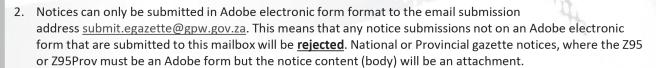
Dear Valued Customers,

Government Printing Works has implemented rules for completing and submitting the electronic Adobe Forms when you, the customer, submits your notice request.

Please take note of these guidelines when completing your form.

GPW Business Rules

1. No hand written notices will be accepted for processing, this includes Adobe forms which have been completed by hand.



- 3. Notices brought into GPW by "walk-in" customers on electronic media can only be submitted in Adobe electronic form format. This means that any notice submissions not on an Adobe electronic form that are submitted by the customer on electronic media will be <u>rejected</u>. National or Provincial gazette notices, where the Z95 or Z95Prov must be an Adobe form but the notice content (body) will be an attachment.
- 4. All customers who walk in to GPW that wish to submit a notice that is not on an electronic Adobe form will be routed to the Contact Centre where the customer will be taken through the completion of the form by a GPW representative. Where a customer walks into GPW with a stack of hard copy notices delivered by a messenger on behalf of a newspaper the messenger must be referred back to the sender as the submission does not adhere to the submission rules.
- 5. All notice submissions that do not comply with point 2 will be charged full price for the notice submission.
- 6. The current cut-off of all Gazette's remains unchanged for all channels. (Refer to the GPW website for submission deadlines www.gpwonline.co.za)
- 7. Incorrectly completed forms and notices submitted in the wrong format will be rejected to the customer to be corrected and resubmitted. Assistance will be available through the Contact Centre should help be required when completing the forms. (012-748 6200 or email info.egazette@gpw.gov.za)
- 8. All re-submissions by customers will be subject to the above cut-off times.
- 9. All submissions and re-submissions that miss the cut-off will be rejected to the customer to be submitted with a new publication date.
- 10. Information on forms will be taken as the primary source of the notice to be published. Any instructions that are on the email body or covering letter that contradicts the notice form content will be ignored.

You are therefore advised that effective from **Monday**, **18 May 2015** should you not comply with our new rules of engagement, all notice requests will be rejected by our new system.

Furthermore, the fax number **012-748 6030** will also be <u>discontinued</u> from this date and customers will only be able to submit notice requests through the email address <u>submit.egazette@gpw.gov.za.</u>









DO use the new Adobe Forms for your notice request. These new forms can be found on our website: www.gpwonline.co.za under the Gazette Services page.

DO attach documents separately in your email to GPW. (In other words, your email should have an Adobe Form plus proof of payment – 2 separate attachments – where notice content is applicable, it should also be a 3rd separate attachment)

DO specify your requested publication date.

DO send us the electronic Adobe form. (There is no need to print and scan it).



DON'T submit request as a single PDF containing all other documents, i.e. form, proof of payment & notice content, it will be **FAILED** by our new system.

DON'T print and scan the electronic Adobe form.

DON'T send queries or RFQ's to the submit.egazette mailbox.

DON'T send bad quality documents to GPW. (Check that documents are clear and can be read)

PLANT BREEDERS' RIGHTS ACT, 1976 (ACT No. 15 OF 1976)

REGULATIONS RELATING TO PLANT BREEDERS' RIGHTS: AMENDMENT

The Minister of Agriculture, Forestry and Fisheries acting under section 44 of the Plant Breeders' Rights Act, 1976 (Act No. 15 of 1976), has made the regulations set out in the Schedule.

SCHEDULE

Definition

In this Schedule 'the Regulations' means the regulations published by Government Notice No. R. 1186 of 12 September 1997, as amended by Government Notices Nos. R. 1582 of 28 November 1997, R. 867 of 3 July 1998, R. 1285 of 16 October 1998, R. 323 of 19 March 1999, R. 604 of 14 May 1999, R. 1271 of 29 October 1999, R. 392 of 20 April 2000, R. 690 of 14 July 2000, R. 1078 of 3 November 2000, R. 387 of 18 May 2001, R. 667 of 27 July 2001, R. 512 of 3 June 2005, R. 545 of 15 June 2006, R. 1272 of 25 November 2008, R. 287 of 13 March 2009, R.103 of 19 February 2010, R.517 of 17 June 2011, R.950 of 18 November 2011, R. 713 of 7 September 2012; R. 311 of 26 April 2013, R.620 of 23 August 2013, R.416 of 30 May 2014, R. 645 of 29 August 2014 and R.1027 of 19 December 2014.

FORMAT AND PROCEDURE FOR THE NOMINATION OF WORLD HERITAGE SITES IN THE REPUBLIC OF SOUTH AFRICA

FOREWORD BY THE MINISTER

South Africa is one of the many State Parties that ratified the World Heritage Convention Concerning the Protection of the World Cultural and Natural Heritage (the Convention) in order to protect her incredible natural resources, biodiversity and cultural heritage. Currently eight properties are already inscribed on the World Heritage List because of their Outstanding Universal Value. World Heritage properties have the potential to generate economic benefits and improve the lives of the communal society.

Our greatest highlights since the ratification of this Convention, includes the promulgation of the World Heritage Convention Act, 1999 (Act No. 49 of 1999), being nominated to serve as one of the 21 member state parties constituting the World Heritage Committee, inscription of eight World Heritage properties on the World Heritage List, establishment of the South African World Heritage Convention Committee (SAWHCC) and successfully hosting the 29th session of the World Heritage Committee in 2005 and recently hosting two significant events commemorating the 40th Anniversary of the Convention (Expert Workshop and International Conference for the Africa Region).

The road has not been an easy one as we have experienced a number of hurdles along the way. These include development pressures in the form of infrastructure, mining, poor conservation management, lack of financial resources and many other issues hindering sustainable livelihoods and adequate preservation of our heritage. All these challenges are a result of planning that can be improved.

