HIGH ALERT: SCAM WARNING!!!

TO ALL SUPPLIERS AND SERVICE PROVIDERS OF THE GOVERNMENT PRINTING WORKS

It has come to the attention of the *GOVERNMENT PRINTING WORKS* that there are certain unscrupulous companies and individuals who are defrauding unsuspecting businesses disguised as representatives of the *Government Printing Works* (*GPW*).

The scam involves the fraudsters using the letterhead of *GPW* to send out fake tender bids to companies and requests to supply equipment and goods.

Although the contact person's name on the letter may be of an existing official, the contact details on the letter are not the same as the *Government Printing Works*'. When searching on the Internet for the address of the company that has sent the fake tender document, the address does not exist.

The banking details are in a private name and not company name. Government will never ask you to deposit any funds for any business transaction. *GPW* has alerted the relevant law enforcement authorities to investigate this scam to protect legitimate businesses as well as the name of the organisation.

Example of e-mails these fraudsters are using:

PROCUREMENT@GPW-GOV.ORG

Should you suspect that you are a victim of a scam, you must urgently contact the police and inform the *GPW*.

GPW has an official email with the domain as @gpw.gov.za

Government e-mails DO NOT have org in their e-mail addresses. All of these fraudsters also use the same or very similar telephone numbers. Although such number with an area code 012 looks like a landline, it is not fixed to any property.

GPW will never send you an e-mail asking you to supply equipment and goods without a purchase/order number. *GPW* does not procure goods for another level of Government. The organisation will not be liable for actions that result in companies or individuals being resultant victims of such a scam.

Government Printing Works gives businesses the opportunity to supply goods and services through RFQ / Tendering process. In order to be eligible to bid to provide goods and services, suppliers must be registered on the National Treasury's Central Supplier Database (CSD). To be registered, they must meet all current legislative requirements (e.g. have a valid tax clearance certificate and be in good standing with the South African Revenue Services - SARS).

The tender process is managed through the Supply Chain Management (SCM) system of the department. SCM is highly regulated to minimise the risk of fraud, and to meet objectives which include value for money, open and effective competition, equitability, accountability, fair dealing, transparency and an ethical approach. Relevant legislation, regulations, policies, guidelines and instructions can be found on the tender's website.

Fake Tenders

National Treasury's CSD has launched the Government Order Scam campaign to combat fraudulent requests for quotes (RFQs). Such fraudulent requests have resulted in innocent companies losing money. We work hard at preventing and fighting fraud, but criminal activity is always a risk.

How tender scams work

There are many types of tender scams. Here are some of the more frequent scenarios:

Fraudsters use what appears to be government department stationery with fictitious logos and contact details to send a fake RFQ to a company to invite it to urgently supply goods. Shortly after the company has submitted its quote, it receives notification that it has won the tender. The company delivers the goods to someone who poses as an official or at a fake site. The Department has no idea of this transaction made in its name. The company is then never paid and suffers a loss.

OR

Fraudsters use what appears to be government department stationery with fictitious logos and contact details to send a fake RFQ to Company A to invite it to urgently supply goods. Typically, the tender specification is so unique that only Company B (a fictitious company created by the fraudster) can supply the goods in question.

Shortly after Company A has submitted its quote it receives notification that it has won the tender. Company A orders the goods and pays a deposit to the fictitious Company B. Once Company B receives the money, it disappears. Company A's money is stolen in the process.

Protect yourself from being scammed

- If you are registered on the supplier databases and you receive a request to tender or quote that seems to be from a government department, contact the department to confirm that the request is legitimate. Do not use the contact details on the tender document as these might be fraudulent.
- Compare tender details with those that appear in the Tender Bulletin, available online at www.qpwonline.co.za
- Make sure you familiarise yourself with how government procures goods and services. Visit the tender website for more information on how to tender.
- If you are uncomfortable about the request received, consider visiting the government department and/or the place of delivery and/or the service provider from whom you will be sourcing the goods.
- In the unlikely event that you are asked for a deposit to make a bid, contact the SCM unit of the department in question to ask whether this is in fact correct.

