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HIGH ALERT: SCAM WARNING!!!

TO ALL SUPPLIERS AND SERVICE PROVIDERS OF THE GOVERNMENT PRINTING WORKS

It has come to the attention of the GOVERNMENT PRINTING WORKS that there are certain unscrupulous companies and individuals who are defrauding unsuspecting businesses disguised as representatives of the Government Printing Works (GPW).

The scam involves the fraudsters using the letterhead of *GPW* to send out fake tender bids to companies and requests to supply equipment and goods.

Although the contact person's name on the letter may be of an existing official, the contact details on the letter are not the same as the *Government Printing Works*'. When searching on the Internet for the address of the company that has sent the fake tender document, the address does not exist.

The banking details are in a private name and not company name. Government will never ask you to deposit any funds for any business transaction. *GPW* has alerted the relevant law enforcement authorities to investigate this scam to protect legitimate businesses as well as the name of the organisation.

Example of e-mails these fraudsters are using:

PROCUREMENT@GPW-GOV.ORG

Should you suspect that you are a victim of a scam, you must urgently contact the police and inform the *GPW*.

GPW has an official email with the domain as @gpw.gov.za

Government e-mails DO NOT have org in their e-mail addresses. All of these fraudsters also use the same or very similar telephone numbers. Although such number with an area code 012 looks like a landline, it is not fixed to any property.

GPW will never send you an e-mail asking you to supply equipment and goods without a purchase/order number. *GPW* does not procure goods for another level of Government. The organisation will not be liable for actions that result in companies or individuals being resultant victims of such a scam.

Government Printing Works gives businesses the opportunity to supply goods and services through RFQ / Tendering process. In order to be eligible to bid to provide goods and services, suppliers must be registered on the National Treasury's Central Supplier Database (CSD). To be registered, they must meet all current legislative requirements (e.g. have a valid tax clearance certificate and be in good standing with the South African Revenue Services - SARS).

The tender process is managed through the Supply Chain Management (SCM) system of the department. SCM is highly regulated to minimise the risk of fraud, and to meet objectives which include value for money, open and effective competition, equitability, accountability, fair dealing, transparency and an ethical approach. Relevant legislation, regulations, policies, guidelines and instructions can be found on the tender's website.

Fake Tenders

National Treasury's CSD has launched the Government Order Scam campaign to combat fraudulent requests for quotes (RFQs). Such fraudulent requests have resulted in innocent companies losing money. We work hard at preventing and fighting fraud, but criminal activity is always a risk.

How tender scams work

There are many types of tender scams. Here are some of the more frequent scenarios:

Fraudsters use what appears to be government department stationery with fictitious logos and contact details to send a fake RFQ to a company to invite it to urgently supply goods. Shortly after the company has submitted its quote, it receives notification that it has won the tender. The company delivers the goods to someone who poses as an official or at a fake site. The Department has no idea of this transaction made in its name. The company is then never paid and suffers a loss.

Fraudsters use what appears to be government department stationery with fictitious logos and contact details to send a fake RFQ to Company A to invite it to urgently supply goods. Typically, the tender specification is so unique that only Company B (a fictitious company created by the fraudster) can supply the goods in question.

Shortly after Company A has submitted its quote it receives notification that it has won the tender. Company A orders the goods and pays a deposit to the fictitious Company B. Once Company B receives the money, it disappears. Company A's money is stolen in the process.

Protect yourself from being scammed

- If you are registered on the supplier databases and you receive a request to tender or quote that seems to be from a government department, contact the department to confirm that the request is legitimate. Do not use the contact details on the tender document as these might be fraudulent.
- Compare tender details with those that appear in the Tender Bulletin, available online at www.gpwonline.co.za
- Make sure you familiarise yourself with how government procures goods and services. Visit the tender website for more information on how to tender.
- If you are uncomfortable about the request received, consider visiting the government department and/or the place of delivery and/or the service provider from whom you will be sourcing the goods.
- In the unlikely event that you are asked for a deposit to make a bid, contact the SCM unit of the department in question to ask whether this is in fact correct.

Please ensure that you adhere to these guidelines when completing and submitting your notice submission.

- The Government Gazette and Government Tender Bulletin are weekly publications that are published on Fridays and the closing time for the acceptance of notices is strictly applied according to the scheduled time for each gazette.