In order to address these challenges, the State Party has developed a Procedure Document for nominations outlining key requirements for both the tentative listing and nomination process. This Procedure Document is complementary to the existing flow process and information outlined in the Operational Guidelines of the Convention. It sets out the process to be followed by the proponents, who want to nominate potential sites for consideration on the Tentative List of the Republic of South Africa or draft nomination dossiers of sites on the Tentative List.

INTRODUCTION

The General Conference of the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) meeting in Paris from 17 October to 21 November 1972, at its seventeenth session, adopted the Convention Concerning the Protection of the World Cultural and Natural Heritage. The main purpose of the Convention was to give the international community an opportunity to contribute to the protection of the cultural and natural heritage of outstanding universal value.

In acknowledgement of the importance of heritage, South Africa (also referred hereunder as the State Party) ratified the Convention in 1997 and subsequently translated it into domestic law through the promulgation of the World Heritage Convention Act, 1999 (Act No. 49 of 1999) (WHCA).

To give impetus to effective protection of the World Heritage properties within the boundaries of the State Party, the National Environmental Management: Protected Areas Act, 2003 (Act No 57 of 2003) (NEMPAA) as amended, recognises World Heritage properties as protected areas. "A protected area is globally recognised as a clearly defined geographical space, recognised, dedicated and managed, through legal or other effective means, to achieve the long term conservation of nature and associated ecosystem services and cultural values."

Furthermore, the National Heritage Resource Act, 1999 (Act No 25 of 1999) (NHRA) provides formal legal protection to sites and objects of cultural significance within the boundaries of the State Party.

The State Party has also established the South African World Heritage Convention Committee (SAWHCC).

Reflecting on achievements to date, the State Party has been very successful with its World Heritage nominations. In addition, there are also more properties on the tentative list awaiting formal nominations.

However, the last few years have revealed a number of challenges concerning the conservation and effective management of World Heritage properties. Challenges range from ill-defined boundaries of properties, poor land use management, inadequate conservation management systems and inappropriate developments. Most of the challenges are a direct result of inadequate planning at the time of nomination List.

Therefore, a need has been identified to provide guidance to all future World Heritage nominations, including those that are currently on the Tentative List. This Procedure will enable the State Party to prepare nomination dossiers and ensure that challenges are addressed, or at least mitigated for, before nominations are submitted to UNESCO.

PROCEDURE

This document is called the "Procedure for the Nomination of World Heritage Sites in the Republic of South Africa". Nomination of properties to the World Heritage List enables the State Party to fulfil its commitment to the Convention. In addition, it contributes to South Africa's commitment to the Convention on Biological Diversity (CBD) as well as Outcomes 10 and 14 Delivery Agreements to conserve our biodiversity, transforming our society and uniting the Republic of South Africa. It is anticipated that this Procedure will assist in ensuring that the State Party's world heritage properties maintain their status on the World Heritage List.

Once inscribed, these properties must be managed in accordance with international best practice models as well as conform to national legislation. For its part, UNESCO has developed the Operational Guidelines for the Implementation of the Operational Guidelines, to assist State Parties with the implementation of the Convention. The Operational Guidelines sets procedures for:

- a) The inclusion of properties on the Tentative List of the State Party;
- b) The inscription of properties on the World Heritage List and the List of World Heritage in Danger;
- c) The protection and conservation of World Heritage properties;
- d) The granting of International Assistance under the World Heritage Fund; and
- e) The mobilisation of national and international support in favour of the Convention.

It is important to note that the process outlined in the Operational Guidelines remains the primary guide but all nominations will henceforth have to adhere to the national process as outlined herein.

The WHCA outlines the national processes that must be followed with the nomination and proclamation of World Heritage properties. Therefore, this Procedure should be read together with the Operational Guidelines as well as the WHCA.

A check list (Annexure 1) has been appended to this procedure to assist proponents in ensuring that their nominations meet the requirements of the State Party before they can be submitted to UNESCO.

PART 1

1.1 LEGISLATIVE FRAMEWORK

The WHCA is the primary legislation for issues concerning the establishment and management of World Heritage properties in the South Africa.

Other relevant legislation, including, without limitation, the Constitution of the Republic of South Africa, 1996, the Intergovernmental Relations Framework Act, 2005 (Act No. 13 of 2005), the National Environmental Management Act 1998 (Act No. 107 of 1998), the National Environmental Management: Protected Areas Act,

2003 (Act No. 57 of 2003), the National Environmental Management: Biodiversity Act, 2004 (Act No. 10 of 2004) and the National Heritage Resources Act, 1999 (Act No. 25 of 1999) will impact on the processes that need to be followed for the nomination of sites.

1.1.1 Defini ti oonf a World Her itageroper ty

Article 1 of the Convention defines cultural heritage as follows:

monuments: architectural works, works of monumental sculpture and

painting, elements or structures of an archaeological nature, inscriptions, cave dwellings and combinations of features, which are of outstanding universal value from the point of

view of history, art or science;

groups of buildings: groups of separate or connected buildings which, because of

their architecture, their homogeneity or their place in the landscape, are of outstanding universal value from the point

of view of history, art or science;

sites: works of man or the combined works of nature and man, and

areas including archaeological sites which are of outstanding universal value from the historical, aesthetic, ethnological or

anthropological point of view.

cultural landscapes: defined in paragraph 47 of the Operational Guidelines cultural

landscapes are cultural properties representing the "combined works of nature and of man" as designated in Article 1 of the Convention. They are illustrative of the evolution of human society and settlement over time, under the influence of the physical constraints and/or opportunities presented by their natural environment and of successive social, economic and

cultural forces, both external and internal.