For the purpose of this sub-paragraph the following applies:
- (i) The provisions of section 133 to 136:
- (ii) The provisions of section 138 to 142, S142A, S143, S144 and S145;
- (iii) The provisions of section 146 unless the Collective Agreement of the Council provides that the Arbitration Act, Act 42 of 1965 applies to any arbitration conducted under its accredited function and which Collective Agreement is binding on the parties to the disputes; and
- (iv) The provisions of section 148.

3. EXTENSION OF ACCREDITATION:

Despite the expiry of the period of accreditation as stated in the Certificate of Accreditation, the Council may continue to perform its accredited functions in respect of any dispute referred to it during the period of accreditation, but not yet resolved by the time the period expires, until the dispute is resolved either through conciliation or arbitration.

NOTICE OF INTENTION TO INTRODUCE A PRIVATE MEMBER'S BILL AND INVITATION FOR COMMENT ON THE DRAFT ELECTORAL LAWS AMENDMENT BILL, 2020

Mr Mosiuoa Gerard Patrick Lekota, MP, acting in accordance with section 73(2) of the Constitution of the Republic of South Africa, 1996 ("the Constitution"), intends to introduce the Electoral Laws Amendment Bill, 2020, in Parliament during the fourth quarter of 2020. An explanatory summary of the Bill is hereby published in accordance with Rule 276(1)(c) of the Rules of the National Assembly (9th Edition).

To date, the electoral system for the National Assembly and Provincial Legislatures in South Africa is one where political parties (and not individuals) contest elections. After each general election, each qualifying party is allocated a number of seats in the National Assembly and Provincial Legislatures, calculated according to a formula contained in Schedule 1A of the Electoral Act, 1998 (Act No. 73 of 1998) ("Electoral Act, 1998"), reflecting as closely as possible the proportion of votes that qualifying parties obtained in the general elections. Each party determines which of its members will fill the seats so allocated.

While the requirement of proportionality is met in such a system, voters are estranged because a direct relationship with a member of Parliament is absent and a lack of accountability of members of the relevant legislatures to its voters prevails much to their chagrin. The increasing and continuing alienation of voters from the political system is detrimental to democracy and the well-being of society at large.

From the time the Freedom Charter was agreed to, the clear intention was to allow the people to be close to their representatives to allow for them to be seen to be governing with them. However, the kind of partnership that was envisaged in the Freedom Charter never materialised after the demise of Apartheid. Furthermore, it quickly became clear that the continued arrangement to use the "closed list" proportional representation system was going to impede the transformation of South Africa, and be detrimental to the interests of the majority who had long suffered political oppression under both colonial and Apartheid rule and continue to be excluded from economic life of South Africa.

As the years wore on and every attempt to reform the electoral system was stymied in Parliament for one reason or the other, voter disenchantment grew correspondingly. To

exacerbate the situation, voters are unable in terms of the current Electoral Act, 1998, to choose an independent candidate to represent them in Parliament more effectively.

This situation has prevailed despite the fact that section 19(3)(b) of the Constitution provides that:

"Every adult citizen has the right to stand for public office and, if elected, to hold office."

However, the content of this right entrenched in section 19(3)(b) was finally determined in the recent Constitutional Court judgment in the New Nation Movement NPC and others v the President of the Republic of South Africa and others matter ("New Nation Movement judgment"). In this matter, the Constitutional Court considered whether the Electoral Act, 1998, unjustifiably limits the right in section 19(3)(b) and also in section 18 (freedom of association) of the Constitution by making the accessing of political office possible only through membership of political parties. After considering and examining the content of these rights, including other sections of the Constitution, the Constitutional Court declared the Electoral Act, 1998, to be unconstitutional to the extent that it requires that adult citizens may be elected to the National Assembly and Provincial Legislatures only through their membership of political parties - thus paving the way for independent candidates to stand for elections.