EXTRAORDINARY GAZETTES

3. Extraordinary Gazettes can have only one publication date. If multiple publications of an Extraordinary Gazette are required, a separate Z95/Z95Prov Adobe Forms for each publication date must be submitted.

Notice Submission Process

- 4. Download the latest *Adobe* form, for the relevant notice to be placed, from the **Government Printing Works** website www.gpwonline.co.za.
- 5. The Adobe form needs to be completed electronically using Adobe Acrobat / Acrobat Reader. Only electronically completed Adobe forms will be accepted. No printed, handwritten and/or scanned Adobe forms will be accepted.
- 6. The completed electronic *Adobe* form has to be submitted via email to submit.egazette@gpw.gov.za. The form needs to be submitted in its original electronic *Adobe* format to enable the system to extract the completed information from the form for placement in the publication.
- Every notice submitted must be accompanied by an official GPW quotation. This must be obtained from the eGazette Contact Centre.
- 8. Each notice submission should be sent as a single email. The email **must** contain **all documentation** relating to a particular notice submission.
 - 8.1. Each of the following documents must be attached to the email as a separate attachment:
 - 8.1.1. An electronically completed Adobe form, specific to the type of notice that is to be placed.
 - 8.1.1.1. For National *Government Gazette* or *Provincial Gazette* notices, the notices must be accompanied by an electronic Z95 or Z95Prov *Adobe* form
 - 8.1.1.2. The notice content (body copy) **MUST** be a separate attachment.
 - 8.1.2. A copy of the official **Government Printing Works** quotation you received for your notice. (Please see Quotation section below for further details)
 - 8.1.3. A valid and legible Proof of Payment / Purchase Order: **Government Printing Works** account customer must include a copy of their Purchase Order. **Non-Government Printing Works** account customer needs to submit the proof of payment for the notice
 - 8.1.4. Where separate notice content is applicable (Z95, Z95 Prov and TForm 3, it should **also** be attached as a separate attachment. (*Please see the Copy Section below, for the specifications*).
 - 8.1.5. Any additional notice information if applicable.

- 9. The electronic *Adobe* form will be taken as the primary source for the notice information to be published. Instructions that are on the email body or covering letter that contradicts the notice form content will not be considered. The information submitted on the electronic *Adobe* form will be published as-is.
- To avoid duplicated publication of the same notice and double billing, Please submit your notice ONLY ONCE.
- 11. Notices brought to **GPW** by "walk-in" customers on electronic media can only be submitted in *Adobe* electronic form format. All "walk-in" customers with notices that are not on electronic *Adobe* forms will be routed to the Contact Centre where they will be assisted to complete the forms in the required format.
- 12. Should a customer submit a bulk submission of hard copy notices delivered by a messenger on behalf of any organisation e.g. newspaper publisher, the messenger will be referred back to the sender as the submission does not adhere to the submission rules.

QUOTATIONS

- 13. Quotations are valid until the next tariff change.
 - 13.1. Take note: GPW's annual tariff increase takes place on 1 April therefore any quotations issued, accepted and submitted for publication up to 31 March will keep the old tariff. For notices to be published from 1 April, a quotation must be obtained from GPW with the new tariffs. Where a tariff increase is implemented during the year, GPW endeavours to provide customers with 30 days' notice of such changes.
- 14. Each quotation has a unique number.
- 15. Form Content notices must be emailed to the *eGazette* Contact Centre for a quotation.
 - 15.1. The *Adobe* form supplied is uploaded by the Contact Centre Agent and the system automatically calculates the cost of your notice based on the layout/format of the content supplied.
 - 15.2. It is critical that these *Adobe* Forms are completed correctly and adhere to the guidelines as stipulated by **GPW**.

16. APPLICABLE ONLY TO GPW ACCOUNT HOLDERS:

- 16.1. GPW Account Customers must provide a valid GPW account number to obtain a quotation.
- 16.2. Accounts for GPW account customers must be active with sufficient credit to transact with GPW to submit notices.
 - 16.2.1. If you are unsure about or need to resolve the status of your account, please contact the GPW Finance Department prior to submitting your notices. (If the account status is not resolved prior to submission of your notice, the notice will be failed during the process).

17. APPLICABLE ONLY TO CASH CUSTOMERS:

- 17.1. Cash customers doing **bulk payments** must use a **single email address** in order to use the **same proof of payment** for submitting multiple notices.
- 18. The responsibility lies with you, the customer, to ensure that the payment made for your notice(s) to be published is sufficient to cover the cost of the notice(s).
- 19. Each quotation will be associated with one proof of payment / purchase order / cash receipt.
 - 19.1. This means that the quotation number can only be used once to make a payment.