Article 2 of the Convention defines natural heritage as follows:

natural features consisting of:

- a) physical and biological formations or groups of such formations, which are of outstanding universal value from the aesthetic or scientific point of view;
- geological and physiographical formations and precisely delineated areas which constitute the habitat of threatened species of animals and plants of outstanding universal value from the point of view of science or conservation;
- **1. 2** Furthermore, Section 1 of the WHCA provides the following definition of a World Heritage Site:

(xxiv) any place in the Republic which—

- (a) has been included on-
 - (i) the World Heritage List; or
 - (ii) the tentative list of the Republic referred to in Article 121(a)(i) of the Operational Guidelines, and is proclaimed by the Minister by notice in the Gazette to be a World Heritage Site; or
- (b) has been proclaimed by the Minister by notice in the Gazette to be a special heritage site for management in accordance with this Act as if that site qualified under paragraph (a)—
 - (i) after consultation with the Minister affected by such a proclamation;
 - (ii) if applicable, after consultation with the relevant MEC; and
 - (iii) subject to a resolution of Parliament, but such a special heritage site cannot be referred to as a World Heritage Site.

1. 1. Responsibility

The WHCA outlines in section 5 that the responsibility to enforce and implement the Convention is the responsibility of the Minister of Environmental Affairs.

Section 5 provides that: "the Minister is responsible for enforcing and implementing this Act and Convention in the Republic".

This means that the inscription of a property in the World Heritage List can only be made at the request and with the consent of the responsible Minister.

1. 1. World Heritage Nomi nations

Section 6(1) of the WHCA gives the Minister the powers to prescribe procedures for nomination of world heritage properties. Hence this procedure has been developed in fulfilment of this section.

1.1.5 Proponents should note that by undertaking activities as outlined in Part 2 (Tentative Listing) and Part 3 (Nomination Dossier) it does not mean that their proposals will be submitted to Unesco as the Minister reserves the right to determine which proposals may be processed further.

PART 2

2.1. TENTATIVE LISTING

The Operational Gui delines for the Implementation of the World Heritage Convention (paragraphs 6 2 to 76) require State Parties to prepare, maintain and submit to the Centre a Tentative Li stof properties they intend to nominate to the World Heri tag List.

In developing a Tentative List, the following basic requirements should be fulfilled:

- 2.1.1. The Format (Annexure 2) of the Operational Guidelines should be used;
- 2.1.2. Natural heritage properties should be designated as any type of protected area, as outlined in section 9 of NEMPAA;
- 2.1.3. Cultural heritage properties should have any formal protection provided for in terms of NHRA;
- 2.1.4. Mixed properties and where appropriate cultural landscapes should fulfil 2.1.2 and/or 2.1.3 above:
- 2.1.5. In nominating transboundary properties, the portion of the property that falls outside the Republic of South Africa should enjoy formal protection in accordance with legislation in that particular State Party;
- 2.1.6. Transboundary properties should comply with the above and have full support of both State Parties; and
- 2.1.7. Formal structures OR Management Authorities (MA) for overseeing the management of the proposed serial properties should enter into a formal agreement.
- 2 In addition to fulfilling basic requirement 2.1.1, nominations to the Tentative List should also address the following management and administrative issues:
 - 2.2.1 Proposed boundary (identify possible core and buffer zone and or "buffering mechanisms"). Where no proposed buffer zone is indicated, a statement on how the OUV is proposed to be protected from outside pressures should be provided. See paragraph 104 of the Operational Guidelines including the Unesco Resource Manual known as "Preparing World Heritage Nominations, second edition, 2011" for further elaboration:
 - 2.2.2 Land ownership (information to reflect the ownership as recorded in the Deeds Office including the contact details of the registered landowner/s);
 - 2.2.3 Land tenure system (land claims/ land use activities, communal land use), where applicable;
 - 2.2.4 Town and regional planning systems (including spatial development frameworks, zoning schemes, integrated development plans);
 - 2.2.5 Stakeholder consultation (Government structures, landowners, communities, relevant NGO's, Private Sector, etc);
 - 2.2.6 Current management system and proposed management structure;
 - 2.2.7 State of conservation and current conservation management plans (List all strengths and weaknesses, opportunities and threats);

- 2.2.8 Knowledge management system and/or preliminary bibliography (i.e. maps, GIS system, inventories, IKS);
- 2.2.9 How this proposed nomination addresses the gaps in the World Heritage list as identified in the Gap Analysis Study of the Centre and Unesco Advisory Bodies; and
- 2.2.10 Natural heritage properties to include a statement on how the proposed nomination will address the priorities of government as far as the National Protected Areas Expansion Strategy is concerned.
- 2.3 The SAWHCC will assess Tentative List nominations submitted for the purpose of making recommendations to the Minister of those sites which meet the criteria for inclusion on the Tentative List.
- 2.4 The SAWHCC will review the Tentative List every two years as determined in the *Operational Guidelines* for the implementation of the Convention and make recommendations to the Minister.
- 2.5 Proponents will be required to make presentations on their proposal to the SAWHCC at any given time as determined by the Department.
- 2.6 When the State Party submits Annexure 2 to the Centre, the additional information required in 2.1 and 2.2 should not be included.

PART 3

3.1. NOMI NATION DO SSI ER

Section 6 (3) of the WHCA provides that "any person may submit a proposal in writing to the Department or, if it is in existence, the body referred to in subsection (2) for a place in the Republic to be nominated for inclusion on the World Heritage List".

Proponents must take note of the timetable described in Part 4 of this procedure. Furthermore, they must interact with the SAWHCC through the Department to ensure compliance.

