- 15. The national Department of Energy is re-allocating funds between municipalities, under the Integrated National Electrification Programme (INEP 5) and Electricity Demand Side Management Grant. Slow spending and delays in contractual agreements, poor business plans and non-compliance by municipalities are the main reasons for the decision to re-allocate between municipalities.
- 16. The Infrastructure Skills Development Grant (ISDG) is being re-allocated between municipalities because of the anticipated under-spending against the programme and the funds are being allocated to other municipalities that can spend.

17. Rural Households Infrastructure Grant (RHIG) will now be administered by the Department of Water and Sanitation because of the shift of the sanitation function from Department of Human Settlement.

Conversion of grants

- 18. City of Johannesburg Metropolitan Municipality and City of Cape Town Metropolitan Municipality requested the conversion of the Public Transport Infrastructure Grant (PTIS) to Public Transport Network Operations Grant (PTNOG) for operational costs in order to improve the service delivery in relation to public transport infrastructure.
- 19. Furthermore, Nelson Mandela Bay Metropolitan Municipality and George Local Municipality have requested to convert PTNOG to PTIS in order meet current-year financial obligations in relation to infrastructure projects required for the current year.

Unallocated funds

20. From an unallocated amount of R363.6 million for Municipal Disaster Grant R10.7 million for has been transferred to municipalities that were affected by floods in the Mpumalanga and Limpopo provinces.

Roll-over of funds

- 21. Municipal Water Infrastructure Grant: a roll-over amount of R1.5 million was approved as the result of funds not being transferred to Ngaka Modiri Molema District Municipality during the 2013/14 financial year. The payment was rejected because of the technical challenges that were experienced by the Department of Water and Sanitation when the payment was processed on the last day of the national financial year, that is 31st of March 2014.
- 22. The Department of Water and Sanitation is also rolling over an amount of R23.3 million as an in-kind allocation for emergency interventions in Mopani District Municipality in Limpopo province and Dr Ruth Segomotsi Mompati District Municipality in North West provence.
- 23. Municipal Infrastructure Grant: A roll-over of R80.2 million was approved to nine municipalities that were affected by the stopping of the funds in terms of section 18 of the 2013 Division of Revenue Act and have improved their performance against the programme having demonstrated that they have contractual commitment to spend the funds.
- 24. Regional Bulk Infrastructure Grant: A roll-over of R18.6 million was approved as a result of funds committed to projects in 2013/14. This is an indirect grant through which is used by the national Department of Water and Sanitation to build bulk water supply systems that cut cross municipal boundaries on behalf of municipalities.
- 25. Municipal Disaster Recover Grant: A roll-over of R156.9 million was approved as the result of funds allocated to 24 municipalities in order to repair and replace infrastructure damaged by disaster that occurred in 2013 and 2014.