COPY (SEPARATE NOTICE CONTENT DOCUMENT)

- 20. Where the copy is part of a separate attachment document for Z95, Z95Prov and TForm03
 - 20.1. Copy of notices must be supplied in a separate document and may not constitute part of any covering letter, purchase order, proof of payment or other attached documents.

The content document should contain only one notice. (You may include the different translations of the same notice in the same document).

20.2. The notice should be set on an A4 page, with margins and fonts set as follows:

Page size = A4 Portrait with page margins: Top = 40mm, LH/RH = 16mm, Bottom = 40mm; Use font size: Arial or Helvetica 10pt with 11pt line spacing;

Page size = A4 Landscape with page margins: Top = 16mm, LH/RH = 40mm, Bottom = 16mm; Use font size: Arial or Helvetica 10pt with 11pt line spacing;

CANCELLATIONS

- 21. Cancellation of notice submissions are accepted by GPW according to the deadlines stated in the table above in point 2. Non-compliance to these deadlines will result in your request being failed. Please pay special attention to the different deadlines for each gazette. Please note that any notices cancelled after the cancellation deadline will be published and charged at full cost.
- 22. Requests for cancellation must be sent by the original sender of the notice and must accompanied by the relevant notice reference number (N-) in the email body.

AMENDMENTS TO NOTICES

23. With effect from 01 October 2015, **GPW** will not longer accept amendments to notices. The cancellation process will need to be followed according to the deadline and a new notice submitted thereafter for the next available publication date.

REJECTIONS

- 24. All notices not meeting the submission rules will be rejected to the customer to be corrected and resubmitted. Assistance will be available through the Contact Centre should help be required when completing the forms. (012-748 6200 or email info.egazette@gpw.gov.za). Reasons for rejections include the following:
 - 24.1. Incorrectly completed forms and notices submitted in the wrong format, will be rejected.
 - 24.2. Any notice submissions not on the correct Adobe electronic form, will be rejected.
 - 24.3. Any notice submissions not accompanied by the proof of payment / purchase order will be rejected and the notice will not be processed.
 - 24.4. Any submissions or re-submissions that miss the submission cut-off times will be rejected to the customer. The Notice needs to be re-submitted with a new publication date.

APPROVAL OF NOTICES

- 25. Any notices other than legal notices are subject to the approval of the Government Printer, who may refuse acceptance or further publication of any notice.
- 26. No amendments will be accepted in respect to separate notice content that was sent with a Z95 or Z95Prov notice submissions. The copy of notice in layout format (previously known as proof-out) is only provided where requested, for Advertiser to see the notice in final Gazette layout. Should they find that the information submitted was incorrect, they should request for a notice cancellation and resubmit the corrected notice, subject to standard submission deadlines. The cancellation is also subject to the stages in the publishing process, i.e. If cancellation is received when production (printing process) has commenced, then the notice cannot be cancelled.

GOVERNMENT PRINTER INDEMNIFIED AGAINST LIABILITY

- 27. The Government Printer will assume no liability in respect of—
 - 27.1. any delay in the publication of a notice or publication of such notice on any date other than that stipulated by the advertiser;
 - 27.2. erroneous classification of a notice, or the placement of such notice in any section or under any heading other than the section or heading stipulated by the advertiser;
 - 27.3. any editing, revision, omission, typographical errors or errors resulting from faint or indistinct copy.

LIABILITY OF ADVERTISER

28. Advertisers will be held liable for any compensation and costs arising from any action which may be instituted against the Government Printer in consequence of the publication of any notice.

CUSTOMER INQUIRIES

Many of our customers request immediate feedback/confirmation of notice placement in the gazette from our Contact Centre once they have submitted their notice – While **GPW** deems it one of their highest priorities and responsibilities to provide customers with this requested feedback and the best service at all times, we are only able to do so once we have started processing your notice submission.

GPW has a 2-working day turnaround time for processing notices received according to the business rules and deadline submissions.

Please keep this in mind when making inquiries about your notice submission at the Contact Centre.

- 29. Requests for information, quotations and inquiries must be sent to the Contact Centre ONLY.
- 30. Requests for Quotations (RFQs) should be received by the Contact Centre at least **2 working days** before the submission deadline for that specific publication.