Nomination dossiers should follow the format outlined in Annexure 5 of the Operational Guidelines. The nomination process is clearly set out in paragraphs 129 to 151 of the Operational Guidelines.

3.1.1. In addition to complying with the Unesco format as set out in Annexure 5 of the Operational Guidelines, nominations should also include the following:

a) Geog raphical Data

- Cadastral description of the area must include:
 - i. Clearly defined core and buffer zone or buffering mechanisms;
 - ii. GIS diagram;

- iii. Written description of the GIS diagram provided;
- iv. Title deeds number/s, where these exist; and
- v. Total area in hectares.
- Highest point (extent, to cover for fly overs).

b) Land Ownership and Tenure

Statement of land ownership and tenure (confirmation letter from Department of Rural Development and Land Reform) or title deed.

c) Land use

Statement of land uses (land use rights, mineral right etc).

d) State of Conservati onof the property

- (i) Biodiversity Management;
- (ii) Cultural property management includes Indigenous Knowledge Systems and traditional and local practices; and
- (iii) Current and planned conservation management interventions.

e) Financi ng

Proof of long term financial commitment from management structures and/or other funders to maintain and conserve the proposed site in a sustainable manner for future use.

f) Consultation

- (i) Letter of consent from the relevant department in the case of state owned land or the owner/s for the inclusion of the property/properties for World Heritage site nomination;
- (ii) Proof of stakeholder consultation (minutes/ reports and signed attendance registers); and
- (iii) Arrangement and plan for continuous involvement of stakeholders.

g) Management Arrangement

Existing management arrangement (Joint Steering Committee in case of serial nominations).

h) Possi bl Socio-economici mpil cations

Socio-economic and tourism benefits to the local community.

i) Link ages with other programmes of Government, international convention

- (i) Contribution to the system of protected areas in South Africa;
- (ii) Does the area contribute to national priority areas;
- (iii) Linkages to other conventions (CBD, Man and Biosphere, Ramsar)
- (iv) Other UNESCO cultural conventions (ICS, Expression of Cultural Diversity; and
- (v) Objectives and priorities captured in national (e.g. National Development Plan, Climate Change), regional (e.g. SADC, AU) and/or international instruments (African World Heritage Fund, bilateral agreements and treaties).

j) I nte grate Manage me nPl an(I M)

Proponent of a World Heritage Site must submit a draft integrated management plan as an annexure to the nomination dossier in line with content as outlined in the Operational Guidelines as well as section 24 of the WHCA.

The Minister of Agriculture, Forestry and Fisheries received a request from Cape Flora SA (CFSA) for the implementation of statutory measures (registration, records & returns and levies) on fynbos products exported in terms of the Marketing of Agricultural Products Act (MAP Act) 1996. The previous statutory measures on fynbos expired on 30 September 2015.

It is proposed that the following statutory measures be implemented for a four year period, effective from date of publication:

- Levies:
- · Registration; and
- Records & Returns.

The purpose and objectives of the proposed statutory measures are as follows:

- The **payment of the levy**, in terms of section 15 of the MAP Act, will be used to finance the following:
 - Research projects, information and technology transfer;
 - Information and statistics;
 - Quality control and certification system;
 - Transformation, Ethical Trade and Training; and
 - Administration secretariat, financial administration & levy collection.

The following levy amounts on export volumes of cultivated fynbos products are proposed:

The MAP Act stipulates that a statutory levy may not exceed 5% of the price realised for a specific agricultural product at the first point of sale. The maximum of 5% must be based on a guideline price calculated as the average price at the first point of sale over a period not exceeding three years. The proposed statutory levy for the first year (R1,85 per standard export carton), would represent less than 1% of the average fynbos value per carton and is well below the guideline price stipulated un the MAP Act.

 The purpose and objectives of submitting records and returns, in terms of section 18 of the MAP Act and Registration in terms of section 19 of the MAP Act, are as follows:

Submitting records and returns to CFSA and registration with CFSA will ensure the availability and provision of continuous, timeous and accurate information, to all stakeholders in the industry deemed to be essential to ensure informed decision making and a stable and profitable industry.

CFSA indicated that no records or returns shall be required in terms of this measure which discloses confidential information of a marketing nature, and in particular, no returns disclosing, *inter alia*, contracting parties; purchasers of fynbos; prices of services or the prices obtained for fynbos, or any similar information.

Such information is deemed essential for all role players in order for them to make informed decisions. By combining compulsory registration with the keeping of information and the rendering of returns on an individual basis, generic information for the whole of the industry can be processed and disseminated and will form the basis for the collection of levies where applicable and appropriate.

It is proposed that CFSA, a non-profit company established in terms of the Companies Act (as amended), 2008 (Act 71 of 2008) implement and administer the proposed statutory measures. The statutory levies will be accounted separately from other funds and activities within CFSA, in accordance with the prescriptions of the NAMC and the Auditor General.

The NAMC believes that the measures requested are consistent with the objectives of the MAP Act (as set out in section 2 of the Act).

Directly affected groups (e.g. exporters producers and packers) in the fynbos industry are kindly requested to submit any comments, in writing, regarding the proposed statutory measures, to the NAMC on or before 20 November 2015, to enable the Council to finalise its recommendation to the Minister in this regard.

- 9.4 An applicant must, together with his application submit proof of registration and a Certificate of Compliance obtainable from the relevant Bargaining Council;
- 9.5 The applicant must submit a Tax Clearance Certificate;
- 9.6 The applicant must provide in each permit application the number of jobs it expects to create annually as a result of the rebate. The applicant will submit to ITAC an annual report on its job creation performance;
- 9.7 The applicant(s) need to consult with the local manufactures of upholstery furniture fabric and industry associations to confirm if the domestic industry is able to supply a reasonable quantity of fabrics as required.