While voters who vote for an independent candidate will enjoy the benefits thereof, all voters, without exception, should equally enjoy a very direct link between themselves and their genuine representatives for reasons that are abundantly obvious. This is absolutely necessary in fast tracking the ever so long delay in tackling the upliftment of the majority of South Africans who have not benefitted to the extent that they should have with the coming of democracy.

Hence, the argument for combining proportionality with constituency representation is overwhelming. Only persons have the capability of representing voters in a granular manner, not political parties. To achieve this personal association with a public representative, each of South Africa's current fifty-two districts could, as per their population size, serve as a larger or smaller multi-member constituency which could be contested by individuals as well as political parties through an "open list" proportional representation system.

At present, most districts in South Africa are failing dismally and serially with local government being in a perpetual and lamentable crisis. With a district becoming a constituency, a scaffolding of political representation becomes immediately possible in each district. Each district, therefore, will have councillors as well as dedicated representatives serving in the National Assembly and Provincial Legislatures as well. The constitutional requirement for inter-governmental cooperation will also be meaningfully enhanced in this way at once.

Hence the Electoral Laws Amendment Bill, 2020 ("the draft Bill") will seek to address the *New Nation Movement* judgment by amending relevant electoral legislation in order to make provision for independent candidates to stand for public office in provincial and national elections, without requiring such candidate to be a member of a particular political party. It will provide for a legislative mechanism to allow independent candidates to stand for election and allowing elections to happen in constituencies that align with districts using the "open list" proportional representation, which will best serve the interests of every South African and most particularly those who have remained marginalised, neglected and increasingly alienated from the politics of the day.

The draft Bill will therefore, *inter alia*, seek to amend:

- the Electoral Commission Act, 1996 (Act No. 51 of 1996), so as to provide for, and to regulate, the registration of independent candidates;
- the Electoral Act, 1998 (Act No. 73 of 1998), so as to, *inter alia*, give full effect to section 19(3)(b) of the Constitution, which provides that every South African citizen has the fundamental right to stand for public office and, if elected, to hold office; to ensure that individuals can stand for office as independent candidates without having to stand for office by virtue of his or her membership of a political party; to provide for the creation of constituencies along current district boundary lines and the replacement of the "closed list" proportional representation system with the "open list" proportional representation system with greater requirements for all candidates to uphold the Constitution and to give impetus to the realisation of the Bill of Rights; and to promote democratic governance and electoral accountability; and
- any other relevant legislation so as to provide for independent candidates to participate in election broadcasts and political advertisements on an equitable basis with political parties; to provide for independent candidates to receive financial and administrative assistance to enable them to perform their functions effectively; and to provide for related and other consequential matters.

SUNSET REVIEW OF THE ANTI-DUMPING DUTIES ON GYPSUM
PLASTERBOARDS ORIGINATING IN OR IMPORTED FROM THAILAND AND
INDONESIA: FINAL DETERMINATION

In accordance with the provisions in the Anti-Dumping Regulations (ADR), any definitive anti-dumping duty shall be terminated on a date not later than five years from the date of imposition, unless the authorities determine, in a review initiated before that date on their own initiative or upon a duly substantiated request made by or on behalf of the domestic industry, that the expiry of the duty would likely lead to the continuation and/or recurrence of dumping and injury.

On 8 June 2018, the International Trade Administration Commission of South Africa (the Commission) notified interested parties through Notice No. 326 of 2018 in *Government Gazette* No. 41685, that unless a substantiated request is made indicating that the expiry of the anti-dumping duties on boards, sheets, panels, tiles and similar articles of plaster or of compositions based on plaster, not ornamented, faced or reinforced with paper or paperboard only, not ornamented (gypsum plasterboard) originating in or imported from Thailand and Indonesia would likely lead to the continuation or recurrence of dumping and injury, the anti-dumping duties on gypsum plasterboard originating in or imported from Thailand and Indonesia will expire on 31 July 2019.

The sunset review investigation was initiated pursuant to Notice No: 395 of 2019 in *Government Gazette* No. 42593, published on 26 July 2019. Initiation letters to interested parties were sent on 29 July 2019. The due date for responses was 04 September 2019.