PAYMENT OF COST

- 31. The Request for Quotation for placement of the notice should be sent to the Gazette Contact Centre as indicated above, prior to submission of notice for advertising.
- 32. Payment should then be made, or Purchase Order prepared based on the received quotation, prior to the submission of the notice for advertising as these documents i.e. proof of payment or Purchase order will be required as part of the notice submission, as indicated earlier.
- 33. Every proof of payment must have a valid **GPW** quotation number as a reference on the proof of payment document.
- 34. Where there is any doubt about the cost of publication of a notice, and in the case of copy, an enquiry, accompanied by the relevant copy, should be addressed to the Gazette Contact Centre, **Government Printing Works**, Private Bag X85, Pretoria, 0001 email: info.egazette@gpw.gov.za before publication.
- 35. DECLARATION OF THE PRIORITY HUMAN SETTLEMENTS AND HOUSING DEVELOPMENT AREAS (PHSHDAs)

I, LN Sisulu, Minister of Human Settlements, Water and Sanitation, having taken cognisance of Section 3 of the Housing Act (No. 107 of 1997) read in conjunction with Section 7 (3) of the Housing Development Agency Act, 2008 (No. 23 of 2008), the Spatial Planning and Land Use Management Act (SPLUMA) (No. 16 of 2013), and the Infrastructure Development Act (No. 23 of 2014), hereby declare the following 136 Priority Human Settlements and Housing Development Areas (PHSHDAs).

I, Fikile April Mbalula, Minister of Transport, in terms of section 23(2)(a) of the National Railway Safety Regulator Act, 2002 (Act No. 16 of 2002) as amended, hereby determine as indicated in the Schedule, fees that the Railway Safety Regulator must charge for safety permits, with effect from 1 April 2020 to 31 March 2021.

The Safety Permit Fees are published for compliance and general information.

SCHEDULE

PERMIT FEES PAYABLE TO THE RAILWAY SAFETY REGULATOR

1. Definitions

For the purpose of calculating fees:

"activity" means the activities undertaken by operators on a railway network;

"annual passengers" means the total number of passengers transported aboard railway operator's passenger or commuter rolling stock between two points (i.e. a station of boarding and of disembarkation) with the exception of a train operator's personnel, over the period of an operator's most recently completed financial year;

"annual tons" means the total sum of the mass of dangerous or general goods loaded onto a locomotive by a train operator in the preceding financial year, and transported along the portion of a rail network for which the train operator has a permit to traverse;

"cape gauge" means a type of railway track where the distance between the two rails of the track is 1,067 millimetres in length;

"general freight or passenger operators" means network, train or station operators (or a combination thereof) whose operations include the transportation of passengers and freight that excludes dangerous or mining goods;

"mine operations" means the operations undertaken above surface by train, network, and station operators to support mining activities;

"non-rail related revenue" means revenue generated by Train Operators, Network Operators or Station Operators whose railway operation is incidental to its main business;

"passengers" means people transported by a train between two points (i.e. a station of boarding and of disembarkation) with the exception of a train operator's personnel;

"rail-related revenue" means the gross inflow of cash arising from all rail operating activities of an operator;

"relevant risk-based fee rate" means the rand value equivalent of the risks attributable to rail activities. The units of measurement include R/Kilometres (for network operations), R/number of stations (for station operator), R/passenger kilometres (for passenger operations), and R/ton kilometre (for freight operations);

"standard gauge" railway track where the distance between the two rails of the railway track is 1,435 millimetres in length; and

"tourist passengers" means passengers transported aboard railway operator's rolling stock between two points (i.e. a station of boarding and of disembarkation) for recreational purposes, with the exception of a train operator's personnel and commuter passengers.

2. Application Fees

A non-refundable application fee must accompany an application for a safety permit. The fees specified in the categories **Operator category and amount** column of the Schedule shall be payable in respect of the corresponding **application fees for general safety permit** that is applied for as specified in the first column of the Schedule indicated as follows: -

REQUEST FOR COMMENTS FROM INTERESTED PARTIES ON GUIDELINES AND CONDITIONS RELATING TO THE EXTENSION OF SAFEGUARD MEASURES

The International Trade Administration Commission of South Africa (the Commission) requests interested parties to make submissions and/or comments on the below guidelines and conditions relating to the extension of safeguard measures.

1. Purpose

1.1 The purpose of this document is to provide a reference and procedural guide pertaining to the application for an extension of safeguard measures in terms of Amended Safeguard Regulation 21.7.