- 9.8 The applications must be accompanied by a sample of fabrics to be imported which will then be sent to the Textile Federation (Texfed), Southern African Sustainable Textile and Apparel Cluster (SASTAC) and known local manufacturers, for confirmation of the local availability of the fabrics to be imported under rebate.
- 9.9 The applicant can request the local manufacturer and/or the industry association to respond within 14 working days of their request. Should the local manufacturers of upholstered furniture fabrics not be able to supply the quantity requested, the applicant(s) need to obtain a confirmation letter stating that the domestic industry is not able to supply. The original letter needs to be submitted with the application form.
- 9.10 If the local manufacture refuses to provide such a confirmation letter, ITAC will write a letter to it informing it of the application and requesting it to confirm the domestic industry's production and production capacity. The manufacturer will then be allowed seven (7) working days to respond to this letter. Should the manufacturer respond within the seven (7) working days period, the information provided will be taken into account during the decision making process; and
- 9.11 Should, after receipt of the manufacturers response, or in the absence of such, information be available that reflects that the manufacturer is reasonably unable to supply the quality and quantity of fabrics required, ITAC will issue a permit.
- 10. Applicants making use of Cut Make and Trim (CMT) should attach the following information:
 - a) Name of the CMT;
 - b) Tax Clearance Certificate;
 - c) Certificate of Compliance obtainable for the Bargaining Council;
 - d) Job profile of the CMT;
 - e) Provide ITAC with production volumes to be carried out by the CMT

The applicant should note that manufacturing by the CMT should not exceed 30 per cent of its own manufacturing volume as indicated in a permit issued by ITAC.

- 11. The applicant should take responsibility of all compliance issues, as non-compliance will result in appropriate steps being taken.
- 12. Rebate permits may not be transferred in any manner by the holder thereof, to any other person, or be used to the benefit of any person, not named in the permits.
- 13. Any request for an amendment to a rebate permit must be forwarded to ITAC for consideration. Amendments will only be considered in the following instances:
 - a) Error by ITAC on permit;
 - b) Error by applicant regarding the product description or tariff subheading. This will only be processed if the request is accompanied by a confirmation from SARS in this regard.
- 14. Should any party misplace a permit, the applicant should submit an affidavit on a company letterhead endorsed by a Commissioner of Oaths, stating that the permit was lost and the circumstances surrounding loss of such permit. ITAC may, on the facts furnished exercise its discretion to issue a new permit. Should the lost permit be found the applicant must return such permit to ITAC.
- 15. Extension of the one year period from which the permit is valid may be granted. Extensions will only be granted where the relevant permit has not expired, and in the view of ITAC, good cause warrants extension of such permit. Such discretion shall lie solely with ITAC. Extensions will only be permitted for a period up to 3 months and the party applying for the extension must submit a letter and supporting documents to ITAC, furnishing reasons and good cause for the extension.
- 16. Non-compliance to the conditions of permits:

Where there is a reason to believe that any condition of a permit issued, in terms of this rebate provision is not complied with, the consignment in terms of which the rebate was used can be seized by ITAC. If non-compliance is established, appropriate steps in terms of the International Trade Administration Act and the Customs and Excise Act will be taken and that can include, criminal charges, withdrawal of the permit or permits concerned and/or the rejection of future applications for permits.

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1 INTRODUCTION

- 1.1 The Competition Commission ("the Commission") will conduct a market inquiry to understand the general state of competition in the grocery retail sector ("the Grocery Retail Sector Inquiry").
- 1.2 The purpose of the market inquiry is to examine whether there are features or a combination of features in the grocery retail sector which prevents, distorts or restricts competition and/or to achieve the purposes of the Competition Act, No. 89 of 1998 (as amended) ("the Act").
- 1.3 This Terms of Reference ("ToR") is published in terms of section 43B(2) of the Act read together with section 43B(4). In terms of section 43B(2) of the Act, the Commission must publish a notice in the Government Gazette announcing the establishment of the market inquiry at least 20 business days before the inquiry commences, "setting out the terms of reference for the market inquiry and inviting members of the public to provide information to the market inquiry". In terms of section 43B(4) of the Act, the ToR "must include, at minimum, a statement of the scope of the inquiry, and the time within which it is expected to be completed". In accordance with these provisions, this ToR sets out the scope of the Grocery Retail Sector Inquiry, as well as the expected timeline for the inquiry.
- 1.4 The ToR proceeds as follows: section 2 outlines the legal basis for the market inquiry; section 3 provides the background to the market inquiry; section 4 sets out the scope of the market inquiry; and section 5 outlines the market inquiry process and timelines.

2 LEGAL BASIS FOR THE MARKET INQUIRY

- 2.1 This market inquiry is initiated in terms of Chapter 4A¹ of the Act and in keeping with the purpose and functions of the Commission as set out in sections 2 and 21 of the Act respectively. Section 21 of the Act calls on the Commission to *inter alia*, *"implement measures to increase market transparency."*
- 2.2 In order to fulfil these functions, and in line with the purpose of the Act, Chapter 4A of the Act enables the Commission to conduct market inquiries in respect of the "general state of

competition in a market for particular goods or services, without necessarily referring to the conduct or activities of any particular named firm".² A market inquiry is thus a general investigation into the state, nature and form of competition in a market, rather than a narrow investigation of specific conduct by any particular firm.