The investigation was initiated after the Commission considered that the expiry of the anti-dumping duties on gypsum plasterboard originating in or imported from Thailand and Indonesia would likely lead to the continuation or recurrence of dumping and the recurrence of material injury.

Responses to the Commission's exporter's questionnaire were received from two exporters/manufactures in Indonesia, namely PT. Siam-indo Gypsum Industry and PT Aplus Pacific. The questionnaire response by Siam-Indo Gypsum Industry was accepted as properly documented by the Commission for purposes of its final determination. However, the questionnaire response by PT Aplus Pacific was regarded as deficient, as the deficient response was received 10 days after the Commission's deadline.

After considering all information submitted, the Commission issued essential facts letters indicating that it was considering making a final determination that the expiry of the anti-dumping duties on gypsum plasterboard originating in or imported from Thailand and Indonesia would likely lead to the continuation or recurrence of dumping and the recurrence of injury.

Comments to the "Essential facts" letters were received from PT. Siam-Indo Gypsum Industry and the Government of Indonesia.

After considering all the comments received from interested parties to the Commission's essential facts letters, the Commission made a final determination that the expiry of the anti-dumping duties on gypsum plasterboard originating in or imported from Thailand and Indonesia (excluding that manufactured by PT. Siam-Indo Gypsum Industry) would likely lead to the continuation or recurrence of dumping and the recurrence of material injury.

The Commission, therefore, recommended to the Minister of Trade and Industry that the current anti-dumping duties on gypsum plasterboard originating in or imported from Thailand and Indonesia (excluding that manufactured by PT. Siam-Indo Gypsum Industry) be maintained.

The Minister approved the Commission's recommendation. The Commission's detailed reasons for its decision are set out in Commission's Report No. 624 (Final determination report).

On 14 August 2020, the South African Revenue Service (SARS) published the amendment of Schedule 2 to the Customs and Excise Act, 1964 through Notice in *Government Gazette* No.43614.

SCHEDULE

- In these rules "the Act" shall mean the Pharmacy Act, 53 of 1974, as amended, and any expression to which a meaning has been assigned in the Act shall bear such meaning.
- 2. The following rule to Annexure A of the *Rules relating to good pharmacy practice* is hereby amended
 - (a) Rule 2.32 Minimum Standard for the disposal and destruction of medicines and scheduled substances.

Rule 2.32 MINIMUM STANDARD FOR THE DISPOSAL AND DESTRUCTION OF MEDICINES AND SCHEDULED SUBSTANCES

Rule 2.32 is hereby repealed and replaced as follows:

2.32.1 Introduction

The disposal and destruction of medicines and scheduled substances may only take place in accordance with the Medicines and Related Substances Act, 101 of 1965 and other applicable legislation.

Regulation 44 of the *General Regulations* published under the Medicines and Related Substances Act, 101 of 1965 states that -

- a medicine or scheduled substance shall only be destroyed by a waste treatment facility authorised to destroy medicines or pharmaceutical waste in terms of the National Environmental Waste Management Act, 59 of 2008;
- (2) no medicines or scheduled substances other than those as determined by the South African Health Products Regulatory Authority (SAHPRA) shall be disposed of into municipal sewerage systems; and
- (3) the disposal and destruction of medicines or scheduled substances must be conducted in such a manner to ensure that the medicines or scheduled substances cannot be salvaged, and the medicine or scheduled substance has been denatured.

In addition, pharmacists and persons authorised to handle medicines in terms of the Medicines and Related Substances Act, 101 of 1965, should not dispose of medicines and scheduled substances in refuse that may be destined for landfill or municipal refuse sites.

2.32.2 Purpose

The purpose of this standard is to ensure that the disposal and destruction of medicines and scheduled substances within pharmacies, medicines rooms or Primary Health Care Clinic (PHC) dispensaries is undertaken safely and in accordance with the requirements of Regulation 44 of the *General Regulations* under the Medicines and Related Substances Act, 101 of 1965, relevant waste management legislation and with due regard to minimising the risk of such an activity causing harm to the environment or harm to the health of the population.