2. Scope

- 2.1 The scope of this document covers the application process by applicants for an extension safeguard measures in terms of Amended Safeguard Regulation 21.7 which provides that:
 - A definitive measure may be extended by a period of up to six years where the Commission finds that:
 - (a) the lapse of the safeguard measure imposed in terms of subsection 6 is likely to lead to the recurrence of serious injury; and
 - (b) there is evidence that the SACU industry is adjusting.
- 2.2 The extension of a safeguard measure is envisaged in the regulations as follows:

 Regulation 21.4, "The Commission shall provide representatives of countries that have a substantial

interest in a general safeguard investigation 30 days for consultations prior to the application or extension of a definitive safeguard measure with a view to, inter alia,

- (a) reviewing the information relating to
 - (i) evidence of serious injury or threat thereof caused by increased imports;
 - (ii) the precise description of the product involved;
 - (iii) the proposed measure;
 - (iv) the proposed date of introduction;
 - (v) the expected duration of the measure; and
 - (vi) the timetable for progressive liberalisation;
- (b) exchanging views on the measure; and
- (c) discussing ways to maintain a substantially equivalent level of concessions and other obligations vis-à-vis that country.

3. Requirements

- 3.1 The SACU industry must bring an application to ITAC containing information on the subject product relating to likelihood of recurrence of serious injury and or threat thereof caused by increased imports and evidence that the SACU industry is adjusting.
- 3.2 An application shall be made to ITAC in writing, by or on behalf of the SACU industry. An application shall be submitted in both hard copy and electronic formats (confidential and non-confidential).
- 3.3 An application shall be regarded as brought by or on behalf of the SACU industry if
 - (a) at least 25 per cent of the SACU producers of the like product by domestic production volume support the application; and
 - (b) of those SACU producers of the like product that express an opinion on the application, at least 50 per cent by domestic production volume support such application.
- 3.4 In the case of fragmented industries involving an exceptionally large number of producers, the Commission may determine support and opposition by reference to the largest number of producers that can be reasonably included in the investigation.
- 3.5 The rules relating to confidential information as contained in the ITA Act will apply to all correspondence, which unless clearly indicated to be confidential and filed together with a non-confidential version, will be placed on the public file and be made available to other interested parties.
- 3.6 A public file will be available for inspection at the Commission's offices by all interested parties, by appointment, and interested parties are encouraged to inspect the public file regularly.
- 3.7 On receipt of an application, the Trade Remedies unit shall liaise with the SACU industry to ensure that all required information has been submitted in the required format.

Properly documented application

- 3.8 In determining whether an application constitutes a properly documented application and is therefore complete, the Commission shall determine whether the application includes such information as is reasonably available to the applicant relating to the required information.
- 3.9 The Commission will identify deficiencies in an application that is not properly documented and return the application to the applicant.
- 3.10 The application must contain injury information for the period of time when the safeguard measure was in place and an estimate should the safeguard measure lapse.
- 3.11 The application must contain information on how the industry is adjusting as contemplated in the adjustment plan.
- 3.12 The Commission will after considering the merits of an application made on behalf of SACU industry decide to initiate an investigation if it is satisfied that there is *prima facie* proof of likelihood of recurrence of injury should the measures lapse.

3.13 In the event that the Commission makes a negative merit assessment, it shall inform the applicant concerned accordingly and supply it with adequate reasons for its decision.

4. Initiation

- 4.1 An investigation shall be formally initiated through publication of an initiation notice in the *Government Gazette*.
- 4.2 The initiation notice shall contain at least the following:
 - (a) the identity of the applicant;
 - (b) a detailed description of the product under investigation, including the tariff subheading applicable to the product;
 - (c) the country or countries of origin;
 - (d) a summary of the factors on which the allegation of serious injury is based;
 - (e) the address to which representations by interested parties should be directed; and
 - (f) the time frame for responses by interested parties.
- 4.3 A period of 20 days from the date of publication of the initiation notice will be provided for interested parties to submit comments to the Commission.
- 4.4 The investigation shall consist of a single investigation phase.

5. Essential facts

- 5.1 All participating interested parties will be informed of the essential facts to be considered by the Commission in making its final determination.
- 5.2 All interested parties will receive 7 days from dispatch of the essential facts letter to comment in writing on the essential facts.
- 5.3 The Commission may grant interested parties a single extension upon good cause shown if a written request for extension is received prior to the deadline, and the extension will apply only to the party to which such extension was granted.
- 5.4 The Commission will take all relevant comments on the essential facts into consideration in its final finding.