- 2.3 The Commission is conducting the Grocery Retail Sector Inquiry because it has reason to believe that there are features or a combination of features in the sector that may prevent, distort or restrict competition within that market, and/or to achieve the purposes of the Act.
- 2.4 The purpose of the Act, as set out in Section 2 of the Act is to "promote and maintain competition in the Republic in order
 - (a) to promote the efficiency, adaptability and development of the economy;
 - (b) to provide consumers with competitive prices and product choices;
 - (c) to promote employment and advance the social and economic welfare of South Africans;
 - (d) to expand opportunities for South African participation in world markets and recognise the role of foreign competition in the Republic;
 - (e) to ensure that small and medium-sized enterprises have an equitable opportunity to participate in the economy;
 - (f) to promote a greater spread of ownership, in particular to increase the ownership stakes of historically disadvantaged persons.
 - (g) to detect and address conditions in the market for any particular goods or services, or any behaviour within such a market, that tends to prevent, restrict or distort competition in connection with the supply or acquisition of those goods or services within the Republic; and
 - (h) to provide for consistent application of common standards and policies affecting competition within all markets and sectors of the economy."
- 2.5 Although the ToR delimits the scope of the market inquiry as currently envisaged, additional and related matters not identified herein may arise during the conduct of the inquiry. If the

Commission believes that the ToR should be amended in any way, either through the addition of new matters or exclusion of matters currently identified herein, the ToR may be amended in terms of section 43B (5) of the Act.

- 2.6 Upon completing the market inquiry, and in accordance with section 43C of the Act, the Commission:
 - "(1).....must publish a report of the inquiry in the Gazette, and must submit the report to the Minister³ with or without recommendations, which may include, but not limited to -
 - (a) recommendations for new or amended policy, legislation or regulations; and
 - (b) recommendations to other regulatory authorities in respect of competition matters.
 - (2) Section 21(3), read with the changes required by the context, applies to a report to the Minister in terms of subsection (1) 4 .
 - (3) On the basis of the information obtained during a market inquiry, the Competition Commission may -
 - (a) initiate a complaint and enter into a consent order with any respondent, in accordance with section 49D, with or without conducting any further investigation;
 - (b) initiate a complaint against any firm for further investigation, in accordance with Part C of Chapter 5;
 - (c) initiate and refer a complaint directly to the Competition Tribunal without further investigation;
 - (d) take any other action within its powers in terms of this Act recommended in the report of the market inquiry; or
 - (e) take no further action."

3 BRIEF BACKGROUND TO THE MARKET INQUIRY

3.1 The four largest supermarket chains operating in South Africa, collectively account for more than 90% of the market.⁵ These firms are able to operate as grocery anchor tenants in shopping centres and malls of various sizes. Mergers and acquisitions and expansion

through greenfields development of the national chains have seen greater consolidation and growth of the formal sector.

- 3.2 Since the 1990s, one of the more prominent features of the South African economy has been the evolution of the townships, peri-urban and rural areas into centres of business activity. The main driver of such a development is the burgeoning of retailers to tap into the growing low to middle income households. The increasing movement of large retailer chains into previously untapped low to middle income segments has resulted in an increase in shopping centre development in these areas.⁶
- 3.3 The movement of national supermarket chains into the townships, peri-urban and rural areas mainly through the construction of shopping centres has affected small, informal and independent retailers in a number of ways. Studies carried out in different townships in South Africa have confirmed that the number of informal businesses decreased immediately after the national supermarket chains moved into townships. For example, in a study by the Bureau of Market Research, in Soshanguve (north of Pretoria), a significant proportion of informal businesses interviewed confirmed a decrease in their business activities during the 6 month period since the opening of a shopping centre in the Soshanguve area. The study found that 75% of informal businesses located less than 1 km from the centre (or about 15 minutes walking time) reported a decline in their profits while only 36,8 % of those located between 4 and 5 km (approximately 1 hour's walk) from the centre experienced a drop in their profitability.⁷
- 3.4 Prior to 1994, small informal businesses supplied residents in these areas with groceries. Despite the importance of small informal businesses in townships, peri-urban and rural areas, they show relatively high attrition rates. A potential decline in the number of small

informal businesses is likely to have an adverse effect on employment, income levels and the spread of ownership in this sector.⁹

- 3.5 In addition, the Commission previously investigated the issue of long term exclusive leases and has recently noted increasing concerns relating thereto from market participants as evidenced by further complaints it received since the previous investigations. The complaints are broadly about the use of long term exclusive lease agreements entered into between property developers and national supermarket chains, and the role of financiers in these exclusive lease agreements as a barrier to entry and expansion. The exclusive clauses in the lease agreements may be causing distortions in the grocery retail sector. In general, the exclusive clauses restrict the landlord from leasing out space in the same shopping centre to potentially competing retailers, whether it is a retailer whose primary business is the sale of foodstuffs, a café or delicatessen which sells fresh fish or meat, grocery, fresh fish shop, butchery, bakery, liquor store or a fruit and vegetable shop. These restrictions tend to mostly affect small and independent retailers who may not be in a position to attract customers if located outside the shopping centre or mall.
- 3.6 Since the previous investigations, the Commission had embarked on advocacy efforts and has imposed conditions to the approval of mergers in the sector to persuade participants in the sector to change the practice of entering into exclusive lease agreements as by default for each new development. However, despite the Commission's efforts, the conduct persists. The Commission has identified this market inquiry as the appropriate route to address the issue of long term exclusive leases, given that these efforts have failed.
- 3.7 In general, clauses in the exclusive lease agreements may affect customers' choice in terms of product range and quality, and ultimately affect competition. Better product range and the

quality of service (including pricing and promotions) can be expected to be better where there are competing retailers at the same shopping centre.