2.32.3 Definitions

- (a) **Authority** in terms of these Rules shall mean the South African Health Products Regulatory Authority (SAHPRA).
- (b) **Disposal** in terms of these Rules shall mean the removal of medicines and scheduled substances from the pharmacy, medicine room or PHC dispensary for

- purposes of destruction by a waste treatment facility duly authorised by the National Environmental Waste Management Act, 59 of 2008.
- (c) **Destruction** in terms of these Rules shall mean rendering the medicines and scheduled substances unusable or irretrievable for use or consumption, taking into consideration the environment and harm to the health of the population.
- (d) Waste treatment facility means a site licensed in terms of the National Environmental Waste Management Act 59 of 2008 that may be used to accumulate waste for the purpose of storage, recovery, treatment, reprocessing, recycling or sorting of that waste. N.B. Council requires that the waste treatment facility be in possession of a certificate specifically to dispose of medical waste, in line with Section 51(1)(a) of the National Environmental Waste Management Act 59 of 2008.

2.32.4 General considerations

Some of the elements in this standard are not statutory requirements but are good practice which pharmacists would be expected to follow whenever feasible.

- (a) All destruction must take place in accordance with local municipal regulations regarding the disposal of chemical or medicinal waste. The person responsible for the destruction may be requested to prove that the method of destruction is in accordance with such regulations.
- (b) All medicines and scheduled substances (including medicines and scheduled substances returned by patients) must be disposed in such a manner that does not allow recovery or retrieval.
- (c) For the disposal and destruction of medicines or scheduled substances, refer to Regulation 44 (4-6) of the *General Regulations* (2017) published under the Medicines and Related Substances Act, 101 of 1965.

2.32.5 Minimum requirements for the disposal of medicines and scheduled substances

The disposal must be properly documented. All quantities removed must be recorded in a pharmacy stock management system. In the case of specified schedule 5 (where applicable) and schedule 6 medicines and scheduled substances, the quantities of medicines and scheduled substances to be disposed must be indicated in the relevant register and signed by the witnesses required in the procedure.

2.32.5.1 The following details should be recorded:

- (a) name, quantity, strength, batch numbers (if applicable) and dosage form of the medicines and scheduled substances;
- (b) date of expiry of the medicines and scheduled substances;
- (c) in the event of the information detailed in Rule 2.32.5.1(a) and (b) not being available, the weight of the medicines and scheduled substances;
- (d) name, position and signature of the person and the witness disposing the medicines and scheduled substances;
- (e) reason for the disposal; and

- (f) date of disposal.
- 2.32.5.2 Medicines and scheduled substances destined for destruction should be separated into six types and labelled accordingly as these follow different destruction rules:
- (a) solid dosage forms;
- (b) creams, ointments and powders;
- (c) ampoules and liquids (contained in glass);
- (d) aerosols;
- (e) radioactive drugs; and
- (f) cytostatic and cytotoxic medicines.
- 2.32.5.3 Collection and on-site transportation of medicines and scheduled substances destined for destruction must be collected on a regular basis to avoid accumulation of the waste.

2.32.6 Minimum requirements for the destruction of medicines and scheduled substances

Subsequent to the destruction detailed in Regulation 44(4) to (6) of the *General Regulations* under the Medicines and Related Substances Act, 101 of 1965, the waste treatment facility shall issue a certificate and maintain a record of the destruction. The certificate shall contain the following information:

- (a) name of the medicine or scheduled substance (if known) or the schedule of the medicine or scheduled substance concerned;
- (b) quantity destroyed;
- (c) date of destruction of the medicine or scheduled substance:
- (d) name and designation of a pharmacist (s) and other persons in line with Regulation 44(4) to (6) in whose presence such destruction took place; and
- (e) other information as determined by the Authority.

The certificate and the record of the disposal and destruction for the pharmacy, medicine room or PHC dispensary must be kept onsite for 5 years.

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