6. Final determination

- 6.1 The Commission will take all relevant comments on the essential facts that have been timeously submitted into consideration in its final determination.
- 6.2 The Commission's final recommendation will be forwarded to the Minister of Trade Industry and competition for final determination.
- 6.3 The Commission shall make available a final report on reasons and conclusions reached on issues of fact and law considered by the Commission once the Minister determination has been published.

1. Introduction

This questionnaire should be completed by an applicant requesting extension of safeguard measures. It is important that that applicant provides all the information required in the prescribed manner.

Purpose

The purpose of this questionnaire is to help the Southern African Customs Union (SACU) industry bring together in a concise and logical form the information needed by the International Trade Administration Commission (the Commission) to decide whether or not to initiate a formal investigation, and may also serve as a basis for further investigation.

- 3. Legal framework
- 3.1. Safeguards investigations are conducted in terms of the International Trade Administration Act, 2002 (Act 71 of 2002) (the ITA Act), and Safeguard Regulations read with the WTO Agreement on Safeguards.
- 3.2 If the application is based in part on confidential material the application must contain a non-confidential version of the confidential material together with an explanation of why it is confidential. Section 33 of the ITA Act provides as follows:
- "(1) A person may, when submitting information to the Commission, identify information that the person claims to be information that –

is confidential by its nature; or

the person otherwise wishes to be recognised as confidential.

(2) A person making a claim in terms of subsection (1) must support that claim with a written statement in the prescribed form-

explaining, in the case of information that is confidential by its nature, how the information satisfies the requirements set out in the definition of "information that is by nature confidential" in section 1(2); or motivating, in the case of other information, why that information should be recognised as confidential; and

either -

a written abstract of the information in a non-confidential form; or a sworn statement setting out the reasons why it is impossible to comply with subparagraph (i)."

These summaries should be in sufficient detail to permit a reasonable understanding of the substance of the information submitted in confidence. Therefore where confidential and non-confidential versions are supplied, parties must:

Indicate where information has been omitted in each case;

Provide reasons for confidentiality in each instance;

Provide a summary of the confidential information which permits a reasonable understanding of the substance of the confidential information in each instance; and

Where information is not susceptible to a non-confidential summary, indicate this in each instance and provide a sworn statement setting out the reasons why the information is not susceptible to summarisation.

The Commission will not formally accept an application until a proper non-confidential version has been submitted in accordance with the above guidelines. If, in terms of section 34 of the ITA Act, the Commission finds that a request for confidentiality is not warranted and if the applicant is either unwilling to make the information public or to authorise its disclosure in summarised format, the Commission will not consider such information in determining the merits of the application.

4. General instructions

- 4.1 Applicants should provide full and accurate information. All cost related information should be reconcilable to the financial statements.
- 4.2 Please take note that the rules relating to confidential information and the submission of non-confidential versions of submissions applies to all correspondence, which unless clearly indicated to be confidential and filed together with a non-confidential version, will be placed on the non-confidential file and be made available to other interested parties.
- 4.3 The non-confidential file is available for inspection by interested parties at the Commission's offices, by appointment.

NOTICE OF AN INITIATION OF THE INVESTIGATION FOR REMEDIAL ACTION IN THE FORM OF A SAFEGUARD MEASURE AGAINST THE INCREASED IMPORTS OF BOLTS WITH HEXAGON HEADS OF IRON OR STEEL

The International Trade Administration Commission of South Africa (the Commission) decided to proceed with an investigation for remedial action in the form of a safeguard against the increased imports of bolts with hexagon heads of iron or steel.

Based on the information submitted, the Commission decided that the applicant submitted prima facie information to indicate:

- Events cited can be regarded as unforeseen developments that led to the surge or increase in volumes of imports;
- SACU industry is suffering serious injury; and
- There is a causal link between the serious injury suffered by the applicant and the surge in volumes of imports.

THE APPLICANT

The application was lodged by South African Iron and Steel Institute (SAISI) on behalf of the South African Fasteners Manufacturers' Association (SAFMA). SAFMA members are the only producers of the subject product in the SACU, thereby constituting 100% by production volume of the domestic industry. SAFMA members are CBC Fasteners (Pty) Ltd (CBC), Transvaal Pressed Nuts Bolts and Rivets (Pty) Ltd (TPN), SA Bolt Manufacturers Company (Pty) Ltd (SAB) and Impala Bolt and Nut (Pty) Ltd (Impala). SAISI is a representative organization serving the collective interests of the primary steel industry in South Africa.