- 3.8 Some national supermarket chains also offer opportunities for independent businesses to participate in the grocery retail sector through franchising arrangements. Some trading conditions such as pricing, packaging and branding are largely determined by the franchisor. Most franchisees do not source supplies on their own but operate as branches of the franchisor and may also enjoy assistance in sourcing funding. They thus appear to operate at an advantage against local and independent retailers. The Commission has also noted that some of the national supermarket chains are buying back their franchised stores leading to further consolidation in the grocery retail sector.
- 3.9 There has also been varied performance of local and foreign national operated small informal retailers across the country some, in particular foreign national operated retailers, have been perceived to be more successful than the others and the reasons therefore are unclear. This has led to tensions that have sparked into violence in some instances. Given the importance of the informal sector, it is important to make a deliberate effort to examine the dynamics of competition between local and foreign national operated small and independent retailers and to understand whether this may contribute to the decline in small and independent retailers in townships, peri-urban areas, rural areas and the informal economy.

4 SCOPE OF THE MARKET INQUIRY

- 4.1 For the purposes of this inquiry, the grocery retail sector includes all shops that predominantly sell fast-moving consumer goods (for example food, toiletries and/or liquor), whether as a wholesaler, retailer, or both. It encompasses all kinds of shops, from small informal businesses such as street traders/hawkers, spaza shops and small independent grocery stores to supermarket chains and wholesale groups/outlets.
- 4.2 The scope of the market inquiry will include the following:
 - 4.2.1 The impact of the expansion, diversification and consolidation of national supermarket chains on small and independent retailers in townships, peri-urban and rural areas and the informal economy.

- 4.2.2 The impact of long term exclusive lease agreements entered into between property developers and national supermarket chains, and the role of financiers in these agreements on competition in the grocery retail sector.
- 4.2.3 The dynamics of competition between local and foreign national operated small and independent retailers in townships, peri-urban areas, rural areas and the informal economy.
- 4.2.4 The impact of regulations, including *inter alia* municipal town planning and by-laws on small and independent retailers in townships, peri-urban areas, rural areas and the informal economy.
- 4.2.5 The impact of buyer groups on small and independent retailers in townships, periurban areas, rural areas and the informal economy.¹¹
- 4.2.6 The impact of certain identified value chains on the operations of small and independent retailers in townships, peri-urban areas, rural areas and the informal economy.¹²
- 4.3 The market inquiry may probe, among other things, the following:
 - 4.3.1 The competition dynamics in the grocery retail sector, including pricing practices, extent of consumer choice and innovation.
 - 4.3.2 The impact of franchise retailers on small and independent retailers in townships, peri-urban areas, rural areas and the informal economy.
 - 4.3.3 The causes and impact of the decline in small and independent retailers in townships, peri-urban areas, rural areas, and the informal economy.
 - 4.3.4 Other issues of public interest and consumer harm in the grocery retail sector.

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¹¹ For the purposes of this inquiry, buyer groups refer to the cooperation between buyers upon price, product diversity, quality, technological improvement or other factors. This definition is in line with the definition of buyer groups used by the Office of Fair Trading ("OFT") in a 2007 economic discussion paper entitled *"The competitive effects of buyer groups"*, prepared for the OFT by RBB Economics LLP, available at www.oft.gov.uk

5 MARKET INQUIRY PROCESS AND TIMELINES

- 5.1 The inquiry will be carried out by a panel of experts in the subject matter assisted by a technical team made up mostly by the staff of the Commission and/or consultants as required.
- 5.2 Without limiting the inquiry panel's methodology, the methods that may be used for gathering information may include the following:
 - 5.2.1 Questionnaires and surveys to identified participants and/or to the general public.
 - 5.2.2 Information requests to particular market participants.
 - 5.2.3 Calls for submissions on issues relevant to the market inquiry.
 - 5.2.4 Targeted meetings with key industry stakeholders.
 - 5.2.5 Public hearings.
- 5.3 The participants in the market inquiry process will include firms directly or indirectly involved in the grocery retail sector, as well as those that have an impact on competition in the sector. These include firms in the property market, finance institutions and suppliers. The inquiry will also include participation by business and trade associations, government departments, public entities, regulatory authorities, consumers and consumer groups, and any other stakeholder that may be able to provide information relevant to the market inquiry. Members of the public are encouraged to participate fully in the inquiry process.
- 5.4 The Commission will publish a report at the conclusion of the market inquiry.
- 5.5 The Commission is committed to the principles of fairness, transparency and integrity and will conduct the inquiry in accordance with these principles. The Commission will allow stakeholders fair and reasonable opportunity to provide input into the inquiry process and its outcomes. For this reason the Commission may release interim reports throughout the market inquiry for public consideration and comment at its discretion.

6 Timelines

6.1 The inquiry will commence on 27 November 2015, and is likely to be completed by 29 May 2017.

In accordance with the provisions of the Labour Relations Act, No. 66 of 1995, made and entered into by and between the

Meesterbouers Assosiasie Groter Boland (MBA Groter Boland)

Bou Industriee Assosiasie Wes-Boland

(hereinafter referred to as the "employers" or the "employers' organisations"), of the one part, and the

Building Workers Union

(hereinafter referred to as the "employees" or the "trade union") of the other part, being the parties to the Building Bargaining Council North and West Boland, to amend the Collective Agreement, extended to non-parties, published under Government Notice R. 1011 of 26 October 2007 as further amended, extended, renewed and re-enacted by Government Notices Nos R. 1012 of 26 October 2007, R. 1174 of 7 November 2008, R. 1083 of 13 November 2009, R. 844 and R. 845 of 1 October 2010, R. 624 of 5 August 2011, R. 133 of 24 February 2012, R. 957 of 23 November 2012, R. 691 of 20 September 2013 and R. 820 of 24 October 2014.

