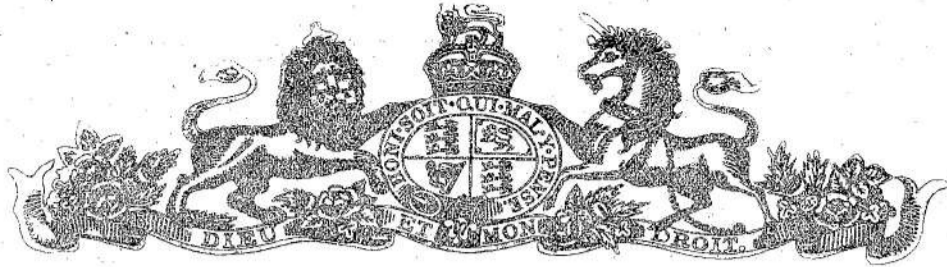

## HIGH COMMISSIONER'S NOTICE No. 70 OF 1920.

Notice is hereby given that His Excellency the High Commissioner, acting under the powers conferred on him by section one of Proclamation No. 26 of 1917, has been pleased to make the following regulations in regard to the sale of sugar in Basutoland:—

1. No wholesale merchant or agent of any wholesale merchant in Basutoland shall on and after the date of this notice sell any sugars the produce of the Union of South Africa at prices exceeding the following maximum prices, viz:—

- No. 1 grade sugars, 54s. per 100 lb.;
- No. 2 grade sugars, 50s. per 100 lb.;
- No. 3 grade sugars, 46s. per 100 lb.;

plus in each case the actual transport expenses and cost of insurance incurred in respect of the particular transaction.

2. No person shall sell by retail on and after the date of this notice any sugars, the produce of the Union, at prices exceeding the following maximum prices, viz:—

- No. 1 grade sugars, 8d. per lb.
- No. 2 grade sugars, 7½d. per lb.
- No. 3 grade sugars, 7d. per lb.

3. In the case of traders at a distance from the railway, when the maximum retail price does not allow of profit being made, the Resident Commissioner may, on application, grant such addition to such retail price as will allow of a profit being made, such profit to be calculated to the nearest halfpenny per lb. gross.

4. The above-mentioned prices shall not be taken as applying to cube, castor, or icing sugars, whether or not produced in the Union.

5. Any sale of sugars by one dealer to another or to a manufacturer shall be deemed to be a wholesale transaction, and every other sale of sugar to any person shall be deemed to be a retail transaction.

6. For the purposes of these regulations, sugars, whether or not produced in the Union, shall be classified under three grades, namely:—

- (1) No. 1 grade, which shall comprise first quality white and first quality yellow sugars only;
- (2) No. 2 grade, which shall comprise second quality white and second quality yellow sugars only;
- (3) No. 3 grade, which shall comprise all sugars not classed either as No. 1 or No. 2 grade sugars.

7. No person shall, on and after the date of this notice, offer any sugars, the produce of the Union of South Africa, for sale to any person or firm in Basutoland unless such sugars

(a) have been graded by the Union Board of Sugar Graders appointed under the terms of Union Government Notice No. 838 of 17th May; and

(b) are contained in pockets or other containers that are indelibly and conspicuously marked "No. 1 grade," "No. 2 grade," or "No. 3 grade," as the case may be, in the manner or form required by the Union Board of Graders.

8. No person shall, on and after the date of this notice, sell either wholesale or retail any sugars other than the produce of the Union at a price exceeding a maximum price, which is hereby fixed at fourpence and one halfpenny per pound; provided, however, that if any such sugars are submitted to the Union Board of Graders for classification they may be sold wholesale or retail, as the case may be, at the maximum prices fixed for like grades of sugars produced in the Union, and the seller shall, when such sugars are graded, comply with all the

conditions imposed under paragraphs 1, 2, 7, and 9 of these regulations on the sellers of Union-produced sugars in respect of the sale and delivery thereof.

9. In every transaction in sugar, whether by a wholesale merchant or a retail trader, the invoice shall not only disclose the price paid or to be paid for such sugar, but shall describe the sugar sold and referred to therein according to the grade thereof as set forth in paragraph No. 6 of these regulations; and every bill of lading, railway, or other consignment note relating to any transaction aforesaid shall likewise describe the grade or grades of the sugars referred to therein.

10. Any person who is in possession of reliable information that the above-mentioned orders are being evaded by any person or firms is required to give information thereof without delay to the nearest Assistant Commissioner or to the Resident Commissioner.

Notice No. 56 of 1920 is hereby cancelled.