DESCRIPTION OF THE SUBJECT PRODUCT UNDER INVESTIGATION

The applicant described the imported products as bolts with hexagon heads of iron or steel, imported under tariff sub-heading 7318.15.43

DESCRIPTION OF THE LIKE OR DIRECTLY COMPETITIVE SACU PRODUCT

The SACU product is described as bolts with hexagon heads of iron or steel.

ALLEGATION OF SERIOUS INJURY AND CAUSAL LINK

The period of investigation for data evaluation for the purposes of determining the allegation of serious injury is 01 July 2015 to 30 June 2019.

The injury analysis relates to information submitted by CBC Fasteners (Pty) Ltd, SA Bolt Manufacturers (Pty) Ltd and Transvaal Pressed Nuts, Bolts & Rivets (Pty) Ltd representing more than 80% of the SACU industry by production volumes.

The Applicant alleged and submitted *prima facie* information indicating that it is experiencing serious injury in the form of a decline in sales volumes, output, market share, utilisation of capacity, net profit and productivity for the period 1 July 2015 to 30 June 2019.

On this basis the Commission found that *prima facie* information was submitted to indicate that the SACU industry was suffering serious injury which could be causally linked to the surge in the volumes of imports of the subject products.

UNFORESEEN DEVELOPMENTS

The Applicant submitted that a confluence of events forms the basis of the unforeseen development that supports this application. This confluence of events is led notably by China which is the biggest producer of global fasteners, accounting for more than 50% of global fasteners capacity and output.

The Applicant stated that during the Uruguay Round of negotiations, South Africa did not foresee the following events:

- The unprecedented steep rate of increase in fasteners production capacity (including the subject products) over the ensuing two decades (increased 8 folds since 1994) to support growing construction and manufacturing activity, as well as to help build infrastructure, particularly in emerging economies;
- The contraction of the world economy and in particular the Chinese economy resulted in the contraction of demand for fasteners, that contribute to the imbalance between capacity and demand;
- Record export volumes by countries with excess capacity, especially Chinese producers fueled by excess capacity and output; and
- This excess output, capacity and export volumes led by China, displaced
 production in other regions, thus harming producers in other markets. This has
 already led to several trade actions by major fasteners markets, including the
 SACU market. The fact that their markets are now protected, contracts the global
 demand for fasteners even further, exasperating the problem of increased
 imports into the SACU;

This investigation will be conducted in accordance with the International Trade Administration Act, 2002 (ITA Act) and the International Trade Administration Commission Safeguard Regulations (SGR) read with the World Trade Organization Agreement on Safeguards (the Safeguard Agreement).

Please note that if any information is considered to be confidential, <u>a non-confidential</u> <u>version of the information must be submitted</u> for the public file, simultaneously with the confidential version. In submitting a non-confidential version, the following rules are strictly applicable and parties must indicate:

- where confidential information has been omitted and the nature of such information;
- reasons for such confidentiality;
- a summary of the confidential information which permits a reasonable understanding of the substance of the confidential information; and
- in exceptional cases, where information is not susceptible to summary, reasons must be submitted to this effect.

This rule applies to all parties and to all correspondence and submissions to the Commission, which unless indicated to be confidential and filed together with a non-confidential version, will be placed on the public file and be made available to other interested parties.

If a party considers that any document of another party, on which that party is submitting representations, does not comply with the above rules and that such deficiency affects that party's ability to make meaningful representations, the details of the deficiency and the reasons why that party's rights are so affected must be submitted to the Commission in writing forthwith (and at the latest 14 days prior to the date on which that party's submission is due). Failure to do so timeously will seriously hamper the proper administration of the investigation, and such party will not be able to subsequently claim an inability to make meaningful representations on the basis of the failure of such other party to meet the requirements.

Subsection 33(1) of the ITA Act provides that any person claiming confidentiality of information should identify whether such information is *confidential by nature* or is *otherwise confidential* and any such claims must be supported by a written statement, in each case, setting out how the information satisfies the requirements of the claim to confidentiality. In the alternative, a sworn statement should be made, setting out reasons why it is impossible to comply with these requirements.