1. SCOPE OF APPLICATION

- (1) The terms of this Agreement shall be observed-
 - (a) by all employers and by all employees engaged or employed in the Building Industry who are members of the employers` organisations and the trade union, respectively;

- (b) in the Magisterial Districts of Ceres, Montagu, Robertson, Tulbagh and Worcester;
- (c) Overberg District Municipality excluding Overstrand Local Municipality (which includes Gansbaai, Hangklip, Kleinmond, Hermanus and Stanford);
- (d) Central Karoo District Municipality (excluding the Magisterial District of Beaufort-West); and
- (e) West Coast District Municipality (excluding the Magisterial District of Malmesbury).
- (2) Notwithstanding the provisions of subclause (1), the terms of this Agreement shall apply to-
 - (a) only those classes of employees for whom wages are described in this Agreement;
 - (b) apprentices and learners only in so far as the provisions are not inconsistent with the provisions of the Manpower Training Act, 1981, and the Skills Development Act, 1998, or any conditions fixed there under.
 - (c) labour-only contractors, working partners and working directors, principals and contractors.
- (3) Notwithstanding the provisions of subclause (1)(a), the terms of this Agreement shall not apply to -
 - (a) clerical employees and administrative staff;
 - (b) university students and graduates in building science and construction surveyors and other such persons doing practical work in the completion of their academic training;

- (c) foremen or general foremen;
- (d) non-parties in respect of clauses 1(1) (a) and 1A of this Agreement.

(e)

1A. PERIOD OF OPERATION

This agreement shall come into operation on the date fixed by the Minister of Labour as the effective date on which the Agreement shall be extended to become binding on non-parties, or the date on which the Minister of Labour declines to extend the Agreement to non-parties, and the Agreement shall remain in force until 31 December 2016.

2. CLAUSE 9: CONDITIONS OF SERVICE

(1) Substitute the following for subclause 4(a):

"(4) Overtime

(a) All time worked in excess of the number of ordinary hours of work on any day shall be overtime, or as the agreed work hours determine by a contract of service.

Overtime shall be dealt with according to the Basic Conditions of Employment Act, 75 of 1997 as prescribed in Article 10 of the Act."

(2) Substitute the following for sub-clause (6)(a)(i):

"(i) The 2015/2016 closing period of the building industry starts at 17:00 on Tuesday, 15 December 2015 and will re-open at 8:00 on Monday, 11 January 2016. If building work is required, employers will be allowed to make prior arrangements with the Council in order to work, during the official period of leave. If there are employees working during this

period, employees will be paid at normal pay rates, except Saturdays and Sundays who will be paid as prescribed by the Basic Conditions of Employment Act of 1997. No building work will be allowed between 16:00 on the 24th December 2015 until 08:00 on 8th January 2016."

3. CLAUSE 10: REMUNERATION

Substitute the following for sub-clause (1):

Provided that the aforementioned wages shall not be less than those prescribed in terms of the Manpower Training Act, 1981, or the Skills Development Act, 1998:

Provided further that the wages specified above for drivers/plant operators shall be payable if such employees have worked 42 hours in any week. If such employees have, however, worked less than 42 normal hours in any week, their wages for that week shall be calculated as follows: The above specified wages divided by 42 hours, multiplied by the actual number of normal working hours worked."

Substitute the following for sub-clause (7):

"(7) Accommodation

- (a) An employee who, in the performance of his duties, is required to work away from his ordinary place of residence at a place of work so situated that such employee is unable to return to his normal place of residence, shall in respect of every night he spends away from his ordinary place of residence, be afforded suitable sleeping facilities, suitable bath facilities, separate toilet facilities, cooking facilities and hot water. The place of residence should be well ventilated with windows and doors, and should have a solid floor (not a soil floor). It should be free of charge to the employee. All transport required shall be provided free of charge by the employer.
- (b) In respect of each night that such an employee spends away from his usual place of residence a living away allowance will be paid to the employee of R50,00 per night in the West Boland area and R33,00 in the Greater Boland area."

4. CLAUSE 14: HOLIDAY FUND

Substitute the following for subclauses (1), (2), (3) and (4):

- "(1) The Holiday Fund is hereby continued and shall be continued to be administered by the Council for the purposes of providing eligible employees with leave pay for the period of annual leave in terms of clause 9(6) of the Agreement. Holiday Fund payout at the end of the year shall be for fifteen (15) working days. Moneys contributed to the Fund by employers shall be invested as provided for in terms of section 53(5) of the Act.
- (2) Contributions by the employer: (a) An employer shall contribute an amount to the holiday fund on behalf of an eligible employee for each day that the employee remains in his/her employ (a contribution day), which amount shall be calculated as follows:

- (b) Every employer shall pay the specified contribution to the Council on the employee's normal pay day, and shall on that day endorse and issue the employee with the specified fringe benefits indicating the amount of the contribution made.
- (3) Public holidays as proclaimed under the Public Holidays Act, 1994, will be prorata included into the holiday fund. Moneys contributed to the Fund by employers shall be invested as provided for in terms of section 53(5) of the Act.

- (a) Employers shall pay their employees for each public holiday that fall in the work period, as defined by the Basic Conditions of Employment Act no. 75 of 1997, in that specific pay week.
- (b) Employers can only claim the funds back from the Building Bargaining Council, if their employee's benefits are up to date and sufficient. If an employer's benefits are not up to date, and not sufficient, the employer will be held responsible to pay their employees for each public holiday. The Council will only deal with claims from employers.

- (c) Employers are obliged to purchase a benefit for each employee on each public holiday, except on the following public holidays, 16 December 2015, 25 December 2015 and 1 January 2016. These public holidays fall under the annual holiday fund.



16.2 Conflict Resolution

- 16.2.2 Should the Parties' Representatives fail to resolve the dispute within fourteen (14) days, the Parties' Representatives shall refer the dispute to the Executive Authority and the Chairperson, who shall use their best endeavours to resolve the dispute.
